JANUARY SESSION.

FIRST DAY.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

WELLAND, Tuesday, Jan. 26th, 1892.

Leave granted and bill read a first, second and third time, and passed, entitled, "A By-law to fix Salaries."

Moved by Mr. Cruikshank, seconded by Mr. Sidey,

That leave be given to introduce a bill to appoint a Constable to perform a special duty on behalf of this County, for the purpose of suppression of vagrancy within and in the vicinity of Welland.

Leave granted and bill read a first time in blank.

Moved by Mr. Sidey, seconded by Mr. Hodges,

That Mr. A. D. White's name be inserted in the by-law as Constable for the suppression of vagrancy in the Town of Welland.

The blank in the bill was accordingly filled in with the name A. D. White.

The bill was then read a second and third time, as required by law, and passed with title as in the bill.

APPENDIX A.

BY-LAWS.

BY LAW NO. 585.

MEMORIALS.

RE MAINTENANCE OF BRIDGES.

To the Honorable The Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario :—

The Memorial of the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the County of Welland,

HUMBLY SHEWETH :—

That Sec. 30, Chap. 50, Ontario Statutes, 1890, relating to the construction and maintenance of bridges, 100 feet in length or more, is, in the opinion of your Memorialists, unjust in its provisions and enactments, and framed in such a manner as to result in much litigation, unnecessary expense and embittered feeling throughout the Province.

That your Memorialists are forced to the conclusion that the Act in question could not have received that careful thought and searching attention ordinarily given to such subjects by your honorable body.

Your Memorialists submit :—

That no Act should be placed on the statute books of the Province which fails to do strict justice to County, Township, Town and Village Municipalities alike.

That bridges of 100 feet in length or more are by no means the only extraordinary expenditure with which municipalities have to contend, and an attempt to assist municipalities burdened in this

respect can scarcely fail to do grievous injustice to municipalities equally, or more seriously, burdened in other directions.

That while in new and unsettled portions of the Province some provision of this character might be necessary, nothing can be more certain than that in old and long settled districts, where the conditions impliedly complained of have always existed, and where purchases of property from the earliest date of settlement have been made with the full knowledge of such conditions, such provisions and enactments as are covered by this section can only work injustice.

Your Memorialists therefore pray that Sec. 30, Chap. 50, Ontario Statutes, 1890, be repealed.

And your Memorialists, as in duty bound, will ever pray.

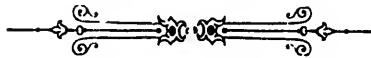

We have also considered the account of Dr. J. O. Emmett for examining persons transferred from the House of Industry to the Provincial Asylum, and we find that the Jail Surgeon is paid \$4 for examining each person sent from the jail, under authority of Chap. 245, R. S. O., 1887, section 11, sub-section 2. Dr. Smith has been paid the same amount for examining persons in the House of Industry; we therefore recommend that the said account be paid.

In December one Wm. Routledge, an inmate of the House of Industry, preferred certain verbal charges against the Keeper, but on investigation we were satisfied that they could not be sustained. He demanded to be heard before the Council, which we cannot recommend. He has since been insubordinate and insolent in his demeanor, and has been committed to the jail by the Police Magistrate of this town upon charges laid against him by the Keeper.

We again beg leave to recommend that a proper detached hospital be built and an addition be made to the barn suitable to the requirements of the farm.

I again beg leave to call the attention of the Council to the unsatisfactory condition of the hospital, and also to the insufficiency of the barn. The importance of having a better hospital building as soon as possible will be obvious to everybody. As to the barn, I may mention that at the December session we were obliged to store five loads of cornstalks in Mr. Bald's barn, and had also 6 pits of roots in the field, containing 1000 bushels, having no room for them in the cellar, and, besides, a number of farm implements standing outside.

The cost of obtaining water has been very considerable every year, and the loss of time and labor in drawing water is worth considering.

It is very desirable in my opinion that fuller and more definite information should be obtained respecting the antecedents, &c., of

persons committed to the House of Industry, and as this can very seldom be procured from the persons themselves, I beg leave to recommend that forms similar to the draft annexed hereto be printed and distributed among the Reeves of Municipalities, and that they be desired to fill up the same and send to the Keeper with the commitment of each person.
