nivville Company. The officials examined were David Reeves, president of the Phoenix Iron Company and the Phoenix Bridge Company: John Sterling Deans, chief engineer; Peter Szalpka, designing engineer; Frank P. Norris, general manager, and Ellsworth L. Edwards, inspector of the Quebec Bridge Company at Phoenixville. In effect, their testimony was unanimous that the fault of the bridge could be directly traced to changes in the original plan made by Mr. Cooper, who, a short time changed the length of the principa span from 1600 to 1800 feet without making adequate changes in the supports to the main span to compensate

exceeded."

Mr. Beck added that he was convinced that the terms and conditions of the contract with the Ontario Power Company, as finally settled, would be more advantageous to the municipalities than the terms embodied in the tender on which the offer was accepted. Since the estimates were made the situation has become more favorable, and the commission has been able to secure a reduction in the cost of power of about 15 per cent. Moreover, copper has gone down about cost of power of about 15 per cent. Moreover, copper has gone down about 40 per cent, and this would affect a saving of probably half a million dollars in the cost of the transmission lines. The estimates of the commission were based on the minimum amount of power, and the final cost will depend on the number of municipalities that join and the amount of power they take.





HEAVY CANAL TRAFFIC.

ico, Welland and St. Lawrence Handle Record Tonnage.

OTTAWA, Nov. 20 .- Reports to the department of railways and canals show that the traffic on the Canadian canals during the past season was by far the heaviest on record. Definite figures will not be available until after the close of navigation, but the general reports so far received tell of great expansion of business this year on all the canals. 

Wednesday Evening, Nov. 20. The October statement of the Canadian chartered banks, which was given out to-day, is corroborative evidence of what has been going on in the stock markets. Call loans in Canada show a decrease of over a million dollars for the month, and a shrinkage of \$10,000,000 in a year. There was also a decrease of upwards of \$15,000,000 in call and short loans outside of Canada. At Toronto to-day there was another call from the banks on stock collateral, and to this was ascribed part of the selling of the Mackays and Twin City. It is rumored that all loans on Canadian General Electric stock are to be called, but notice to this effect has not reached some of the brokers, and the rumor is not given entire credence. There was another outbreak of liquidation in Canadian securities to-day, which had a discouraging effect upon the market, and caused a depressed feeling at the close. Herbert H. Ball.
