At that time, Omsk and Siberia deserved it, of course, but, whether they did or not, it is to Omsk, through the toievsky in his "Recollections of the House of the Dead," that the world owed, and still owes, its strangely obstinate misconceptions of the country which Nansen has described as "the land of the future." Very many people, it may safely be ventured, still of picture Siberia as a land of more or less eternal snow, of frozen wastes
