During the month of January Canadian Banks withdrew \$1,350,720 from the United States. On the 31st, they had a balance of \$23,948,158 due them there.

Local bank clearing are disappointing. They, however, are a quarter of a million more than during the same week of last year.

There is a revival of the interest in Postal Telegraph stock, which is higher at 90 bid.

The net exports from Canada at New York since Jan. 1 are \$24,800,000, as compared with \$20,000,000 the corresponding period last year, \$20,600,000 in 1933 and \$25,000,000 in 1932.

The gold reserve of the United States Treasury, which was down to \$42,000,000 a fortnight ago, is now up to \$52,000,000.

There is a big decrease in the number of deaths in Canada this week, according to R. G. Dan & Co., the number is 32, as compared with 61 last week and 33 the corresponding week of last year.

The decrease in the population of Canadian banks during January is much larger than had been anticipated. The Toronto office of the Bank of Montreal, for example, shows a decrease of \$8,465,000 for the month.

The total exports from Canada for the six months ended Dec. 31 are valued at \$71,324,223, as against \$76,594,729 during the corresponding period last year, and \$72,222,000 in 1933.

The Daily Bulletin (R. G. Dan & Co.) reports that the effects of the wide spread storm have not yet abated, particularly with regard to remittances, which are decidedly poor.
