Theodore Davie, Q.C., Premier of British Columbia, will become Chief Justice of the province in succession to the late Sir Matthew Begbie. This will necessitate a reconstruction of the Provincial Ministry, and in this connection an interesting report is in circulation that Lieutenant-Governor Dewdney may leave his gubernatorial chair for the provincial premiership. Such a change would open up a vista of possibilities in the political world in which Ontario might have some interest.

It is understood that Mr. Davie's appointment will be gezetted on Saturday.
