THE YOUNG PEOPLE'S ASSOCIATION meets on alternate Tuesday evenings at eight, and the young men meet for devotional exercises on Sabbath morning at a quarter-past ten. Young men are cordially invited to attend.

THE HOPEFUL GLEANERS' MISSION BAND meets in Church Parlour on the second Wednesday of each month, at four o'clock.

MISSIONARY COLLECTORS visit their districts after the first Sabbath of each month, leave a copy of the *Presbyterian Record* with every family of the congregation, and are expected to pay the sums received to the Treasurer on the Wednesday evening following.

THE MISSION COMMITTEE meets at the close of the Frayer Meeting on the first Wednesday after the Communion.



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DEAR BRETHREN,—Another year of our congregational

life is completed and its record is with God.

It becomes us unitedly to give thanks for the manifold blessings received during the year. These we cannot fully recount. The word of God has been faithfully preached among us, and has, we cannot doubt, continued to bring forth fruit. God's children have been edified, and some, we trust, have been led to enter upon the Christian life. The communion seasons have been times of refreshing from the Lord. We cannot sufficiently express our gratitude that during another year of vacancy the Sabbath attendance has not fallen off, the prayer meeting has hardly declined in numbers, and all the other agencies of the congregation have continued in healthful operation. And here it is proper to record our sense of the value of the ministrations of the Rev. Dr. James, whose services were secured from November till the time when we hope to be settled. Both in the pulpit and in visitation these services have proved acceptable and edifying.

We are especially pleased to find that our contributions towards the several Funds of the Church are somewhat in advance of any previous year, evidence, we trust, being thus furnished that the congregation are actuated by intelligent appreciation of duty, and by love to Him who permits us to be fellow-workers with Him in the extension of His kingdom. May the time not be distant when every member of the Church of Christ will regard it as the highest privilege and honour to aid, according

to ability, in the evangelization of the world!

In the month of September a very hearty and unanimous call was addressed by the congregation to the Rev. S. H. Kellogg, D.D., Professor of Systematic Theology in the Western Seminary, Alleghany, U. S., and, to our great thankfulness and joy, was accepted by him.

His obligations to the Seminary, however, made it impossible for Dr. Kellogg to be inducted into the pastorate of this congregation till the beginning of April—a period which is now at hand. We are happy to learn that an affection of his eyes, which has made cessation from work necessary, is passing away, and that in the good providence of God, we may expect to see among us at the time contemplated the pastor whom we have chosen. May his coming be "in the fulness of the blessing of the Gospel of Christ." Let much prayer ascend that the ministry soon, we hope, to be entered upon may be abundantly fruitful, and may be full of comfort both to pastor and people.

By the great goodness and forbearance of God experienced during our whole history as a congregation we should count ourselves pledged to more complete consecration to His service, and should strive not to decline but in every way to advance in the divine life and in work for the Lord. Very especially should the great cause of Missions, in every branch of it, become increasingly dear to us, so that neither prayer nor offerings

should be restrained.

The members of the congregation will peruse with much pleasure the several missionary reports, and will not fail to note that a most important addition to the missionary givings of the year comes from the Sabbath School and Mission Band. May the seed sown amongst the young by faithful teachers, as by parents, spring up

and bear fruit in many a sanctified life.

Death has again paid visits to several families; but those whose names we must thus erase from our membership have, we trust, gone to be with Christ, which is far better. In the case of Mr. Wm. Agnew, an aged and faithful member of this congregation, who, but a few weeks ago, died on the way to his home from Sabbath evening service, the warning to be ever ready is most impressively renewed to us all: "Ye know not the day nor the hour."

### ABSTRACT OF MINUTES OF CONGREGA-TIONAL MEETING.

Toronto, 18th January, 1886.

The thirty-second annual meeting of the congregation was held this evening, according to announcement from the pulpit on the two preceding Sabbaths.

The meeting was preceded by a social gathering of the congregation, tea being served from half-past six to halfpast eight o'clock.

The business meeting was opened with devotional

exercises, conducted by Rev. Dr. Caven.

On motion of Mr. McDonald, Mr. R. K. Burgess was called to the chair, and Mr. Long appointed Secretary. On motion of Mr. H. W. Darling, the minutes of last

annual meeting were taken as read, and confirmed.

The Secretary then read the Managers' report for 1885, and the Treasurer, Mr. Reid, presented his financial statement.

It was then moved by Mr. Kirkland, seconded by Mr. Wm. Gordon, "That the report and Treasurer's statement be received and adopted, and that the thanks of the congregation are due and are hereby tendered to the Managers, and especially to the Treasurer, for the manner in which they have discharged their duties." Carried.

Moved by Dr. Bryce, seconded by Mr. Christie, and carried, "That thanks are due and are hereby tendered to Miss Douglas and the members of the choir for their valuable assistance rendered throughout the year.

Moved by Mr. Kerr, seconded by Mr. McDonald, and carried, "That the thanks of the congregation are due and are hereby tendered to Mr. Douglas, the leader of the choir, and as some token of their appreciation of his

to pay him the sum of three hundred dollars."

Moved by Mr. Woodbridge, seconded by Mr. Kilgour, "That the retiring Managers shall not be eligible for re-election for the following year." Considerable discussion took place on this motion, the majority of the speakers opposing it. Moved in amendment by Mr. John Brown, seconded by Mr. John Young, "That it is undesirable and inexpedient to alter the Constitution in regard to the manner of electing the Managers for the congregation, and that the mode of electing Managers be the same as heretofore, and that all male members be eligible for election." On being put to vote, the amendment was carried and the original motion declared lost.

Moved by Mr. Carrie, seconded by Mr. Lowden, "That the Rev. Dr. Caven, Messrs. Kerr and Long be a committee to prepare and print the annual reports of the

church." Carried.

Nominations for Managers were then received, the retiring Managers being Messrs. Carrie, Christie, Nairn, McIntosh, Woodbridge and Long. The Chairman called upon Messrs. Gray, Bruce, Robinson and Kilgour to act as scrutineers, and the vote having been taken, the following were declared elected:-Messrs. Long, Carrie, Christie, Nairn, McIntosh and Dr. McPhedran.

Moved by Mr. Robinson, seconded by Mr. Woodbridge, and carried, "That Messrs. H. W. Nelson and John Paton be appointed Auditors for the ensuing year."

The Secretary read the report of the Treasurer of the Organ Committee, which showed that the organ, costing \$3,300, had been entirely paid for, with the exception of a small balance due the Treasurer, which was covered by unpaid subscriptions.

Mr. H. W. Darling made a few remarks explanatory of the clause in the Managers' report, referring to the desired increase in the offerings of the congregation for

church purposes.

On motion of Mr. Kirkland, thanks were tendered to the ladies for their exertions in connection with the social.

After the usual vote of thanks to the Chairman, the meeting was brought to a close.

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#### REVENUE.

Contributions for the Support of Ordinances are made in three ways: (1) Weekly Offerings, in envelopes placed on the collection plate each Sabbath; (2) Quarterly Subscriptions; (3) Contributions placed on the collection plate. The sittings are all free, no pew rents being charged to any one. The first method has been adopted by the greater part of the congregation, and the Managers greatly prefer that it should be adopted by all.

Envelopes are given at the beginning of each quarter, and on the allocation of sittings; and any one not now receiving envelopes, and desiring to contribute in this way, is requested to give his or her name to any of the Managers, who will attend to the matter. Those occupying sittings are expected to contribute according to their means.





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### MANAGERS' REPORT, 1885.

The year that has just closed, which has been trying in so many respects to the prosperity and usefulness of the congregation, from the long-continued vacancy, has yet been attended with so much that points to the everwatchful care of the Great Head of the Church, that the Managers feel they and the congregation have just cause for deep gratitude, all the more that there is now the immediate prospect of a resumption, by one qualified in all important respects, of the pastoral oversight, so necessary to the edification, the growth and the prosperity of the congregation.

It would have been strange had there not been on the hould be

part of those who have taken a very deep interest in the welfare of the congregation for many years, great anxiety as to the effect of a long vacancy and the contingencies arising out of the selection of a new pastor. In so far as these anxieties found expression in earnest prayer to God, they were not useless, and it must be said to His praise that they have been graciously answered. Nothing could exceed the loyalty of the congregation generally to the Church; and the manner in which the members have sustained and encouraged one another and the office-bearers in their efforts to tide over the difficulties of the vacancy, and secure the services of a stated pastor, and the harmony that has characterized their proceedings in this work throughout, are only in keeping with the traditions of the congregation, and are the proper preludes to future fruitful effort. As a matter of record, it may be stated that the coming of the Rev. Dr. Kellogg amongst us in the ordinary routine of pulpit supply, the

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pleasure and profit derived by those who were fortunate enough to enjoy his ministrations on the first two Sabbaths when he preached, the spontaneous unanimity with which the congregation generally settled upon him as the one minister whom they would be pleased with, the visit of the special commissioners to Dr. Kellogg at his home, the cordiality of their reception, and the subsequent acceptance by Dr. Kellogg of the hearty and unanimous call extended to him, all occurred undoubtedly under the direct leading and sanction of the Master Himself. We are now looking forward with much interest and hopefulness to Dr. Kellogg's induction early in April. He will come to a people prepared to love and appreciate him, to encourage and aid him in the important work he has undertaken; and the earnest prayer of this people is that his ministrations amongst us will be helpful to every member and advantageous to the Church

at large. Touching the finances of the congregation, a comparative statement of the receipts and expenditures for the past three years is appended, from which it will be seen that the ordinary revenue for the year was somewhat less than in 1884. Several unusual items of expenditure, such as insurance for three years, painting and repairs to the Church edifice, repairs to the furnaces, erecting a hydraulic engine for the organ, etc., have absorbed over \$900 of the revenue which might otherwise have been applied to the extinction of Church debt. All outstanding accounts have been paid, and a balance of \$89.37 is carried forward to the current year. Only \$100 has been paid on account of the Building Fund, and the debt still remains at \$17,000, bearing interest at 6 per cent. There are upon the books subscriptions to a very considerable amount on this account, which should now either be collected or cancelled. If the obligations which the congregation have assumed in connection with Dr. Kellogg's pastorate are to be met under the excellent system which in the past has worked so satisfactorily, in placing in the hands of the Treasurer the necessary funds to meet the expenditure without exacting payment or pew rents incumber their offer contribut agers be performa

The M McIntosl All of pew rents or solicitations of almost any kind, it will be incumbent upon the members to double, or nearly double, their offerings of the past year, and to see that they are contributed with unfailing regularity. This, the Managers believe, has only to be pointed out to secure its performance.

The Managers retiring by rotation are Messrs. Nairn, McIntosh, Carrie, Christie, Woodbridge and Long.

The years speed silently but swiftly by—the closing hours of this present year have come, and we are on the verge of a new year.

We recount with devout gratitude to God all His mercies to us in the past, and during these past months

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they have neither been few nor small. Our opportunities for doing as well as getting good have come to us daily, and we cannot say the Lord has been unmindful of us. His presence has been felt by us in the enjoyment of His Word and Spirit, and we trust His Kingdom has in some measure been advanced in us and by us. And, yet, who is there amongst us who has not to confess, with deep humility and self-abasement, the much sin and imperfection that has mingled with and marred all our work and worship before God? Our unbelief and coldness of heart have weakened us in our ways, and we have not accomplished for the Lord what we might have done. There has not been nor is there in our hearts the conscious growth of personal holiness and entirety of consecration to God there should be. Were our walk more close and constant with Him we would be able to speak more comfortingly and rejoice more hopefully in the Lord; and to this end let us in the future more than in the past live nearer to, and more for, God, losing sight of self and seeing only the Saviour, and seeking in all things to please Him.

If we cannot report any increase on the numbers in attendance on the Sabbath School over 1884, it is so far satisfactory we have not decreased. In the absence still of a stated pastorate it was hardly to be expected we could add to our numbers. We trust, however, that in the coming year, with the settlement of Dr. Kellogg as our pastor, there may be before the year closes a very considerable addition made to the numbers already on the rolls of the School.

We find the number of scholars' names on the roll-

book to be as follows:

The Infant Class, which is still taught by Miss Caven and Miss Inglis, has a roll of 34 boys and 29 girls—total 63. The Intermediate Classes, taught by 12 female and 14 male teachers, have on their rolls 94 boys and 87 girls—total 181. The Advanced or Bible Class, taught by Mr. Kirkland, has on its roll 25 male and 45 female—total 70. This gives a total on the roll of the school of 314, the same number exactly as reported last year.

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The number of teachers' names on the rolls is 15 male and 15 female—three less than reported last year.

During the past year not a few changes have occurred in connection with teachers and scholars. Besides the changes incident to removal to other parts of the city or country, sickness has prevailed to some extent, and the

Angel of Death has come into our midst.

Mr. David Picken, who had for many years been an exceptionally faithful and devoted teacher with us, and who was for a considerable period Deputy-Superintendent of the school, but who, under the Divine will, had been laid aside from Christian work through sickness for nearly four years, died on the 16th of May last. His end was peace. In the days of health, as in the days of sickness, he had been ripening for a glorious immortality. And we cannot doubt but that he is one of those who through faith and patience are now inheriting the promises. May we seek to follow him in so far as he followed Christ, that we too, when the Master shall come, may be found ready, "the loins girt and the lamp burning," and enter in to be for ever with the Lord.

Death also has taken from our midst some of the lambs of the flock. Not a few of the young have been passing through pain and suffering, and while with the majority so afflicted returning health and strength has been granted, it has been different with others. Of those whose names were on the roll at the beginning of the year, God saw meet on the 15th of October last to take to Himself, after a few days' illness, David Leslie. He died full of faith in the Saviour and in the joyous hope of sharing His glory, giving to sorrowing friends around his bed and to his teacher the greatest of all consolation—that he fell asleep in Jesus. And in this connection we should not fail to notice the death of two young female members of the congregation, and who, but a short time ago, were members of the Intermediate Classes. We refer to Mary Rennie, who died 12th April, and Helena Caven, who died 11th December. Of both these young persons it could be said they had found the Saviour; they had so learned of Christ in the days of youth and health that not fail knew has washed love cato be earnest School to sountestify can do

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when the time of sickness and trial came their faith did not fail them; they had implicit trust in His love; they knew Him in whom they believed, and their sins being washed away in His blood, they had no fear: perfect love casteth out fear. They were ready to depart and to be with Christ, which was far better. What an earnest call, and yet what an encouragement, to Sabbath School teachers to be earnest in this work of teaching, to sound in other ears the blessed name of Jesus, and to testify from the heart to the heart what the grace of God can do for sinners!

The average attendance during the year has been good; and on the whole the conduct of the scholars has been satisfactory.

Owing to the absence of a stated pastor, opportunities have been given from time to time during the year to have the school addressed by ministers supplying the pulpit, many of those addresses proving very interesting and profitable.

There have been the usual quarterly reviews of the

lessons conducted by the Superintendent.

Instead of the review on the last Sabbath of the year, the Rev. Dr. James, who for a few months is occupying the pulpit of our church, preached a most appropriate and impressive sermon in the Church to those attending the Sabbath School and Bible Class, taking for his subject of discourse the clause in Luke, chapter xxiii., and 33rd verse: "There they crucified Him."

The meeting of teachers for devotional exercises, immediately after the closing exercises of the school, has been found, as in past years, a time of blessed fellowship

with one another and with the Lord.

During the year meetings for business have been held as they were found necessary, and have been well attended.

On the 9th January last the anniversary of the school was held, and proved to be an exceedingly interesting and happy gathering. Besides the attraction of the magic lantern, the Rev. David James, of Midland, gave a very suitable address, and which was much appreciated by all present.

The usual summer gathering of the scholars, with many of their parents and friends, was held on the 25th of June at Victoria Park. The day was all that could be desired, the attendance good, and every one was more than delighted with the day's entertainment.

The scheme of lessons used by the intermediate classes was, as in former years, the International Series, and was found to be on the whole exceedingly suitable. The Bible Class adopted as the basis of their lessons

the first five books of the Old Testament.

The infant and intermediate classes have been regularly supplied with the illustrated papers, which are, we believe, carefully read and appreciated. In proof of this, when, at the request of the Superintendent, the scholars were asked to return such copies of those papers as they did not desire to keep that they might be sent to schools in distant parts of our Dominion, no inconsiderable number were returned for this purpose; and in this way we have been able to meet the "wants and wishes" of schools not so favourably situated as our own. In the month of May Mr. Jaffray, labouring at the Presbyterian Mission Station of Sault Ste. Marie, wrote seeking for a donation of suitable books and papers for their Sabbath school. Our Librarians, without delay, sent quite a number of papers and books, and later in the year, at the request of Mrs. McEwan, who was for a time a teacher in our school, but now resident in Manitoba, and who is still taking a very active interest in Sabbath-school work there, a box was sent to her also, well filled with illustrated texts and papers, 45 copies of the Bible and 66 volumes of books from our library that had been made good use of by our own scholars.

The friends in those places very gratefully acknow-

ledged our service in these matters.

Would He have loved so coldly, forgiven so reluctantly, suffered injuries so peevishly, prayed so formally, resisted temptation so feebly, as I have done? Why then should I—I who have His example like a torch to guide and enkindle my heart; His grace to support me; and His promise of glory, honour and immortality to animate and strengthen me? Thus beholding in the glass of gospel history the glory of the Lord Jesus, and loving with growing ardour the object we contemplate, we shall be changed from glory to glory, till the lovely image be superinduced upon our own souls in all the fulness of which humanity is susceptible.

Service proceeding from such principles, regulated by a law so holy, and formed upon a model so perfect, may well be called "Holy service," pleasing to God, useful to men, indicative of the high health of the soul, and the earnest of her approaching glory and blessedness. Living and labouring in this spirit we may hope for success, for that prosperity which is the Saviour's joy—the gathering into His kingdom of many souls, even those that shall shine as jewels in His crown and be forever sharers of His glory.

It is gratifying to be able to say that the past year has seen no diminution of interest on the part of the young people of the congregation in the aims of this Association.

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#### REPORT.

In presenting another annual report your Committee feel grateful that there is no falling off in the aggregate of the contributions for the past year, but a slight increase.

The amount received through the collectors in monthly instalments was \$1,639.61, and there was paid to the Treasurer direct, including the collection at last Annual Meeting, \$945.01.

The collection for Home Missions at the two diets of worship yesterday, after deducting ordinary collection, amounted to \$56; adding to these sums interest on deposits for part of the year \$32.33, the revenue of the Association will be seen to be \$2,672.95.

In the amount thus reported there was contributed specially for Central India \$3, A Friend; for French Evangelization, \$2 by Church Member; for Home Missions, \$12.50 by the same; for Foreign Missions, \$12.50 by the same; for Manitoba College, \$25 from A Friend in London, England, per Mr. Reid; for French Evangelization, \$14.60 by the same; for Manitoba College, \$14.60 from Mr. George Smith; for McAll Mission, Paris, \$30, and Augmentation of Ministers' Stipends, \$503.79. Deducting these amounts and \$47.68 paid for Records, there remains, exclusive of yesterday's collection, \$1,951.28, to be allocated among those Schemes of the Church for which they have been contributed.

Your Committee desires to submit the following allocations of the amount for the approval of the congregation: For the Assembly's Home Mission Fund, \$800; Foreign Mission Fund, \$275; College Fund, \$425; Manitoba College, \$75; University Scholarship, \$60; French Evangelization, \$100; Augmentation of Min-

isters' Stipends, \$216.28.

These amounts do not embrace all that has been contributed by the congregation for Missions and Educational purposes throughout the year. The Sabbath school gave \$304.52; the Hopeful Gleaners' Mission Band, \$350; The Murray-Mitchell Auxiliary, \$124.
