The red revolutionists or anarchists of Europe, smarting under several failures, are now making war against kings in a new way. They remember how the great blaze of the first French revolution was extinguished under the military despotism of Napoleon, which again led to the rule of the holy alliance in 'continental Europe. The "glorious three days" of 1830 did not mend the matter much for French revolutionists, for it left the country as much under military government as before. Next after that came the outburst of 1848, which quickly ended in smoke, and led up to Louis Napoleon's mischievous coup d'etat of December 2, and left the rule of the sword stronger than before. The event of Sedan gave French revolutionists another opportunity, but they achieved only the merest transitory gleam of success. Doubtless the lessons of those repeated failures have sunk deep into the hearts of communists, socialists, nihilists, fenians, invincibles, reds, and revolutionists of every grade; and as a result the war against kings and

their instruments of government is to be carried out on a new plan. Of course, assassination is not new, being in fact something of old date in the world's history. But the use of dynamite against governments goes only a few years back, and now another change in the strategy of European anarchists looms up. Formerly they used to make their base of operations in London, Paris, Brussels, or eva as circumstances suggested: but now, owing to a better understanding between the powers, these places are no longer considered safe, and New York is now the place whence selected desperados are despatched to do deeds of murder in Europe with pistol, dagger and dynamite. For some time back indications of this change of base have been multiplying, and they are getting stronger every week that passes. A diplomatic note has just been received by Earl Granville from Count Kalnoky the Austrian foreign minister, in which the latter declares that the police of Vienna have become convinced of the American origin of the recent murders and outrages in that capital, the most startling of which have been the murder of police commissary Klubeek on December 17, of Detective Block on January 25, and of the broker, Herr Eisert on January 10, the robbery from the latter of 3000 florins, and the robbery from the postoffice on February 1 of 240,000

Count Kalnoky points out that this out break of terrorism began immediately after the publication in the seditious papers of Vienna of the proceedings of the socialistic congress, which was held at Pittsburg last November, which was controlled and directed by John Most, and which distinctly advocated assassination and the destruction of public and private property to avenge the so-called wrongs of the people; that among the papers found in the possessi of the anarchists Kennel, Schultz, Falk, and Lissa, lately expelled from Switzerland, were letters and instructions from Most; that the money stolen from Herr Eisert had been forwarded to Most, and that Penkert, the socialist editor of the recently suppressed paper Zukunft (the Future), was about to sail from London to join Most in New York. These and other facts in possession of the Austrian government, Count Kalnoky says, furnish incontestible proofs that the murderous operations in Vienna are instigated and directed by the central anarchist committee, which has its meetings in New York city, and of which the leading officers are the socialists, Most and Karl.

Austria's proposal is that England should join her in a complaint to the government of Washington on the subject; and a cable despatch of Saturday's date says that the eabinet will consider it on Wednesday. Apparently England has good and substantial reasons for acceding to the request, but no indication of the government's intentions has yet been given.

We should say that the American gov ernment could scarcely afford to treat such an appeal with indifference were it made. New York, Pittsburg and Cincinnati have had their warning experiences; and it is well known that Chicago and other cities, having a large foreign-born population are slumbering volcanoes that may break out any day. The anarchists find that they can do openly in America what they dare hardly attempt in the most secret manner in Europe; and New York is made the headquarters of their central committee.
