MEETING OF KENTVILLE BOARD OF TRADE

A session of the Board of Trade fraught with a large attendance, more interest, and more intelligent and animated discussion than usual was the one held in the Council Chamber of Court House Friday evening. The matters under discussion included hotels, sheep, dogs, and vinegar. There were present President Blair, Vice President Hardy, Secretary Porter and Messrs. Wm. Youlds, Barclay Webster, George C. Roy, George E. Graham, W. A. Ross, E. B. Newcombe, J. F. Outhit, T. P. Calkin, A. E. Calkin, G. E. Calkin, Dr. Moore, H. L. Cole, W. J. Cole, W. J. Molloway, R. A. Neary, S. S. Strong, P. N. Parker, L. Ellis, A. E. H. Chesley, Capt. McBride, W. W. Clarke, Coun. LaMont, E. J. Bishop, P. Simms, H. Lyons, Rev. R. B. Layton, J. W. McKay, H. G. Harris and others.

After reading the minutes of the previous meeting which were accepted, the president on behalf of the sheep committee read an important and carefully prepared report on the subject of sheep makings in the course of his report several recommendations. The report which should furnish much matter for consideration both by the farmers and merchants of this community is published elsewhere in this issue and should be clipped out and preserved by all those interested either directly or indirectly in the question of sheep raising.

The president's report furnished the subject for an interesting discussion which was participated in by Dr. Moore, George E. Graham, J. F. Outhit, B. Webster and A. E. Calkin. Dr. Moore thought that decisive action should be taken which would result in the elimination of the numberless useless curs found around the country side which work so much havoc among those seeking to raise sheep. He believed that a heavy tax would bring about the desired result as most of the owners of the curs would be unwilling to pay much money for the animals they now harbor. Mr. Outhit in reply to Dr. Moore said there was another solution for the dog nuisance and that was the shot gun. However he did not believe that the dogs were the real cause of the falling off of the sheep raising industry. He looked upon the dogs as the excuse not the reason. He thought it would be difficult to cite cases where dogs actually had made inroads into flocks of sheep. Dr. Moore in response signified a number of cases in this community. Mr. A. E. Calkin in a few remarks told of how profitable sheep raising had been in the past even with a few sheep. He paid a high tribute to the quality of the Nova Scotian wool.

A letter was read from a British Columbia company about to start in making moving pictures, who were anxious for particulars of this country. The secretary of the Board was instructed to forward such information as desired.

The secretary read some correspondence that he had had with the Halifax Herald requesting the payment of a bill incurred at the time of the publication of the Herald tourist number. A write up was charged for which the board did not receive and a charge was made for cuts which came out poorly indeed and were considered no advertisement for the town or if any, a bad one. A charge of two cents was also made for the large number of papers sent at that time to people in the United States. It was felt that the Herald should in fairness give a wholesale rate on these papers. The whole amount was considered excessive. The secretary wrote to the Herald asking for further information, which has not as yet arrived, so the matter now remains unsettled.

There was appointed a hotel committee consisting of Messrs. Graham, Outhit and T. P. Cal-

kin.

Returned Soldiers

Mr. Outhit addressed the Board on the matter of looking after returned soldiers. He stated that there was in Halifax a committee which before the arrival of the steamers had a list of the names and destinations of all returned soldiers. This committee met the soldiers on their arrival in the city saw that they were out on the right trains on leaving Halifax and were desirous that the returning soldiers be greeted upon their reaching the home town by some of the home town citizens. It was moved by E. B. Newcombe and seconded by H. G. Harris that a committee from the board be appointed to look after this work, uniting in so doing with the town council and Red Cross Society. Messrs Roy, McBride and Chesley were appointed the Board's committee.

Coun. LaMont reported on the vinegar factory at Berwick. It was thought by the Board that this would be a poor proposition for local business men as the factory could not profitably be removed from its present location.

Mr. Graham thought that a special effort should be made to have as many as possible attend the next meeting of the Board, which will take place on December 4th. He suggested that the secretary request each one present to attend the next meeting bring a new member with them and also bring any dues that are in arrears. The Board concurred in his suggestion, so it is hoped that the next meeting will be one of special interest.

Several new members were added to the board including Messrs. J. W. McKay, W. J. Holloway, P. Swanson, Rev. A. W. West and Rev. P. Pollet.

GERMAN LOSSES THIRTY THOUSAND

New York, November 7—A news agency despatch from London today says: German losses on the Rumanian frontier in the Jul valley

A German army division consists of about 20,000 officers and men of virtually all fighting classes. fighting have exceeded a division and a half, wireless despatches from Bucharest stated today.

CAPTURED ARSENAL London, Nov. 7—Entente allies forces have occupied the arsenal and island of Leros, one of the Sporades, off the coast of Asia Minor, according to a Reuter despatch from Athens.

Representatives of the Anti-alcoholic Leagues of Montreal and Quebec, and representatives of the Dominion Alliance met in Quebec and resolved to organize a campaign having for its object total prohibition in the Province of Quebec.

The Brooklyn, N. Y., Eagle celebrated its 75th birthday on Thursday last, by issuing a paper of 180 pages and giving a banquet in the evening.

FRENCH CANADIAN SOLDIERS IN RIOT AT QUEBEC

Quebec, Nov. 7—A row among some four hundred soldiers last night, on St. John Street, developed into a riot where knives, belts, iron bars and almost every weapon except revolvers were brought into play and caused a riot call to the military pickets. At least seven soldiers sustained serious wounds.

It appears that for some time men from the 171st Overseas Battalion have had resentment against a military pickets for arrests.

A number of bars, stores and the Y. M. C. A. were rushed and the entrances badly damaged by the mob which after an hour's fight was brought to order. Arrests are expected.

THE MEN WHO BEGAN THE WAR

Nadjo Kerovic, one of the conspirators in the assassination in 1914 of Archduke Francis Ferdinand, heir-apparent to the Austrian throne, has just died in a military prison. Three of the conspirators were executed in February, 1915, and Jakov Zilotic and Nedja Kerovic were sentenced to imprisonment for life, but the penalty later was commuted to twenty years Govrio Prinzip, the actual assassin, was sentenced to twenty years in prison.

**OLD BAY OF FUNDY
MASTER COMES BACK**

Over thirty years ago, Capt. John Cook was one of the veteran shipmasters sailing out of the Bay of Fundy. Around the Horn and the Cape of Good Hope, through the Bay of Biscay and down into the Mediterranean the staunch ships he commanded found their way. In the barks Conductor and Recovery he made some record trans-atlantic runs and finally he thought he was tired of the sea and in 1886 decided that he had his share of sea-faring life, so he quit in favor of younger men and settled down in a cosy home in Harborville, Kings County.

Once since that time he took a little voyage, but for the most he stayed ashore, occasionally amusing himself with a sail or motor boat. Then came the war, and the mines and the submarines and all the excitement and chance for adventure that has been on the sea for the past two years and more. Sailing vessels came into their own again and the windjammers were called upon to freight stuff across and the war zone. Day after Capt. Cook passed the wharf at snug little harbor near his home and ever he was looking down the bay to where it opens out into the wide Atlantic. Across the water at Port Greville a splendid big schooner was building. Finally she was launched, christened the Ada Tower and chartered for a run to the United Kingdom with lumber. The owners wanted a man accustomed to the deep, offshore sea and they sent out a call. Although away past the allotted three-score years and ten Capt. Cook's hearing was not affected; he heard and answered that call right gladly and full happiness came to him as he trod the new ship's quarter deck and gave orders to keep her well off to the northward of Isle au Haute. In eighteen days he had her to Queenstown "for orders" and the owners were delighted. They called him to proceed to Glasgow, and inside of a week there flashed under the ocean bed "Arried." She will soon be ready to return and the younger captains out of the bay are wondering what new kind of record the old veteran will open up.

LAURIER—NEVER AGAIN

The Canadian people are being informed by Liberal politicians and by the Liberal press, that there is to be immediately a general election, and that the true hope of the future is the Liberal party. With a delicacy born of discretion they omit to mention that the Liberal party means Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

Why are they sensitive on the subject of Laurier? It is because they realize that the continuance of the Laurier leadership is an affront to all that is best in Liberalism. Fetish worship is losing its hold. Canadians are looking for real things in these grave times. A plume carried about on a pole no longer commands the obedience and docile submission of a people whose eyes have been opened in a tremendous trial. In a crisis which has called for virile Canadianism, what has Sir Wilfrid Laurier done? He has reaffirmed his position as a pacifist. He has chattered of militarism, of some mysterious menace of militarism to be fought and subdued when the war is over. He has urged that the Germans, who have slain so many thousands of Canadians—sometimes with torture—he treated gently when the war is over. And he has refused to play an active part or any part, in the call which is being made to the manhood of Canada for the winning of the war.

FELL LEADING HIS MEN

Capt. L. Howard Johnstone of Sydney fell in a movement of victory while leading his men. A wounded brother officer writes to Dr. Johnstone the young hero's father:

"The 25th Battalion were attacking again, and Captain Johnstone was in command of the whole front line. They had reached and taken the first German trench and the Captain was going on his knees, waved his arms and shouted to his men to go on, when he rolled over, dead."

P. AND O. LINER ARABIA SUNK BY SUBMARINE

Paris—The Peninsula and Oriental liner Arabia has been submarined. She carried 450 passengers. All are believed to have been saved.

The steamship Arabia registered 7,933 tons gross. She was last reported bound from Sydney, N. S. W., September 30, for London, sailing from Adelaide on October 5.

Buenos Ayres, Nov. 1—Carlos Becu, the Argentine Minister of Foreign Affairs, states that he hopes to find a solution soon for the question concerning the purchase of German steamers interned in Argentine ports. There are thirty-eight German and four Austrian ships in Brazilian ports.

Mrs. Borden saw him a few days ago and says he is looking fine. I haven't been over to Bramshott yet but will endeavor to find him when I go over.

HUGHES ELECTION IS IN DOUBT

Western States Swinging Toward Wilson

New York, Nov. 9—A midnight, twenty-four hours after every newspaper, regardless of political affiliations, had heralded the election to the presidency of Charles Evans Hughes, the result of the election is still in doubt.

As early as eight o'clock last night the leading newspapers of New York, Philadelphia, Chicago, Boston and other cities in various sections of the county definitely announced the election of Mr. Hughes. As the night wore on, whatever uncertainty of the election of the Republican candidate existed was gradually dissipated, and the country retired to rest without any doubt that the fourth of March would witness the inauguration of a new incumbent. But at three o'clock this morning the tide began to turn. Western states whose early returns showed a strong trend toward Mr. Hughes, began to develop Wilson strength. Gradually the Hughes majorities shrank, until states that were conceded to him first drifted into doubtful column and then into the group claimed by the president.

These sudden changes in the fortunes of the two great parties aroused in the people a degree of interest that even on election day was noticeably lacking. Great crowds began to gather in front of newspaper offices, where editions were issued at short intervals, recording the varying changes in the

battle of ballots, and all day and all night tireless vigils were kept by anxious watchers at the various headquarters where the returns from the doubtful or pivotal states, California, North Dakota, Washington, West Virginia, Minnesota, Nebraska, New Mexico -- were closely and anxiously scanned as they slowly filtered in.

At midnight, returns such as complete, or so far complete as to be regarded as indicative, gave Wilson 232 votes in the electoral college; Hughes 239, and left sixty votes doubtful in eight states. It requires 266 votes to elect a President. Although California still showed a lead for the President and his campaigners were claiming it by at least 1,500, the President's majority there had dwindled to a little more than 1,400, with about one-fifth of the districts missing.

STILL NO NEWS OF S.S. RAPPAHANNOCK

No word has yet been received from the Rappahannock, which left Halifax twenty-three days ago for London. About the time she was due to enter the English channel there was very severe weather on the coast, but she is a splendid sea boat and marine men do not think she would come to harm by bad weather. It is possible that she might have been some damage to her machinery, but if such were the case it would have to be of a nature which would put her power out of commission entirely, otherwise her wireless would have given some account of her whereabouts.

While the Messina was a long time in being heard from on account of her having been intercepted by the British admiralty and sent to Archangel, it is not at all probable that such a fate has befallen the Rappahannock, for her cargo of apples, part of which consisted of quite soft varieties, would be of little use in the far northern port.

The Furness-Withy company had nothing new to give out yesterday regarding the ship. They still have hopes that she will turn up safely, but have taken the precaution to replace

her sailings with another steamer.

She carried in the vicinity of 20,000 barrels of apples in addition to general cargo. The United Fruit companies are said to have had about four thousand barrels on board, while other heavy shippers were W. H. Chase, Wolfville; F. A. Parker, Berwick, and S. B. Chute, Berwick.

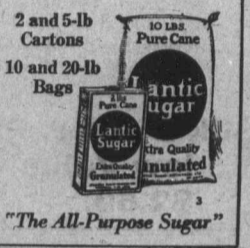

He then threatened to put her sister out of the house, and as she was afraid of him she ran upstairs. Her husband then abused her sister and she gave him in charge. The witness's sister testified to the cruelty of the prisoner towards his wife, but said that the man had simply caught hold of her on Saturday and that she had no charge to prefer against him.—St. John Globe.

STARTS 40-YEAR TERM

Warren Whitehead, of Abercorn, Que., slayer of Mrs. Eliza Dipper, of the same place, has been taken to the St. Vincent de Paul penitentiary to start serving a term of forty years. Mrs. Dipper, an aged widow, who lived alone, was found murdered in her cottage on the morning of December 1st, 1915. The crime was a brutal one, the aged victim having been bound, gagged and beaten by the slayer.

THE SNAKE IN THE MEADOW

It was Tenyson who, in his idealistic fashion, sang of the "Summer of the snakeless meadow." The poet knew, perhaps by experience, how the charms of the most beautiful meadow are spoiled by the presence of a snake.

Canada, with its untold material resources, its noble institutions, and its splendid patriotism, is a lovely meadow, but its charm is being spoiled by the snake, political partzanship.

Government by party has its merits, and, when employed to conserve or advance the interests of the country, its usefulness is cheerfully conceded. But when this purpose is prostituted to selfish ends, it becomes a snake, not only to mar the beauty of the country, but to poison the very springs of its life.

Let one, whose vision is unobscured, take a walk along any of the paths, which traverse our country's life, and he will find the snake of partzanship lifting its slimy folds, sounding its ominous rattle, venting its hideous hiss, or showing its deadly fangs. Is it responsible government that engaged his attention? He will find that favoritism, bribery, graft, etc., have so degraded the principle that democracy is only a name.

In many constituencies in Canada the conscienceless nobodys, who sell their votes, turn the scale in almost every election. Is our traveller studying the problems of reform? He will find the way blocked by prejudice and indifference, which have their root in unreasonable and wicked partzanship. Is he seeking the fruits of the Gospel of Jesus Christ in civic life? He will find that political partzanship, with its snaky affiliations, has so lowered standards, that character has been almost universally compromised, and the church, in consequence, shorn of her glory.

How to Scotch the Snake

One of the highest forms of patriotism is to Scotch this snake. It must not be allowed to spoil the mission of Canada which our absent soldiers call "God's country." But how is it to be done? There is only one way, namely, to apply the principles of Christianity to the various phases of our political life. Left to the leadership of godless office-seekers and wire-pullers the parties will go from bad to worse. As soon as our party designs some dirty method of gaining or retaining power, the other party forthwith steals, reworks, and uses it for a similar purpose.

Christian men from all parties must get together and determine to scotch the snake. A comparatively small number of electors in each constituency can accomplish the object. Every religious denomination should contribute its quota. The Temperance Alliance, which has proved its efficiency from ocean to ocean, furnishes the organization. Can we not, without injury to any worthy interest, and with untold benefit to many, get in Kings County, at least three hundred men who shall be united in purpose and method to scotch the snake? Come on men, don't be afraid!

KAISER'S ENGINE DRIVER KILLED BY AERIAL BOMB

Paris—A bomb dropped by an aviator of the entente allies has killed the engineer driving the train of Emperor William of Germany, according to information at Zurich, Switzerland.

Emperor William recently was reported to be at Bapaume, on the Somme front overseeing the preliminaries for a counter-offensive for which the German troops there were said to have received strong reinforcements. On Monday last the Emperor was in Berlin on a brief visit, conferred with the Imperial Chancellor, and visited the palace at Potsdam. His movements since then have not been reported.

A NEW PRESIDENT IN THE UNITED STATES

Hughes is Elected

New York, Nov. 8—Charles Evans Hughes will be the next president of the United States. At Midnight last night it appeared certain that Mr. Hughes had carried at least twenty-five States with an electorate vote of 301, and that Mr. Wilson had carried fifteen States, with an electoral vote of 149. Eight States with an electoral vote of 81, were in doubt, including Ohio, with 24; Missouri, with eighteen, and Kentucky with thirteen. Almost without exception the Republican candidate swept the States that have a big vote in the Electoral College. He carried New York, Pennsylvania, Illinois, Massachusetts, Indiana, Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota and California. He won New England easily, carried the Pacific Coast States without an exception, and skimmed the cream of the Middle West.

New York, Nov. 7—Chairman Willcox, of the Republican National Committee, at 8.50 p.m., gave out the following statement:

The victory is greater than we had expected, and it shows

that the American people can be trusted to settle the issues of the campaign. The present outlook seems to indicate a clean sweep. That means Mr. Hughes is elected President, and that both Houses of Congress will be Republican. The American people are to be congratulated.

RUSSIAN TROOPS CAPTURE TRENCHES

Petrograd, Nov. 7—Via London—In the region east of Kirilbada on the Transylvanian front, says the Russian statement from General Headquarters, a Russian attack resulted in the dismounting of two enemy guns and the capture of trenches, with over a hundred prisoners and two machine guns. South of Dorna Watra, says the statement, "we continue our successful operations in the valleys of the Dorsek and Poutna rivers. We captured here, within two days, seven machine guns, 15 officers and 15 officials and 800 men.

"On the Caucasus front we repulsed the Turks and occupied the village of Aymur, southeast of Kalku. We have arrested the Turkish offensive in the direction of Bedjar.

"No change has occurred on the Roumanian-Transylvanian front.

All the Hearst Papers Barred From Canada

Ottawa, Nov. 8.—The Hearst newspapers have been excluded from Canada, following the lead of the British authorities. The action of the government is outlined in a memorandum issued by the postmaster-general in which he announces that all Hearst papers have been refused the privilege of the mails in Canada and prohibited from circulation in any way.

The order takes effect on Saturday, November 11th. Anyone in possession of such papers after that date is liable to a fine not exceeding five thousand dollars or imprisonment for five years, or both. The papers banned are the New York American and Journal, Boston American and Journal, Chicago Examiner and American, San Francisco Examiner, Los Angeles Examiner and Herald, and Atlanta Georgian and American. Fifteen daily and Sunday papers are included in the list.
