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COUNCIL WILL DISCUSS COLD STORAGE SYSTEM

At Meeting on Monday—Interesting
Debate Expected—Only One
Controller Favors It.

A very knotty problem which the civic government has to handle just at present is that of the cold storage system for St. Lawrence Market. The subject has been handed around from pillar to post for more than a year, yet the question crops up now and again in committee and in Council, a long discussion takes place, with the inevitable result that it is referred back for further consideration or more information. So often has this happened that it has become a matter of course, and so much conflicting information has been received, that when the Board of Control met last night, the question again yesterday attacked rather gently with it.

Of late the Toronto Cold Storage Co. of Church street has been very urgent in its efforts to have its plant approved, and it is actually losing money every day.

"The only reason," say the members of the Board, "that we oppose the city's entrance into the cold storage business is that if a private industry cannot make a profit how can a business run by the Board of Control do so?"

Pro and Con.
At the Board of Control yesterday, F. E. Hodgins, K.C., appeared on behalf of the Toronto company and again placed his arguments before the members. Mr. Sheppard was there, too, to defend the position he took in forwarding a report to the Property Committee some time ago. He stated that the firm supplied to him by the company was the Manning plant. Mr. Sheppard stated that the Manning plant would have a capacity of 100,000 bushels.

"Are your figures based on those of the bookkeeper, or are they an estimate of the space?" asked Mr. Hodgins. "If we had some representations from the tenants of the market," he continued, "as we have had from other tenants, we might have something to go upon and some reliance, but here we have nothing but the word of the man who has the plant for sale."

Mr. Hodgins said here that nobody wanted the plant. The Manning plant had three-fourths of the trade in the city, and this could not be obtained by the city's plant. He claimed the Manning plant only cost \$600,000 a year, but to do this they had only a very moderate temperature compared with what the city would have to keep up. They had no rooms where the temperature was below zero—expressly stated that the Manning plant had rooms where the temperature is away below zero, and I know."

City Has Guarantee.
Controller Oliver thought this was no argument, for the tender had guaranteed to only use 600 tons of coal and had also guaranteed a sufficient temperature.

Controller Richardson was of the opinion that the market should have cold storage, but he did not want the city to go into a business of this kind. The Mayor agreed with him, as he didn't want to go into a business that would not pay.

One Controller for It.
Controller Loudon is the only supporter of the plant on the board. He said the Mayor had been making enquiries on his own hook and a report he had received was to the effect that the space in the market was not at all sufficient for the purpose of a cold storage plant. The matter was finally sent on to Council, with the recommendation that the city do not go into the business at present.

ORDERED TO PRODUCE 'CAP'
Col. Matheson's Resolution Passes
Legislature With the Recital
Cut Out.

Session Devoted Principally to Advancing Bills of More or Less Importance.

Yesterday was a decidedly Sullivan-esque day in the legislature. The "Cap" was the feature. As soon as Colonel Matheson got the floor he read a resolution couched in the following terms: That, inasmuch as it appears by the second report of the committee on Public Accounts that Capt. John Sullivan of St. Catharines was summoned (notice to appear before the said committee, and that he neglected or refused to appear, that the House do order that the said Capt. John Sullivan be summoned before the said committee on Tuesday, the second day of June next, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon for examination respecting the Shannon limit in Ruthwell and the connection therewith, and that this order be served on John Sullivan.

Mr. Gibson balked.

The Attorney-General read at the recital. "We don't know that those are the facts," he said by way of excuse. "We know that he hasn't been formally summoned, but we know that he knows that his presence is required here, and we believe that he is evading service, but we don't know that." The Attorney-General said the resolution would be just as effective if it showed the recital.

Mr. Whitney said the House did not know what the committee has done to bring the captain before the committee, but they knew what it alleges it has done.

Col. Matheson observed that the report of the committee sets out that Sullivan was notified.

"We'd better abandon the whole business," was Mr. Whitney's remark. "We can't begin a resolution with the word 'inasmuch' we'd better change the rules of the House. The House is asked to bring Capt. Sullivan before the committee."

Mr. Matheson said he made the suggestion with a view to the propriety and regularity of the motion. There was no evidence that Capt. Sullivan was served with a summons to appear. Mr. Ross suggested that the resolution be changed to read "that the House do order that the said Capt. Sullivan be summoned before the committee, etc."

Mr. Whitney: That's the same thing. Colonel Matheson then submitted the resolution in the amended form. It reads:

That in accordance with the second report of the committee on Public Accounts to this House the House do order Capt. John Sullivan, etc.

The resolution carried without further discussion.

Shelving of Frontenac.
In reply to Mr. Gallagher, the Attorney-General said the department had not been authorized to act as an agent for the purchase of Frontenac Island, an acute situation having arisen over the purchase of stationery by the sheriff. The department sent a copy of the resolution to the sheriff, and asked for an explanation, from which it seems that the case was not one calling for action on the part of the department.

DIED FOR HIS BROTHER.
Story of Singular Tragedy Enacted
New Odessa, Russia.

Berlin, May 28.—News of a singular tragedy near Odessa, Russia, has reached here. Stefan Novosyarski, the owner of a large estate, met and loved a Viennese variety singer, calling herself Baroness Von Naxos, and induced her to go to his estate. His brother Alexis, 14 years old, strongly disapproved of this, and repeatedly threatened to compel the Baroness to leave the estate.

One night Stefan went to Odessa, and the next morning a servant noticed that the door of the Baroness's room was still locked. Rapping at the door was not answered, so the police were summoned. It was opened forcibly, and the corpse of the Baroness was found on her bed. She had been strangled, and on her nose were the marks of teeth. From a leather strap attached to a hook in the wall hung the body of Alexis, and on a table was the following note:

"The woman wanted me to share my brother's sin. May God pardon me for what I have done. Thus she strangled my brother. I have done my duty. I beg him to erect a cross over my grave. CONVOCATION AT TRINITY.

Granting Class the Best Ever Sent Out of the College.

There was a very bright array of summer gowns and scarlet hoods at the annual convocation of Trinity University yesterday afternoon. The hall was well filled with friends of the students, chiefly ladies, while the gallery was crowded by the undergraduates who distributed their favors without discrimination, the girl graduates, however, coming in for tremendous applause.

Provost Macklem, the acting chancellor, occupied the chair, and on the platform were nearly all the members of the faculty and many of the Church of England clergy of the city.

After prayers read by Dean Rigby, Dr. Geikie presented the graduates in



medicine to the provost, who conferred the degree of M.D.C.M., and Registrar Jones handed the parchments to the fifty-three students.

Dean Geikie then introduced Dr. E. C. Beer, who had secured 85 per cent. of the marks obtainable in his examinations, and the provost presented him with the gold medal. Dr. E. C. Beer was then called on to receive the second of the chief honors, and was highly congratulated by the provost.

Certificates of honor were then presented to the seven first students in the final examinations by Dr. Temple, two final silver medals by Dr. Powell, and five primary certificates of honor presented by Dr. Clark.

Provost Macklem then spoke briefly and announced that the amalgamation of Trinity University and Trinity Medical College had been completed. He called on Dr. Clark, who congratulated the college on the good report presented. Short speeches were also made by Drs. Gingham, Grassett, Sheard and MacLaren, who spoke very highly of the graduating class, saying it was the best ever sent out of the college.

The provost pronounced the benediction, and the gathering dispersed about 6 o'clock.

COW BLOWN THRU FENCE
ONE OF STORM'S FREAKS

Later Reports Indicate Great Damage in Section of Perth County.

Stratford, May 28.—(Special.)—Storm seems to be following storm in Perth County. Following the Mornington cyclone of Tuesday, a tremendous wind storm visited this city and vicinity late yesterday afternoon. Large limbs of trees were torn off and hurled long distances. Rain fell in torrents and pedestrians were obliged to seek shelter, their umbrellas being torn from their hands. A large maple tree at the rear of William Richardson's residence, on Ontario-street, was split down the centre by lightning. It stood in the front yard and knocked down the chimney. A lad was sitting near the tree but was unharmed.

Damage by Tuesday's storm.
But the storm of Wednesday pales before the cyclone of Tuesday, the wide range of which is now being realized. At Kinkora, in the fine Roman Catholic Church was badly damaged. A chimney was torn off and windows broken.

The orchards of L. Crowley and others were completely destroyed. The trees, which promised an abundant yield, were torn up by the roots and the scene is one of desolation.

Patrick Stock, the five-year-old son of John Stock, ran to the barn for shelter. Just as he reached the door a terrific blast swept thru the building, carrying a large farming mill some 15 feet away. The lad was struck on the forehead and the mill pinned him to the ground. It was some time before assistance arrived and he was released. The wound in his head required several stitches and he is badly shaken up.

Mitchell Suffered Greatly.
Reports indicate that the storm was particularly violent between Mitchell and the Village of Dublin. South of Dublin, at Sadler's brickyard, a lot of damage was done, and Councillor William White's farm, in Hilbert, east of that town, looks as if it had been hit through bush and field. Joshua Vivian had four acres of bush. Today they are scarcely a tree left. At James Parsh's, just inside Mitchell, a large pig pen was blown away in pieces. At Mitchell's next farm east, his large barn was unroofed, and George Larkworthy's barn, near his slaughter house, had the roof taken off, and Mr. Larkworthy's cow was picked up bodily by the wind and blown thru a board fence and was pretty badly bruised.

Mr. Tubb, Mr. Watson, Mr. Elliott and Mr. Williams had the roof of their barns. John Greenwood's orchard was almost totally destroyed, and William Hoeney's and William Foster's windmill also came to the ground. There were also hundreds of cows on the ground, and in the wind's way, a number of cattle killed and considerable other damage done.

As Thomas Coppin and son were driving home today, the wind upset their buggy, but neither was hurt.

Coastal Weather Escape.
Further reports from Mornington Township indicate that the storm there was more disastrous than at any other supposed. The schoolhouse on Con. 11 struck by the tornado was a brick structure. Not a brick remains upon another. How Caretaker Hastings and his daughter, Pearl, escaped death is a mystery. The basement with the exception of the place where they were, was simply jammed with debris. The bell on the school was carried out into the field. A cultivator was carried about 100 yards, and a milk can over eighty rods.

Stories hardly believable are vouched for by responsible parties. The feathers were blown off hens and they stumbled about in the wind in ridiculous half nakedness.

Levin Barr Injured.
Levi Watson's barn was blown to atoms, and ten pigs and a horse killed. Mr. Watson and Johnston Barr were in the barn when the storm came. They threw themselves forward and clung to some logs. The flying timbers battered them so unmercifully that Mr. Barr is confined to the house.

John Gamble's barn was unroofed, and his woodshed torn away. Mrs. Gamble was struck in the back by a flying stick, and her spine is badly injured.

John Martin of Con. 13 had his barn unroofed. Monuments in the graveyard were blown down.

In Maryboro, Samuel Riddell had the roof blown off his barn, while his neighbor, John Snelling, had his brick house and bank barn completely destroyed. A bee will be held Thursday and Friday to help clean up the debris.

B.S.S.A. Annual Meeting.
The annual meeting of the Toronto Baptist Sunday School Association was held in Jarvis-street church last night, and a large attendance resulted. The meeting took the shape of a reception to Rec. Dr. Bates, field secretary of the association. Dr. Bates in his address outlined the work of his department for the year. He hoped to give better service than ever before. He expected the association would flourish, as everything pointed to a most successful year. The membership of schools was increasing throughout the city and province. The establishment and strengthening of mission schools would be an especial object of attention, and he was fully confident that good results would attend the campaign. He would also strive toward obtaining more concerted action on the part of the various churches, and advised this method rather than that of individual work on the part of members and pastors.

The election of officers resulted in the choosing of A. T. Gregory as president, W. C. Smith and Mr. Toose as vice-presidents. E. E. White, secretary, read an interesting statistical report. Refreshments were served by the ladies of the church, and an enjoyable hour was spent after the meeting had closed.

May Have Been Shot.
Peterboro, May 28.—The belief is growing here that Mr. Sanderson was shot by a stray bullet while in his canoe and fell overboard.

Will Honor Their Dead.
The veterans of '96 will gather at Riverside Park on Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock and decorate with flowers the graves of their comrades who fell at Ridgeway on June 2, 1867. The graves are in the Necropolis and in St. James' Cemetery.

at a later stage, to limit the company's powers in this respect.

When Clause 13, describing the route of the road, was taken under consideration, Mr. Pringle of Cornwall said it was a very important clause, and he asked that it be printed in its amended form. This point was upheld by several others, and the clause was allowed to stand.

Extension to Moncton.
To Clause 12 an amendment was moved by Edington McCarthy, embodying the new feature of the extension from Quebec to Moncton, and some other changes, described as follows:

"From a point at or near the City of Moncton, in the Province of New Brunswick, thence by the most direct route to a point at or near the City of Winnipeg, thence in a northerly and westerly direction, to a point at or near the City of Regina, thence in a northerly and westerly direction, passing through the north of Lake Nepean, in the Province of Ontario, to a point at or near the City of Toronto, thence in a westerly and northerly direction, passing through or near Battleford, Edgemoor, and Dunsburg, or by such other more feasible route as is hereafter indicated, following in its general direction that herein indicated, and by way of either the Peace River, Pass or the Pine River Pass, or such other pass in the Rocky Mountains as is found most convenient and practicable, to Port Simpson, Bute Inlet, or such other port on the Pacific Coast between the said points as is considered most expedient, and adapted for the purposes of the company. And also a branch line from the main line between a point at or near either North Bay or Nipissing Junction, and branch lines from points on the main line to Port Arthur, Port William, Brandon, Regina, Prince Albert and Calgary, respectively; and also a branch line from some point in British Columbia to Dawson, in the Yukon Territory, and the company may for the purpose of constructing its main line of railway, divide it into five sections, to be known as 'Eastern Section' to extend from the eastern terminus to a point at or near the City of Quebec, in the Province of Quebec, thence to a point at or near the City of Montreal, in the Province of Quebec, and thence to a point at or near the City of Quebec, in the Province of Quebec, and Ontario."

Limit Bonding Powers.
Clause 15 says that the company may issue bonds to the amount of \$30,000,000, on the Quebec Section, \$20,000,000 on the Woodland Section, \$20,000,000 on the Prairie Section, and \$50,000,000 on the Mountain Section. Dr. Sprague stated that these bonding powers were excessive.

Hon. A. G. Blair said that, if the government wished to limit the bonding powers would be limited, and on this understanding, the clause was allowed to pass.

In Clause 24 the company asked power to accept assistance in land or money, and to issue land grant bonds to the extent of two dollars an acre upon any aid granted to the undertaking.

Some of the members of the Gore-street Methodist Church are circulating a petition asking the Stationing Committee to declare the pulpits of the church to be vacant, and the minister engaged in reflection on the present pastor, Rev. T. J. Atkins, who threatens a libel suit.

Objection was taken to the clause giving the company power to develop water-power and deal in electricity. The clause will be re-drafted.

Provisions enabling the company to undertake irrigation, enter on railways, etc., for the erection of poles, and engage in mining, lumbering, iron and steel manufacturing, were struck out.

HIS GOLDEN JUBILEE.
Rev. Prof. MacLaren to Celebrate 50th Anniversary of His Ordination.

The fiftieth anniversary of the ordination of the Rev. William MacLaren, D.D., Professor of Systematic Theology at Knox Church, will be celebrated by a social gathering in the Bloor-street Presbyterian Church this evening.

Dr. MacLaren was born in Carleton County in 1828, and is of Scottish descent. He was educated at the Ontario Grammar School, and at Knox College, in 1853, he was called to the Presbyterian Church at Amherstburg.

Special services will be held on Sunday in the Bloor-street Church in commemoration of the event.

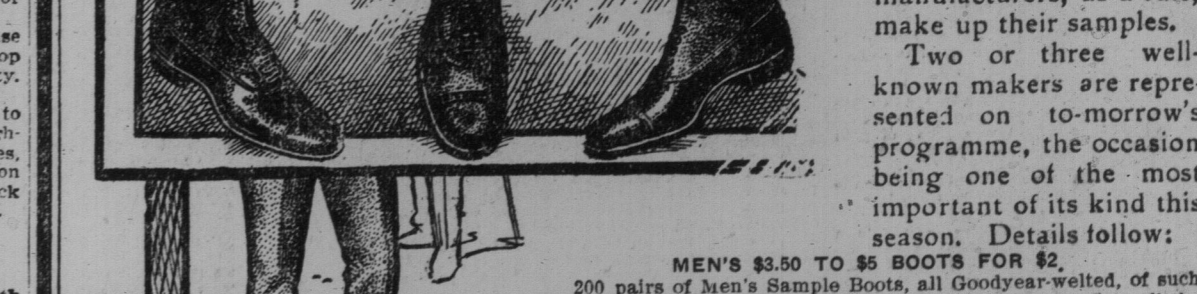
