





TREATMENT OF SORE MUSCLES.



William Huckle, now serving a seven-year sentence in Kingston Penitentiary for alleged blackmail while engaged in the private detective business in Hamilton, has written the Anglican Archbishop of Ottawa, claiming authorship of hymn 676, "Just for To-Day," in the book of common praise. He savs:

"In July, 1878, I was addressing an
"In Flyde Park, Eng. open-air meeting in Hyde Park, Eng-land, my subject being 'Infidelity ver-sus Christianity.' During my remarks I referred to the love of God as ex-emplified in the provision He had empined in the provision He had made for man's sustenance. An infidel in the audience interrupted me, asking, why we prayed to God for 'daily bread; why not ask for a year's supply?' In reply I told a story of a little girl, who upon being asked the same question replied, 'Bec use we do not want stale bread, we ant fresh bread each day.' Upon reaching my home and thinking about the incident, I composed a leaflet entitled 'Just for To-Day,' which I recited the following Sunday at an open-air meeting in Hyde Park. A gentleman named Counsel, an Australian, who was present, asked me after the meeting if I would have the verses printed, offering to have 20,000 printed if I would agree with him to do so. A printer named Frederick Crawley printed them, and my name was attached. Another 20,000 were printed in 1883, 10,000 were printed in 1883, 10,000 were printed in 1897, and in 1898 10,000 were printed in Toronto Each time was attached. de for man's sustenance. "It has also been published in several religious papers, I understand.
"The hymn 676 in "The Book of Common Praise' is my leaflet, 'Just for To-Day.' The last two verses have been altered. In the original they were rendered as follows:

'Cleanse and receive my parting soul, Be Thou my stay;
Bid me, if to-day I die
Go home to-day.

"So for to-morrow and its needs I do not pray— But keep me, guide me; hold me,

Lord Just for to-day."

"My wife has copies of the original, also of others which I have composed —which you may obtain from her, her address being 1,200 North Goodman street, Rochester, U.S.A.

"I would esteem it a favor if you will enquire into the facts as given above, and communicate with me as to the result. My object in writing to you is that credit may be given where it is due, and I am confident you will feel that if my verses are considered worthy of a place in the 'Book of Common Praise,' the authorship should at least be acknowledged. Mr. Dawson, the inspector, has seen one of the original copies of 'Just for To-Day,' published in 1878 with my name attached."





"A talk with any smaggler who ever encaged in the business of bringing Chinese into the United States contrary to the immigration laws will suffice to establish the Chinaman's proverbial ionesty in ousiness transactions, "said Guy E. Runyan, of Detroit.
"I know of one old French Canadian who in his younger days was a professional smuggler and operated on the Canadian terder. He did not deal in fursior any articles of commerce, He made a practice of smuggling Chinamen across the border, and according to his own statement amassed enough money to set himself up in a comfortable business.

"He has often said that the duty of a professional smuggler ended when the Chinaman was leaded on the soil of the United States. There it was that the smuggler got his money. After that it did not fall to him to look out for the Oriental who had been his charge. Ninetynine times out of every hundred the Chinaman was apprehended and sent back to his former abode by the immigration authorities.

"Nevertheless the smuggler received his bay. Never, according to the story told me by the old man, and numerous others who have been connected in different wayswith the smuggling of Chinamen, has there been known an instance where the snuggler was defrauded of the price promised him. This illustrates the predominant trait of honesty in the Chinese character."


