

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REPORT OF THE COUNCIL

OF THE

Dominion of Canada Rifle Asssociation,

1888.

In presenting the Twenty-first Annual Report of the proceedings of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association to its members, the Council have the pleasure to congratulate them on a successful year's operations, both financially and in the decided improvement in the quality of the shooting at the annual competition at Ottawa, the lowest score in the grand aggregate being higher than the highest in 1887.

The Association loses a substantial friend, in the departure from this country to a higher office in India of the late Governor-General the Marquis of Lansdowne, who before leaving presented to the Association as a parting gift the sum of Two hundred and fifty dollars, which was by resolution at the last Annual Meeting expended in a Silver cup to be called the Lansdowne Challenge Cup as a reminiscence of so constant and generous a Patron.

His Excellency the Governor-General, Lord Stanley of Preston, on his arrival, kindly promised his distinguished patronage to the Association and generously offered a subscription to the funds similar to that given by his predecessors, namely, Five Hundred Dollars, and expressed his desire to assist the Association by every means in his power; the thanks of the Association are therefore due to His Excellency for his liberality and the deep interest he evidently takes in the welfare of the Association.

The thanks of the Association are also due to the Government and Members of the House of Commons for the liberal grant voted to the Association at the last Session of Parliament;

To the Hon. Sir Adolphe P. Caron, K.C.M.G., Minister of Militia and Defence, for his continued interest in the affairs of the Association;

To the Chairman of Council, Lt.-Col, Hon. J. Ald. Ouimet, M.P., for his fourth donation to the General Prize Fund;

To the President and Directors of:-

The Bank of Montreal, for their 8th yearly donation. The Bank of British North America, for their 8th yearly donation. The Canadian Bank of Commerce, 8th The Merchants Bank of Canada, 8th The Imperial Bank, of Toronto, 66 8th The Molson's Bank, of Montreal, 66 7th The Bank of Hamilton, 7th The Dominion Bank, of Toronto, 66 7th 66 The Bank of British Columbia, 66 66 7th 66 The Eastern Townships' Bank, 66 66 3rd 66

To Mr. J. H. Steward, Optician to the Association, 406 Strand, London, England, for a handsome Silver Cup; and to Mr. Arthur L. Howard, of Brownsburg, Quebec, for a Whitney-Kennedy repeating rifle.

The Canada Club of London again presented to the Wimbledon Team a handsome Silver Cup for the member thereof making the highest aggregate score at the Wimbledon meeting, for which the thanks of the Association are due.

Lt.-Col. Frank Bond, Commanding the Prince of Wales' Rifles, was appointed to the command of the Wimbledon Team, and his report shows that Col. Humphrey, Commanding the Cambridge University Rifles, had arranged everything for their comfort in camp at Cambridge, where they had a week's practice before proceeding to Wimbledon. He speaks highly of the kindness and courtesy shown to the Team at Cambridge by Col. Humphrey and others, which made the week's sojourn there very pleasant and the Association owe a debt of gratitude for the hospitality shown.

The doings of the Team at Wimbledon are fully detailed by Col. Bond in the report to be found at the end of this, which is well worthy of perusal. The amount of Prize Money won was £323. Sergt. Alex. Wilson, 33rd Battalion, made the highest aggregate of the Team, and consequently was the winner of the Canada Club Cup.

The competition for the Kolapore Cups, in which four teams took part, was close and interesting, and was won by the Mother Country Team with a score of 687, the Canadians being second with a score of 674, only 13 points behind.

The Council have pleasure in reporting a very successful prize meeting at the Rideau Range.

The annual competition of the Association was carried out most satisfactorily. The attendance was not quite up to the previous year, but was only nine competitors less, namely, 354, as compared with 363 in 1887. The timing of the Extra Series and Martini matches worked very well and gave general satisfaction, and, as will be seen by the comparative statement to follow, there was more firing thereat than the previous year, although the attendance was somewhat less. The improvement in the quality of the Snider ammunition was a matter of congratulation; at the Competitors' Meeting it was highly praised, and it was recommended to Council that each match should be fired in future throughout with the same rifle, and if possible that the Snider be used, so as to render the carrying of two rifles on the same day unnecessary.

The minutes of the proceedings of the Competitors' meeting will be found at the end of this report.

The new team match for the Lansdowne Challenge Cup proved very attractive, no less than thirty-three teams competing in it.

Every Province was again represented, and several new corps competed, showing that the interest in the Association is extending.

Although the matches are so arranged as to be all open to H. M. Regular Forces, both Army and Navy, those forces are never represented at the Annual Matches at Ottawa, which is to be regretted, as the associating of the Regulars with the Militia Forces would undoubtedly have a good effect. It is hoped that another Annual gathering will see a representation from the Garrison and Squadron at Halifax.

The addition of two long range targets to the accommodation at the Rideau Range was fully taken advantage of, there being an increase of 303 entries at the long ranges as compared with 1887.

The increase in the number of Rifle Associations affiliating this vear is very satisfactory, but the number of annual subscribers is still limentably below what it should be.

A Presentation of Prizes took place on Friday afternoon at the President's Marquee, when there were present, amongst many others, The Right Hon. Sir John A. Macdonald, P.C., G.C.B., The Hon. Sir Adolphe P. Caron, K.C.M.G., The Hon. Sir John Thompson, K.C.M.G., Minister of Justice, The Hon. J. G. Haggart, Postmaster-General, The Hon. C. H. Tupper, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, and Sir Fred. and Lady Middleton. The attendance of Prize Winners was very small, and it is a question deserving of consideration of Members at the Annual General Meeting of the Association whether means cannot be found to induce competitors to attend in larger numbers to receive their prizes.

The Council would neglect a pleasing duty did they not thank the Executive Officer, the Range Officers and the Staff generally employed at the Annual Matches for the very efficient manner in which they performed their arduous duties.

FINANCE.

For a full statement of the finances of the Association the Council refers to the Treasurer's accounts duly audited and submitted herewith.

The Balance sheet shows the total receipts from all sources for the year to have been \$18,123.57 which with the balance of \$2,440.34 from last year makes a total on the credit side of \$20,563.91.

The expenditure amounted to \$18,120.83, leaving a balance of \$2,443.08 in favor of the Association.

In the ordinary sources of revenue certain increases will be observed. The affiliation fees from Rifle Associations amounted to \$873.00 as against \$752.00 in 1887, an increase of \$121.00.

The number of Rifle Associations affiliating being 63, as compared with 54 in 1887, an increase of one Provincial and eight County and other Rifle Associations. The Moosomin N. W. Territories' Rifle Association affiliating for the first time as a Provincial Association.

Members subscriptions for the year being \$300.00 as compared with \$280.00 in 1887, a small increase of \$20.00.

Associate Members amounted to \$287.00 a decrease of \$20.00 as compared with last year, this may be accounted for by a number of Competitors becoming full Members of the Association.

The Receipts from special donations amount to \$920.00 as against \$600.00 last year. An increase of \$320.00, in which is included the parting gift of \$250.00 received from the Marquis of Lansdowne, before his departure from Canada, and which is to be devoted towards the purchase of a challenge trophy, for competition annually.

The special donations from Banks amounted to \$800.00, the same as last year, and there are no contributions to report this year under the head of Manufacturer's.

The net receipts from entry fees including post entries and fines, exclusive of the charge for ammunition, amounted to \$3,746.86 as against \$3,576.01 in 1887, an increase of \$170.85.

Receipts from sale of ammunition this year amounted to \$1,071.02 as against \$900.46 in 1887, an increase of \$170.56, this is accounted for to some extent by the increase in quantity of "Martini Henry" ammunition used in the competition this year.

Prizes in cash and badges amounted to \$7,206.57, an increase of \$512.87, as compared with last year.

The expenditure connected with the Wimbledon Team this year amounted to \$5,782.00 as against \$5,811.96 in 1887, a decrease of \$29.96.

A detailed statement of the disbursements made by Lt-Colonel Bond, Commanding Wimbledon Team of 1888, will be found in the appendix.

REPORT OF

LIEUTENANT-COLONEL FRANK BOND.

Commanding Wimbledon Team, 1888.

To Lt.-Colonel, The Honorable G. A. Kirkpatrick, President of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association:

SIR,—Having been appointed to the command of the Canadian Wimbledon Team for 1888, I have the honor to report, that in accordance with the instructions received, I proceeded to Quebec on the 21st of June 1888, and took over the command from Col. Bacon who had inspected the team. The members were all present and properly equipped, and subscribed to the regulations.

We left Quebec on the 21st of June 1888, on board of the Sarmatian. Staterooms had been engaged for us in advance and were quite satisfactory except in two cases, where I had to place four men in a cabin. I think this is not advisable, where the comfort of the members of the team is a serious consideration and must be studied, when one appreciates fully the magnitude of the work they have in hand.

We had a very rough and stormy passage, and nearly all the members of the team suffered more or less.

We arrived at Moville at 10 a.m. on Saturday the 30th of June, and I telegraphed to Col. Humphrey, informing him of our probable arrival at Cambridge on Monday.

We landed in Liverpool on Sunday morning the 1st of July, and after breakfast on board ship proceeded to the Lime street station and stopped at the North Western Hotel, as we could not go on the Cambridge, there being no connection with the train to Cambridge at Bletchley; this connection I think could be arranged with the railway authorities if taken in hand in advance, and would be much better for the team, as they could settle down at once to their work, and also save considerable expense.

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st .; We left Liverpool on Monday morning at seven o'clock for Cambridge. I telegraphed before starting to Col. Humphrey letting him know about our movements and probable hour of our arrival; and it was well I did so, as he afterwards told me it enabled him to make arrangements for our reception.

We arrived at Cambridge at two o'clock and drove to the ranges, where we were to camp and practice for a week, in a pouring rain. We found our tents pitched and dinner ready, thanks to the kindness of Col. Humphrey, and every thing had been airanged to make us as comfortable as possible, but we were unable to begin practice that afternoon on account of the rain, which continued to come down in torrents.

We commenced practice on Tuesday morning, the 3d of July, and made the most of our time, but under very trying weather.

On Wednesday the 4th, we fired a match with the Cambridge volunteers and were victorious. We practiced steadily each day, but with the weather very disagreeable, and on Thursday a terrific storm broke over the town, the rain pouring through our tents; altogether it was practicing under great difficulties.

At the invitation of Col. Lord Wantage, I proceeded with Col. Humphrey to a meeting of a local volunteer corps at Churn, in Berkshire, for the purpose of seeing their rifle range, one of the places proposed for the National Rifle meeting in case Wimbledon will have to be given up. It is certainly a very suitable place, the only drawback being the distance from London, taking about one hour and a quarter to get there.

Through the courtesy of Col. Humphrey, Major Roberts, of Caius College, and others, our stay at Cambridge was rendered very pleasant. I sent in advance to Wimbledon and made all the entries for the team, and also made arrangements for our camp.

We left Cambridge at 7 a. m. on Saturday the 7th of July, and arrived at Wimbledon at 3:30. Our tents were ready for us and we soon made ourselves as comfortable as possible, considering it had poured rain all day.

I endeavoured to make the Canadian camp as beautiful and attractive as it has been in former years.

On Monday the 9th of July we took part in our first match for this season, at Wimbledon, and were well pleased with the result, seven of our men taking prizes in the Alexandria.

I regret that more of our men did not secure places in the first stage of the Queen's, as I feel certain that many of them would have come in well at the finish.

The Canada club through their Secretary Mr. Sim, advised me of their intention to offer for competition a cup, and requesting me to make such disposal of it as I thought best. It was decided to award it to the member of the team making the highest score in the Hop Bitters Aggregate and it was won by Lieut. Chamberlin of the 43rd Batt.

The Corporation of London cup was given to the member making the highest aggregate score during the meeting and was won by Sergeant Alex. Wilson, 33rd Batt., with the handsome score of 320 points.

It will be seen by comparing the scores of other years, that while the firing has been very much better than usual, our men have been able to hold their own, and as the returns will show, have made a higher aggregate than usual.

The prize money secured by members of the team amounts to £3 2 3.

The competition for the Kolapore Cups attracted a great deal of interest, notwithstanding the fact that only four teams competed, but it was known that the Canadians had been shooting well, and the Captain of the Mother Country had picked out the best eight men of the United Kingdom, and after a close competition we were defeated by 13 points only, Jersey coming in third.

The weather was the worst known for years, very cold and wet, the thermometer ranging two mornings from 42 to 44 degrees in our marquee, and the fields were often turned into swamps, making it very trying for the members of the team.

I noticed that many members of the home teams did not camp out, but lived in houses in Putney and Wimbledon, and drove out to the ranges.

I was glad to receive a visit from Colonel Gzowski, and who was also present during the Kolapore competition, and who always takes a warm interest in the welfare of the Canadians.

The Duke of Cambridge, I regret to say, was unable to inspect the team, as he was detained in London by important business; however, they were inspected by Colonel Lord Wantage, President of the

National Rifle Association, Colonel the Honorable H. F. Eaton, Grenadier Guards, Commander of the camp, and a brilliant staff. Fortunately the afternoon turned out remarkably fine, and while Lord Wantage was inspecting the team Her Royal Highness Princess Louise and Marquis of Lorne drove up and visited the camp. Lord Lorne expressed to the team his great pleasure in seeing the Canadians once more at Wimbledon and the interest he always feels towards the Canadian people.

Sir Charles Tupper, the Mayor of Ottawa and a large number of prominent Canadians visited the camp.

We are indebted to Dr. Rae for having made the members of the team honorary members of the Royal Colonial Institute.

The London Scottish with their usual hospitality made the Canadian team members of their mess, as did also the Westminster Rifles.

Nothing could exceed the kindness and attention shown the Canadian team by the officers of the National Rifle Association, and the name Canadian is a pass-word to the best of everything on Wimbledon common.

I take particular pleasure in acknowledging the services of my Adjutant, Captain Wright, 43rd Batt. He devoted his whole time and great energy towards securing the comfort and welfare of the members of the team, and a great deal of the success of the team is due to his careful management. The conduct of the members was highly satisfactory; there has not been even the smallest misunderstanding, but on the contrary a desire on all sides to comply with every order and to make the name of Canadian stand higher than ever with all those with whom they came in contact with.

I have endeavored to keep the expenses of the team as moderate as possible, consistent with the high reputation of the Canadian camp.





On the motion of Lt.-Col. Thomas Ross, seconded by Lt.-Col. White, 43rd Battalion, was appointed Chairman and Major Sam Hughes, 45th Battalion, was made Secretary.

Lt.-Col. White on taking the chair, referred to the benefits arising from past meetings, the great complaint of last year's meetings of the bad quality of the Snider ammunition, made at the Government factory at Quebec, had been entirely removed, as the ammunition furnished from that factory this year has given general satisfaction.

Major Delamere, 2nd Q. O. Rifles, suggested that Major Perley should give to the meeting an outline of the improvements made in the ammunition of 1888.

Major Perley explained that the improvement was due to a change in the formation of the bullet.

It was then moved by Lieut. Macnachtan, Cobourg Garrison Artillery, seconded by Major B. A. Weston, 66th Battalion—

That the thanks of the competitors at this meeting and of the Volunteers of the Dominion be tendered to the Hon. Sir Adolphe P. Caron, K. C. M. G., Minister of Militia and Defence, for the prompt manner in which he repaired the defect in the ammunition complained of, and laid before him by the Executive of the Association, and that we now desire to express our utmost confidence in that now issued, as it has proved of first quality, we also desire especially to thank Major Perley for the able manner in which he pointed out those defects, and through whom the changes in a great measure have been made.

Major Weston referred to past Meetings held here, whereat the arm with which the Canadian Militia are armed was condemned, owing to defective ammunition, he thought it the duty of this Meeting to make it known that the Militia have every confidence in the ammunition.

Captain J. T. Hartt endorsed Major Weston's remarks.

Major Blaiklock supported the resolution.

Major Delamere congratulated the Department on the ammunition, as did also Captain Adam. He said that both shells and contents were superior to the English.

Captain Weeks, P.E.I. Engineers, also endorsed all the complimentary remarks relative to the ammunition.

The resolution was then put and carried amidst applause.

About this time Colonel Kirkpatrick, President of the Association entered, and was greeted with a round of applause.

Major Perley explained the process of manufacture of the Martini cartridge.

Complaint having been made of the price charged for Martini ammunition, the Chairman, Lt.-Col. White, announced that after consultation with the President, he was able to announce that the price for Martini ammunition would be reduced to 20c. a package.

The President in a brief address welcomed the competitors. He regretted being late at the meeting but had come direct from the train to the hall. He referred to the success of the meeting, and expressed pleasure at the improvement in the Snider ammunition.

Sergeant R. P. Doyle referred to the prevalence of complaints of competitors having to fire in matches without sighting shots; some got in at the extra series, and others did not before firing on their scores. He thought there should be more Snider shooting.

Captain Adam endorsed much that Sergeant Doyle had expressed.

Pte. Sutherland, G. G. F. G., suggested that pool targets might be antroduced, when competitors might fire two pool tickets as sighters.

Major Blaiklock agreed with former speaker relative to pool targets but thought it advisable to open all targets for a short time before matches for pool firing.

Major Weston did not agree with Major Blaiklock's idea of opening all the targets for pool shooting, he moved, seconded by Major Delamere—

"That it be a recommendation to council to provide pool targets at its next annual competition in such numbers and at such distances as they may think desirable."—Carried.

Major Perley explained that no additional targets could be placed on the Rideau Range.

Captain Macdonald, of Guelph, outlined how pools were fired at the O.R.A. Meetings over all extra series targets before matches. Sergt. Doyle thought that the old system of sighting shots should be returned to. He moved, seconded by Q.M. Sergeant Cleveland—

"That at future meetings the old system of two sighting shots be re-established."—Lost on a division.

Captain A. P. Sherwood suggested that owing to the improvement in the Snider ammunition, the Dominion of Canada Match might be fired throughout with that rifle.

Captain Hood, 5th Royal Scots, suggested that each range officer should check the scoring tickets with the black boards and initial the tickets before the scores were rubbed off the boards.

Major Weston stated that the Executive had already resolved to to carry out that proposal.

Lt.-Col. Allan, 2nd Q. O. Rifles, suggested that special officers be appointed for that duty.

Captain A. P. Sherwood then moved, seconded by Capt. Bruce, 10th Royal Grenadiers—

"That in the opinion of this meeting, owing to the great improvement in the quality of the Snider ammunition, all matches should in tuture be fired throughout with the same rifle, and that as far as possible matches should be so arranged, that only one description of rifle should be necessary on any one day.—Carried.

Major Weston then moved that the meeting adjourn .-- Carried.

REGULATIONS.

The Prize Meeting of the Association will be conducted by a Special Committee of five members (three to form a quorum), appointed by the Executive Committee, either from the Executive Committee or other Members of Council, with power of substitution by the Executive Committee from time to time as occasion may demand, and said Special Committee shall have power to hear and determine all matters arising at the meeting submitted for their consideration, and their decision or that of a majority of them, shall be final, conclusive and binding, but they or a majority of them may at their discretion refer any question to the Executive Committee, in which case the decision of the Executive Committee shall be final.

NOTICE TO COMPETITORS.

- 1. Competitors must make themselves acquainted with the Regulations, as also with the conditions of any match for which they have entered as in neither case will the plea of ignorance be entertained.
- 2. Competitors must refer to the Notice Board morning and afternoon to ascertain whether orders have been issued altering the original detail of the shooting, or affecting them seriously.
- 3. Competitors must, when at the firing point, comply with all orders given by the range officers on duty.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

- I.—No Active Militiaman shall shoot as a member of more than one corps.
- II.—No Officer, Non-commissioned Officer, or Private, employed by the D. R. A. for duty at the firing points or in the butts, shall shoot either for a prize or for practice.

III.—In competitions restricted to Active Militiamen, or in which they shoot as such, the uniform of their corps shall be worn, in accordance with the Regulations and Orders of the Militia, viz.:

a. Tunic, patrol or regulation fatigue jacket. Elbow caps of leather or other material will not be allowed.

b. Trousers.

c. Regimental head dress, or a cap cover, with or without a cap under it. Cap covers or puggarees may be worn over the regimental full or undress cap, and greatcoats or waterproofs over uniforms.

Officers of a corps must all appear dressed in the same order as must also Non-commissioned Officers and Privates. Where a duly authorized undress for officers exists, they (the officers) may appear in it, although the Non-Commissioned Officers and Privates may be in full dress. Waist belis must be worn, except when firing.

d. In competitions not restricted to the Active Militia, competitors must appear strictly in uniform as above, or wholly in plain clothes. (See Reg. XIX c.)

Note. —In "Military Matches" the above rules shall not apply, as special details for dress are issued.

IV.—All protests or objections shall be made at once to the Secretary or Range Officers on duty, and when practicable, in writing. When a protest is in the first place made verbally, it must subsequently be put in writing, and handed to the Secretary not later than one hour after the occurrence on which the the protest is founded, and the Executive Committee reserve the right to refuse or accept any protest received or presented after the expiration of that time.

V.—Competitors must submit their rifles and ammunition for inspection whenever required.

VI.—Fixed or artificial rests will not be allowed, except in Skirmishing Matches.

VII.—Competitors shall only use the mats provided by the Association. Cork beds and elbow rests will not be allowed.

VIII.—No wiping out between shots will be permitted.

IX.—"Blowing off" shall not be allowed at the firing points, or after competitors have taken their position for firing. Pits will be provided at places near the firing points where competitors can "blow off" before joining their squads on presentation of a "blow off" ticket, which will be sold for 5 cents each, and include the cost of one round of ammunition to be obtained from the person in charge, on delivery of ticket.

X.—No competitor shall load until he has taken his position at the firing point, and the Register Keeper has given the word "All Clear."

XI.—Slings may be used in all matches, but they must be of the Government length and pattern, white, brown or black, and attached to the rifles as in Government arms.

XII.—In individual competitions—competitors may use a binocular or telescope, *not mounted on any kind of stand*, provided their doing so causes no delay in the shooting.

XIII.—After a competitor has taken his place at the firing point, no person, except the Register Keeper, or an Officer on duty, will be permitted to speak to him.

XIV.—In Matches where both team and individual prizes are being competed for, coaching of any kind is strictly prohibited.

XV.—In *Matches* where the prizes are offered to *teams only*, the members of each team shooting together will be permitted to 'coach' or "spot" for each other, and to use binoculars or telescopes for that purpose, provided their doing so does not delay or impede the shooting. The duly recognized Captain or Adjutant of a team, although not himself shooting, will be permitted to assist his team in like manner, and to appoint spotters to assist him. With the above exception no other persons will be allowed within the ropes, or permitted to offer advice or instruction to the competitors.

XVI.—Any violation of these rules, or any part of them, must be at once reported by the Register Keeper to the officer in charge, who will caution the offender, and on any repetition of the offence shall report the same to the Executive Officer, that the case may be dealt with by the Special Committee as laid down, under the head of "penalties," and the person or persons offending may be removed from the firing points.

XVII.-PENALTIES-DISQUALIFICATIONS.

Any competitor-

- (a) Who shall fire in a name other than his own; or
- (b) Who shall fire twice for the same prize, unless permitted by the conditions of the competition to do so; or
- (c) Who shall intentionally discharge his rifle at the wrong target;
- (d) Who shall offer money, or a bribe of any kind, to any employee of the Association, under any pretence whatever; or
- (e) Who being cognizant of any attempt to defraud the Association shall fail to report the same with due diligence to the Council, Executive or Special Committee; or
- (f) Who shall be guilty of any conduct which the Council, Executive or Special Committee may consider discreditable; or
- (g). Who shall be reported to the Council, Executive or Special Committee as having been elsewhere guilty of such conduct, or the aforesaid offences; or
- (h) Who shall directly or indirectly make any arrangement with any other competitor for pooling or dividing any prize,

shall, upon the occurrence being proved to the satisfaction of the Council, Executive or special Committee, or on the receipt of such report from any Affiliated or duly recognized Association, forfeit all his entrance fees and prizes, and be disqualified from competing at any Prize Meeting of the Association, until reinstated.

XVIII.—EXCLUSION FROM FURTHER COMPETITION DURING THE MEETING.

Any competitor—

- (a) Who shall fire when the danger signal is up; or
- (b) Who shall discharge his rifle on the range except in accordance with the regulations for shooting; or
- (c) Who shall be found with a loaded rifle, except when at his proper firing point and engaged in competing; or

- (d) Who from a proper want of care discharges his rifle accidentally. [If such discharge is due to a defect in his rifle an ample and satisfactory explanation must be given]; or
- (e) Who shall alter or make any erasures on his firing ticket; or
- (f) Who shall act in any way that might prove dangerous;

shall, upon the occurrence being proved to the satisfaction of the Special Committee, be excluded from all further competition at the meeting, and shall forfeit all his entrance fees.

XIX.—DISALLOWANCE OF SCORES.

Any competitor—

- (a) Who shall fail to comply with the conditions laid down for any particular prize; or with the orders of the Executive or Range officers; or
- (b) Who shall infringe any of the instructions and regulations for the conduct of the meeting while shooting for any particular prize; or
- (c) Who shall shoot dressed partly in uniform and partly in plain clothes. (See Reg. III. d);

shall, on the occurrence being proved to the satisfaction of the Special Committee, have his score for that particular prize disallowed, and if such disallowance refers to the Grand Aggregate, he shall also forfeit all claim to shoot in the Governor General's Match.

XX.—FINES.

Any Competitor who shall accidentally fire at the wrong target shall be fined one dollar, to be paid forthwith to the Range Officer.

In cases where a competitor is "excluded from further competition," or where his "score is disallowed," for any particular prize, the *circumstances only* under which the penalty was incurred shall be posted on the notice board, as a warning to others, without the NAME of the individual implicated.

In cases of "disqualification," the NAME of the offender as well as the particulars of the case shall be posted on the notice board.

XXI.—MITIGATION OF PENALTIES.

The Special Committee shall have power to vary, mitigate or remit any of the above penalties.

XXII.—PRIZE WINNERS.

- (a) Unless otherwise specified, no one will be allowed to take more than one prize in any competition.
- (b) Winners of prizes will, on signing the official prize list, receive the amount or amounts due to them from the Treasurer of the Association.
- (c) If a formal presentation of prizes takes place, winners being Active Militiamen, must parade in the full dress uniform of their corps.
- (d) All Challenge Cups and Sheild must be returned to the Secretary on or before the 15th August, 1889.

XXIII.—DISTANCES AND TARGETS.

The Targets shall be of the following dimensions:

MILITARY MATCH TARGETS.—At all ranges 6 feet long, 2 feet 6 inches high.

XXIV.—SIGNALLING—SCORING.

- 1. The signalling will be as follows:-
 - (a) Bull's Eye, counting....5.... White disc.

(b) Inner4....Red disc.

(c) Magpie3.. Black and White disc.

(d) Outer2....Black disc. (e) RicochetR....Black bar.

- (f) Misses will not be signalled; but if a target is lowered under the impression that it has been hit, and if no hit is found on it, after raising it the marker will wave a black disc, to signify that the target has not been struck.
- 2. When two shots strike a target simultaneously, that which has the highest value will alone be signalled with the signal disc, and the competitor whose proper turn it was to fire at the target will be credited with the shot, provided he has fired. Both shots will, however, be shown by spotting discs.
- 3. On a target being lowered, the position of a hit, if any, will be shown by the spotting disc when the target is again raised.
- 4. The signalling shall not be questioned, but if a shot is not signalled, and the officer in charge of the firing points be satisfied that a reasonable doubt exists as to whether the shot may have struck the target, he may call on the Officer in charge at the butt to examine the target, and the result of such examination as signalled shall be final. Any competitor challenging a shot shall deposit the sum of fifty cents with the officer in charge of the firing point, which shall be forfeited in case no hit is found on the target.
- 5. If on a target being raised the *spotting disc* appears manifestly to disagree with the *signal disc*, the Register Keeper shall stop the firing at the target, and report the circumstances to the Range Officer, who shall decide the shot after enquiry of the Officer in charge at the butt, but no deposit will be required, nor shall there be any appeal from the decision given.
- 6. All claims for shots signalled *must be made before* another shot is fired at the target in question.
- 7. If at the moment at which a competitor fires, his target should be lowered in such a manner as to falsify the result of his shot, the Range Officer is empowered to cancel the result of such shot, and to permit the competitor to fire another shot in its place.

- 8. All alterations of the register must be initialled by the officer making them, but no alterations, except in the case of a clerical error, shall be made without his first having signalled to the butt.
- 9. No person will be permitted to go and examine a target during the meeting except the Executive Officer or such person or persons as he may duly authorize to do so in his behalf.

In Skirmishing.

When the number of hits counted on the target exceeds the number of shots allowed in the competition, three marks shall be deducted for every such hit in excess of the number of such shots, unless it be proved that such hits on the targets in excess of the number of shots allowed, could only have been made by competitors in the squad firing more than the authorized number of rounds, in which case the squad shall be disqualified.

XXV.

The rifles shall be Snider (Long and Short) and Martini-Henry rifles, either of Government issue or of *bona fide* Government pattern, and bearing the Government viewer's mark.

- Weight of Snider not to exceed, without bayonet, 9 lbs. 12 oz.
 Weight of Martini-Henry, without bayonet, not to exceed
- 2. No pad or shoe for the heel plate will be allowed.
- 3. Minimum pull of trigger, 6 lbs.
- Sights to be strictly in accordance with those of the Government issue. Filed sights not to be allowed.
- (a) All sights may be temporarily blackened or whitened, but black and white must not be mixed so as to produce grey, and no application of colour will be allowed after the competitor has taken his position at the firing point.

No application of a permanent nature will be allowed.

No shading of sights will be allowed.

(b) The back sight may be tilted forward or backward, or supported at any angle by any extemporized means.

(c) The sliding bar may be inverted and used on either side of the uprights. One permanent centre line for the Snider, and three for the Martini¹Henry will be allowed, and temporary marks or line of any kind removable at pleasure may be used, but not consisting of slips of paper or other substance capable of being shifted or removed.

XXVI.—AMMUNITION.

None but the ammunition issued by the D. R. A. on the ground shall be used or allowed.

XXVII.—POSITION.

Unless otherwise specified the shooting at all ranges shall be from the firing points, and may be in any position, with the head to the range.

In the Standing position the whole of the left hand must be in front of the trigger guard, and the left elbow clear of the body.

XXVIII.—ORDER OF SHOOTING.

- 1. Competitors must be present at the firing points punctually at the time detailed on their tickets, otherwise they will not be allowed to shoot; the time to be regulated by the clock in the Secretary's office, "Blowing off" and all other preliminaries must be completed before hand, and will not be allowed as excuses for delay.
- 2. In all ordinary competitions competitors shall, when possible, be formed up by files, and fire shot and shot *alternately*.
- 3. When but one competitor is present, he shall fire his shots without undue delay; but the officer in charge of the firing point or some one named by him, must witness the shooting, and countersign the register. Failing such verification the score will be invalidated. Any person present whom the competitor may name will watch the score recorded, and if need be raise objection before the next shot is fired.
- 4. No two competitors shall shoot in any competition except in the Martini matches, with the same rifle; nor shall a competitor change his rifle at any range during a competition unless his first rifle should become unserviceable through an accident, which must be verified by the Officer in charge.

- 5. The competitor must, after delivering each shot, pay attention to the score called out by the Register-Keeper, and himself see that such score is correctly entered on the Register, so that any objection to the score recorded may be investigated before the next shot is fired.
- 6. In the case of unreasonable delay in firing on the part of any competitor, or of such delay as the Range officer may consider likely to prolong the firing beyond the time allowed, the Range Officer shall have the right to caution and time the competitor by a sand glass purporting to run one minute, more or less, and if after such caution the competitor does not fire before the sand glass has run out, the Range Officer shall declare the score forfeited and call on the next competitor to proceed with his firing.

XXIX.-TIES.

Ties shall be decided as follows:-

A. In Individual Competitions for a Series of Prizes

- 1. If at more than one distance by the range totals in inverse order, commencing at the longest range.
 - 2. By the fewest outers.
 - 3. By the fewest magpies.
 - 4. By the fewest inners.
 - 5. By the value of each shot in inverse order.

In the case of ARSOLUTE TIES.

- (a) If for PRIZES, IN KIND, by shooting off as in clause B.
- (c) In the case of a prize PART IN KIND AND PART IN MONEY, by shooting off for the Prize in Kind, and dividing Money.

These sub-sections apply also to competitions at single distances. Where a "possible score" is made, the maker shall fire three shots immediately after.

N. B.—In all competitions the *order* of the winners shall be decided by the foregoing rules, if possible, but in the case of absolute ties the names shall be arranged alphabetically and bracketted.

B. In individual Competition for a Single Prize.

- 1. By the aggregate score in five rounds at the longest distance.
- 2. By firing single shots until decided.

Absentees shall forfeit their claim to shoot.

C. In team Competitions.

- 1. If at more than one distance, by the aggregate range totals in inverse order.
 - 2. By the fewest outers.
 - 3. By the fewest magpies.
 - 4. By the fewest inners.
 - 4. By the highest scores in each team shooting off, as in clause B.

D Grand Aggregate.

Equal numerical scores for the first 5 places, and for the last place or places, shall be decided by the result of firing 5 shots at 500 yards, with Snider Rifles, after that, if the scores be still equal, by single shots until decided.

For other places:

- 1. By the total score in each match in inverse order.
- 2. By the total scores at 600 yards.
- 3. By the total scores at 500 yards.
- 4. By the total scores at 400 yards.
- 5. By shooting off as in Clause B.

In the Governor-General's Match, scores of equal numerical value shall be treated and placed by the before-stated Rule B.

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In Military Matches, by largest number of hits.

E. In cases not met by the toregoing.

- 1. By any special rules attached to the conditions.
- 2. By the fiat of the Committee.

Note.—Where ties have to be decided by "shooting off" the Snider Rifle only shall be used.

XXX.—ENTRIES.

The Executive and Special Committees reserve to themselves the power of refusing any Entry for any match, or of cancelling at any moment any entry that may have been previously accepted.

The privilege of Entry is restricted to members who have paid their subscription (\$2.00), and to associate members, who pay the fee of \$1.00

- 1. Entries for the several competitions shall close on days to be named by the Committee.
- 2. Every competitor shall enter and shoot under his own name, and not oftener than once for any prize, unless specially allowed by the terms of the competition.
- 3. No entry shall be accepted after the hour fixed for the commencement of the competition to which admission is sought.
 - 4. Entries shall be classified:
- (a) Ordinary (at the published rates of entrance fees). To include those made and received by the Secretary of the D. R. A. on or before 4 p.m., Wednesday, 29th August.
- (b) Post (at an increase charge of 20 per cent. on the published rate of entrance fees). To include those made or received after 4 p.m. Wednesday, 29th August.
- N.B.—The acceptance of Post Entries will be entirely governed by circumstances. As a rule the privilege will be withdrawn as soon as the target accommodation allotted for each competition is absorbed, and whenever the Special Committee may determine.

5. To meet the case where difficulty may be experienced in selecting the actual competitors in sufficient time to make the required entries by the 29th August, Officers commanding corps and Secretaries of Provincial or Local Associations will be permitted to send in their application for (state No.) competitors, accompanying such application with the amount of the entrance fees; and to postpone the rendering of the actual names of those for whom they make the entries, until the selection of the competitors is definitely made. In such cases the Register Tickets will not be issued before the nominal return is handed to the Secretary. Any payment made for entries in excess of the number of competitors nominated will be returned in full, as provided for in the following regulations:—

XXXI.—RETURN OF ENTRANCE FEES.

- 1. Entrance Fees in full will be returned to those-
- (a) Who are prevented from being present at the meeting; or
- (b) Who attend the meeting but are incapacitated from illness or accident; or
- (c) Whose entries the Executive or Special Committee may have cancelled.
- 2. Claims based on other consideration than the above will, if allowed, be subject to a penalty of half forfeit.

XXXII.—SQUADDING.

- 1. In the case of competitors classified as Ordinary Entries, arrangements will be made and details published of the day, hour, and target at which each competitor will be required to attend to fulfil his engagements.
- 2. In the case of Post Entries, the hour of shooting cannot be predetermined or announced. and competitors so classified must await the orders that the progress of the meeting may render practicable.

XXXIII —ALTERATIONS OF SQUADDING.

r. Any alterations which the Executive Officer may find it necessary to make will be duly notified on the notice board, and such notice shall be a sufficient authority for the change. In the absence of such notice, tickets will be available only for the target for which they were originally issued, and any erasure or alteration, unless verified by the initials of the Secretary or Executive Officer, will cancel the ticket.

2. The place of rublication for all notices affecting the detail of shooting shall be the board fixed without the tent of the Secretary, and the posting of a notice on such a board must be taken and accepted as a good service on all affected thereby.

XXXIV.—REGISTER TICKETS.

- 1. Should a competitor lose his ticket, or omit to take it to the firing point, or fail to attend at the hour detailed, or give a wrong ticket and so by his own neglect miss the opportunity of competing for the prize for which his ticket was issued, he shall forfeit his claim on the Association in regard to such competition, and no duplicate ticket shall be issued to him except upon special circumstances.
- 5. Any *erasure or substitution* of one name for another, unless made by the Secretary or Executive Officer, shall invalidate the ticket.

The Council reserves the right to alter, amend or rescand any of the foregoing regulations as circumstances may require.

CONSTITUTION.

ADOPTED AT ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING, 1877.

t That the Association be denominated "The Dominion of Canada Rifle Association."

2 Any person being a subscriber of \$2.00, and paying the same before the first day of September, or the second day of the Annual Prize Meeting, shall become a member of the Association for the current Association year, and any member may continue his membership by the annual payment of \$2.00.

Any person may become an Associate Member of the Association, for the current year upon payment of the sum of \$1.00, and shall have the privilege of taking part in the annual matches, but shall not be entitled to vote at any meeting of the Association.

3 Donors of \$40.00 at one time to the funds of the Association, or of a prize of not less value, to be competed for at the Annual Prize meeting, shall be entitled to be enrolled as Life members of the Association, they having the full rights and privileges of ordinary members, and their names to be published in the Annual Reports.

Donors of money or prizes in kind of Five Dollars value and upwards, but less than Forty Dollars, shall be entitled to be enrolled as members for the year in which they contribute to the Prize Fund, with rights and privileges of membership.

4 Any Provincial Rifle Association of the Dominion subscribing not less than \$25.00 annually, and any other Rifle Association of the Dominion subscribing not less than \$12.00 annually, to the funds of the Dominion Rifle Association, shall be considered as being in connection with it. Each Affiliating Association shall be entitled to receive a Silver medal for competition by its bona fide members. The winner of such medal, being an efficient member of the Active militia, or an officer retired retaining rank, to be entitled to compete free of entrance fee in the "Dominion of Canada" and "Affiliated Association" matches at the first Prize Meeting of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association at

which he is present after he wins the medal; provided always that the name of the winner and details of the matches at which it is won shall have been communicated to the Secretary of the D.C. Rifle Association not later than the first day of such prize meeting.

5 There shall be a Patron and Vice-Patrons, to be named by the Council.

The Governor-General of the Dominion of Canada for the time being shall be respectfully requested to become "Patron."

- 6 There shall be a President, to be elected at the Annual Business Meeting of the Association.
- 7 There shall be a Vice-President for each Province, to be elected in the same manner as the President.
- 8 There shall be a Council of members of the Association, who shall be elected in the following proportions:-

Fourteen [14] from Ontario, Ten IO " Ouebec, Six " New Brunswick, [6] Six " Nova Scotia, 6 Four " Manitoba, 4 Four " British Columbia, 4 Four Prince Edward Island, Two

each of of the N. West Territories so soon as the Associations are formed therein and affiliated with the Dom. Rifle Association, as Provincial Associations, one-half in each to be elected at the Annual Business Meeting of the Dominion Association, the other half by the Provincial Association of the respective Provinces at their annual meeting; the names of those elected by the Provincial Association to be notified to the Secretary of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association on or before the day of the Annual Business Meeting each year. Six members of the Council shall

- 9. The Council shall at its first meeting choose from its own members the Chairman of the Council.
- 10. The Council shall annually elect at its first meeting an Executive Committee, consisting of fifteen (15) of its members, and in the event of a vacancy occurring therein during its term of office, the same may be filled up by the Executive Committee from the members of the Council. Five (5) to be a quorum. The President of the Association and Chairman of the Council shall be ex-officio members of the

- 11 The Presidents of the various Provincial Associations in connection with the Association, and the Deputy Adjutants General commanding districts, *being members* of the Dominion Rifle Association, shall be *ex-officio* Vice-Presidents, and all Vice-Presidents shall be members of the Council.
- 12 There shall be a Treasurer and a Secretary at Ottawa, both to be appointed annually by the Council, and holding office during pleasure, who shall receive such compensation for their services as may be voted by the Council.
- 13 The Council shall have the arrangement of the income and funds of the Association, rendering an account to the yearly meeting, such account having been previously audited by a person or persons, not members of the Council, who shall be annually named by the Council for that purpose. The Council shall also have the entire management and superintendance of all affairs and conceins of the Association, and shall or may do all such acts and deeds as shall appear to them necessary or essential to be done for the purpose of carrying into effect the object and views of the Association.
- 14. The Executive Committee shall give effect to such instructions as the Council may from time to time order, respecting the management of the affairs of the Association.
- 15 The Council may from time to time make such rules for their guidance as they deem necessary.
- time and under such regulations as may be determined on by the Executive Committee, as to all points not previously decided upon by the Council; and such Prize Meeting of the Association shall be conducted by a Special Committee of five members, three to form a quorum, appointed by Executive Committee, either from the Executive Committee or other members of the Council, with power of substitution by the Executive Committee from time to time as occasion may demand, and said Special Committee shall have power to hear and determine all matters arising at the meeting submitted for their consideration, and their decision, or the decision of a majority of them, shall be final, conclusive and binding; but they, or a majority of them, may at their discretion refer any question to the Executive Committee, in which case the decision of the Executive Committee shall be final.
- 17. An Annual Report, embracing an audited account of the Finances, shall be drawn up by the Secretary under the direction of the Council, and shall be published and sent to members of the Association at least one month previous to the Annual Business Meeting.

18. The Annual Business Meeting of the Members of the Association for the Election of Officers and the Council, and the transaction of other business, shall be held at Ottawa, on the third Wednesday after the assembling of the General Session of Parliament of the Dominion. At the close of such Annual Meeting or an adjournment thereof the Association year will terminate.

19. A General Meeting shall be held on the second day of the Annual Prize Meeting for the discussion of all matters that may be brought forward by any member or competitor attending the matches, but no changes in the Constitution shall be made except at the Annual Business Meeting.

20. No alteration in the Constitution shall be made except by a resolution duly passed at the Annual Business Meeting or some adjournment thereof, and no such resolution shall be proposed unless a notice in writing of the terms of such resolution, signed by two members as proposer and seconder thereof, shall have been given to the Secretary one month previous to the Annual Business Meeting at which the same is to be proposed, and it shall be the duty of the Secretary to immediately notify all Members of the Association of such proposed amendments.

21. The Council shall have power to fill any vacancy occasioned by death or resignation in their number, from among the members of the Association.

General By-Laws of the Association.

ADOLTED AT

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING, 1877.

There shall be two Ordinary Meetings of the Council. Meeting of The first of which shall be held immediately after the Annual Business Meeting of the Association, and the second, on the first day of the Annual Prize Meeting.

Extraordinary Meetings shall be summoned by the Extraordinary Secretary, if required by the Chairman, or by any four of Meetings. the Members of the Council, at such place as the Chairman may direct—notification being sent to each Member of the Council at least fifteen days previous to such meeting—and the requisition for the meeting, and the notices to the members, must state the object or objects of such Extraordinary Meetings.

The Council shall keep minutes of its proceedings at The Council to all Meetings, which shall be entered in a book kept for that all proceedings. purpose by the Secretary,—and open to inspection of any Member of the Council.

There shall be a Finance Committee, consisting of three Finance Com-Members of the Council, to be chosen at the first meeting.

The Treasurer shall deposit from time to time, in such Treasurer to dechartered bank as the Finance Committee may direct, all cived in Savings sums of money received by him on behalf of the Association. Banks.

All expenditure of sums for current expenses which Expenditure of may be required by the Secretary must be authorized by the sums for current signature of the Chairman of the Executive Committe, or in his absence by some of the Finance Committee, and the Treasurer shall pay all orders duly signed in such manner.

Other expenditures of a general nature are to be made Expenditure of a only upon the authority of the Council of the Association.

A detailed statement of all receipts and expenditures Annual Accounts shall be rendered annually to the Council by the Treasurer, made up to and closed on the 30th November.
