MR. FIELDING'S MISTAKES.

Mr. Fielding's Budget speech of last Session proves to have been good deal out of the way. It was mearly at the end of the fiscal year when he spoke, but his estimate of the expenditure for 1905-6 was \$1,159,360 too low. This is in current expenditure alone. The capital outlay, has been \$452,216 above Mr. Fielding's estimate, so that altogether he was a million and a half out in his reckoning. Finance Minister expressed the hope that there would be no increase in the net national debt during the year. As a matter of fact there was last year an increase of over \$800,-000 in the debt of the country in spits of the alleged surplus of \$13,-000,000. It is a great thing for a government to have a surplus, but the kind which Mr. Fielding produces always go with an increase of

THE LONDON ELECTION SCAN-DAL.

The enquiry into the methods by which the seat for London was stolen for Hon. Mr. Hyman has gone on. About eighty persons have now sworn that they were paid for their votes on the scale explained by Deputy Returning Officer Jerry Col-Many of them made the agreement with him personally to receive the money after he had noted that their ballots were properly marked. Some of them bargained with others. The confession of Collins stands substantially as he made it, all the efforts to break down his testimony proving vain, while scores of electors have gone on the stand to confirm it. In one day's sittings of the Court thirteen persons swore that they had made a corrupt agreement for the sale of their vote, most of them beceiving the standard price of \$10, payable on delivery of their vote, as certified by the Deputy Returning Officer holding up his right hand. Two received only \$5.00 each, and in a few cases the pay-masters deducted fifty cents commission, leaving \$9.50 for the vote.

The influence of noise upon-infant mortality, he continued, was much more serious than was at present dreamed of, He had seen the growth of dufants who lived in or near noisy streets greatly arrested, and their removal to quieter localities had enabled them to recover. "The noises of clocks, bells, and chimes, such as Big Ben, are nothing but relics of barbarism—the baneful accompaniments of the right."

Str. Jennie Saves 49 Out Of 150 Men On House Boat In Gale

ANOTHER BOAT WAS LOST

Key West, Fla., Oct. 22.—Survivors from one of the houseboats of the Florida east coast railway extension along the Keys tell a harrowing tale of death and destruction caused by the storm of Thursday. Crushed by the Waves.

W. P. Dusenbery, civil engineer in charge of the work on Long Key, who wonderfully escaped death, arrived here on the Austrian steamer Jennie, among other survivors rescued.

He said houseboat No. 4, on which were 150 men was struck by the storm.

were 150 men, was struck by the storm early Thursday morning, and was driven out into the guif. The houseboat soon began to break up, and as the great waves hit her, men, singly and in twos and threes, were washed into the sea and drowned. Some went held of the protection, but when the top

into the sea and drowned. Some went below for protection, but when the top of the boat was carried away the waves rushed in and the boat soon went if pieces. Thirty or forty of the men were crushed to death in the collapse.

Men Cling to Timbers.

The others grabbed timbers to save them from drowning. Mr. Dusenbery was in the hold, but succeeded in getting a log, and floated until Friday night. To one piece of timber sixteen men were clinging; nine were hanging to another. The sides of the houseboat were crowded with men. It turned ever three times, each time reducing the number.



Various Causes That Bring About au Attack of Vertigo.



T. C. Robinette, for the defence, got permission to ask for particulars, but waived the right, pleaded not guiky and asked for a jury trial. He did, however, register formal objection to the jurisdiction of the magistrate to try the case.

Winnipeg's Centennial.

Ernest Thomson Seton thinks that the arrival of the first settlers in the Red River district in 1808 should be fittingly commemorated by the holding in Winnipeg of a centennial celebration. It was in 1808 that Lord Selkirk's first settlers arrived to begin the life of farmers as distinguished from the trading and hunting life of the plains. 

GREAT CARLIST CRISIS

MOST SERIOUS WHICH HAS ARIS-EN SINCE ALFONSO'S BIRTH.

A remarkable feature about the pressent Carlist recrudescence is the large nums of money which now are being pent in connection with the movement and which are said to be furnished by he religious orders and grantagularly. the religious orders, and particularly by the Jesuits. One of the difficulties with which the Carlists have had to contend during the last two decades has been the lack of money, which is indispensable to the success of all poli-



tical or revolutionary movements. True Don Carlos himself is rich, thanks to his enjoyment of a life interest in the enormous fortune of his first wife and to his refusal to accord any share thereof to the children which she bore with his money, save where his own comfort and the extravagance of his present nonroyal wife, Bertha de Rohan, are concerned. He has resolutely declined to contribute a penny piece to the Carlist cause or even to relieve the wants and destitution of veterans of his cause who have sacrificed their property and their liberty for his sake, while he is so niggardly in his treatment of the four children by his first wife that two of his daughters are suing him for at least a share of their dead mother's at least a snare of their dead mother's fortune. It is certain, therefore, that it is not he who is furnishing the money in the present instance.

Nor does it come from his only son, Don Jaime, the active head of the move-

Don Jaime, the active head of the movement, whose allowance is so small that he has been obliged to pawn his jewelry in Paris, as revealed by a sensational lawsuit there last year. The nobles and capitalists in Spain possessed of wealth are not disposed to risk its confiscation for the sake of a pretender who declines to subscribe towards his own cause. It looks, therefore, as if the story were true according to which the religious orders are financing the present Carlist movement.

church expect to terrorize the Government and the king into submission by
the menace of a full-fledged Carlist insurrection it is impossible to say. But
it is worthy of note that a number of influential Carlists have disappeared from their homes in Spain, presumably having gone to join Don Jaime, and that troops are being massed along the northern frontier line and sea coast to resist any Carlist descent upon the shores or invasion through the Pyre-

ness.

Don Jaime, the only son of Don Carlos and the acknowledged leader of the militant branch of the Carlist cause, is militant branch of the Carlist cause, is liable to prove a much more dangerous adversary than his father ever was. For, unlike the latter, he is a soldier by profession, has seen a considerable amount of active service in the Russian cavalry, and was one of the few princes of the blood who went through the war with Japan in Manchuria. He received his education at the Jesuit College of Beaumont in England, is a clever, forceful writer, an accomplished man, and possessed of much personal magnetism, which, combined with his reputation for reckless bravery, contributes to render him popular. In fact, he possesses all the qualities needed for the leader of an insurrection, and unless something unforeseen occurs, such as the complete surrender by the Spanish Government to the church, it will not be long before he will raise the standard of revolt in Spain and sol-

Chang Te Fu, Province of Honan, China, Oct. 23.—The autumn manceuvres of the Chinese imperial army began yesterday in the neighborhood of Chang Te Fu. About 30,000 troops are engaged, under the command of Yuan Shikai, commander-in-chief of the Chinese forces, and including cavalry, infantry and artillery, the latter army consisting of 150 guns. The troops engaged in the operations are equipped with the most modern accourtements, and have been drilled and trained by foreign officers. Thirty artillery attaches of foreign powers are closely following the operations.
