DOINGS IN THE LOCAL LEGISLATURE

Important Bills Become Law.—Resolution Re Better Education.—Estimates for 1912.

Fredericton, March 18.—W. E. Hatheway's motion in favor of increased agricultural and technical education, largely along lines suggested in 1910 and 1911 by the Northumberland County Teachers' Institute, was seconded by D. W. McLaughlin, and after discussion chiefly by Mr. Hatheway, who pointed out that there was two and a half times as much illiteracy in N. B. and N. S. in proportion to the population than in Ontario, and that the time was coming when the House would have to think of the person first and property afterward, passed unanimously.

March 19.—The St. John Commission bill passed, with few amendments.

LAST REGULAR MEETING TOWN COUNCIL

Refuses to Move in Question of Taxation or Countenance New Valuation.—Only Two Scott Act Cases in February.—Mayor Pedolin Announces His Retirement.

The present Newcastle Town Council held its last regular session on the 21st inst., Mayor Pedolin presiding. Aldermen present: John Clark, J. G. Kethro, C. M. Dickison, S. A. Russell, Charles Sargeant and H. H. Stuart. The following bills were passed:

SCOTT ACT REPORT
The Scott Act Inspector reported two complaints and two convictions for first offence during February.

SALARIES RAISED
The petition of Adam Dickison and T. C. Hill, policemen and Scott Act Inspectors, for an increase in salary, which they declared necessary on account of the increased cost of living, was read.

Ald. Clark and Kethro thought it better to leave the matter over for next Council.

Ald. Sargeant and Stuart thought it better to deal with it now.

Ald. Stuart proposed that the increase be from \$1.60 to \$2.00 per day. He thought that \$2.00 a day was little enough upon which to support a family and no civic employee should be paid less.

Ald. Dickison agreed that \$2.00 should be the minimum wages per day, and, seconded by Ald. Russell, moved, That the salaries of the Police officers be increased \$2.00 per day from and after the first April next.

Carried.
John Creighton, night engineer at the Power House, having resigned his position, Robert Beckwith, who had applied for the vacancy, was unanimously appointed at \$2 a day.

ALD. STUART
Ald. Stuart brought up the matter of applying to the Legislature for permission to change the system of taxation upon a majority vote of the ratepayers, in accordance with the motion passed by Newcastle Council last September and adopted the next month by the Union of N. B. Municipalities, and moved:

That this Council prepare a Bill for the Legislature to carry out the intention of the resolution unanimously passed by the Council on Sept. 28th 1911.

The motion was seconded by Ald. Dickison but merely to bring it before the meeting.

Ald. Stuart pressed for the passage of the motion, on the ground that such a bill if passed would enable the town to greatly improve its methods of dealing with vacant land and collecting taxes. He showed that Tax Reform was a live question in B. C. where a Royal Commission had lately recommended abolition of poll tax and taxes on personal property and improvements and the Liberal Opposition had adopted that report in their political platform; that the Ontario Opposition had made it an issue there; that many western cities had adopted the idea of the land tax; that it was an issue in N. S.; and that St. John, Campbellton and Moncton were applying to the Legislature for permission to increase the rate of taxation on land and lower on improvements and that St. John was seeking to lower the poll tax to two dollars. He thought that, as the Council, with the approval of the Mayor, had unanimously passed in September last the motion to prepare a bill to ask the Legislature to increase the powers of municipalities to deal with taxation, and as St. John, Campbellton and Moncton were moving on the matter, it was the duty of the Council to direct the Town Clerk to immediately prepare a bill to obtain for Newcastle the same other as was seen in other towns and should be dealt with without delay.

MOVED TO OPPOSE
Ald. Kethro and Clark seconded the motion because of expense to be repaid because of the fact that the Town Council had just submitted just such a proposition to the government undertaking six months' time either to have fertilizer or its equivalent in manure, but on further investigation had learned that many of the farmers would be unwilling to expend the necessary amount in this way. Chas. A. Fawcett of Sackville said that Agriculture was steadily declining.

He recommended a complete system of organization and cooperation of the farmers not only to elect men and parties, that are pledged to produce reforms while in opposition, but to make sure that after these men and parties are elected, these reforms are carried out to the letter. Direct legislation through the initiative, the referendum and the recall is an important subject and worthy of the attention of this convention.

Ald. Dickison thought that the town should have a new valuation. It need not be more than any other town.

Ald. Stuart said that he did not see the benefit of the changes proposed. He was inclined to think that the system of taxation upon the people should be extracted from their pockets.

Ald. Sargeant said that he would deal with the matter at the next Council meeting.

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FARMERS AND DAIRYMEN MEET

35th Annual Gathering Held in Fredericton Last Week.—Farmers Wanted in Legislature.—Sic Tax Re-comment

The 35th meeting of the F. & D. Association was held in Fredericton March 19—22.

Delegates were present from all parts of the province.

The vice presidents of Charlottetown, Kings, Queens, St. John and Sunbury presented reports.

C. N. Brown of the N. B. Fruit Growers' Association said that 40,000 fruit trees had been set out last year and that 60,000 would be planted this year. The McIntosh Red was the highest priced apple.

W. W. Hubbard said that N. B. last year raised 3,000,000 bbls. of potatoes.

R. G. Murray, of St. John was called upon for his views of the fertilizer question. Mr. Murray said that according to figures published in the agricultural report of 1909, the retail price of chemical fertilizer could be reduced by about one half, were a farmer to procure the necessary ingredients and mix them on his own premises. At the present price, said the speaker, it is practically impossible for the small farmer to realize profit from the use of fertilizer.

In conclusion, Mr. Murray proposed the following resolution, which he pointed out had been endorsed by various agricultural societies of the province:

"Resolved, That it is of the utmost importance to the farmers of the province to be able to get at a minimum price the constituents of chemical fertilizer, and this association accordingly strongly urges the government to obtain and furnish to the farmers of the province the constituents of fertilizer as nearly as possible at manufacturers' prices."

The resolution was seconded by Mr. Legere and referred to the resolutions committee.

W. W. Hubbard explained that the department of agriculture had some time ago submitted just such a proposition to the government undertaking six months' time either to have fertilizer or its equivalent in manure, but on further investigation had learned that many of the farmers would be unwilling to expend the necessary amount in this way. He also showed that when freight charges and mixing expenses were considered a small profit only was left for the manufacturer and dealer, and that the farmer, by paying the present price was merely paying for the convenience of obtaining the ingredients readily mixed.

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This form of government has been in operation in whole or in part in Switzerland for more than fifty years, and that country is noted for having equalized its wealth among all classes of its people; while, in this country the interests are growing richer and

the masses of the people are getting poorer. The initiative and the referendum have also been introduced lately into several of the American States. He could assure the farmers that if the unimproved wilderness lands and lumber lands of New Brunswick were taxed at the same rate as our improved farm lands, we then would be called upon for a small portion of the taxes which we now pay.

He would suggest for discussion the great increase in the price of produce from the farmers' price to the sum the consumer pays. It is estimated by men who have studied the conditions that of the agricultural wealth produced only thirty five per cent. finds its way back to the farmer, while sixty-five per cent. is claimed by the transportation companies and the middle-men. This also would be a good subject for our boards of trade to discuss, as they seem to be inclined to blame the farmers for the high cost of living, and while they are calling on the government for relief by bringing in a class of farmers that would supply the goods at a less cost. The merchants who constitute the greater portion of our boards of trade might note that one of the proposed means to lessen the cost of living, namely, the co-operative store bill, was killed by numerous delegations of our merchants, who were sent to Ottawa to fight the measure in committee. The loaning of money to the farmers by the government might also be interesting to those who are laboring under a heavy debt and have found that the profits or returns from ordinary agriculture are not sufficient to pay the interest charged by loan companies and banks. However, the work of reform is difficult, and it will only be by the untiring efforts of some of our bright young farmers backed by a strong agricultural organization that success can be obtained. You will find a lack of interest in many of the farmers, themselves, owing to the paucity of education which has been carried on for years in the interest of the protected and subsidized classes. And you may expect to meet a determined and continuous fight from the great organizations of wealth, such as transportation companies, the millers, the pork packers and the best trusts, the telegraph and the telephone companies. One of the greatest drawbacks of the small industries is the high rates charged by the express companies. David Lloyd George says: "The way of the transgressor is hard. But the way of the reformer is harder."

Resolutions requesting the provincial government to support a number of short-term projects to be carried out in the province and to ask the government to improve the horse raising industry by legislation for compulsory inspection by a veterinary surgeon of all horses and prohibition of the use of sound animals, asking the government to aid the construction of a railway line from Tracadie to Newcastle and to support the incorporation with that end in view, that both political parties should nominate a farmer as a candidate in each constituency in the provincial elections, urging the government to furnish the

CANADIAN VS AMERICAN FOOTBALL

"Reddy" Griffith, the famous Varsity coach, writing on American football, says:

So much has been written and so well written during the last few days about the American football game that it is almost impossible to add anything to the criticisms. Still, the writer in a moment of weakness, promised to give a few of his views in the way of comparison between the game as it is played in Canada and in the United States.

The great outstanding difference is in the matter of offside interference. To the average Canadian offside interference is something to be avoided as destructive of most that is highly cherished in his game; to the American it is the essential, the pivot around which the whole game swings. Take it out of American football and you have at once eliminated practically every means of attack and defence known to American coaches. In fact, it is a very difficult matter to convince American footballers that gains can be made, kicks pulled off, or anything else effective done unless the runner or the kicker be protected by his interference. In itself, interference is not so awful as it sounds, particularly in the open field; as a matter of fact it often is one of the prettiest and cleverest parts of the game, and the team with this department highly developed is always the one most feared by others.

RACEVICH THREW SIX

Giovanni Racevich, holder of the Italian heavyweight wrestling title, threw six heavyweights in less than twenty minutes actual wrestling time at Madison Square Garden, upon his first appearance on the mat in America. The Italian champion undertook to throw all the men in two hours at catch-as-catch-can style, with only a moment's rest between bouts, and to forfeit \$1,000 to each man he did not throw in twenty minutes.

His first victim was Harry Potepsky, who succumbed to a half-nelson in 2:02. A body hold and a half-nelson brought August Faust to the mat in 1:40. George Sandele was disposed of with a back hammerlock in 2:25. Oom Paul Schmidt, a 265-pound German, put up quite a tussle, and lasted 4:40, being pinioned with a half-nelson. A double nelson forced Hans Lehner to the mat in 4:55. Fritz Mohl, a stock Hollander, was the victim of a wrist hold and a half-nelson in 1:55.

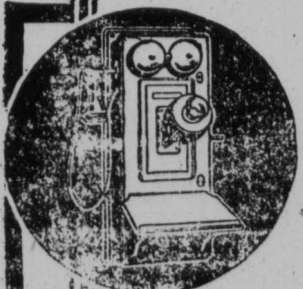

Concrete Dam Still Held up at Tuesday's Session.

The Town Council met on the 18th evening, His Worship Mayor McDonald presiding. There were also present Councillors White, McKenzie, Alexander, Miller, Moore, Lunan and Pinault. Meetings of previous meeting read and confirmed.

Petitions for license to conduct general stores from J. F. Gallagher St. John and A. Bertrand, Causapasc, were referred to Police and License committee.

The proposed bill for the Legislature as drafted by the Town Solicitors was then read.

After discussion, some amendments were made in its provisions and the bill will come up again for consideration at Friday's meeting.

A lease was submitted from the Intercolonial Railway for the privilege of laying a six inch sewer on their property, and was referred to the town solicitors.

This is the Crawford sewer from Paterson street extension.

The chairmen of the various standing committees submitted reports of accounts, which were ordered paid.

Councillor Alexander submitted further information with reference to fees of consulting engineers re Smith Lake dam. After discussion the matter was laid over till Friday evening's meeting when it was expected that Mr. Underhill would be present to give information re construction of wooden dam. Councillor White brought up the matter of an old account of Jas. Alexander for \$195. This account was for a horse commandeered at the time of the fire July 1910. The account was ordered to be paid.

To Cure Forehead Creases

A perfectly smooth brow is not the least of youth's enviable possessions, and it is one of these tiresome accidents which makes a "fringed" style of hairdressing best becoming just when the forehead begins to record the wear and tear of time.

For the heavy lines known as "frown marks" the beauty doctors advocate what they call "wrinkle plasters." The lines are pressed out with the fingers, and the plaster is applied while the "frown mark" is thus forcibly held in abeyance. The plaster should be applied, it seems, every time one proposes to go into a "brown study," as well as during sleep.

To eradicate the fine lines, flannel wrung out of hot water and laid on the forehead for ten minutes at a time, and followed by a similarly lengthy dabbling not rubbing, with olive oil is the treatment prescribed. Adopted twice a day for a fortnight, these means are said to ensure a smooth white brow. The oil must be freely applied, as it is the oil which feeds the wasted tissues that cause the lines.

Browned Crumbs.

Keep all scraps of crust until there is a good quantity; cut off any black bits, and put the rest on a baking-tin in the oven until they are a bright golden brown all over and quite crisp. Then pound them in a mortar, or, if there is not one available, put them between two pieces of paper and crush them with a rolling-pin. Next pass them through a sieve—this ensures them being all of one size. Put them in a tin with a tight-fitting lid.

These crumbs are useful for shaking over boiled ham or bacon, and can often be used for puddings instead of white crumbs, giving the mixture a richer appearance.

SUDDEN DEATH OF REV. C. W. TOWNSEND

Stricken With Paralysis at His Home in St. John.

The people of this town and all over the province heard with sincere regret of the death of Rev. Mr. Townsend on Wednesday morning.

For the past two years Rev. Mr. Townsend had been travelling evangelist for the Baptist Home Mission Board, an office which he filled with great acceptance, not sparing himself in any way, ever ready to travel at the call of the churches or the board. Last fall, the Campbellton church being vacant, Rev. Mr. Townsend was asked to supply there till such time as the congregation should get a permanent pastor. He had been in Campbellton all winter applying himself to the work with his usual intensity of devotion.

In his work there he made many friends, his sincerity and devotion in his work, his clear vision, and his loving Christian character, making him a man among men, and one whom it was a delight to know. His congregation cannot yet realize the dreadful blow which has befallen them, in the loss of such a leader and pastor.

Last Monday he travelled to his home in St. John, accompanied from Moncton by Rev. Dr. Hutchins. While on the train he complained of feeling slightly ill, saying he was afraid he was getting the La Grippe. On arrival in the city he went to his home in the North End and passed the evening, retiring sometime before 10 o'clock. About 10 o'clock, while in bed, he was seized with a paralytic stroke which affected his right side. Dr. Francis J. Hogan was called in at once, but in spite of all he could do the patient remained unconscious, and he died early this morning. Rev. Mr. Townsend was formerly a student at the Pastors College, London, an institution founded by Rev. C. H. Spurgeon. He came to New Brunswick in 1895 and has filled the pastorates at Cambridge, Hillsboro and St. Martins. He was looked upon as one of the ablest ministers of the Baptist denomination.

Remarkably intelligent and highly cultured, his pulpit ministrations were always acceptable to the people wherever he was.

He came to Canada about twenty-two years ago going first to British Columbia, where he filled some important charges. It had been his intention to return on Saturday to resume his work in Campbellton, Rev. Mr. Townsend was married to Miss Eleanor Rowland of London, England. Besides his wife he is survived by one son, Mr. Charles T. Townsend, and two daughters, the Misses Salome and Alice, all at home. Services were held at the home of the deceased Thursday evening at 8 o'clock. The body was taken on the early morning train Friday to the Narrows, Queens county, for interment alongside the remains of a deceased daughter.

A RAILWAY TO TRAGADIE

James Robinson, Ex. M. P.; Ald. T. W. Butler; secretary E. A. McCurdy of the Newcastle Board of Trade; H. N. Donald Morrison; W. L. Allain, M. P. P.; Customs Collector W. A. Park, Hon. Allan Ritchie and E. H. Sinclair—the first five provisional directors—are applying for a charter as the Miramichi Valley Railway Company, to build and operate a steam or electric railway along the Miramichi river and bay from Newcastle to Tracadie, the work to begin within one year and be finished within two years thereafter.

This line is very much needed and the formation of a company with the above named gentlemen at its head will be welcome news to the dwellers along the entire left bank of the Miramichi, and to the people of Eastern Gloucester County, likewise to the towns of Chatham and Loggieville and other places along the right.

The country between here and Tracadie is among the richest and most fertile in the province—the soil, forest and water alike yielding abundant harvests. Business has hitherto been sadly hampered by insufficient means of transportation, yet in spite of this drawback new settlements have been recently opened and the population has steadily and rapidly increased. With a railway the material prosperity of the region ought soon to be doubled.

PROGRESSIVE TOWNS

The Bill providing that the City of St. John shall henceforth be governed by a Mayor and four Aldermen, for which officers there shall be NO PROPERTY QUALIFICATION REQUIRED, was passed by the Legislature last week. While some changes were made in the Bill as sent up by the city, the principles of DIRECT LEGISLATION BY THE

INITIATIVE AND REFERENDUM AND THE RIGHT TO RECALL ELECTED OFFICIALS were preserved intact. Thus St. John, the metropolis of the province, with a population four times that of Moncton, six times that of Fredericton, nine times as large as that of Chatham and fourteen times as large as Newcastle, is fully sustained by the Legislature in her request for, not only Direct Legislation, but also the right of her citizens to nominate and elect whom they desire, regardless of property possessed by the candidates—the inalienable right which Newcastle's Town Council refused by a vote of five to two to petition for.

Campbellton is seeking legislation to allow her to exempt improvements from taxation and raise the deficiency by increased taxes on land, and Moncton seeks permission to exempt improvements from taxation to the extent of twenty-five per cent. each year until they become entirely exempt, a certain amount of income to remain exempt, and the deficiency to be made up by increased taxes on land, &c. But Newcastle Council, having unanimously decided last September to ask for permission to improve its tax system has, at the last moment, by a vote of 5 to 1, refused to take any further action in the matter.

If we fail to move with our contemporaries we shall soon be in the rear of the procession of progress.

NOVA SCOTIA AWAKE TO TAX REFORM

A Bill to permit any municipality in the province to tax personal property or improvements at a lower rate than the regular rate of taxation or to raise taxes on real estate alone, this change in the method of taxation to be brought about after the rate payers have voted in favour of such a change, has been introduced by

the Nova Scotian House of assembly by Hon. Mr. MacGregor. This is the intended principle voted for by Newcastle Town Council last September and by the Union of N. B. Municipalities in October, but recently deserted by both. The idea of tax reform will not die. It will continue to occupy a prominent place in the attention of Newcastle and New Brunswick people and its final victory is assured.

CARD

To the Electors of the Town of Newcastle, Ladies and Gentlemen,

Having been requested by a number of citizens to offer myself as a candidate for re-election to the office of ALDERMAN, I have decided to do so, and I again respectfully solicit the hearty support and co-operation of all who are in accord with the principles for which I have stood in the Town Council during the past year. If you again honor me with your confidence I will, as in the past, faithfully work in what I believe to be the Town's best interests, continuing to do all that I can to secure:

1.—Equal rights and opportunities to all classes of citizens, and impartial collection of taxes and enforcement of law.

2.—A new and thorough valuation, by competent and disinterested men from outside, to rate separately all the land, improvements, income and personal property of each person and corporation at its exact value, with a view to the apportionment of taxation on much fairer principles than at present obtain. This should include the taxation of vacant or unimproved land, that is being held for purposes of speculation, at the selling price asked for it by the owners, with a view of compelling the owners either to improve such premises, by erecting dwellings or work-shops thereon and thus affording better means of livelihood or household accommodation at more reasonable rates for an increased population, or to sell their property, now idle, to those who are willing and anxious to put it to use. It should also include the lowering of poll and income taxes and taxes upon improvements, with the aim of ultimately placing the bulk of taxation upon land value. No bonuses should be granted and no special exemptions from taxation should be allowed, except to those

who, through unavoidable misfortune, are really unable to pay.

3.—The preservation of the Sinking Fund to insure the payment in full of our bonded indebtedness as the Bonds become due, no further addition to be made to the public debt. By thus gradually paying off the principal, we shall by and by be relieved of the enormous charge for interest (now over \$10,000 a year) which wastes our revenue, consuming a third of the taxes but never decreasing the liability. Town affairs should continue, as in the past year, to be managed so that no further addition to the debt may be necessary.

Three Million Workers Idle and Many Suffering From Want and Hunger.

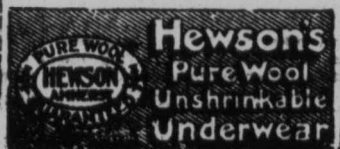
London, March 25th.—The twenty fifth day of the national coal strike ends with nearly 3,000,000 workers idle, many thousands dependent upon charity to keep them from starvation, every manufacturing industry in the land undergoing a throttling, and a settlement apparently as remote as ever. The government refuses to introduce a compulsory minimum wages bill of \$1.25 a day for men and 50 cents for boys and has failed to persuade the mine owners and miners to come to an agreement.

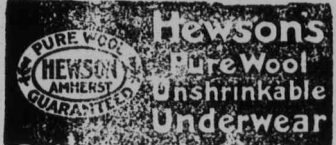

Sackville, N. B., March 14—Dr. Becknell, professor of Physics in Mount Allison University, has signified his intention of not returning to Sackville next year. A meeting of the Mt. 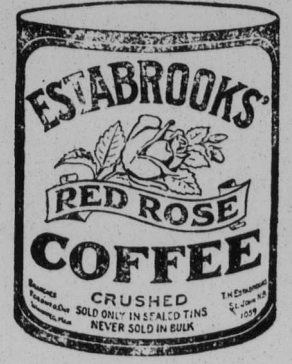

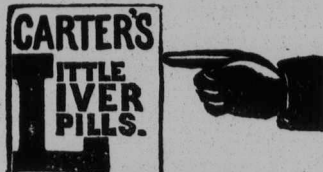

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency at Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties: Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3 per acre.

Duties: Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right cannot obtain a pre-emption right for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3 per acre. Duties: Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$500.

Pineapple Cream

Pineapple cream is a delicious sweet for the hot weather. Required one tin of pineapple, half an ounce of orange, two ounces of lump sugar, and half a pint of thick cream. Put half a pint of the syrup or the pineapple into a saucepan (if there is not that quantity make it up with water). Chop up two-thirds of the pineapple, being careful to remove any skin. Add the chopped-up pineapple and sugar for eight minutes; then add the lemongrass that has been previously dissolved in a little hot water; allow all to boil gently for five minutes, and pour the mixture into a bowl. When it is cold and beginning to set whisk in the cream and beat all together until it is a thick creamy mass. Pour into a wet mould, and leave it aside until set and quite firm. 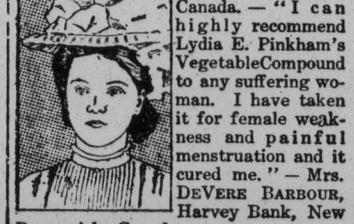

There is a genuine ring about the latter claim, and the conditions are the same as will govern the Reece vs. Inman match. The Oldham man is certainly in rare form and in his heat of the Big London tournament with Diggle lately he scored 7,500 points, whilst Diggle made 5,333.

A Great Climb

A wonderful feat of rock-climbing in the Grindswald, Switzerland, has been accomplished by Mr. Percy H. Thorp. He succeeded in climbing up the face of the Elger to the Eberwald station of the Jungfrau Railway (a tunnel railway), and clambered in through the aperture by which travellers admire the view. 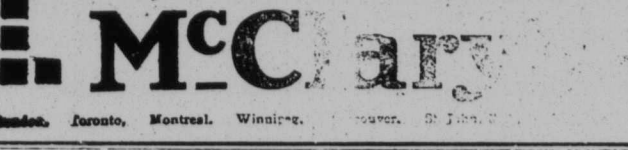

thing else. To this Ald. Stuart replied that he had something prepared in favor of a new valuation which he would move later.

ALLD STUART

Re the motion before the Council, Ald. Stuart pointed out it was merely to prepare a Bill to ask the Legislature, not for a new system of taxation, but for the PERMISSSION to abolish or reduce, JUST AS QUICKLY OR AS GRADUALLY AS THE RATEPAYERS BY A PLEBISCITE SHOULD DETERMINE, taxes on improvements, personal property, income and polls, or ANY ONE OF MORE OF THESE. Now people were allowed to hold land vacant for high prices thus preventing those who wished to build from doing so, while on the other hand a man was taxed extra for every little improvement he made on his property. The bulk of personal property, in so far as it consisted of money, bank stock, bonds, etc., now escaped taxation, and it ought as well be legaly exempted. A larger proportion of income should be exempted and the poll tax should be cut down. The deficiency could be made up on land taxes by the extra amount collected on vacant or unimproved land. Taxation of those who had improved their property could be cut down. The man who owned land would not escape taxes for while he might pay them directly on taxes on the land he rented on to the merchant whose goods he bought would finally be paid by him. The opponents of the motion had groundless fears and their plea of economy was ill timed.

MOTION LOST

On the question being called the motion was lost the vote standing: Yes—Ald. Stuart, Nay—Ald. Clark, Dickison, Keate, Russell and Sergeant.

THANK THE MAYOR

On motion of Ald. Clark and Sergeant, the Mayor was tendered the thanks of the Council for the thorough, efficient and impartial manner in which he had presided during the year. He feelingly replied and announced his determination not to again be a candidate.

Ald. Kethro, Sergeant and others deeply regretted His Worship's decision not to be a candidate for re-election.

ALD. STUART

Ald. Stuart spoke in favor of having a new, thorough and impartial valuation from which a better assessment could be produced. This valuation should be made soon and a non-resident expert who had no property or other interest in the town, should be called to the following resolution:

"Whereas, our present system of taxation, which by the low tax values, allows the owners of land to escape an unimproved land tax, and by the high values for speculative purposes, keeps up the price of land, and by the heavy expenditure of money on water works, sewers, and other public works, etc., has become necessary, that the Council should call on the Legislature to pass an Act (to be known as the "Valuation Act") which should provide for a new and thorough valuation of all the land and other real estate and personal property of the town, with a new listing of the incomes of the citizens thereof, and

"(2) That this valuation should be performed by expert assessors not residents nor ratepayers of the said Town."

This resolution was not seconded and the other members preferring to let it, too, go over to the next Council.

Whereas, it was on September 28th, 1911, unanimously resolved that this Town Council of the Town of Newcastle prepare or cooperate with the Union of N. B. Municipalities or any County, City or Town in the said province in preparing a Bill for the next session of the Legislature providing that any County, City or Town in the province of N. B. shall, upon a majority vote of its qualified ratepayers, have the power to reduce or abolish within its jurisdiction taxes on polls, improvements, persona property and income, or any one or more of these, and raise its revenue by means of a land tax, with or without a poll tax and with or without a system of business licenses, and

"Whereas, The present assessment is inadequate for the purposes of a radical change in the methods of taxation, therefore

"Resolved, (1) That in the opinion of this Town Council there is needed at once a new and thorough valuation of all the land and other real estate and personal property of the town, with a new listing of the incomes of the citizens thereof, and

"(2) That this valuation should be performed by expert assessors not residents nor ratepayers of the said Town."

This resolution was not seconded and the other members preferring to let it, too, go over to the next Council.

Adjourned.
