Unhappy Poland.

The Times correspondent reports that 160 of the sequestrated estates of Polish noblemen hare at last been disposed of by auction. Until the Russian Govern-ment took upon themsolves to force the sale of the lands at public auction and permitted others than the Sclavo-orthodox to bid for them, it was impos-sible to find purchasers, although the Government had sets part 250,000 roubles a year to assist the investors. The Poles held togother, and the orthodox were afraid to buy. Even the Land Credit Company, to whom the money was en-trusted declined the task expatriating the Poles who could not be sent to Siberia. The lands now sold have passed at more-ly nominal values into the hands of Jewsand Germans from the Baltic prov-inces. At present the ejected landlords have no alternative but submission to these cruel measures, against which even the Russian Conservative party, pro-text. It is supposed that the loan just made to the Land Credit Company by Rothschilds may have been sanctioned on condition that part of the funds shall be applied to this process of ejectment. So fur 600 estates have been confisented out of 50,000 in the province.
