

"You are alone!" he says, anxiously.








Ladies' Apron With Princess Front.

Expedition To Hudson's Bay.

The schooner Laddie is now being provisioned at Job Bros. & Co.'s premises for an expedition, promoted by Sir William McKenzie, Principal of the Canadian Northern Railway, to Hudson Bay. The expedition will be in charge of Mr. P. J. Flaherty, of Toronto, a mining engineer, who will be accompanied by Mr. E. C. LaDuke. Elaborate preparations occupying three months were made by Mr. Flaherty. The main object of the trip is not exactly known but scientific exploration about Hudson's Bay will be included as well as photographs for moving picture purposes. The Laddie will be supplied with an outfit of scientific instruments and all supplies necessary will be taken. Her crew will comprise:—Harold Bartlett, captain; Stewart Gushue, mate; Herb Spracklin, bosun; Michael Leary, engineer; W. Robertson, cook; K. French, S. Robinson, cabin, and S. Sansbury, steward.

Two years ago Capt. Bartlett went north in the Laddie which was engaged by the Canadian Government. It may be remembered Capt. Bartlett did not leave Hudson's Bay, two years ago on his return till Oct. 1st. The previous year Capt. Bartlett and crew of the Laddie were nearly lost in Hudson's Bay. They reached Winnipeg after a harrowing experience.

The Laddie is being put in first-class condition, being sheathed with green heart. She is fitted with a 75 H. P. Remington engine. She sails on Thursday.

The Cistern.



The cistern is a large brick receptacle which has a capacity for 40 barrels of rain water. 8 barrels of golden hued autumn leaves and 13 barrels of shy angle-worms. It is the first thing that is thought of in building a house and is generally located under the kitchen, where its contents can be elevated to the sink and used to impart a dull English finish to the dinner dishes.

Cisterns were in use thousands of years before that insidious form of highway robbery known as the municipal water works plant was invented. Among the proudest possessions of the Roman emperors was a cistern which was convenient to bathe in and also to silence the clamor voice of some liberty-loving patriot. Emperor Nero had a subterranean cistern in which he used to suffuse people who were always wanting to have their taxes remitted, and it was astonishing how their interest in the problem of taxation, dwindled after they had sat in Nero's cistern for a few hours, several feet below the surface.

The cistern is fed by a long, serpentine device known to the plumbing trade as an eavespout. This is attached to a shingle roof and has a curved upper lip which is designed for the sole purpose of allowing the eavespout to slop up about four times a year. It required a high grade of genius to invent the eavespout, which has produced more who's-who's than the tight-waisted patent leather pump.

The advent of the blood-sucking water meter has largely done away with the use of cisterns, which are of no benefit whatever except during the

heated term, when the head of the house can pry the lid off his cistern and let himself down into its cool depths in a pair of washable pajamas. In some parts of the country, cistern water is considered a delicious and health-giving drink, and it is served at southern hotels in a raw state. This produces loud yelps from northern travelling men, who pass it up with a resentful look and retire to their rooms to hunt up a different flavor.

LONDON, To-Day.
The Washington reports of Great Britain's intention to establish a great naval base in Bermuda is regarded here as a gross exaggeration. It is admitted the Admiralty is taking measures to increase the British squadron in those waters and develop Bermuda as a dockyard and coaling station, but it declared that this is merely to remedy a mistake that was made under Admiral Fisher's regime. Bermuda, it is argued, has been in British possession since 1609, long before the Monroe Doctrine existed, and it became a regular coaling station in 1859, and was made the headquarters of North America and West Indies squadron years ago. Under Lord Fisher's naval redistribution scheme, owing to naval pressure in Europe, a number of ships that had their headquarters at Bermuda was reduced, but the dockyard was always maintained. So far as it is known, all that the Admiralty now intends to do is to station four armoured cruisers in the West Indies during the winter months. No battleships are going there.

LONDON, To-Day.
The text of the Labor Party's proposals for nationalization of mines, published by the Miners' Federation of Britain, provides for the establishment of a new government department under a Minister of Mines, and purchase at price about \$675,000, based on an average output of each mine for five years at a maximum of \$2.50 per ton; the proprietors to be compensated by Government stock at three per cent. par. Miners are to be Government servants and have the right to form trades unions and declare strikes. The Minister of Mines can buy mines by compulsion if necessary. He is to be responsible for sufficient coal supplies at reasonable prices throughout the country. The bill calls for a Government order of compelling railroad companies to enable the minister to carry out this part of his duties. Supporters of the bill have their advocacy of it on the ground that State ownership of coal mines has proved successful in several countries.

Mr. Balfour as a Bookman.

Mr. Balfour's absences from the British House of Commons are usually put down to golf or to the gout that so often attacks members in pairs during a tedious debate. But of late he has played truant for graver causes; he is preparing for the press a work on political economy, a continuation and in part a correction of a former volume. There is nothing Mr. Balfour takes so seriously as his written word. He goes further than most authors in conscientiousness. Having re-written certain portions of his "The Criticism of Beauty" he made known through his publishers but not exactly on their advice, that any purchaser of the first edition who returned his copy would receive the revised version for nothing. The methods of the member for the city are not according to city standards, exactly pushing—unless, of course, the first edition had risen to a premium!







A Suitable Punishment.

When you come to think of it, isn't it really astonishing how large a proportion of the troubles that darken our horizons and keeps us from being happy, is the creation of our own brains.

There are a few real troubles in the world; death of someone you love is the chief of them; sickness is another; "real" biting poverty which withers lesser soul with its deadly breath is another; unrequited love is another,—although when one considers how largely love is subjective one might almost class that with the troubles that we create; disgrace for one's self or for those one loves is another.

I suppose there are a few more real troubles, but I haven't been able to think of them, although I've been trying to ever since this subject occurred to me, and that was some months ago. To tell the truth I don't really believe there are any more. And yet, when you feel blue and miserable, when your horizon is darkened, how often is your unhappiness to be traced to one of these real troubles? Probably not once out of

a hundred times. The other ninety-nine times you are allowing your existence to be poisoned by someone of the million million varieties of self-created troubles. What do I mean? Why fretting over what people think of you, for instance; making yourself miserable because you cannot possess some luxury; worrying over your work, fretting because you cannot arrange the future, re-hashing some past decision, torturing yourself by useless remorse, and so down the infinite line. Some of your troubles have some slight ground in present discomfort; some have not even that, but are rooted simply in the irrevocable past or the unmanageable future. There is no question but that fear and regret cause quite as much suffering as present trouble.

Do you know what I sometimes think when I find myself letting one of the self-created troubles darken the blue sky of my ought-to-be happiness? I think, "It would serve you right, Ruth Cameron, if every time you were wicked enough to be blue over nothing, something to be really blue about came to you."

You see, once on a time that did happen to me. I had been fretting over one of these self-created troubles when I should have been perfectly happy, and then all of a sudden, the shadow of a real trouble swooped down upon me.

Of course it would be a terrible punishment to have that always happen. But don't you think we almost deserve it?

Household Notes.

Any chance of this rusting is prevented by placing them near the heat for a little while after they have been washed.

Fine linens and all pieces of hand-some lingerie should be wrung out by hand and never through a wringer.

A good-sized pearl button sewed into the corner of the dishcloth will be found a convenience when cleaning saucepans.

Sweet oil will remove finger marks from varnished furniture. Kerosene on waxed or oiled furniture gives better results.

To prevent custard dishes or cups from cracking when pouring boiled custard into them, place the dish or cup on a damp cloth.

If hot vinegar is used instead of cold when making meat sauce, it will greatly improve the flavor and give the sauce a better color.

White enameled furniture can be cleaned by dissolving one tablespoonful of baking soda in one pint of warm water. Saturate a soft cloth and wash the furniture.

A mixture of kerosene and ammonia cleans porcelain bathtubs and sinks instantly, and does not injure them as greatly as acid substances do.

Egg stains should be soaked in cold water before going to the laundry. If this is done, the stains will come out easily. Hot water sets them.

New potatoes will scrape very easily if they are put to soak in water in which a small piece of common soda is put; also, they will not soil the fingers.

When washing pudding cloths, throw some orange peelings into the water; this collects the grease and helps to make the cloths white and clean.

When making lemonade, dissolve the sugar in a little hot water. This prevents the sugar from sinking to the bottom of the pitcher and will sweeten it more quickly.

When the hot-water bag starts to

leak do not throw it away, but heat clean white sand and put it into the bag. The sand is better than water. It retains the heat longer.

The best way to cook an egg is to do it one's self at the breakfast table. Take a quart of boiling water and carefully drop the egg in. At the end of five or six minutes it will be beautifully cooked.

When grease is spilled on the table, pour cold water with a little lemon juice on it immediately. The grease will harden quickly and you can remove it with a knife, without leaving a mark.

The cause of the little break in silk stockings often comes from running one's hands within the stockings while rings are on the fingers. The stones or rings catch the thin threads and break them.

If a cork is too large for a bottle in which you wish to use it, lay it on its side and with a little board or ruler roll it under all the pressure you can put on it. It will be elongated to fit in a very few minutes.

Single Scull Races, Yacht Races,

And Names of Men and Boats. Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir—Many of St. John's citizens remember the single scull races, and the yacht races. The single scull race should still be on the programme. It was indeed a pity to dispense with them, some of our most prominent men took part in them, amongst them being Mr. Johnson, now Judge Johnson, of the Supreme Court; a brother of the present member for St. Barbe District, Mr. Clapp, was a good oarsman in the States or Canada some years ago. He used to row the Nonsuch. Then there was Juke in the Blue Bell, and Chancey in the Nameless. Chancey is still alive and a smart man yet. Walsh and Squires were two good rowers also. Other single scull boats in the single scull race, were Touch Not, Fanny, Water Lily, Lotus, Maggie and Blue Jacket. The Fanny was rowed by Hughes, at the Regatta of 1879; Ryan rowed the Willie, and the Minnie was rowed by McGrath. In the all-comers single scull race of 1880, the Columbia, Arthur Rendell, Esq., took first place. Mr. Rendell looks good enough for a scull race to-day; he is a smart looking man yet. "Son" Hughes took second place, and Tucker in the Lotus, third place. The following year's races, Judge Johnson in the Anon, beat Hughes in the Naisie; Coaker came along the next year and did good work for a couple of years, defeating Leahy from Halifax in a challenge race, as I have told you in the letter yesterday. Earnes was a good rower. I think that was the year before the fire of '92 that the first single scull race was held at Kitty Vixen Pond. "Oh for the days and for the men Who once on the pond did row; Like Richard Squires from Broad Cove. Some forty years ago." The yacht races were very pretty; some fine yachts contested. The Telegram dilating on the races of 1889, stated, that the yacht race for that year furnished one of the most charming spectacles ever witnessed on Quill Vail Lake. Nine yachts contested, Elsie, Siren, Marguerite, Sybil, Wanda, Canychie, Beothuk, Nettle and M.K.G. The late Hon. A. W. Harvey steered the Sybil; the M.K.G. was owned by Mr. M. K. Greene, late of the Municipal Council; Dr. Rendell was awarded the prize in the Elsie; the Wanda took second place and the Siren, owned by Hon. Edgar Bowring, took third prize. Bob Sexton steered Dr. Rendell's yacht on the occasion. In August, 21st, the same year, nine yachts again contested in a race on the pond. The Canychie won the race. The first steered by the late Hon. A. W. Harvey came next. I should like to see single scull races on the pond once more; the present generation know nothing about them, but the old folks can appreciate the pleasure which they gave, especially when "Greek met Greek" such as in the days when the "bush-borns" beat the "bluenoses."

Diary of the Rev. H. Le Bishop's Chaplain

THIRD INSTALMENT.

Left Tillamagoe on Tuesday morning for Herring Neck, a glorious summer day, with very light wind and as we were under canvas, instead of motor power, our progress was slow. We passed several magnificent icebergs during the day and arrived in the afternoon at the usual anchorage, Herring Neck is a quaint romantic place, the principal and practically the only street is the water, for the people are settled in little coves. Miniature harbours and little inlets quite impossible to be connected by roads, so the boat is very much in evidence; children go to school in boat, the women go shopping by the same means, and on Sundays the people get to church in the same manner, and when the time for service had come the Bishop went to church in the ship's boat. about this work as successfully could not join in the consecration service, but those who were present would have to toll to the absent ones, upon their return, how pleased he was with their work, then turning to the candidates he said that he had set apart their church by the service of Dedication, and they had set apart their bodies by the service of Confirmation, referring to St. Paul's words: "Know ye not that your bodies are the temples of the Holy Ghost, etc." Service over we returned to the ship.

Next morning we went to Clark's Head about three miles from our last anchorage where the second Church in Gander Bay awaited consecration. A similar service to that performed at Victoria Cove was held, the Church was set apart, followed by the Confirmation Service, good byes were said. We went on board and immediately left this place for Fogo. Mr. Pitcher and Mr. Cracknell, the latter a student from Queen's College, remained behind to hold services in the two places just recently visited. We arrived at Fogo towards sunset, several persons called—among whom were Rev. J. O. Britnell, Rector, the Church Warden and Messrs. Barrie. In the night the houses were illuminated and the old cannon roared forth a boisterous welcome which was acknowledged by the ship's gun. The following day, the first since we left St. John's, was availed of by the Bishop for attending to his correspondence and other matters in connection with the Diocese. In the evening we went on shore to tea at Mr. William Earle's.

Sunday was a very busy day for everybody, the services began with a Celebration at 8. The Bishop was Celebrant, assisted by the Rector. The Chaplain went by motor boat to Barr'd Island for morning prayer and Celebration, as the present incumbent is a Deacon. The Bishop held a second Celebration and preached in Fogo Church at morning prayer. In the afternoon a new cemetery which had been prepared and fenced was duly consecrated, many hundred people followed the Bishop as he slowly marched round the ground repeating the 47th Psalm the alternate verses being said by the people. After the sentence of consecration was read by the Chaplain and signed by the Bishop, hymn 225: "Brief life is here our portion," was sung, a short address was given in which the Bishop emphasized the fact that only the Prayer Book service was to be used over the body of a person interred in that ground and pointing out how necessary it was that the resting place of the body of a Christian should be treated with great respect; he asked them to see that the fence was always kept in good repair; the blessing pronounced over the ground, a short but interesting service was brought to a close. Returning from the consecration service the Bishop and Chaplain went to tea at the Rectory, and remained there until the Confirmation service an hour later. A large congregation witnessed the Laying on of Hands. The fathers and mothers, older sisters and brothers filled every seat and long before the hour for service had arrived every available seat was occupied. The service began with a processional hymn, the Choir, Clergy and Bishop entering by the west door, slowly the procession marched up the aisle, each in due order taking his allotted place, and then the service began.

After the "Imposition of Hands," the Bishop first spoke to the congregation, thanking them for the very hearty welcome extended him, assuring them of the great pleasure it was to him to re-visit Fogo, after an absence of six years, hoping that the new church which was now very necessary, would soon be started. Then turning to the large number of candidates he reminded them of the great gift which they had received from God. Service over, the congregation wending their way homeward, we walked to the wharf, and found the gig waiting. We went on board feeling that "something attempted, something done, had earned a night's repose."

Monday morning through the kindness of Mr. Earle, who placed his horse and carriage and driver at the disposal of the Bishop, Barr'd Islands received an Episcopal visit. A drive of two hours over a road by no means fit for motor cars, the Bishop and Rector of Fogo arrived at the house of Mr. Hodder, agent for Messrs. Earle, Sons & Co. The Chaplain in company with the baggage was kindly taken down by Mr. Harold Earle in his motor yacht. The Rev. E. Andrews and Chaplain met the Bishop and all had dinner at Mr. Hodder's. The confirmation was held in the afternoon immediately following a short service dedicating the Church which had been added since the Bishop's last visit. In spite of the fact that the day was beautifully fine and everyone was busy about fish either catching, dressing, or curing it, the Church was crowded, an arch of welcome had been erected and the building nicely decorated. Many young people and not a few older ones were present by the incumbent and knelt before their Bishop to receive the Apostolic Rite. In his address the Bishop thanked the

congregation for the hearty reception given him, saying he accepted it, not merely as a compliment to himself, but as a sign of their loyalty to the Church over which he was the Chief Pastor. Then he spoke to the children about the service in which they were the chief persons concerned. He had held this service for them; he had come to Barr'd Islands to give them a special means of grace from God, etc., etc. The recessional hymn brought a most interesting service to a close. We went back to Mr. Hodder's, had a cup of tea, and the Bishop and Rector returned to Fogo, while the Chaplain and Mr. Andrews on hour later went back by motor boat, Mr. H. Earle coming from Fogo to take us back. In the evening the Rector and Mrs. Britnell came to supper with the Bishop on the ship.

The following morning we started for Indian Islands and held the confirmation in the afternoon. Every man was away at the fishery; the entire congregation being composed of women and children, who had erected an arch and had covered the landing place back to the road with mats. Bunting was very much in evidence and a general holiday feeling pervaded the place. To Make Wire Rods For St. John Factory.

MILL PURCHASED BY MARITIME NAIL COMPANY, LTD.
(From St. John Globe, July 21.)

A striking example of St. John enterprise has become known by the return from Europe of Mr. Stanley E. Elkin, manager of the Maritime Nail Co. Ltd. As is already known, this Company's plant in the North End has been considerably enlarged and improved in recent years, and under Mr. Elkin's control has been one of the most successful and best paying industries in the country. It is also well known that the Company is erecting a factory at Fort William, Ont., in order to supply the Western market more easily.

It has now become public that the Company has bought a rod mill at Voelbingen, Germany, for the purpose of supplying their Canadian mill works with rod for the production of wire in the German steel trust. Mr. Elkin went to Germany in June to be present when the first shipment of rods was made. The shipment of 4,000 tons is coming to St. John in the steamship Guernsey, and is the largest cargo of this kind ever brought to Canada.

Mr. Elkin found the mill in excellent working order, and is confident the new enterprise will be a great success. He succeeded in interesting leading German manufacturers in the enterprise, and has on the Board of Directors Mr. A. Roehling, President of the Stahl Works, Bochum (the steel trust), W. Moser, director of the Deutsche Draht Walzwerke (wire rod syndicate); and also Mr. Norton Griffiths, M.P. The German steel interest is a very large and important one—the capacity of the mills being 40,000 tons a year, and the connection with the Canadian industry may lead to investments in the Dominion.

The Maritime Nail Co. in establishing the works in Germany, will effect a large saving in cost, and will put their mill in an advanced position in these days of fierce competition. An issue of preference stock was recently made to cover the cost of the new enterprise, and it was very promptly taken up.

The mill in the North End was recently enlarged, and a warehouse is to be erected in the fall. The prospects altogether are very bright for a continuance of the success that has marked the operation of the mill in recent years.


