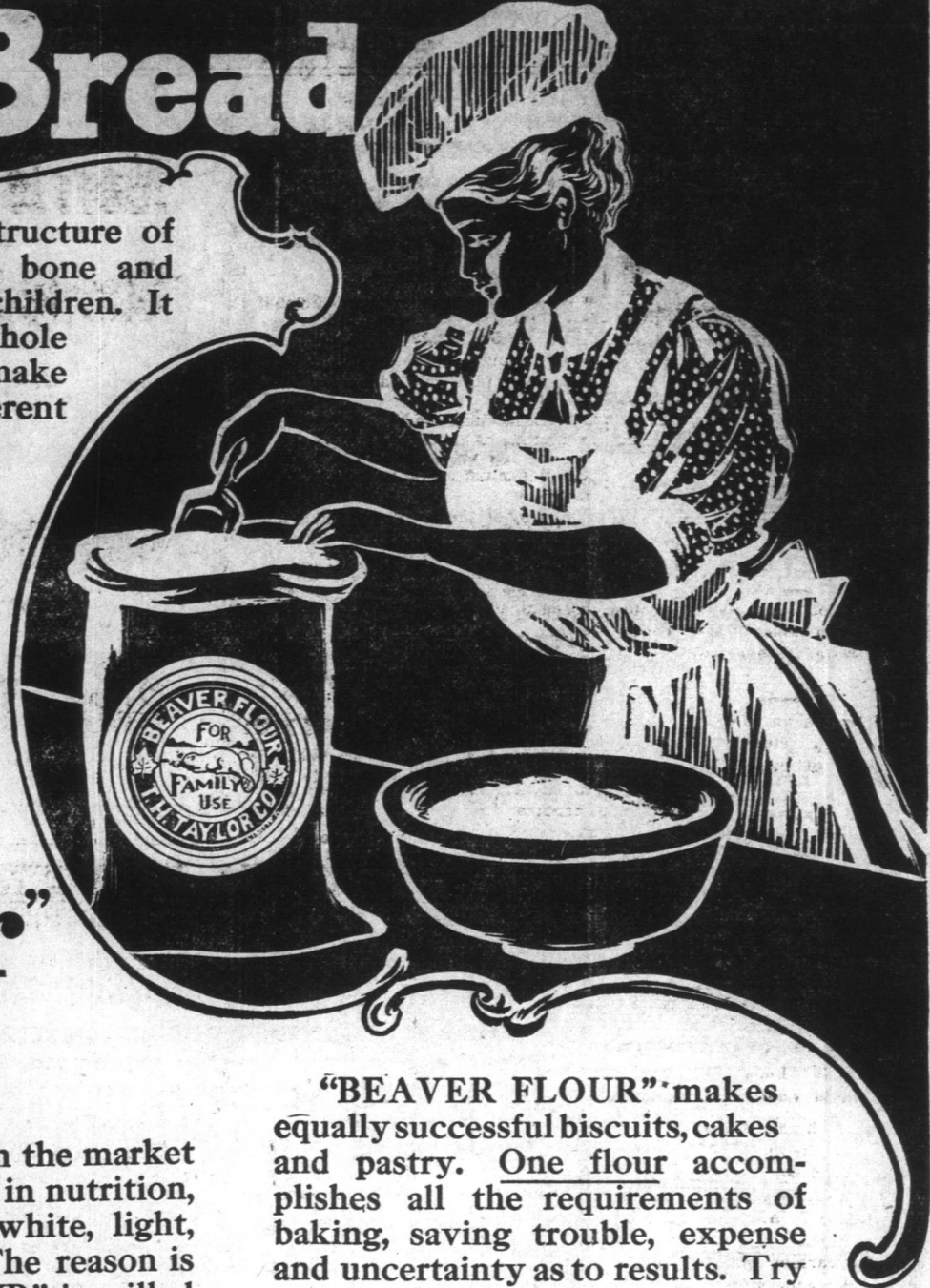

#### 'Want Fair Treatment.'

We direct the attention of our readers to a letter which appears in our issue to-day, signed Workman, and emanating from Grand Falls. The writer points out that the Hon. Sir Robert Bond presented a petition to the House of Assembly at the last session of the Legislature, from the people of Grand Falls, asking for the erection of a public building, suitable for Post, Telegraph, Customs and Savings Bank work. The unsuitable character of the building used at present, is evident to any person who has seen it, and it presents an appearance which contrasts most unfavorably with the other buildings of the new town. In fact, it is an eyesore, utterly unworthy of the town itself, and a standing disgrace to the Government which keeps it in use as the Government building of the town. We have grown accustomed to the utilization of Grand Falls as an advertising asset of the Colony. Indeed, it is used almost as extensively abroad as the "energy" of the Premier is used at home. It would almost appear that the members of the Tory party had convinced themselves that they were the persons who had induced the Harmsworths to start their enterprise here, despite the fact that the Tory party as a party assailed everything and everybody connected with the Harmsworth contract in most unmeasured terms. To-day, however, the Grand Falls enterprise is used by them as their stock advertisement of the resources of the country. Now, what has the Tory

Government done for Grand Falls since it came into power. We hear frequent boasts of the immense revenue derived from Grand Falls. But what has the Government done? The roads were built by the Government, so we may re-iterate: What has the Tory Government done? It has left the temporary shack built at the time the residential part of the town was "Shack-town." Shack-town has disappeared, but the Shack Government building still remains. Well might the inhabitants last spring petition for its removal and for the erection of a building commensurate with the revenue of the town, in keeping with the other buildings of the town, and worthy of its utilization as part and parcel of the advertisement which the Government make of Grand Falls as the model pulp and paper town of the world. As the letter under reference indicates the people are growing impatient at the delay of the Premier in keeping his promise to erect a suitable public building, and as one who cannot possess "his soul in patience," and who declines to "wait and see" in silence, Workman asks in his impatience: "Was Sir Edward fooling us, or has he forgotten his promise?"

# General Railway Strike.

Leaders Claim That 200,000 Men are Out—Daily Telegraph Says It is Perilously Like Civil War.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-Day. Thomas, the Secretary of the Western District Amalgamated Society of Railway Servants, stated that there would be no truce between the unions and the railway servants, despite the efforts of Lloyd George, and that the strike would go on. The Society had sent out 1,500 telegrams to various railway centres, ordering an immediate strike. Officers and men on furlough have been recalled to their regiments by telegraph. Artillery men have been taken from gun drill and are devoting attention to rifles with a view to strike possibilities. Parts of London are being made ready for encampments. It is probable that bluejackets will be drafted to equip the electric power stations at Liverpool. They will also be required to protect ships in the harbors upon which there have been small fires, supposed to be incendiary in origin. The authorities regard the action of the strikers in calling out men from the power house of Liverpool as one of the gravest features of the day. All the horses of

the army have had their shoes sharpened in preparation for service in the streets.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, This Afternoon. The morning papers denounce the strike leaders for dismissing the Government's offer of a Royal Commission without consideration. The Daily Telegraph says it would appear not to be a strike but something perilously like Civil War. The Dublin employees of the Irish roads called a strike this morning. At Glasgow eighteen hundred railway men struck this morning. At Leeds five thousand men struck this morning. At Liverpool the cruiser Antrim landed part of her marines, who were sent to the docks and the electric power stations. The city is comparatively quiet. At Sheffield there is considerable rioting. At noon, the strike ordered showed only a partial success. Some railway lines are operating very few trains. Other roads are practically normal. The strikers say they are satisfied with the response to the order and claim 200,000 men have quit work.

#### No Shipments of Perishables.

Special to The Evening Telegram. BOSTON, To-Day. The shipment of perishable goods from Boston will be seriously affected by the labour troubles in England, for the Cunard steamship Franconia, scheduled to leave this port on Tuesday, will not load any cargo until orders are received from the head office in Liverpool. Other lines in this port will not take perishable cargoes from the other side will be seriously interfered with.

#### Moroccan Situation Looking Ugly.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-Day. Interest was revived in the German occupation of Agadir in Morocco, from which position Germany refuses to budge, when the announcement was received from Gibraltar, that the British Mediterranean cruiser fleet had sailed to Fezuan in Morocco, and that the French warships Sans, Guenet, Surprise and Corbin had also sailed for Casa Blanc, Germany has three warships at Agadir. With the warships of Britain and France assembled at other Moroccan ports, the Moroccan situation has an ugly appearance.

#### Ex-Shah Assassinated.

Special to Evening Telegram. TEHRAN, To-Day. It is reported here that Mohammed Ali Mirza, the former Shah of Persia, who recently returned from exile in Russia, and started an uprising in an endeavour to regain the throne, has been assassinated.

The deceased who was 84 years old, possessed a sympathetic disposition and cheerfulness. By these characteristics he formed a circle of friends not only here in his own place, but in many of the little settlements around, and he was always held by these friends as an honest, truthful and hard-working man, and good neighbour. When it became known that the last hour was drawing nigh the Rev. Fr. O'Flaherty, our beloved priest, who is ever willing to respond to the call of the sick, was sent for and administered to him the last rites of the Catholic Faith, of which he was a firm upholder. Mr. Ryan leaves to mourn him a wife, 2 daughters and 7 sons, all of whom were by his bedside at the time of his death. The funeral took place on Sunday, 13th inst., and was attended by a large number of people, including 46 grandchildren.—Com.

### Mob Burns Negro.

Philadelphia, Aug. 14.—Thirty miles west of here, in the town of Coates, Villez Walker, a desperado negro, was carried on a cot from the hospital last night and burned to a crisp by a frantic mob of men and boys on a fire which they ignited about a half mile from town. The negro, who had shot and instantly killed Edgar Rice, a special policeman of the Iron Mills, was dragged to the scene of the shooting, bleeding pitifully for mercy. He had been arrested by a posse, shooting himself as he was being taken. The crowd, containing as many women as men, broke through the police guard at the hospital later in the evening and found Walker strapped to a cot. The mob seeing this gathered up the bed and placing it on the shoulders of four men started for the country. They stopped at a farm and quickly gathered up a pile of dry grass placed the bed containing their victim upon it and set it on fire.

### Two Jokers Are Shot to Death.

Detroit, Mich., Aug. 12.—Frank J. Cook, aged 35, and Daniel Vogel, aged 20, special detectives for the Lake Shore Railroad, were shot and instantly killed last night by patrol officer Wm. Burnett, aged 38, of the Michigan Central Railroad, on the Michigan Central tracks near Junction Avenue. They met death as the result of a joke that they attempted to play on Burnett. They were all on the beat of terms and met at the junction of the two roads every night. Last night Cook and Vogel, knowing that Burnett had had trouble with two car breakers, decided that they would hide behind a car and spring out on him as he passed. Burnett, not recognizing either of the men in the darkness, drew his gun and shot four times at them, three bullets taking effect. One went through Cook's heart, the other two striking Vogel in the head and chest. Burnett then ran down the tracks to Junction Avenue where he met a patrolman Dan O'Connor, who was hastening towards the scene of the shooting. "I've just shot a couple of our thieves," he said. The two men went back and looked at the bodies. When Burnett saw who the men were that he had shot he broke down. O'Connor took him to the station where he was locked up.

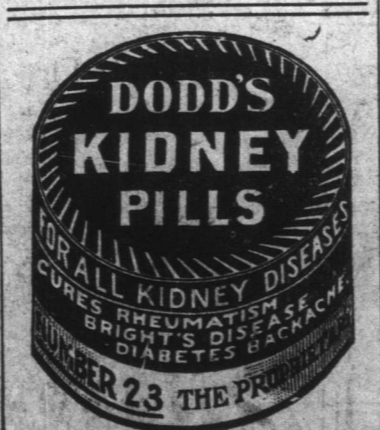
### Plenty of Stockfish.

The catch of stockfish along the Norway coast ended a couple of weeks ago. The final report of the total catch of stockfish in Norway is at hand. It refers to round fish only. The total catch this season was 64,400,000 fish against 55,700,000 in 1910 and 56,500,000 in 1909. In spite of there having been prepared for around 25.2 million this season against 2.09 million last season, we do not believe prices for stockfish will be any lower this season than last because last year there was a lot of old fish unsold at the beginning of the season while this year there is no old stock, besides the fish this season is smaller but the quantity this season will be exceptionally fine. Strohmeyer & Arpe Co.'s market report says:—  
The quantity caught of round fish exceeds by a few million the quantity of fish caught last season. Nevertheless, it is hard to say whether prices will open up any lower than they did last season. The fish itself appears to be somewhat smaller individually than it was last year. No records are kept of the catch of split fish, so everything we may say in regard to the quantities caught, will be mere guesswork, based on rather unreliable information. Opening prices seem to be about the same as last season for split fish.—Fishing Gazette Aug. 5.

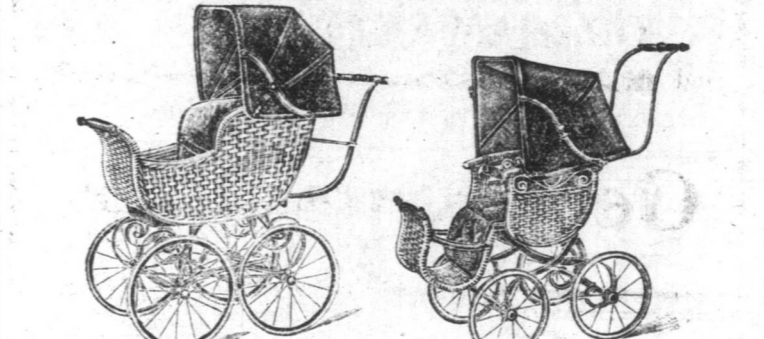

**Lloyd George and MacDonald on Threatened Railway Strike.**

Special Evening Telegram.  
LONDON, To-day.

How tenaciously the Government is clinging to the hopes of a settlement of the railway dispute and the effecting of a working arrangement was displayed by Lloyd George in a speech in the House of Commons last night. The attitude of the Government, said the speaker, had taken a strong turn for the better and that fears of an immediate strike might vanish. MacDonald, the labor leader in the House, had prepared to move a vote of censure against the Government for its use of the military in strikes, and because of its general attitude in the present situation. The feeling in the House ran high. Lloyd George intimated that representatives of the unions had failed to understand the Government's offer to form a Royal Commission, which would report what amendments were necessary to the 1907 agreement between the railway managers and the men. It was not proposed to form an ordinary commission, but one composed of three members, one representing the railways, one the men, with a chairman who was well known for his impartiality and who enjoyed the general confidence of the community. Although there had been no withdrawal of the ultimatum by the men, the Chancellor declared that the House would be pleased to know that negotiations for a settlement of the trouble had not been broken off. "I have not given up hope of arriving at some solution of the difficulty, satisfactory to all parties," said Lloyd George. MacDonald said there had been a misunderstanding of the Government's proposal, and he would not press the

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**Risks on War and Premium at Lloyds.**

An insurance broker at the time of the war wrote in the London Economist: "When people talk about war risks at Lloyd's they really have in mind two distinct markets. In the first place there is a risk to say a total loss in the event of war breaking out within a certain period, and in the second, the ordinary risk against damage done to ships and property in naval warfare. The first risk is the one the public hears about. In this market the rate started this week at 4 guineas per cent. for three months, rose to 5 guineas on Wednesday, and fell back to 5 guineas on Thursday afternoon. As Mr. Asquith's speech came over the tape the market hardened, and after hours on Thursday 10 guineas was being paid. "This (Friday) morning the most various rates are being quoted, according to interpretations put on yesterday's speeches, some underwriters asking as much as 20 guineas for six months; but the bottom working rate at first was about 7 guineas for three months and 10 guineas for six months and 15 guineas for a year. Inquiries were numerous, and the tendency at mid-day was distinctly harder, but the quotations eased off before the close of the day. On ordinary marine open policies and covers underwriters have notice at the beginning of the week that after August 9 war risk would wherever possible be excluded, or covered at a higher premium.

"The notice has given brokers a great deal of trouble in circularizing clients and answering inquiries, the chief difficulty being that every underwriter has a different idea of prices. Some of them are refusing to include war risk at any rate whatever, but most of them are throwing it in for 1s. per cent. a month or 2s. 6d. per cent. for three months.

"Whether the market will settle down later on remains to be seen, but the impression gained from this day's business is, that with the growth of modern cruisers and modern liners underwriters are becoming more nervous about their risks, and it may be that they will at some future date be universally excluded. The matter has been discussed by underwriters for some weeks, but to any, as has been said in the press, that the steps taken by them this week have no connection with the Morocco trouble is really nonsense.

## The Archbishop at Branche.

Tuesday, August 15th, the festival of the Assumption, was the day appointed for the administration of the Sacrament of Confirmation at the beautiful and thriving settlement of Branche.

This settlement is one of the most charming spots on the eastern side of the country, and would undoubtedly be much frequented by summer visitors if it were only made more accessible; a very few hundred dollars would make the Gut available for the coastal steamers. As it is at present, even the small craft of the fishermen can only get in at high tide. Inside the Gut a most delightful panorama is opened up to view. The mouth of the river spreads out into a wide delta, studded with green and fertile "flats" or meadows where thousands of tons of hay are cut annually. These natural meadows are irrigated every year by the spring freshets, and hence require no manure. A great number of cattle are raised here, and the merry tinkling of the cow bells makes the welkin resound with pleasant, though not over-harmonious, music.

The Archbishop and party drove over from St. Bride's on Monday evening across the intervening twelve miles of bog and moorland. Hundreds of women and girls and boys were out on the "barrens" picking bakeapples, which are very numerous this year. The long level ride, a great contrast to the drive from Placentia, was somewhat monotonous, but was enlivened by the flights of curlew and plover and the uprising of many coveys of partridge. These latter were never known to have been so numerous as this year.

About a mile outside the village nearly the whole population, to the number of some two or three hundred, had come out with flags and banners and mottoes to greet the Ecclesiastical dignitaries. The whole road was lined with rugs and strewn with natural flowers. The horses were taken from the carriages and the vehicles were drawn by stalwart bodies of young men.

The work of preparing the children for the morrow's function was at once commenced, the clergy hearing the confessions of the children, the Archbishop examining in Catechism.

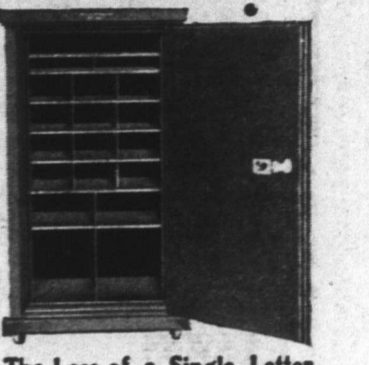
Tuesday, Aug. 15.—The day was bright and clear. From an early hour the children, dressed in light and tasty summer gowns, were parading the streets attending the early Masses, where all the candidates received Holy Communion. At 11 a.m. all gathered for Confirmation at the commodious new schoolhouse. The new church recently commenced under the energetic superintendence of Rev. Fr. Fyfe was not sufficiently in readiness to hold the Confirmation in it. The great concourse of people, between 400 and 500, being too large to be accommodated within the school, His Grace addressed them in his usual forceful and encouraging manner from the steps of the building. The burden of His Grace's remarks was what he never tired of impressing upon the people, namely, the advice to the young men to stay at home and settle down on the land and not to listen to the alluring stories of the wealth and happiness of those who go abroad. These accounts are all fallacious and many of our young men would gladly come back if they had the means. Entering the school-room, which serves as a temporary church, His Grace addressed the candidates for Confirmation on the nature and effects of the Sacrament, also alluding to the beautiful festival of the day, the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin. The total number confirmed was 78, viz. 44 boys and 34 girls. During the administration of the Sacrament, Mrs. J. F. Roche presided ably at the organ while the choir sang Veni Creator Spiritus. His Grace then inspected the new church, which is far advanced in construction under the management of foreman William Collins. The building promises to be of graceful design and splendid workmanship. In the evening the Archbishop's party returned to St. Bride's again, accompanied by the usual manifestations of affection and respect, and round upon round of rousing cheers took the place of the volleys of musquetry heretofore in vogue. This was a notable feature in the reception, the people having faithfully complied with the request not to fire guns. The result was perhaps little less noisy, but this is compensated for by the revival of the almost lost art of hearty and wholesome cheering.—Com.

## The Grand Falls Public Building.

Editor Evening Telegram.  
 Dear Sir—During the last session of the Legislature the Rt. Hon. Sir Robert Bond presented a petition to the House from the residents of Grand Falls, asking the Government to take into consideration the erection of a Public Building suitable for Post, Telegraph, Customs and Savings Bank offices. The Premier expressed himself quite in accord with the prayer of the petition, and assured the local gentlemen that such a building had already been decided upon by the Government, and that the work would be commenced at the opening of spring. This was in March, Nov. 19, at this date—August 16—there is not the least sign of it.

## Items From Montreal.

The careless handling of a revolver on Saturday, the 6th, under the plea of "I did not know it was loaded" has rendered motherless four little children, all under seven years. The fatality occurred in the store of Jos. Adelman, Craig St. West. Mrs. Adelman was selling a revolver when Adelman entered and picking up the gun asked if it were loaded. Without waiting for a reply he pulled the trigger and the bullet pierced his wife's throat on the left side. Death was instantaneous. The coroner's jury returned a verdict of excusable homicide.  
 The City Council has adopted an amendment to the building laws. This amendment states that in future all such buildings as theatres, asylums, schools with dormitories attached, departmental stores, hotels, and apartment houses of over four stories shall be constructed of fireproof material. This is certainly a step in the right direction. The only thing now to be desired is the enforcing of the law.  
 As a result of a fight with razors on Friday night, one Italian lies badly slashed about the head and throat in a precarious condition at Notre Dame Hospital and three others are the occupants of cells in No. 3 Police Station. The three arrested men claim that the knifing was done in self defence, and consequently the wounded man was arrested at the hospital and is held there under guard.  
 Much surprise was caused by the presence of a number of patrol wagons and a posse of police when the Allan liner Victorian arrived on Friday evening. It transpired that no fewer than 57 stewards were to be placed under arrest. When at Quebec the stewards were called upon to help land the mail bags. This of course was not part of their many duties, and seeing that there were numbers of dock hands present, they contended that they should not have been called upon to do this, especially as they were supposed to commence their regular duties three hours later, viz. 4 a.m. Upon arriving here the captain handed them over to the police.

## Girl Killed; Nine Hurt.

Automobile Strikes Electric Car at New Bedford.  
 New Bedford, Mass., Aug. 7.—One girl was killed and nine other persons hurt, two of them seriously, when an automobile containing six children and two men crashed into an electric car on the Fair Haven Bridge tonight. Alice Wright, fifteen years old, was killed. The seriously injured are George A. Schott, badly bruised and cut, and Ellen O'Malley, 12 years old, who is feared suffered internal injuries.  
 Matthew Cantwell, Annie Manley, Sylvester Manley, Mollie O'Malley and Alice O'Malley, who were also in the automobile, suffered severely from contusions and shock, while the motorman, Delano, and the conductor, A. B. Curry, of the trolley car, were thrown heavily and bruised.  
 The automobile, a large touring car, was going west over the bridge behind a Fairhaven car. It is said that the automobile shot out from behind the electric car directly into the path of another trolley car going in the opposite direction. Delano did not see the big machine in time to shut off the power, and the force of the blow drove in the dasher and plumed him to the front seat, causing bad bruises.  
 So heavy was the impact that the electric car, on which there were thirty passengers, was lifted from the track and hurled over against the iron railing of the bridge. The four-inch rail was bent out for nearly eighteen inches, but the carbing on the roadway held the wheels and prevented the car from toppling over into the Acushnet River.  
 The automobile, owned and driven by Mr. Schott, was wrecked and all its occupants thrown out. Alice Wright, landed on her head and her skull was fractured. She was unconscious when picked up, and was hurried to the Emergency Hospital, where she died within a short time.

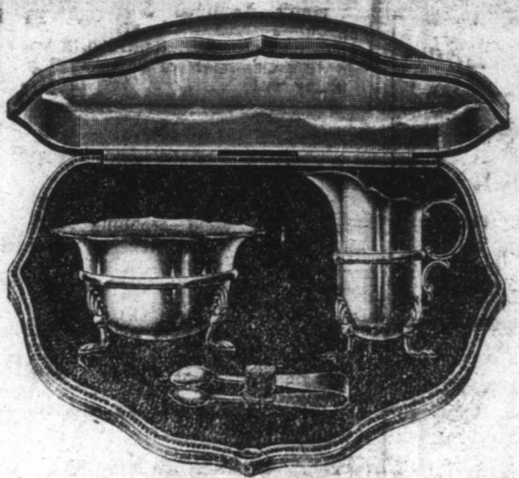
