

The Evening Chit-Chat

As two sturdy youngsters with their shins slung over their shoulders, tramped past me on the street the other day, three words came back to us at which my companion and myself simultaneously turned to each other, smiled and then looked thoughtful.

And these were the words: "But FATHER said—"

You don't see anything to smile at or look particularly thoughtful about in that? You should have heard them. It wasn't just the words. It was the tone of pride, the air of finality, of one who feels that he is saying the last possible word on a question. The youngster in the case evidently felt that he was settling the matter.

We smiled with pleasure at the little fellow's thoroughly unshaken belief in the head of the house as close kin to the Delphic oracle.

We looked thoughtful because it was borne in upon both of us what a tremendous responsibility that father and all the rest of them had to carry.

A rough old fisherman, who at about middle age, had changed from one of the worst drunkards and most worthless fellows in the village into a splendid man and a Christian, told me the story last summer of what helped start the change.

He was climbing over the rocks with his little girl one morning. The tide had just gone out and left the rocks wet and slippery. The father was walking ahead and the girl following. He stepped on a slippery rock and slipped. "You must look out where you step, father," called the little girl, "cause I'm stepping right where you do."

The deeper meaning of that smile the man like a blow. "Why, mum, when it came right out on my head when I thought about it," he said, and that very day he made up his mind that he must indeed "look out where he stepped."

Sounds like Sunday school fiction, doesn't it?

But as a matter of fact it really did happen just about as I've told it.

Fathers and mothers, doesn't the thought of your influence terrify you sometimes?

You've just got to look out where you step, for whether you wish it or not the little ones are surely going to step right where you do.

You can't point out one way and walk another.

The law of "Do as I say, not as I do," can't ever be enforced in the home, for when people live so close together the "I do" is about one hundred times stronger than the "I say."

Fathers and mothers, are your thoughts, your spirit toward your neighbours, your spirit toward your home, your habits, the tone of your conversation, your manners, your ambitions, your beliefs such that you are willing that your children shall "step right where you do"?

Really, it's an appalling bill of responsibility, isn't it?

Americans Want First Concessions.

Want the Removal of Pulp Wood Embargo - The Reciprocity Conference.

Ottawa, Ont., Jan. 7.—It is learned that one of the proposals to be made at the reciprocity conference at Washington on Saturday by the United States representatives, in order to meet the needs of the American newspaper publishers association, will be that in return for a removal of the duty on wood pulp and print paper entering the United States from Canada, the Canadian provinces, Quebec especially, should remove the prohibition of the export of pulp wood and other manufactured lumber from the crown lands to the United States.

The paper manufacturers of the United States are anxious to get their pulp wood in order to have an almost unlimited supply for their mills.

Inquiry to-night shows, however, that there is no likelihood of Quebec cancelling the prohibition of export, and the Canadian commissioners have no power in the matter.

The province of Quebec is not a party to the reciprocity negotiations. It is not represented by the Canadian commissioners, and the Canadian Government has no jurisdiction over the provinces in this regard.

Pottsville, Pa., Jan. 6.—One anthracite workman was killed and eight others were seriously injured last night at the Hammond Colliery of the Philadelphia & Reading Coal & Iron Company at Gladville. Public Health.

Hon. John Harvey, the President of the A. P. C., did good service in addressing the City Council on the Public Health and the Housing Question. It will be pleasing news to many to learn that some gentlemen are seriously considering a plan of building several houses and letting them to poor people at the rental they are at present paying for shacks. A few experiments in that direction might result in showing the feasibility of the Municipality taking up the problem.

He also emphasized the importance of inspection of milk vended, the licensing of vendors, and the inspection. There is no room for doubt that we must look in the direction of clean and airy dwellings, pure milk and sound meat for a curtailment of the high sick rate and a reduction of the abnormal death-rate of St. John's. Two hundred years ago the death-rate in London was 50 per 1,000; by minimizing the influences which affect health of the public, the rate has been reduced in an extraordinary manner, and is being reduced sensibly every decade.

Brazilian Molasses.

Mr. C. Blackburn, the Vice-Consul here for Brazil, has imported two casks of Brazilian molasses which arrived at Goodridge's Thursday last by the Rosina. The quality of the molasses is very good indeed, as it possesses great sweetening power, but is rather more like Demarara molasses than Barbadoes. It is a superior article and will no doubt result in setting up a keen competition for the possession of our market in this article.

There are practically no pipe smokers in France, and should the people take Schloesing's advice a tremendous cut in the State's revenue would result, pipe tobacco being less profitable.







Empire's Biggest Store

Corner Stone Laid in London for Whiteley's New Business Palace.

What is declared will be the biggest Departmental store in the Empire will be that of the Messrs. Whiteley, in Queen's Road, Paddington, for which the foundation stone was recently laid by the Mayor of Addington.

The new building will extend from Forchester gardens to Douglas place, and have a frontage in Queen's Road of 600 feet. It will have a depth of 200 feet and stand on a site of four acres, all of which is freehold property belonging to the firm. There will be five floors, and therefore 20 acres of floor space, of which 16 acres will be devoted to selling purposes. The large centre dome will be 150 feet high, and would be an exact copy of the world's masterpiece. The nearest approach to it is the Pantheon at Paris. There will be 24 passenger elevators so arranged that there will be no waiting. Between five and six thousand employees will be required to run the store, in which there would be many novelties. There will be a wireless telegraphy station, a children's playground on the top floor, and a roof garden.

The store, it is promised, will surpass anything in Paris or New York, and set a new mark for the merchants of Great Britain to emulate.

New Use for Ores Once Worthless.

Marquette, Wis., December 31.—The Ardis furnace at Iron Mountain, Mich., the invention of John T. Jones, of that city, was tested in the presence of fifty leading steel and iron men of the United States, Canada and Mexico. Professor Crabtree, of Pittsburgh, expert of the Carnegie interests, witnessed the operations of the furnace. The experiment was a success. The furnace takes lean ore, now considered worthless, and turns it into good pig iron. This was done with considerable lean ore. A change will be made in the cupola used and the final test will take place next month. The furnace will make millions of acres of iron ore land, now considered worthless, very valuable and is considered the greatest discovery in the iron industry for many years.

Queer Paris Headgear.

Gold Tiaras, Helmets and Strange Feather Arrangements Seen.

Paris, Dec. 21.—Headgear in Paris for indoors and out is developing new eccentricities. The gold tiara set all ruffled with gems and having for its accompaniment Byzantine ornaments with pendants and coins hanging over the temples, which a beautiful brunette woman wore at the theatre recently, was becoming to her, but not one woman out of ten could wear it. The fez made entirely of colored beads is very effective also. Another stunning headdress is the helmet of the First Empire, which is much worn and which is made of fine beaded net of golden tulle encircled by old galon and finished with a large cabochon, or again of beaded tulle work with marabout feathers.

A headress consisting of four green feathers stuck in the hair and falling down over the eyes, which a very smart Frenchwoman has been affecting in the evening, is only eccentric, while a hat seen on the Champs Elysees recently and worn by an American woman was weird, for the aigrette on it came down over her shoulder, twisted round her neck and finished under her chin.

The little "heards" and tortoiseshells which were popular a few years ago as ornaments threaten to come back, and jewelled figures of these creatures are worn in the hair.

Cap and Glasses Recovered Identified as Those of Cecil Grace.

London, Jan. 6.—Word was received to-day that the aviator's cap and glasses picked up in the North Sea, off Maziereke, Belgium, have been identified as those worn by Cecil Grace, who was lost while attempting to cross the English Channel from Calais to Dover on Dec. 22. A diligent search of the coast in the vicinity of Maziereke is being made in the hope of recovering the aviator's body.

City Council.

A full Board was present at last night's meeting. Councillor Mullaly disclaimed any credit for the decision to root out the fever on Pope Street by destroying the houses. The whole credit of the suggestion belonged to Councillor Channing, whom he congratulated. Councillor Martin took exception to this and pointed out that he himself had done something and had suggested the precaution taken to prevent the spread of the disease. Mayor Ellis said that he did not think it was in the interest of the good government of the city at all that any individual Councillor should be singled out for special credit for doing what is his duty. The whole Councilors agree to a proposal from a member, orders are given to the officials and the work is done. He believed that the discussion was childish and unworthy the dignity of serious men. Besides, there was an implication that the other Councilors were not doing their duty. The committee on Mr. Rooney's claim reported that it was just and had been paid. A discussion followed on the typhus fever outbreak. The majority of the Board expressed their opinion strongly that there had been unjust criticism of the Council and the Board of Health. The papers should go to the right source when they want information and not be publishing flying rumors. The Health Officer reported that all the houses on Pope Street had been thoroughly disinfected and cleaned up. He denied the report in the papers that clothing that had not been disinfected had been taken from infected houses and given around amongst the neighbors. The Mayor then introduced Hon. John Harvey, whose excellent address on the suggestions to improve the condition of the poor in the city will be found in another column. The Colonial Secretary wrote the Council in reference to charges for Alan and Paruss lines. Further particulars will be asked. The question of the title to land where the Parade Rink is built was referred to the Solicitor. The claim of Mr. T. Kent was also referred to the Solicitor, enclosing the letters of Howley & Herzer, his solicitors. E. M. Jackson is permitted to repair building on Water Street. Shen & Co. asked permission to build a wooden shed on their premises. Councillor Ryan expressed the opinion that permission should not be given to erect any other than a fire proof or iron covered shed. J. P. McLoughlin will erect a workshop on Job's Street. David Smallwood will build a stable on Coronation Street when he gets the Health Officer's approval. The Reid Nfd. Co. reported that the street railway earned \$35,955 the past year. Councillor Mullaly, who had asked for a report on duties of Dr. Brehm, was informed that the statement would be ready next meeting. Councillor Mullaly then proposed the following resolutions: Whereas there has recently appeared in the local press a scale of fees purporting to be the result of a meeting of the medical practitioners of the city, which fees are largely in excess of those heretofore in force; And Whereas there has since appeared a scale of fees likewise adopted, which is stated to have been intended as a reduction of the excessive rates above referred to; And Whereas the last mentioned scale is still much beyond the means of the average citizen, even the minimum rates being such as would bear most heavily upon the great majority of the heads of families in this town; And Whereas the making of any such scale of fees is apparently under the entire control of the said medical practitioners, who are strengthened in their position by reasons of the provisions of the Medical Act;


Resolved that this Council recognizing its duty in matters which affect citizens generally, do hereby recommend to the Government that whilst every precaution should be taken to maintain the highest possible standard for those who wish to be admitted to the medical profession in the city, the provisions of the present Medical Act should be so amended as to prevent the possibility of the carrying out of a policy which is fraught with such serious consequences to the community. Councillor Ryan and Mayor Ellis supported them. Councillor Martin was absent. Councillor Channing expressed the opinion that the resolutions were good but that the Council Board was not the proper place to deal with them. Councillors Cooke and Myrick spoke to the same effect. On the motion being put it was carried unanimously. Councillor Myrick gave notice of a motion to ask the Government to amend the Municipal Act so that all house taxes for water be paid by the owners of the houses and not by the tenants. The landlord could govern himself accordingly when letting the house. Under present conditions tenants flit about from one house to another and pay no water rates, so that a large sum is lost every year to the Council's revenue.

The Liquor Question.
Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir,—I was pleased to find in the "Daily News," of Friday last, on no less an authority than the Assistant Collector of Customs, that our consumption of Rum for the year 1910 was less than that for 1909 by 2,124 gallons. This is indeed, gratifying news to the 3,200 voters and workers for the cause of Temperance who waged such an earnest fight two years ago. Although we were deprived of the blessing of Local Option at that time owing to the strong drink sentiment of the extra districts which was the cause of much comment during the polling, still we have much to be thankful for in the reduction of the consumption of Rum which is the popular drug of the poorer classes. With an abundance of labor and money plentiful this curtailment can only be attributed to the early closing of the saloons. We should all therefore take heart and by a determined effort keep up the good fight and still further remove the facility of obtaining liquor by closing the bars at 6 p.m. This arrangement while doing no injury to monopolists would tend to keep much money in the pockets of the poor.

Surely, Mr. Editor, the 3,200 voters who were desirous two years ago of preventing the sale of liquor entirely in the city are not unreasonable in demanding at least that their opinions and feelings on this subject should be given some attention by our legislators. Yours truly,





HOUSING AND PUR

Synopsis of An A Harvey, Presid Made to the Last

Hon. John Harvey, being introduced by the Mayor, stated that he had come to oversee in the Council his criticisms or suggestions, but to speak about the housing question, which he already occupied considerable of the attention, and with the view of what they were quite familiar. He stated that he was quite aware from personal conversations that both the present Mayor and the last Mayor, as well as individual members of the Council, were alive to the necessity of trying to improve these conditions. His object was to emphasize the facts which they already knew.

Before going into that matter, however, he suggested that it might be valuable to the Council in its efforts to obtain the services of a Housing Auditor or Expert from abroad for a few weeks, which would probably be very expensive, and that such a person should be invited to come down and investigate the Council's resources and system. He stated that the Secretary would probably be able to give the advice of such a person, but that it was obvious that the Council themselves had not time to make an investigation thoroughly, and he thought that a person versed in the subjects and coming here with a fresh mind would be of considerable help to them in solving the various problems which confronted them.

Mr. Harvey went on to say that the Commission of Public Health, now sitting, had had a number of discussions regarding the situation in St. John's, and the following points might possibly be some time brought officially before the Council by that body:—

(1) The supply of milk, on which the infantile mortality is so largely dependent;

(2) The Meat supply, which is not so thoroughly bad.

He stated that he was aware that the Council had already considered the possibility of insisting that all meat imported for food in St. John's should be slaughtered in a Municipal Slaughter. This would enable proper inspection to be made of the animals, which are now sent down from the neighbouring Provinces.

He also stated that there certainly ought to be an Anti-Spitting Law, which would make it possible to prevent the sidewalks in St. John's from being covered with excrementation, which was picked up on men's boots

HOUSING AND THE PUBLIC HEALTH.

Synopsis of An Address of Hon. John Harvey, President of the A.P.C., Made to the City Council Last Evening.

Hon. John Harvey, being introduced by the Mayor, stated that he had not come to overwhelm the Council with statistics or suggestions, but to speak about the housing question, which had already occupied considerable of their attention, and with the need of which they were quite familiar. He stated that he was quite aware from personal conversations that both the present Mayor and the last Mayor as well as individual members of the Council were alive to the necessity of trying to improve these conditions. His object was to emphasize the facts which they already knew.

Before going into that matter, however, he suggested that it might be of value to the Council in its difficulties to obtain the services of a Municipal Auditor or Expert from abroad for a few weeks, which would probably not be very expensive, and that such a person should be invited to come down and investigate the Council's resources and system. He stated that the Secretary would probably be glad of the advice of such a person, and that it was obvious that the Council themselves had not time to make such an investigation thoroughly, but he thought that a person versed in these subjects and coming here with a fresh mind would be of considerable help to them in solving the various problems which confronted them.

Mr. Harvey went on to say that the Commission of Public Health, now sitting, had had a number of discussions regarding the situation in St. John's, and the following points might possibly be some time brought officially before the Council by that body:

- (1) The supply of Milk on which the infantile mortality is so largely dependent.
- (2) The meat supply, which is notoriously bad.

He stated that he was aware that the Council had already considered the possibility of insisting that all meat imported for food in St. John's should be slaughtered in a Municipal abattoir. This would enable proper inspection to be made of the animals which are now sent down from the neighbouring Provinces.

He also stated that there certainly ought to be an Anti-Spitting Law which would make it possible to prevent the sidewalk in St. John's from being covered with excrementation, which was picked up on men's boots

The foregoing table shows that although St. John's possesses more wealth and more intelligence than the rest of the island its death rate is enormously worse, and that while the rest of the island shows a marked improvement in the death rate from Tuberculosis, St. John's has remained stationary. The improvement in the Colony had begun from 1906, when the Anti-Tubercular campaign had started. He was in hopes that the figures of 1910 would show that St. John's had also begun to decline, because the poorer districts had been well canvassed for the past eighteen months by nurses going from house to house, and that these nurses had really done splendid work and that anybody going through the town would see to-day at least twice as many open windows as there were twelve months ago, and that the houses which they visited were undoubtedly improved in other ways.

Mr. Harvey went on to say that there could be very little hope for improvement in St. John's while the houses were getting worse and the children were being brought up under conditions which precluded their having an ambition for anything better where they grew up. He then produced a map of St. John's showing that nine-tenths of the consumption in the town was confined to a certain area west of Long's Hill, and that this area was also the area of the poorer houses, and he said that these houses were all getting constantly worse.

In his opinion there ought to be a Compulsory Education Act, at least as regards St. John's. Children now go to school pretty much when they like, and many of the parents refuse to send them to school because they do not consider their clothes are good enough to go to school in. He stated that if there was a Compulsory Education Act it was probable that the parents of these children would exert themselves to see that they were properly clothed, for there was no reason why any able-bodied man in St. John's should not be able to clothe his children decently and live in comfort if he was moderately industrious.

What he came particularly to suggest to the Council was that they should put in force Sections 12 and 13 of the Amended Municipal Act. Under these sections legal inspection was provided for, and he suggested that the Council should begin in a small way and take certain streets, and particularly the houses in which there were children, and that the inspector should endeavour to see that the people living in these houses kept them clean and healthy inside as well as out, and that the children were kept decent.

This might be done on a small scale at first, but if it was done systematically great good would result. Section 12 entirely covers the necessary powers. He thought that at the same time there should be a systematic inspection, as provided under Section 13, for the purpose of ascertaining the physical and habitable condition of the dwellings themselves, and

that this inspection should be extended through all the tenements in the town, and a tabulated statement be drawn up for reference and for the purpose of seeing what could be definitely done to ameliorate the conditions. If the houses were known it could be possible at any rate to know what the extent of the problem was. Landlords could be called upon to improve the dwelling in question, and if they did not all comply, some of them certainly would. He recognized the impossibility of immediately turning out a lot of families on the street when closing up the houses or destroying them, but as far as he could judge there was very little hope for the improvement of the town until most of these houses were improved or destroyed, and he thought it likely that the ultimate solution would be that the Council would find it possible without undue risk and perhaps without expense to guarantee say 4 per cent. to a Building Society to be formed under their supervision as to expenditure and management. With a very large amount of money in the Savings Bank at 3 per cent. he thought that there ought to be an unlimited amount available for a 4 per cent. or 5 per cent. guarantee.

A system could be begun experimentally on small scale, so that little or no risk would be involved. He stated that two or three tenements were going to be erected by certain gentlemen for the purpose of seeing what could be done in the way of social improvement by drafting a few families from the worst of the present tenements into more decent ones and that all the figures necessary to the Council for forming an opinion as to the feasibility of such a scheme could be shortly obtained from the operation of these houses.

He again stated that what he was really desirous of asking the Council was that inspection in the two directions which he had referred to should be undertaken by them. He thanked the Council for their patient hearing, and after a short address by the Mayor in which he stated that the Council was very much in sympathy with what the speaker had said, and that a large number of the points raised had already been discussed by them and were slated for action as soon as they could manage it, and that the Health Department had already been requested to make a report upon the number of unhabitable houses, Mr. Harvey withdrew.


