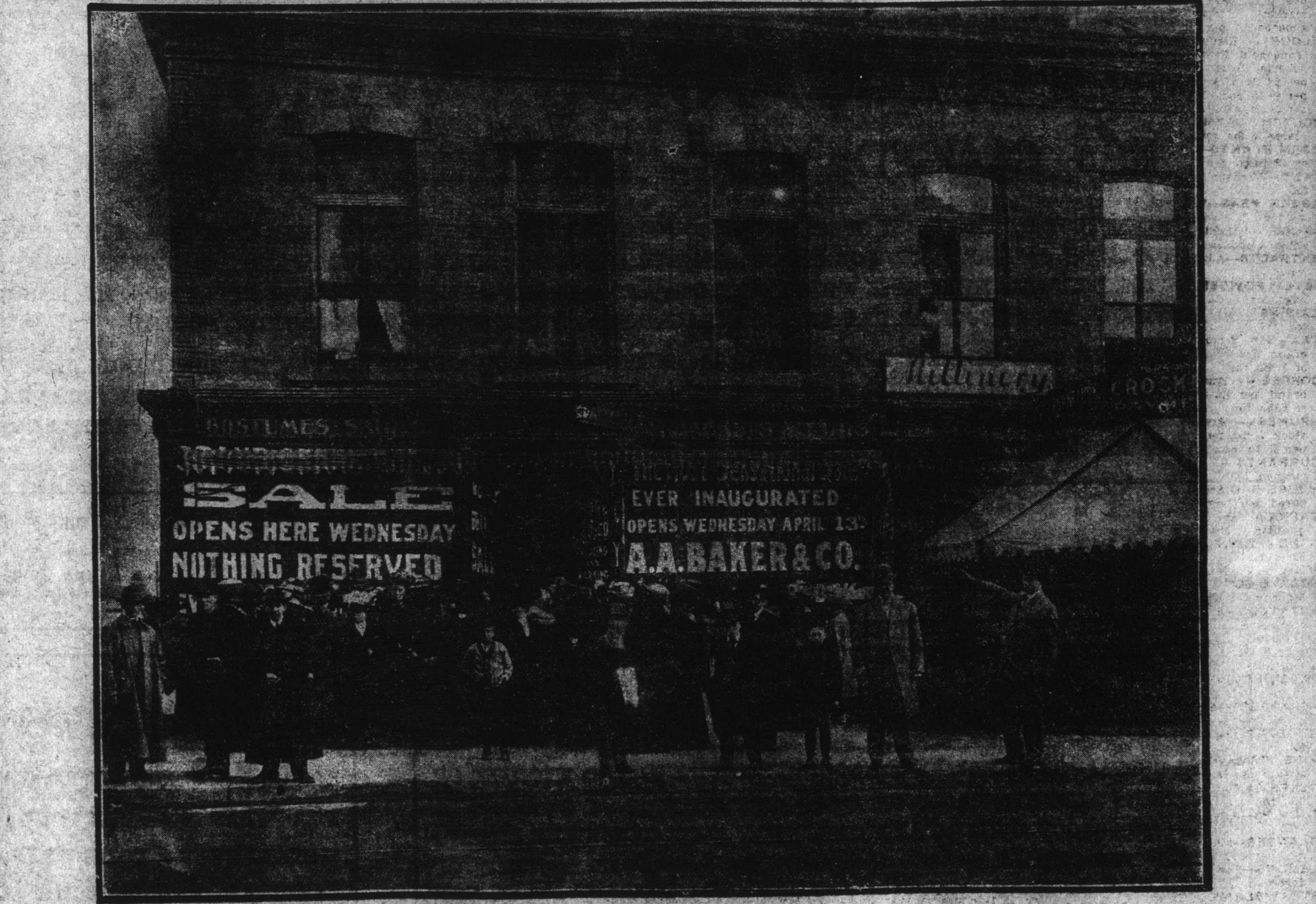

FIRST EVIDENCE AT ROYAL COMMISSION

Full Report of the Evidence Given by Hon. W. H. Cushing

DR. WADDELL SUBJECTED TO RIGID EXAMINATION

Verbatim Report of the Proceedings at the Investigation

The Royal Commission met pursuant to adjournment, present, as before, occupying P. J. Nolin, being the agent, and Sydney B. Woods, Esq., instead, on behalf of the Hon. Mr. Ruthford, and excepting Mr. Robson, who withdrew as counsel for the A. G. & W. Railway.

Mr. Walsh: My first duties this morning, my lords, are to convey to the Commission the information that was conveyed to me just as my learned friend and I were leaving the hotel, that Mr. Robson had withdrawn from the inquiry. He was acting, as your lordships will remember, on behalf of the Alberta & Great Waterways Company, and he sent us a letter which was dated yesterday, simply containing the information that he had withdrawn, and asking us to communicate that fact to the Commission.

In addition to the information Mr. Robson conveyed to us of which I have just informed your lordships, it has been intimated to us by Mr. Minty that Mr. Clarke will not be present to attend the sittings of this Commission and that Mr. Minty has returned to Winnipeg. His letter is marked "personal," so I don't consider myself at liberty to read the letter, but in fairness to Mr. Minty, I might simply say that he states if the Commission decides to go to Winnipeg to take evidence, he will be glad to give his evidence there. In view of these developments which have only arisen in the past half hour, my learned friend, Mr. Johnston, and I are somewhat non-plussed. Your lordships will remember that on the opening day of the inquiry the statement was made by counsel representing the company that Mr. Clarke would be here, and we intimated before we left Edmonton last week at the conclusion of our labors, that we would require Mr. Clarke's presence here this morning, as we thought it was absolutely necessary that we should clean up the matter of production before starting in with the main evidence of the inquiry, and Mr. Clarke was a witness from whom it was absolutely imperative that production should be procured. Relying on the statement that was made that Mr. Clarke would be here, we had outlined in some measure the plans of procedure that we would adopt this morning. We had intended, after the question of production was fully disposed of, to call Mr. J. K. 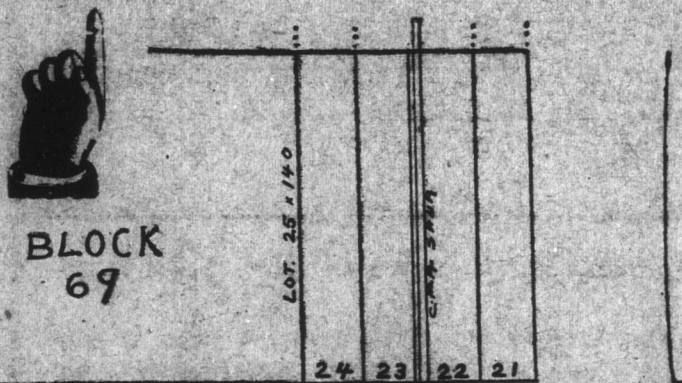

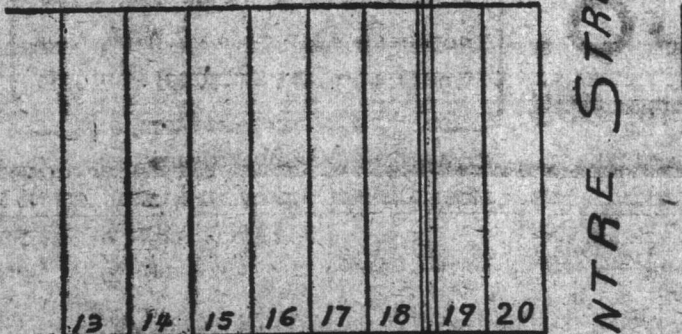

A. Yes.

Q. About when?

A. It was the end of last September, September, 1909?

A. Yes.

Q. When were you engaged as the engineer of the Alberta & Great Waterways company?

A. My duties, formally.

Q. When were you engaged?

A. I was engaged for different pieces of work at first.

A. About the time, after September, 1908, when I took hold for Mr. Clarke.

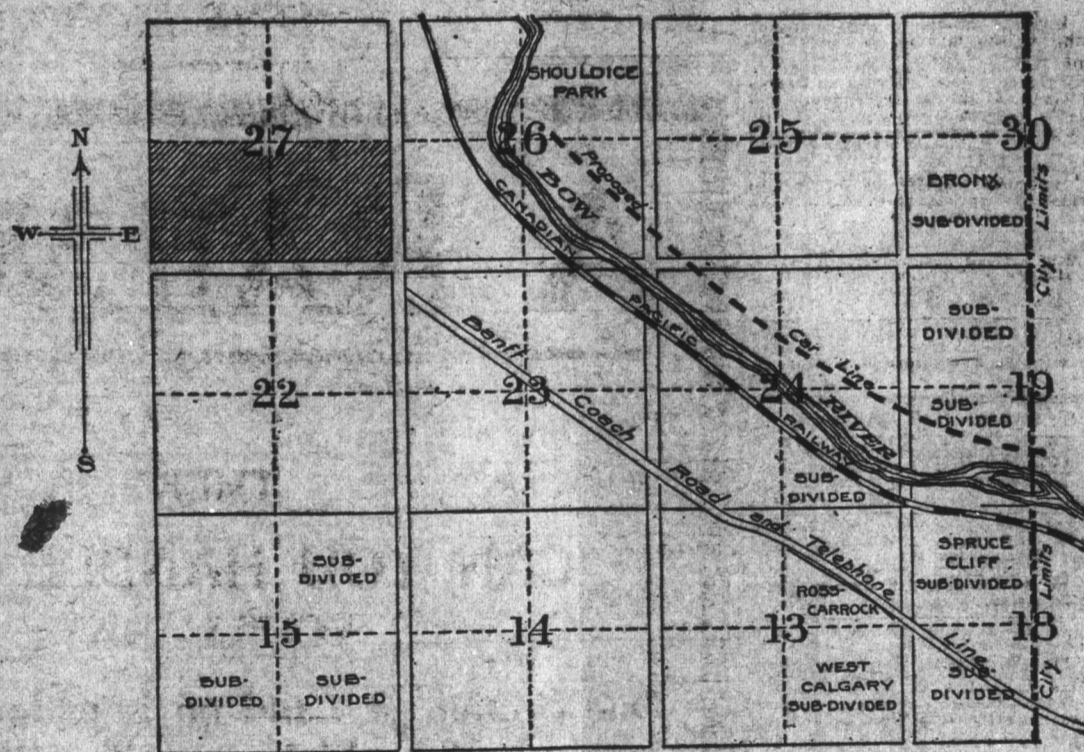
