A WORD TO HON. MR. O'CONNOR —A POST OFFICE OUTRAGE.

Some time ago the editor of the STAR received communications from persons about Gibson, complaining of the recklessness of the postmaster of that place, one Mr. Garden. It was charged by the correspondent that on more than one occasion the mail bag for Gibson was found hanging on Mr. Garden's gate post, which fact it was thought went far to account for the disappearance of several letters and newspapers tim," Mr. Garden runs to the Telegraph, the Grit organ of St. John, and instead of denying the charge, if he could deny it, writes over his own name the following, which we wish the Postmaster General to look at carefully:

Fredericton as a juror, and the person that I left in charge of the post office did not happen to be in when the courier came along with the mail; co isequently he hung the bag (which was an old one and had a small hole in it) outside the door, but it did not remain there more than ten minutes. Is not this a most outrageous state of others at the same time that they disaffairs! but the worst feature of it is grace themselves-if the latter condition the postmaster makes no attempt to excuse himself for his criminal neglect. With what indifference he speaks of the "old bag" with "a hole in it," as if an old bug with a hole in it is the proper receptacle for Her Majesty's mails! As if hanging on a the place to leave a mail bag that may contain money letters, or correspondence of great importance!!

Mr. Garden says he was attending the hours his office should have been open? And after the mail bag had the day, who opened and distributed the mail? Or was there any provision made for its distribution? There was none. And why should the people who expected mail even in that "old bag," with "a hole in the bottom" of it be expected to wait till the jurymanpostmaster returned from the court? Let Mr. Garden answer this, or let Mr. Inspector McMillan answer it. And at any rate why should the mail courier, whoever he may be, hang Her Majesty's mails on a gate post? Does he not know that a gate post is not a post office? We think Mr. McMidan might, too, give some explanations while Mr. Garden is at it.

There is a good deal of rottenness about our postal service here that we parody on the Ten commandments. should wish the Postmaster General to This vile little publication ought to enquire into. There are more loose screws than those in the Gibson office. We have to request the Postmaster The Rev. Mr, Deinstadt preached a General to make prompt enquiry into vigorous sermon against dancing, in the Methodist Church, last Sunday eventhe whole matter.

Indeed we might remind Hon. Mr. O'Connor, in this place, that the affairs of the Fredericton Post Office are also far different from what the public could wish them.
