Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram.
MONTREAL, Nov. 24.
The death of Sir Edward Seaborne Clouston, Bart., one of the best known bankers and financiers in Canada, occurred to-day.

MADRID, Nov. 24.
The sensational discovery has been made that the assassin of Prager Canalejas was but one instrument in an anarchistic plot which also embraced the killing of Emperor William of Germany. Following this discovery, Germany's secret services police have been notified to keep close watch upon all foreigners in Berlin. Special guard has been kept over King Alfonso and General Weyler ever since the killing of Canalejas.

SOFIA, Nov. 24.
The besieged garrison at Adrianople attempted a general sortie yesterday afternoon. The Turkish troops, however, were thrown back into the fortress after a battle which lasted throughout the afternoon. They lost heavily. This was the first sortie of its kind by the whole garrison, and is supposed by the besiegers to be undertaken with a view to re-provisioning the town, the population of which is suffering from scarcity of food.

BERLIN, Nov. 24.
German official circles express themselves quite undisturbed by the sinister rumors regarding the international situation emanating from Vienna. It is declared the prospect of a peaceful settlement of the Austro-Serbian conflict is distinctly improved. The report that the Austro-Hungarian Government made representations to Russia is discredited here; but instead relations between Vienna and St. Petersburg are understood to have improved since Russia gave Serbia to understand that she cannot have her support for her demand for a port on the Adriatic Sea. The reported tension between Roumania and Austria-Hungary, is also discredited.

LONDON, Nov. 24.
A story of lawlessness and looting by Bulgarian and Greek troops at Saloniki, where the inhabitants are in terror lest the Allies should fall fighting with each other, has been sent by the Reuter correspondent. The correspondent is an Englishman of many years' residence in Saloniki, and thoroughly acquainted with the city and surrounding country. He writes that the Bulgarians on the march to Saloniki had already their share of blood and rapine, having ravaged, without mercy, Turkish villages en route. As soon as they entered Saloniki they instituted a systematic pillage of the quarters occupied by them. Regardless of remonstrances of Greek officials, a continuous fusillade was kept up, November 10th and 11th, by soldiers of Bulgarian and Greek Armies, and among the Christian population may casualties occurred. A stoker of the steamer Mado was killed by a hail of bullets, which according to reports of ship officers also fell on the decks of foreign warships. For several nights soldiers, guarded by roughs, entered whatever house appeared to offer prospects of booty, and cleaned out everything worth taking. The terror-stricken owners offered no resistance, as it would be useless in view of fixed bayonets over their breasts and revolvers thrust against their temples. Hundreds of cases of this kind have been reported. The victims made complaints into the ears of foreign consuls, who made indignant protests to the Greek authorities, but with little effect. The arrival of a body of Greek gendarmes, Nov. 12th, improved the situation. In the meantime a violent anti-Jewish outbreak occurred, apparently because the Jews abstained from decorating their houses with Greek flags, and did not join in shouting welcome to the Greek soldiers. The difference between the Bulgarians and Greeks regarding the ultimate destiny of Saloniki has reached an acute stage. There is no fraternizing. King Ferdinand is expected to reach here soon for the purpose of reminding King George by his presence that he is not the only potentate in Saloniki. The Bulgarians have firmly resolved that their occupation of Saloniki will be permanent, and that there are many incidents to prove that the relation between the Bulgarians and Greeks at this moment is really pronounced. The difference between them from flying at each others throats only by a frail temporary truce. The people of Saloniki who lately feared that Messan Fasha intended to make their city a second Saragosa, and who have suffered much at the hands of the Allies, are now haunted by the terror that the Allies may at any moment come to blow the city to the air. All foreign warships was certainly limited.

LONDON, Nov. 24.
Troops suffered terrible hardships, says a Post correspondent with the Montenegrin forces, outside Scutari. A swollen lake has flooded the whole country, and the men practically live under water and under conditions no European army could endure. A good half of the Montenegrin army is without tents, a great majority of them with no change of clothing, and the brief intervals of the weather are insufficient to dry their rain coats or other garments. The toughness of the mountain soldiers is amazing.

Almeriana Arrives.

The Furness Liner Almeriana, Capt. Fairclough, reached port yesterday morning, after a run of fifty-four hours from Halifax. Favorable weather was had until Cape Race was reached where fog was met and the ship had to reduce steaming. While waiting to hear the sound of the horn from the Cape the Allan boat Carthaginian, which was stopped in the fog, was spoken to from the Cape. The Almeriana made a good run to port. She brought a full freight, the largest she has ever brought here in one trip. Her cargo includes flour, pork, apples, oranges, tinned goods and a quantity of kerosene oil and deals which she has on deck. The steamer is expected to get away for Liverpool on Wednesday morning taking an outward cargo of fish.

Complaints About the Outport Dispatch.

Judging from the correspondence which reaches us there appears to be considerable comment of an adverse nature on the news which is sent to the outports in the daily telegraph despatch.

The despatching of news of the doings of politicians in the city is not appreciated by many readers of the outport despatch and considerable resentment has arisen. Hence the protests which have reached us.

The flagrant misuse of the message was, of course, the misrepresentation of the attitude of the Evening Telegram towards the explanation Sir Edward Morris gave of how he became owner of the 40,000 shares in the St. George's Lumber Co. The explanation was corroborated by Manager Prince.

The explanation, however interesting, was not in point. It did not deal with the question we asked. We had pointed out the conflict between Sir Edward's statement in the House of Assembly last session and the record of his possession of these shares.

Sir Edward had stated that he had never had an interest, direct or indirect, near or remote, in any timber wealth of the country at the time he held shares in a company which owned timber lands in Newfoundland.

We asked for an explanation of this discrepancy in the two statements. We asked Sir Edward to reconcile these conflicting pieces of evidence. This was all we did. If this was a charge, then Sir Edward did not meet it. That was our case. That and nothing more. Sir Edward's letter substantiated that case. Manager Prince's letter substantiated it, and that we pointed out at the time we published Sir Edward's so-called explanation, which embodied the letter of Manager Prince.

Yet in face of this the compiler of the outport news despatch sent broad-

cast by telegraph in the outport news message the falsehood that the Evening Telegram virtually admitted the collapse of the case. Could misrepresentation go further? Could political partisanship in a supposedly non-partisan message treat a subject more improperly and unfairly?

Public Despatch

The Evening Telegram a few days ago called attention to the so-called "Public News Message" sent to the outports and protested against this service being prostituted for Party purposes. If the messages sent to Trinity are specimens of what go to other places, the Telegram has good cause for its protest; not alone for the partisan nature of some of the messages, but for the general "twaddle" that is included under the name of news. A few days ago the message stated that Lady Morris opened a Sale of Work and that a Poultry Show was to be held in St. John's. The next day the message stated that the Poultry Show had been opened. Both of these items mentioned may be quite in place in the news columns of a daily paper, but to the ordinary man they do not appear of sufficient interest to warrant a place in a public telegraphic despatch compiled especially for the outports. The outport public want news—real news—in the Public Message, and accounts of the opening of Sales of Work and Poultry Shows in St. John's are not news from the outport point of view.—Trinity Enterprise.

Special Evening Telegram, QUEBEC, To-day.

It is said to be the intention of the Federal Government to test the practicability of winter navigation the coming season on the lower St. Lawrence by an ice breaker. It is a regular monthly service between Quebec and St. John's Nfld. The steamer will call en route at Anticosti and St. Ignace.

The Royal George has been floated and arrived here under her own steam. As to the damage sustained Joseph begins a veteran diver says the vessel is much more damaged than was thought.

SYDNEY, To-day.

There is much anxiety over the steamer Morien now six days overdue on a trip from Louisburg to Placida, Nfld. The Morien left Louisburg on the 16th, with 1100 tons of coal and as not been reported since. J. A. Young one of the owners is of the opinion she has run with some accident, a her machinery, which disabled her, and that she drifted off her course. There has been no gales lately, heavy enough, he thought to interfere seriously with a ship like the Morien. The tug Thomas and Lady Aurier left Louisburg yesterday morning but returned soon after, the weather being heavy. The Lady Aurier left again yesterday afternoon and will be joined shortly by the Thomas to search for missing steamer.

LONDON, To-day.

No serious fighting is reported on the Thessalonian lines where both sides appear to be waiting the issue of the mistle negotiations. Meanwhile all necessary dispositions have been made for the Bulgarians to be ready to meet any attack. Bulgaria is shipping forces from Saloniki in Greek transports, presumably for transport to Gallipoli Peninsula where Turkey is strengthening her forces by Anatolian troops. Here an attempt will be made by the allies assisted by the Greek fleet to take the Dardanelles. The rest of the allied forces, liberated in Macedonia, will be sent by rail speedily, possibly to reinforce the Bulgarians attacking the Thessalonian lines. Their places will be taken by Bulgarian 1912 recruits, who after three weeks training, are being drafted into Macedonia or garrison duty. The only news of military importance is the occupation of Ochrida, a large town near Monastir by Servians. The position Adrianople and Scutari is apparently unchanged.

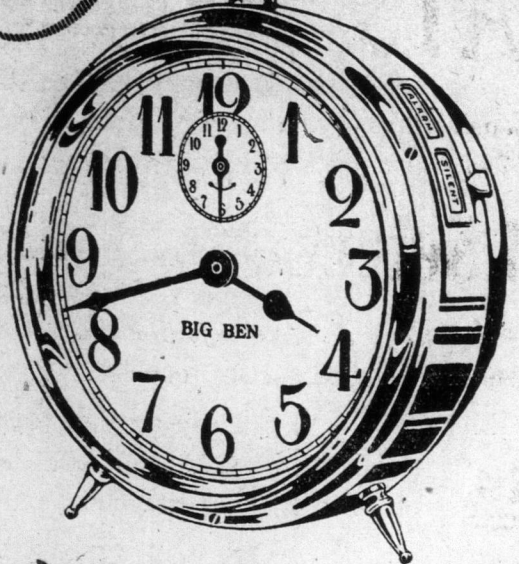

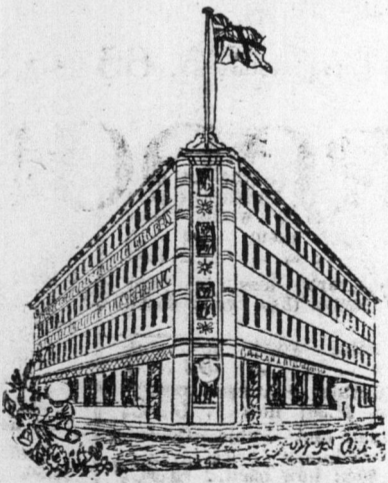

Induction of The Rev. W. H. Thomas

PASTOR OF QUEEN'S ROAD CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH.

When the Rev. Joseph Thackeray, recent pastor of the Congregational Church, closed his ministry of fifteen years, in August last, amongst his closing words he gave expression to the following wish, namely: "That in due time the right pastor would be selected, and he felt sure that such would be the case." During the three months that have intervened since Mr. Thackeray's departure the church has been supplied by different ministers until yesterday when the Rev. W. H. Thomas began his pastorate.

It was but natural that the interest in Mr. Thomas should be very keen, and the congregation, as well as the community in general, hoped for a worthy successor to Mr. Thackeray. In this they have not been disappointed, as the impressions made by Mr. Thomas yesterday morning were favourable in every way, and at the close of the morning service there was that feeling amongst the congregation which bespoke of satisfaction, and encouragement and spiritual edification.

In appearance Mr. Thomas is some what like Mr. Hunter, the evangelist, who visited here in the winter of 1890, but he is really like Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the great Canadian statesman, and without doubt, comparatively speaking, when he shall have reached Sir Wilfrid Laurier's years, he will have made as great an impression in the Church, as Laurier has done in the State.

His ministrations carry with them the mark of the student as well as the scholar, and his department carries dignity. His style of preaching is clear and concise and while not demonstrative or sensational, is none the less impressive and convincing, and such as is remembered beyond the church doors.

We hear it sometimes said that the pulpit is losing its power, and we must acknowledge that there is some truth in the assertion, but if Mr. Thomas's ministrations yesterday can be taken as a criterion of his future career, then we are safe in saying, and proud to be able to say, that the pulpit of this city will be stronger by his presence, and not only will his own people be built up and edified, but the different Nonconformist churches in which he will occasionally preach will be benefited by his services and strengthened by his help.

We feel sure that Mr. Thomas will find warm hearts and a large black hearth, and that both he and his good wife and children, will receive the right hand of fellowship from all classes of the community. Amongst his predecessors in the Congregational Church he has had such men as Hall, Beaton, Hodgekinson, Silldall and Thackeray, all of whom have left their impress upon the people, and most of whom have filled a large place upon the lecture platform in the literary days of the Athanæum lectures, when we had less entertainment and sport than we have now, but when we had more time devoted to true learning and research. We feel sure that Mr. Thomas will be a worthy successor to these gentlemen whom we have known for the last half century; and though not of his fold, we at the same time bid him welcome, and assure him of the co-operation of the Press, and all that stands for the moral good of the community and the welfare of the people.

Obituary.

MR. HENRY HENDERSON.—The death occurred at his residence, City Terrace, last evening of Mr. Hy. Henderson, a man well known and greatly respected in business and social circles in St. John's. Mr. Henderson was a native of Kinross, Scotland, and lived in this country 57 years, having come here when a very young man. Quiet and unostentatious, Mr. Henderson was well liked by a large circle of friends and was a successful business man, noted for integrity and honourable dealings in all transactions. He conducted a very successful dry goods business on Water Street, and also on Theatre Hill. Mr. Henderson was for 35 years elder of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church here. Surviving him are his widow, formerly Miss Urquhart, three sisters, Mrs. Chas. Morris, of Chicago; Mesdames Stuart and McLeod, of this city; Mrs. A. W. Wood, of Winnipeg; Misses Etie and Maggie Henderson, and two sons, Mr. Charles, of the audit department of the R. N. Co., and Mr. William, an electrician, residing in Toronto. The Telegram, in common with the many friends of the deceased, extends to the bereaved family its sincere condolence.

What do you think of all that for the Premier and three or four lines of war news same day?

Since reading the above "public message" I have received a copy of the Evening Telegram containing Sir Edward's explanation and the Telegram's editorial reply thereto, and I find that the closing sentence of that message is utterly false, the Telegram does not "admit the collapse of its charges against the Premier in view of his explanation." But on the contrary points out the stronger proof to substantiate its charges respecting those shares held by the Premier in St. George's Lumber Co.

Now what can be thought of a public man who will deliberately color those despatches, which he prepares for an interested public, with his own peculiar partisan prejudices, and flashes over the wires a barefaced falsehood? Such a man is not to be trusted in any public position or service, for being capable of such a thing, he may, if not checked, sent broadcast even greater falsehoods detrimental to public interest and damaging to the individual who may happen to be on the other side of politics.

"Public telegraph needs" is supposed to be, and should be, non-political and we call His Excellency the Governor's attention to this matter at once to stop such a daily scandal. The Outports want the truth, and nothing but the truth will be tolerated. We want "public needs" not Morris politics, we are sick of that. If those messages are compiled by the Hon. P. T. McGrath we would like to know it also we want no more of his tricks.
