The new methods used to insure the longevity of the battleships are partly but not entirely known. The vessel is first anchored securely in a capacious harbour. It is then protected by mines, barbed wire fences and policemen. In order to minimize the danger of leaks, the bottom of the harbor is built up around the ship and in some cases it is quite likely that the latter is fitted with wheels This enables it to escape more rapidly from mysterious strangers and ob viates the danger of scasickness of the part of the crew. There is still much nervousness in Europe over the protection of these delicate crafts and new safeguards are being continually thought out. Later on they may be hidden in the cathedrals or taken apart and sent to neutral counties by Parcel Post. 
