## SACRED MUSIC

Last Wednesday at St. Mary's Church Rev. Father Drummond lectured on Sacred Music. He first spoke of the origins of music in Egyptians and Assyrians had many kinds of musical instruments that the Hebrews also, as appears from the Bible had a great struments and instruments of perfusion, but that we could of per correct idea of what their music was because they had no proper system of musical notation.
Even the Greeks who were the most aesthetic people that ever
lived had probably no idea of hare tony. Their music was merely the: servant of poetry; with them music and dancing served only to orig out the rythm of poetry, and the three together formed but one art. They too had no systenn of musical notation and corr. sequently all effort to reconstruct their music from ancient dock-
At the beginning of Christianity tans could be heard swelling upwards from the catacombs of Rome, and we have reason 10 suppose that the music of the Church was then largely borrowed from the Hebrews, who formed the bulk of the infant Church. When the Christians emerged from the catacombs the first to or-
ganize and regulate the ecclesiasganize and regulate the ecclesias-
tical chant was St. Andrew, Bishop of Milan. To this Ambrosian chant St. Augustine "The hymns and songs, 0 my God, and hymns and songs, 0 my God, and stirred and penetrated my being. stirred and penetrated my being.
The voices streamed upon my ears and caused truth to flow into my heart; from whose fount the feellings came welling up. I ended at last in a flood of tears." However from St. Gregory the Great, Pope
