

The lines are pressed out with the fineer, and the plaster is applied while the "frown mark" is thus forcibly held in abeyance. Land Regulations.

Any person who is the sole head of a tamily, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Ageocy or Sub-age cy for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother son, d'aughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Duties: Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his Lomestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely own ed and occ nied by him or by his father, mother, son, dauger, orother or sister.


