charming spots on the eastern side of the country, and would undoubtedly be much frequented by summe visitors if it were only made more accessible; a very few hundred dol lars would make the Gut available for the coastal steamers. The nouth of the river spreads out into wide delta, studded with green and ertile "flats" or meadows where housands of tons of hay are cut annually. These natural meadows are irrigated every year by the spring reshets, and hence require no manure. A great number of cattle are raised here, and the merry tinkling of the cow bells makes the welkin resound with pleasant, though not over

Hundreds of women and girls and boys were out on the "barrens" picking bakeapples, which are very numerous this year. 
