





6.—CONCLUSION.

From the previous articles it will be seen that 1. There are about 1,000 Protestant

children in St. John's without school accommodation 2. The Elementary School Build

ings in the majority of cases, are quite unsuitable for use in the teaching of children, while some of them have for years been condemned by ourselves.

3. Even the best of our school buildings lack very many essentials to make them suitable for the work of teaching young people.

4. There is a lack of even the ordinary educational equipment in the lower schools, while in the higher branches of education, there is not adequate equipment for chemistry, physics, commercial training, manual training, music, art, etc.

5. Because of the present divisions and the consequent multiplication of schools, it is impossible to carry out a satisfactory programme for classification and grading.

6. The majority of our children leave school at twelve years of age. and it is necessary that steps be taken so that our young people may be encouraged to remain longer at school.

7. We must first lay the foundations, beginning at the Kindergarten, and passing through the various grades up to the Associate classes. Upon this firm basis then can be de veloped an Institution of University

## Early Morning Air.

Everyone recognizes the sweetness and freshness of the early morning air and knows that these atractive properties disappear as the day advances. But so far as analysis goes, scientists say that the composition of early morning air is not different

from that of air at any other time.

During the passing of night to day and of day to night several physical changes occur. There is a fall in temperature at sunset and a rise again at dawn, and consequently moisture is alternatively being thrown out and taken up again, and it is well known that change of state is accompanied by electrical phenomena and certain chemical manifestations also.

The formation of dew has probably therefore far more profound effects than merely the moistening of

Dew is vitalizing not entirely because it is water but because it possesses an invigorating action due partly at any rate to the fact that it is saturated with oxygen. and it has been stated that during its formation peroxide of hydrogen and some ozene are developed. It is not imporbable that the peculiariy attractive and refreshing quality that marks the early morning air has its origin in this way. The difficulty of inducing grass to flourish under a tree in full leaf is well known and is generally explained by saying that the tree absorbs the nourishing constituents of the soil or that it keeps

protects it from rain. It is doubtful whether any of these explanations is true, the real reason most probably being that the vitalizing dew cannot form upon the grass under a tree, whereas as a rule both rain and light can reach it.

"Sixteen years ago, in an article Champions for the year ture. He pointed out that the sport therhithe), mariners, Robert Clay and contributed to the English Historical Review. Mr. Marsden made it clean that the master of the Pilgrim ship was not Thomas Jones, as had been supposed, but one Christopher Jones. He cited Admiralty Court records which established the association of Christopher Jones and Mayflower as far back as 1609, when they made a voyage to Drontheim, in Norway, and from which he inferred that on one occasion, in 1616, they had been to one of the wine countries.

"Dr. Rendel Harris, in his recently published volume "The Last of The Mayflower," has given extracts from the Port Books, which show that in both January and May of the year in which the American adventure was undertaken Christopher Jones and his Mayflower brought cargoes of French wine to the Thames.

"In point of fact, we learn from the Port Books that the vessel was fetching French wine to London as early as 1640, and that she received some on board for the Norway voyage of 1609.

"Between the spring of 1610 and the summer of 1620 Christopher Jone's Mayflower finds frequent mention in the Port Books of London, always in connection with voyages to when she brought consignments of taffeta, satins, sarsenets, and lawns from Hamburg."


