The year 1920 was the last of a systemmmunist policy. Lenin's partial renouncement of Communism in March, 1921, resulted in an increase of the cultivated area and in the size of the harvest. The winter crops there have perished completely, while in those districts where they still survive the harvest will not be above that of 1921-i.e., 15-30 lb. per acre. 



### Men and Boys as Cooks

By MARY I. BARBER. Kellogg, Co., London. Ont., Canada.

Why should boys know how to cook? From the practical point of view there are many times when the ability to get a meal will be most welcome. In the daughterless family, when mother is ill or away, why should not father and the boys be able to prepare breakfast, at least-and to leave the kitchen in good order afterwards?

From an educational point of view learning to cook develops certain powers of observation, the senses of taste and smell, and an appreciation of the ingenuity and skill it takes to turn out a finished meal at the right

Many men take pride in the way they can manage a camping partybuilding and keeping the fires, frying the bacon, boiling the coffee and even flapping the flapjacks or baking biscuits. But this efficiency is often lost when they enter the doors of their homes.

Meal preparation has been made easy for us by the food manufacturers. If our emergency shelf is well stocked, a balanced meal can be achieved with a can opener and some saucepans.

For breakfast, prunes from the can, corn flakes from the package, codfish balls from the can, toast, and coffee will form a satisfying meal; for lunch. canned vegetable soup, canned welsh rarebit on crackers, tea, and crisp cookies from a tin box. For dinner. open a can of assorted hors d' oeuvres if you wish to stimulate the appetite. The main course may be creamed chicken, macaroni with cheese, baked beans, kippered herring, or cold tongue-all of which comes canned. Round this out with a can of lima beans (to take the place of potatoes) and a can of spinach. For dessert, there is nothing better than a can of mixed fruit which has been thoroughly chilled

Knowledge of right combination of foods is important. A rule to follow for each meal is:

One food for heat (starches, fats. and sugars). One food for meat (meat, eggs,

cheese, fish, milk or legumes). Some foods to keep us feeling fit (fruits, vegetables, all-bran or whole cereals).

The main object of cooking is to preserve, or develop flavor. The food manufacturers have done this for us. The main object of eating is to give our bodies the materials they need for growth and health. Let boys learn the principles of food selection, and if they live where there is a grocery store and a cow, and if they own a can opener, their health will be insured antil the emergency passes.

### Improved Roadways

FACILITATE AUTOISTS CROSSING CONTINENT.

CHICAGA-(A.P.)-Oklahoma and South Dakota, two states noted in the past by automobile tourists for their bad roads, are mending their highways with the result that in the future driving through them will be better and easier.

Oklahoma announces that 350 miles of hard surfaced roads are being built and the cost of the programme, together with bridges, will reach \$9,-959.00. Twenty-four federal aid projects embracing 127 miles of concrete highway at a cost of \$5,455,000 are now being completed by the state highway commission. Twenty-nine stretches of gravel highway totalling 223 miles, also receiving the aid of the federal government and costing \$4,014,000, are being laid.

The commission contemplates spending between \$8,000,000 and \$10.-000,000 annually for six years. Three countries will vote within the next month on road bonds, totalling more than \$2,000,000.

Financed by 70 percent. of a motor vehicle license tax and the entire proceeds from a two cent tax on gasoline, the 6,000 mile trunk highway system of South Dakota, begun in 1919, will be approximately one-fourth completed and gravel surfaced at the close of 1924, under supervision of the state highway commission.

The system comprises six direct east and west routes through the state and an equal number running north and south. The construction programme of this season is the most significant yet undertaken, as it will complete a number of the through routes in the east half of the state.

By the end of the year a total of 1,000 miles of the arterial system will have been graded. During the last iscal year the highway fund received \$1,350,000 from automobile fees and 900,000 from the gasoline tax. The former fund is devoted wholly to new construction and the latter to main-



GOOD RESULTS AND BAD RESULTS

I am not ready to admit that no good results have come from the Pro-hibition Act, scandalously as it has been treated, to set over against the undoubted evils that have flown from it. The closing of the licensed saloon is admittedly a good result. Nobody worth while wishes the saloon to return. Street corners do not present the repugnant scenes not uncommon in pre-war days. Drunken men are still seen occasionally upon the streets of this city, and their number may be increasing, but they are so infrequent as to-challenge a degree of attention they would not have received in saloon days. Then, too, I am hopeful that the closing of the saloon, he withdrawal of open invitation to drink, may have good effects upon the young which by and by may be tributed to the Prohibition Act. This admit is speculative only, and over against it may be set the claim that there may have been inculcated in the young a disrespect for law more damaging to them morally than any harm which could be done to them by drinking habits. SALE OF SPIRITS.

It is a principle of the Bill that all sales of spirits, for beverage purposes, shall be by the Board or its Agents, in Board establishments, where nothing else may be sold. Wine and beer in bottles may also be sold in the same places, and in hotels and Clubs, holding the Board's permit Sale anywhere of wine or beer by the glass is not permitted. It is provided that the chief establishment of the Board, and two branches, shall be at St. John's, and that branches may be opened by the Board in areas having a population of five thousand or upwards, a majority of whose electors petition for a branch, which may by the petition be confined to the sale of spirits alone or of wine and beer alone. You will notice that in these particulars, respect has been paid to the principle of local option, and also to the arguments of those who have advocated the sale of wines and beers. SCOPE OF BILL.

The Bill includes alcohol, spirits (brandy, rum, whiskey and gin), wine and beer containing three per cent. and over by volume of alcohol under the general title of "alcoholic liquor," and provides that alcohol and spirits (for beverage purposes) can be sold in Board establishments only, in which wine and beer will also be for sale. No consumption on Board premises is legal. No sale may take place therein between six o'clock in the evening or nine next morning or on Saturday afternoon, Sundays, or holidays or election days.
