Messrs. Tregillus & Hextall Will Give 150 Acres of Land BRIDGE TO BE BUILT ACROSS THE RIVER

"The Exhibition company has been offered practically free of charge very fine grounds to the far west of the city. The proposed donors are Mr. W. J. Tregillus and J. Hextall, and the property is a portion of that part of the west of the city known as Bowness. It is on the south of the Bow river and directly across

from the park now known as Shouldice Park.

Then again, it is directly across from the park to which a railway will be projected at an early date. Arrangements are being made to have a bridge span the river very soon.
