WAR NEWS CONDENSED. Perhaps the most interesting piece of news since the war began, excepting the account of Dewey's victory at Manila, was the special despatch from Key West pub-Hshed in yesterday morning's World, telling of a fire in the coal bunkers of the priliser St. Paul at Key West, supposed to have been caused by spontaneous combustion, which was suppressed after twelve hours' hard fighting by 200 men. A Washingpatch, published in some of the evening papers, refers to the fire as if it were still burning, and it may possibly have broken out again, but this is unlikely. The noteworthy thing about it is that the St. Paul is commanded by Capt. Sigsbee, who was commander of the ill-fated Maine when it blew up. If this fire had not been disgovered, it would have heated the walls of the magazine and blown the ship to pieces. What a sensation it would have made throughout the world! Schley's flying iron is officially reported to have reached Key West, and another report says that something big is going on there, but the press censors won't allow the corres condents to tell about it. This may mean that the army of invasion is getting ready to start for Cuba. It was announced the other day that the American Government had decided to put an end to Blanco's communications with the outside world by rutting the cables at Santiago de Cuba, and that Sampson's fleet would do the work. A Havana despatch to Madrid stated that Santiago de Cuba had been bombarded by Americans, but that little damage was done; at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, ac cording to a despatch from Kingston, Jamaica, a number of warships were reported off the east-end of Jamaica, going toward Santiago de Cuba at a tremendous speed; at midnight a despatch from Madrid said: "The Spanish fleet has reached Santiago de Ouba without accident." But another Madrid despatch says that Cervera's fleet has reached Havana. One of these despatches must be inaccurate, or else there are two Spanish fleets in West Indian waters. Meanwhile the French steamship Ferdinand de Lesseps is said to have left Colon on the Isthmus of Panama with a big cargo of arms and ammunition for a Spanish fleet reported to be off the coast of Costa Rica. A Key West special says that the cruisers Marblehead and Nashville had a running fight with a Spanish warshipof Cape San Atonio, on the west side of Cuba. Halifax was greatly excited yesterday afternoon by a report that nine warships had been seen off Cape la Have, west of Halifax. That Tabacce Pool.

The St. Louis Republic of yesterday says:
"Indications point to an early consummation of the deal for the organization of the gegantic Continental Tobacco Company. It is understood that the capital stock of the new corporation wil be fixed at \$50,000,000 and that it will take in all of the big plug tobacco factories in the United States.
"In all probability St. Louis will be the headquarters of the new company, as it has been pretty definitely settled that Harrison I. Drummond, president of the Drummond Tobacco Company of this city, will be president of the Continental. Mr. Drummond, it is said, is now in New York negotiating the terms of the transfer of several capital company. No figures can be obtained. The Drummond factories may be turned over to the Continental at a fixed price, which, it is expected, will be the basis of computing the value of the other plants to be taken into the company."
