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Report of the Board of Home Missions, 1891-2.

The Board of Home Missions in presenting its Annual Report first desires to express its sympathy with the Bishop in his enforced and long continued absence from the Diocese, to which the Board feels that he is only reconciled by the necessity for entirely re-establishing his health in order that his work may be resumed with the greater efficiency. The whole Diocese joins in the prayer that he may speedily be enabled to return, and that the work so long intermitted, may be taken up with fresh energetic vigour.

The financial condition of the Diocese, which comes more within the purview of the Board, still gives much cause for anxiety. The members of the Church, as a body, cannot yet be said to grasp the situation in which we find ourselves. While there are some who do give liberally and in proportion to their means, there are still very many who think that their responsibilities to God and His Church have been sufficiently discharged when they have given one dollar to the Board of Home Missions for the prosecution of its work. To rouse the interest of our people, to devise means which wisdom may suggest and which success will justify, by which the possibilities of large increase yet unrecognized by the mass of Church people may be quickened into life, and to elevate the idea of Christian giving to a higher plane, is still the work which may well engage the most anxious thought of the Board.

Since the last report was issued, the important step, therein hinted at, was taken, of employing a Diocesan Agent, who should travel throughout the Diocese, explain the position of the finances, and inculcate the principles of systematic and proportionate giving. The services of the Rev. W. J. Ancient, a clergyman well known and highly respected, were secured for a period of six months, as an experiment. Mr. Ancient addressed congregations and audiences in Halifax and other important places in the Province, and there is reason to believe that the ground was well and efficiently broken, and that the seed of much good fruit was sown. But when he had been at work barely four months, he was suddenly re-called to his parish by the sad misfortune of the burning of his Church, and his agency work had to be abandoned. It remains to be seen whether the funds of the Board will prove to have been increased by this effort of faith.

After this sudden cessation of the efforts of a Diocesan agent, the Deputation work was resumed. The Rev. Dyson Hague, Canon Partridge, Rev. J. M. Withycombe, and others spent what time they could spare from other pressing duties, in visiting several of the Deaneries, and there is little doubt in the minds of most of the members of the Board that this is the form which the most successful efforts will ultimately take. In other Dioceses it has proved a very powerful method of arousing the zeal of the people; and the intercourse of the clergy with each other and with the various congregations cannot fail to excite most desirable feelings of mutual sympathy and brotherhood. The Board hope for a large increase of gifts under the regular and systematic influence of the Deputation work this year. A conference of Rural Deans was held during the past month in Halifax. Amongst the work done at this conference was the division of the Deaneries into deputational districts, and the suggestion of men to do the work. The matter will be brought before the Ruridecanal Chapters at their next meetings. That our people are able to give much more than they do give admits of no doubt. The only difficulty is how best and most quickly to train them to do so.

At the revision of grants made as usual in November last, and going into effect from January 1st of this year, the Board feel it necessary to reduce in many instances the grant made by the Board, and to increase the amount to be paid by the people. While there are cases in which complaint has been made of this by the clergy, and which will probably press hardly upon them, in the large majority of instances the reduction has been quietly accepted. It may be feared that the general collections will suffer in consequence, but it is to be hoped not.

The Board has sanctioned the omission from this year's Report of the Rules and Regulations of the various Funds, which are ordered to be printed in a separate pamphlet. It is suggested that the Constitutions and Canons and the Acts of the Legislature of the Synod be included in the same book. This will be a matter of economy. In the place of this printing, the Board this year includes in the report short summaries of work done in the various parishes, which it is hoped will prove both interesting and helpful reading. The parochial statistics are fuller this year than ever before, though not quite perfect yet.

The Society of the Treasury of GOD, now fully constituted, has at present 64 members, all pledged to give of their income a proportionate part, and to give it at short and regular intervals. The spread of this principle throughout the Diocese will prove its financial salvation.

After the visit of a deputation of the Board to his parish a year ago, the Rev. E. H. Ball, of Tangier, induced his people to adopt a scheme which involved the abolishing of all special collections, the giving of the largest sum possible for them in the weekly or monthly offertory, and the setting apart of the money by the Vestry to various objects as their importance seemed to demand. By this arrangement he has effected the following improvements, as exhibited by his returns for 1890 and 1891.

Thus he has raised the whole contribution from his Parish 30 per cent. ; his own stipend, being first on the list of claims, is secure ; and his people, feeling that by the giving of a certain proportion of their income, and giving it at short intervals, they are fulfilling their Christian duty and setting an example of the true method of supporting the Church, are gaining for themselves though to a certain extent unconsciously, a great increase of spiritual power. The Board is most happy to report that a similar scheme is now in operation at Truro, under Archdeacon Kaulbach ; at Amherst under Rural Dean Harris, in Yarmouth under the vigilant and energetic oversight of Rev. Dr. Cartwright. And there is every indication that the movement will grow.

In conclusion the Board would give utterance to its conviction that the only way to secure by this or any other means a due amount from the possessions of our people, is to uplift them spiritually. Nothing will do this but a fresh outpouring of the Grace of GOD upon the Diocese at large. There must be more earnest and fervent prayer for guidance and enlightenment, more steady and persistent and laborious work, less trust in expedients and more waiting upon GOD.

In the earnest hope and expectation that by another year in the good Providence of the Great Head of the Church, our prospects will have brightened, and our future success will be assured, the Board submits its Report to the Synod.

Report of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund Committee.

The position of things reported last year as regards the W. & O. Fund has not materially changed. Despite the attention drawn to the state of the Fund, and the earnest pleadings for its objects by the Diocesan Agent and the Deputations, the income from subscriptions has not increased, while there are more widows to receive the pensions. In consequence of this the Committee have been obliged to reduce the amount of pension to \$100 a year for the present. There is a deficit of nearly \$3000; the income is about \$1900, the pensions amount to \$1500, and the balance of \$400 will have to be set aside until the \$3000 borrowed from the Reserved Fund to keep up the payments to the widows of \$175.00 and \$150.00 successively has been repaid.

The amount of \$100 a year to the widow of a clergymen who has spent life and health in the service of the Church, is most inadequate and operates as a barrier to the acceptance of our vacant missions by Clergymen from other dioceses. But in justice to the Committee it must be remembered that the premiums to be paid by the Clergy are very small, and that the \$100 a year is all that the Fund on its present basis was calculated to be able to pay. In endeavouring to go beyond this amount, the Committee have encountered difficulty, which can only be overcome by an increase of capital, or an augmentation of donations, or by keeping strictly to the terms of the rules which limit payments to the original \$100. In the absence of the two former alternatives, the Committee have felt bound to adhere to the later.

The Committee would suggest that a Deputation be sent to Prince Edward Island. The Clergy there are now enjoying the same advantages with the Clergy of the Province of Nova Scotia; and the Island has done nothing either by collections or endowment to increase the Funds. An influential and persuasive member of the Committee would doubtless succeed in arousing some interest in the objects of the Fund, which would lead to its improvement.

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Report of the Superannuation Fund Committee.

The Committee on Superannuation Fund beg to submit to the Synod their Annual Report:—

The Clergy now on the Fund under the old rates, are Rev. Canon Maynard, D. D., of Windsor; Rev. J. Shaw Smith, B. A., of Dartmouth, and Rev. J. O. Ruggles, M. A., of Halifax. These each receive the sum of \$200 a year. Under the new scheme adopted by the Synod in 1890, there are receiving the benefits of the Fund according to their length of service, Rev. H. Stamer, and Rev. R. F. Kline, who receive \$400 each. Thus at present the payments made aggregate \$1400. The income of the Fund from investments is about \$1600 and from premiums \$208, in all \$1808. The collections according to the annexed list increase this amount to \$2006.33.

Your Committee are inclined to think that the Fund as now constituted will probably bear all demands upon it. But if at any time it fails to do so, the pensions will have to be decreased *pro rata*.

A mortgage of \$3200 has been paid off, and \$4000 re-invested at 5½ per cent. All the securities have been submitted to the auditors and the Investment Committee. These will be found in the report of the B. H. M. for 1891. There is now in the hands of the Committee a balance of \$112.00.

The Rev. G. B. Dodwell, M. A., and J. J. Ritchie, M. A., who were on the Fund for a portion of 1891 have both now passed to their rest.

The following resolution passed at a recent meeting of the Committee, is recommended to the Synod for adoption:

“That the Committee have power, in cases of the applicants being under 70 years of age, to put them on the Fund for a limited time, at the end of which period a new application must be made if they wish to continue.”

The following additions to the rules are also recommended to the Synod for adoption.

1. “Any applicants for admission to the Fund being under— years of age shall, before being placed upon the list, if required by the Committee, be subject to examination by a duly qualified medical practitioner.”

2. “Any beneficiary of the Fund, under— years of age shall, at the pleasure of the Committee, be subject to an annual medical re-examination.”

3. “The medical practitioner, in all cases where a certificate is required, shall be nominated and his fees paid by the Committee.”

Report of the Board of Domestic and Foreign Missions.

Your Committee have much pleasure in reporting a perceptible increase in the contributions of this Diocese towards these most important objects. The time was when at the meeting of Provincial Synod, Nova Scotia stood lowest on the list, and \$800 was the most the Diocese appeared to be able to raise for so noble a purpose. Since that day, the amount has been steadily growing till our offerings are nearer \$3000 than \$2000. It is obvious that some powerful influences have been at work to produce such an effect upon the hearts of our people.

The increase may be accounted for, first, by the formation of the Board of Domestic and Foreign Missions, which by its regular and powerful appeals, coming twice in each year, and ordered by the Bishop to be read by the clergy in churches, has compelled the attention of the parishes to the needs of the Mission Field. It is a great advantage to have the mind fixed twice every twelve months upon so eminently reasonable and necessary a theme: and there is no other way of doing it as well. Then, secondly, a larger number of parishes have begun to give; and although some of their collections may be small, the tendency of them is to grow larger. And last, some of the more wealthy congregations have risen to the occasion, and the sums contributed by them, whether unappropriated, or devoted to special objects, have considerably swelled the total amount. Nova Scotia now stands second from the foot of the list, and she will win her way higher yet.

There is little doubt, too, that the sending of missionaries direct to Foreign fields has been a great stimulus to the cause. Members of the Church can now indicate the mission and the man to whom their gifts are to be made. This will probably in the near future, become a favourite way of shewing interest in Missions, especially to the Heathen.

The Rev. E. F. Wilson recently paid a visit to these provinces, bringing with him Indian boys: and receiving amounts and promises which appear for the first time many of them, in our columns. This year, too, a statement of contributions made to the Sabrevois mission, collected in many places in Nova Scotia by

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Rev. Canon Rollit, of Montreal, is appended. These special objects all enlarge the total amount forwarded, and shew what the Diocese is doing. It is moreover to be noted, that there must still be certain sums, sent from Sunday Schools and private sources, to various missionary agencies, which do not pass through the Secretary's books, and which hence do not appear on the account.

There can be no question that the mind of the Church is being aroused more and more each year in this vital matter. And as the system of proportionate giving per week or per month permeates the Church, and all our obligations are thus better acknowledged and met, the Funds of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society will receive a corresponding impetus. It is to be hoped that the Church people in their respective parishes will take heart from what has been already accomplished, and determine that the Diocese shall in this respect assume her proper position.

The cause of Domestic Missions especially has been much advanced by the publication of the Canadian Church Magazine, which was originated by Rev. Dr. Mockridge, who has been the efficient and zealous Secretary of the Central Board ever since its formation. The Magazine is illustrated, and very well edited. It is a portrait gallery of our distinguished Bishops and Missionaries, and has a children's department, thus training our growing boys and girls to an intelligent interest in the Church's Mission work. If any one desires to help the cause of Domestic Missions in our own Dominion, we cannot do better than subscribe, and induce others to subscribe, to this Magazine, which will come to him with regularity, and will always prove a welcome guest.

The meetings of the Central Board have been well attended, though the distances are so great that the representatives from this Diocese have not been present during the past year. Should a recommendation be made by the Synod at its ensuing session that the expenses, or half the expenses of the delegation from distant Dioceses, be paid by the Central Board, it would doubtless carry much weight.

Upon the whole I can look back with much satisfaction on the year's work, and look forward hopefully, feeling that I have the all-powerful help of the Holy Spirit.

ANTIGONISH.

I came to the Diocese of N. S. and to this Parish in Jan. 1891. I had not the pleasure of seeing the Bishop, as he was too ill at that time to see any one on business of the Diocese. I hope the Spring will find him quite recovered, and his health permanently restored. I found on my arrival lots of work to be done in the Parish, the three churches and the Rectory being in great want of repair; the Glebe land in need of much cultivation and fencing. The three churches are St. Mary's, Bayfield; St. Paul's, Antigonish; and Christ Church, Linwood.

Last summer we raised here at Bayfield the small sum of \$75.00, the proceeds of a pic-nic and sale of fancy articles. Out of this we paid off an old standing debt of \$32.00 on the church furnace. The balance was expended in re-shingling the Rectory and re-building chimnies. We also raised \$36.00 (by a Musicale with refreshments in the Rectory) towards the purchase of a new organ for the church which we need very much, and we hope to get it at once.

I am in hope of getting a liberal subscription in the Parish for the repairing of St. Mary's church here, and the Rectory. It will take \$500 or more.

We raised at Linwood last Fall about \$85.00 for the repairing of Christ church there. This will be expended, as far as it will go, this spring, in removing the old tower and building a new one with a small spire. I also hope to build a chancel, which will greatly improve the building in every way. At least \$400 are needed to put this church in proper repair. We have already replaced the old picket fence round the church grounds by a new one. We bought the pickets, and the congregation supplied new posts and did the work. There will, I hope, be some repairs put upon St. Paul's church at Antigonish this coming Summer. We have raised a small sum there by subscription for a new organ. We have had a small re-table placed upon the altar for flowers, &c. This is being now ornamented with the words "Holy, Holy, Holy," in pretty lettering by Mrs. H. K. Brine. We have purchased a pretty set of Altar linen. We need a new set of Holy vessels with Cruets, Ciborium, &c. There is no Font either at St. Paul's Antigonish, or at Christ's Church, Lindwood. I should be very happy if some kind gentleman or lady would present us with these. The necessary repairs to the buildings will be more than the small congregations can manage.

BADDECK.

You ask me on behalf of the B. H. M. to write you a short account of my work in the Mission of Victoria Co., C. B., for the year 1891. I have much pleasure in complying with your request.

To understand the better what my work has been during the past year, it seems necessary that I say a word anent the Mission itself.

The Mission extends from Baddeck to Cape North, a distance of some eighty miles; but only at its extremities is active church work at present being done.

At the Baddeck end, there are two churches, about five miles apart—viz: at Baddeck, and Big Baddeck. There are two other churches at the northern end, the one, unfinished interiorly (belonging conjointly to the Presbyterian body and the Church) is at Ingonish—the other at Neil's Harbor twelve miles further north.

At Big Baddeck there are eight church families—at Baddeck nine—at Ingonish seven—at Neil's Harbor thirty-two, and scattered here and there some other half dozen families.

At Baddeck I have held two regular Sunday services, with alternate celebrations of the Blessed Sacrament at 8 and 11 a. m. together with morning S. School, except on the first Sunday in each month, when I have had a children's afternoon service with catechetical lecture. I have also had weekly Bible class. Big Baddeck has had one regular Sunday service with monthly celebration (1st Sunday in the month) and an occasional week-day service as well.

About one-fourth of my time only, has been given to the Northern extremity, as until recently it enjoyed the services of a layman.

Mr. Stansfield, whom I found stationed at Neil's Harbour, as lay-reader, rendered me valuable assistance, having conducted regular Sunday services together with S. School and Bible Class. Within a month after his departure, I secured the services of Mr. Brown, who ably carried on the good work done by his predecessor, until the end of October when I was obliged for lack of means to part with him. The people, during the six months that he was with them, contributed upwards of \$90.00 towards his support, and I supplemented this to the amount of \$50.00. During the above period, my plan was to visit the Northern every seven weeks, holding week-day and Sunday services, with celebrations, both at Ingonish and Neil's Harbour. Since being left single-handed, I have regularly visited this part every five weeks, remaining there from ten to twelve days at a time.

At present the S. School at Neil's Harbour is being conducted by six of my most intelligent parishioners.

There is also a Band of Hope thriving here.

The baptisms for the year were upwards of twenty-five, three adults being among the number.

There have been eight marriages in the mission for the year.

A gratifying increase has been shewn in the number of communicants. Materially the church has been benefited somewhat.

The church at Big Baddeck has been re-shingled in part.

At Baddeck sufficient funds have been raised to erect a substantial fence about the church; and a new organ has been recently added.

At Neil's Harbor we have the shingles on the spot to re-roof the church; and for which the Mission is indebted to Rev. S. Gibbons, who was enabled to make the purchase from funds raised in the U. S. A.

I may add that in my humble opinion the Mission is altogether too large to be satisfactorily worked single-handed. A division is necessary. Meanwhile the Missionary would do a better work for Christ and His Church if stationed at Neil's Harbor.

CLEMENTSPORT.

Easter meeting, 1891, voted \$120 (additional) to the Rector's salary, making the sum total from all sources about \$720. The Parish was enabled to make up this additional grant through the aid of the Mission of Victory. Victory Mission, I may state, was started and worked successfully by my predecessor, Mr. Morris, who, owing to the wretched state of the roads leading to the settlement, could not give the people there more than an occasional service. The road the past two years has improved so that at certain seasons of the year I have been able to give them regular fortnightly services—week nights and Sundays alternately.

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In consideration of the latter the people agreed to guarantee \$50 per annum. A vigorous canvass of Bear River by an energetic parishioner showed a marked increase in the ability of the people at this end of the Parish—he having arranged a system by which produce might be converted into cash by the Warden and the latter handed over to the Rector at regular times. Bear River has, by the way, been throughout, especially prompt in the matter of salary.

CLEMENTS WEST—the largest and most capable portion of the Parish has done fairly well, and Clementsport, where the congregation by death and removals was diminished into a mere handful has been bearing a greater financial burden than it will in future be able to support.

It is a matter of regret that dullness of trade all through this Parish, has made it very difficult for the Warden to meet obligations, and it may also be observed that the old evil of Clements—ignorance of the necessity of liberality is ever asserting itself. I have made it a special aim to put the finances of the Parish on a sounder basis, for I felt persuaded that the only chance of making the work permanent here lay in this.

We have prepared a foundation for a new church in Clementsport and increased the sum already in hand for its completion by \$500. The frame is all on the ground and operations will be begun as early in the Spring as frost will permit. A committee formed at Easter for the carrying out of this work has developed great energy and determination.

I may note here, that previous to last Easter the greater portion of the parishioners were steadfastly to this enterprise, and the few people of Clementsport stood alone and unsupported in the almost hopeless task of raising this edifice, but after a lively discussion of its merits the Parish at length unanimously decided to give the matter their countenance. If this had not been done, I doubt if the Church would have been begun within the next decade. A contract for the building of a larger chancel on the chapel at Deep Brook has been given to competent workmen and the whole amount has been voted for this work by the Ladies' Aid Society of this place. I hope by Easter to see this in a fair way to completion. It will be a great acquisition to the building and from plans prepared I understand the work will be artistic and suitable to this already well arranged church which possesses a remarkable history as having been removed to this site by water from another place three or four miles distant.

I have given all the attention I could to the Mission of Graywood (or Liverpool Road) which has again been relinquished by Annapolis and placed upon my already well-burdened shoulders.

Services, baptisms, burials, &c., were conducted throughout the Summer, the former two almost regularly. I must, however, record my obligation to Mr. How, Rector of Annapolis, for material help in the latter in many urgent cases, and I was sorry when he had to declare himself unable to afford any further aid by reason of his own heavy duties.

I have to be thankful to God for much spiritual progress. Through

the medium of Bible Classes, special services and persistent visiting, several names of adults have been added to our Baptismal Register besides a large number of infants, and the attendance at Sunday services has been increased all through the Parish. I have, nevertheless, one great disappointment in the matter of the church I started at Victory, which owing to poverty I had to defer almost indefinitely.

COUNTRY HARBOUR.

Dear Sir,—In giving a detailed account of my work in this Mission for the last twelve months I have much to be thankful to Almighty God for, and also the Society and friends for the way and manner in which they received me and my family. On my arrival to Isaacs Harbor Capt. W. Griffin took us all in, kept my wife and one of my boys while I walked on with three of my other boys in search of the Mission House, calling at the first house to make enquiries I found that it was Mr. Milhard's, one of our good friends. We were not allowed to go further until the next day. The next day we reached the Mission House. Mrs. George Keith put us up until the next day. Then John L. Henderson and his wife came down with his horse and waggon, bringing butter, and with them took my wife and myself to their house and put us up for the night. The four boys were then taken in by my two other neighbours. A few days after the Church Warden was able to get up our luggage from Isaac's Harbour. I then commenced my work, travelling by foot and water, and was very sea sick every time. The fishermen are all very poor but very kind. John Bingley was the first to take me from Country Harbour to Fisherman's Harbor, he took me to his home and I was to have dinner with him, his wife and five children. I held a meeting that night; Mr. F. Hines put me up for the night. The next morning a man was over after me to pilot me through the woods for Beckerton, here I was very kindly received—held Divine service which was well attended. The next day I walked to the lake to Mr. David Smith's—was very kindly received—held Divine Service.

I visited Country Harbor and held Divine Service 147 times, 50 Bible class meetings, 50 Wednesday evening meetings, 14 meetings for singing.

Beckerton, I have visited and held Divine service 101 times, Bible readings 25 times and 12 prayer meetings. All well attended.

Fisherman's Harbour 22 services—one in open air—well attended and attentive.

I was invited to Wine Harbor and have held two meetings, both well attended. One man, named John Kyzer, said to me, "Mr. Gav, I intended this year if my factory had not been burnt down to have a Church Minister to come to Wine Harbor occasionally if I had to pay him myself.

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COW BAY, C. B.

The work of the Church in this Parish during the past year has been slowly progressive.

With only 90 families and one-quarter of those with small means, we have found it particularly hard to raise the money required to meet the lawful claims of the Church at home and abroad.

Our contribution to B. H. M. this year is somewhat below that of last year I am sorry for this, but there were good reasons for it, and I am pleased to note that our contributions to other sources, such as Domestic and Foreign Missions, were proportionately large.

We have an increasingly strong centre in Cow Bay, and its influence for good is felt all through the Parish. But with our five congregations scattered and isolated from each other along a coast of 30 miles, it is utterly impossible for one Priest to maintain a uniform standard of Church life in all parts of the Parish.

I was sorry to hear that the committee of B. H. M. decided to reduce our annual grant—and I have doubts about the wisdom of it—as it means either a reduction of \$50 per an. to a stipend altogether inadequate to the requirements of a very expensive Parish, or else a corresponding reduction in our B. H. M. contributions. The former may result in my resignation at an early date ; the latter would pain me very much.

We have complied with the request of the B. H. M. re the children's Lenten offerings. Forty boxes have been supplied to our children and I anticipate good results.

Our spiritual condition is below what I would like it to be. This can be accounted for by those who know the many temptations to evil which are peculiar to a colliery district, and which are ever the results of a divided Christianity such as exists in our midst.

All our work is done on strictly Church lines. We can point to many good results of our attitude in this respect and, God helping us, we shall fight it out on those lines.

DARTMOUTH.

During the year 1891, the work of the Church has gone on prospering. The regular routine of Parish work has been carried out. The services have been very fairly attended, and there has been many evidences of a desire to serve God more faithfully than in the past. This is the most encouraging feature in my work. House to house visitation has also received my attention. The sick have been visited, and read to and prayed with. Some have shewn their appreciation of these visits by attending the church more frequently after restoration to health.

We have in connection with Christ Church, the following Classes and Societies :—

The Sunday School is well attended and has for its new Superintendent Mr. Morrison, who has thrown himself heart and soul into the work. We have 21 teachers. The primary class of nearly 100 is conducted by Mrs. Mott.

EASTERN PASSAGE.

I am in receipt of your Post card, asking particulars of this Parish. I fear my report must of necessity be short since my coming has been so recent that I can hardly judge confidently of our needs or of our prospects in supplying them. I may say, however, that I have been most kindly received on all hands, even by those who, normally at least, are not attached to our communion—in the little that I have accomplished since my coming I have been most cordially supported by the parish-

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ioners without regard to creed or religious differences. Whatever, therefore, may be the needs of the Parish in the future I do not fear that the parishioners fairly and reasonably led will fail to support me in my efforts to supply them.

We have just purchased for St. Peter's, Eastern Passage, a new organ (American) at a net cost of \$185.00, and with the exception of \$20.00 which we have borrowed, the money has been collected.

We are thus enabled to brighten our services greatly by the addition of music and singing.

As you are probably aware services are held in four places: Eastern Passage, Cole Harbour, Cow Bay and Wellington, and all services, Sunday and week-day, when held, are well attended.

FALKLAND.

The Parish of Falkland consists of the coast line on the West side of Halifax Harbour, from the Queen's quarries, near the mouth of the North-west Arm, to Sambro; a distance of about fifteen miles. By far the greater part of the population are Roman Catholics. The Church people are resident in three settlements; there being about 30 near Falkland church, besides the troops stationed at York Redoubt, numbering about 15. In the Herring Cove district, there are 103 belonging to the Church, nearly all of whom are very regular in their attendance at Divine service. At Portuguese Cove and Ketch Harbour there are 14 Church people. At Sambro, the Protestant population is all Methodist.

The Church services at the several stations are: at Falkland every Sunday morning at 11 a. m.; at Herring Cove every Sunday evening at 7 p. m., and at Portuguese Cove once a fortnight at a private house at 3 p. m. There is also evening prayer and practice of the choir at Herring Cove every Friday, and during Lent, on Wednesday also, with a short address.

During the latter half of the past year, I have been unable to conduct three services on any Sunday, from weakness of voice, consequently the Portuguese service has been discontinued. The actual number of services, Sunday and week-day, during the year was 173. Baptisms, 6; Marriages, none; Burials, 2. I do not know of an unbaptized infant or adult in the Parish. There are 58 communicants; and the Sunday School at Herring Cove has 20 scholars.

FALMOUTH.

Work has been carried on during the past year as in former years, under very much that tends to discourage a zealous worker. The services of the Church have been regularly held in the different churches. My field of labor here is so extensive and the roads are in such a bad

condition the greater part of the year that it is impossible for me to make as many visits to the scattered parishioners as should be made.

There is an unmistakable lack of interest here in Church work on the part of the majority of those who call themselves Churchmen. A deadly apathy seems to have firmly settled down upon them, which can only be removed when the Holy Spirit has worked upon and has driven out all coldness from their hearts.

One wonders why it is that so many heads of families in Falmouth and Windsor Forks, never regularly attend the services of the Church. There are fathers and mothers, who are members of St. George's and St. Michael's, who have never during my Incumbency attended either morning or evening prayer and yet when asked what they are in religion will answer that they are Churchmen. I have tried hard to get such ones to church, but so far without success. I must confess with great sorrow of heart that I have failed to devise such means as have secured the attendance at the services of such ones mentioned above. Such a state of affairs in a community which has enjoyed the services of an Anglican Clergyman for a century or more, is a sad commentary indeed. Such fathers and mothers have never yet felt their responsibility to their children and to their neighbors. If the parents do not practise what they should, the children will grow up and lead the same indifferent and ungodly kind of life as has been in their early life set before them at home.

There are now four churches in this Parish; a little over a year ago there were three, viz.: St. George's, Falmouth; St. Michael's, Windsor Forks; All Saints, Mill Bank and St. Andrew's, Hantsport.

I have a tract of country 25 miles in length to travel in order to minister to my people. The size of the Parish involves many tiresome journeys and great expenditure of labor without any great results.

The Holy Communion is administered once a month in the morning at St. George's, St. Michael's and St. Andrew's, and at least three times a year at All Saints. The communicants are small in number in each of the above churches. Too small compared to the number that have been confirmed.

The only real live centre of Church work in the Parish is Hantsport. This little seaport village is partly in Hants and partly in Kings, and did not a little over a year ago have an Anglican Church. In the year 1886 the few Church families conceived the idea of building an edifice for the worship of God, and immediately commenced to raise money for that purpose, and in the year 1890 their efforts were crowned with success. A new church capable of seating from 250 to 300 has been completed and opened for Divine service. It has cost the people in the neighborhood of \$4000.00, and only a debt of \$1000.00 remains to be paid. The Church people have done nobly when this fact is taken into consideration that the community is composed chiefly of bigoted Baptists and so can hardly grant freedom of conscience to those who want to worship God as he always has been worshipped by the Church "Catholic," "decently and in order."

I have had the blessed privilege early in the past year of baptizing in St. Andrew's Church 5 adults and a goodly number of children, and no doubt when the Bishop makes a visitation of the Parish, a fair number will be prepared to receive the holy rite of "The Laying on of Hands."

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A good sized Sunday School was organized last March in connection with St. Andrew's Church, by a faithful band of workers who have done a good work among the younger members of the congregation.

The struggling church at Hantsport has received great assistance from the Church people of Windsor, Truro, Haliifax, Yarmouth and Annapolis, since they commenced work.

St. Andrew's Sunday School has received a grant of a good Sunday School Library from S. P. C. K., England. And the Incumbent has to thank sister Caroline for the gift of a beautiful red Altar-frontal and Antependium. Also the C. B. S. for the gift of £5 for the purchase of a Communion set. In the other churches, except at All Saints, Sunday Schools exist, but the work that should be done is not done, owing to want of qualified teachers. My duties prevent me from taking a prominent part in Sunday School work. I have held three services every Sunday besides week-day services during the Advent and Lenten seasons at Hantsport, and during Lent at Windsor Forks and Falmouth. At these services I have delivered lectures on the Prayer Book, English Church History and Lectures on confirmation.

HORTON.

Notwithstanding my illness in the early part of last year, and my enforced absence from home after that for three months, the usual Sunday services were maintained without one Sunday's failure throughout the year in both churches of the Parish: for this I have to thank several kind friends, more especially the Professors and senior Divinity Students of King's College. The Rev. Dr. Willets, President of King's College, most kindly took the Sunday services at Wolfville during the months of July, August and September. The total number of Sunday services in the Parish during 1891 was 174; public celebrations of the Holy Communion, 34; private, 13; Baptisms, 31; Marriages, 4; Burials, 7. The average offertory for ordinary Parochial purposes in St. John's church, Wolfville, has been \$8.18 per Sunday: in St. James' church, Kentville, \$17.32 per Sunday.

During the past year a very handsome Memorial Window has been placed in the East end of St. John's church, Wolfville. The window was the gift of the Rev. John Storrs, M.A., Vicar of St. Peter's church, Eaton Square, London. It is a memorial to his father, who for 35 years was Rector of the united Parishes of Horton and Cornwallis, and for a portion of that time Rural Dean of the Deanery of Avon. The window, which is a very choice specimen of English art, represents the adoration given to the Risen Saviour, by angels in heaven, and by His people on earth. This window completes the work of improvement and adornment which has been going on in St. John's church for the past six years. It is a matter of thankfulness that the whole of this work is now paid for. Thanks to my predecessor and to zealous members of the church in the Eastern and Western divisions of this Parish, the Parish of Horton now possesses in St. John's church, Wolfville, and in St. James' church, Kentville, two Sanctuaries for the worship of Almighty God which will compare favorably with the churches of any Parish in the Diocese.

LOCKPORT.

This mission was separated from the Parish of Shelburne, and formed into a separate Parish six years ago. There are three churches, Holy Cross at Lockport; Trinity, at Jordan Falls; and St. Peter's, Green Harbour; all are neat churchly buildings, in good repair and well equipped, with stone founts, organs, bells, Litany desks, &c. Services are also held in school houses at Enslow's Point and Port L'Hebert, and in a Union building at Jordan Ferry, East. One half the congregation at Port L'Hebert is in Liverpool Parish. Occasional services also, at Blue Island and West Head, &c. Small chapels are much needed at Enslows Point Port Hebert and Blue Island. None of our people are well off; the largest proportion are poor fishermen.

During the last five years, the congregations, especially at Lockport, have been much weakened by the removal of some of our best supporters, and the several business failures here have put it out of the power of the remnant to do what they wish, in a financial way, to carry on the work. Encouraging signs of deep and untiring interest are evident in all sections of the Parish, except one, where some of the church people do not seem to "catch on" in doing their part. We have a number of very earnest, self-denying workers whose willing and cheerful co-operation has done much to encourage the Rector and Church Wardens; but all are poor, and many have scarcely a sufficiency of this world's goods. A debt on the Rectory presses us sore. Owing to business failures, five poor men were compelled to assume the debt; but without extraneous aid are hardly put to it, to meet their notes when they become due.

The Sunday Schools are doing a good work. The contributions of our people to all objects of the church, though small, show their interest in the work of the church generally. The increased reverence and fervour with which our services are entered into, the more generally responding and kneeling, and private prayer, before and at the close of the service, which is becoming the rule, there, though very encouraging as showing a greater regard to the proprieties of worship, if not anything higher, are yet, I trust, evidences that our people are being led to the great object of the church—repentance toward God and faith in our Lord Jesus Christ, and the bringing forth fruits unto holiness—as results of their faith, and the effects of grateful love to God who first loved them, and gave himself for them.

I cannot speak too highly of the kindness and attention of the people among whom I live.

LIVERPOOL.

This Parish comprises the town of Liverpool, with the neighbouring villages of Milton and Brooklyn, and the fishing settlements of West Head, three miles distant, and Hunts Point, eight miles distant. The churches are three in number, the Parish church, Trinity, at Liverpool; Grace church at West Head, and S. James' at Hunts Point, besides the Mission Chapel of S. Andrew's, situated about half way between Liverpool and Milton. During the past year the number of services held was 309, the number of Communion 46. The Parish numbers about 240 families. The number of Parochial visits made last year was 1201. Private Communion 32. There are 3 Sunday Schools in the Parish, two of which are necessarily closed during the winter months. In these are 22 teachers and 170 scholars.

Throughout the Parish considerable work has been done for the improvement of church property, &c. In Liverpool the congregation is working for a new organ, the fund towards which, was last year considerably

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augmented by means of sewing-classes, entertainments, sales, &c. At Western Head a handsome new window and Reredos, besides a new altar with brass crosses and vases have been put into the church by the willing workers there. At Hunts Point the church grounds have been considerably improved.

LONDONDERRY.

DEAR SIR,—I regret to say this Parish has not been in a flourishing condition during the past year. This town is entirely dependent upon the iron industry; and the iron trade having been dull, work has been scarce. During the latter part of last summer the rolling mill suspended work, in consequence of which many of the best paid workmen had to go elsewhere to find employment, some taking their families with them, and among those leaving the place were, of course, some church people, thus reducing both the congregation and the contributions at the same time. Then we had the misfortune to loose our church, which was burnt to the ground on the night of Sept. 30th. This not only added to our financial difficulties, but deprived us of many of our services. The Baptists kindly came to our assistance by offering us their place of worship on Sunday mornings. This service, with afternoon service at the West Mines, is all that we have had from the end of September to the present time. Our Sunday School has also suffered, owing to the fact that we have had to hold it in the morning, before service, instead of in the afternoon. But as we hope to open our new church on mid-lent Sunday, we are looking forward with some confidence to a fresh start in the near future. And as there are prospects of some, at least, of the mill work being resumed, we are also hoping for better times financially.

It will easily be understood that with the afore-mentioned difficulties in the way there has not been much real work accomplished in the Parish.

Another reason why not much has been accomplished is, that last July I was prevailed upon by the B. H. M. to undertake missionary work throughout the Diocese. This work was suddenly terminated on the burning of our church. In the meantime *locum tenues* had been occupying my place here; but as will be readily understood, nothing beyond the routine work of the Parish was done by him.

With the opening of the new church, and the resumption of all the regular services and usual, as the formation of confirmation classes, I trust new life will be infused into the Parish, and that the next report from this Parish will be of a more encouraging character.

MAITLAND.

I am glad to be able to report a very satisfactory year of work in this Parish.

A church has been built at Northfield at a cost of \$2000, which we were able to open free of debt.

The Rectory has been extensively repaired at a cost of \$600. New Organs have been placed in the Knutwick and Northfield Churches. The Church at Five Mile River has received a thorough painting and a new fence put about the Grave Yard.

I have now under my care 5 churches in good repair, with a school house, in which services are held during the summer months.

I have held regular services in the five churches with a celebration of Holy Communion on nearly every Sunday—three services with a drive of 24 or 30 miles being my regular Sunday work.

I have also held a Bible Class once a week, with services on Wednesday and Friday evenings.

I have buried 27, baptized 44 and married 4. I have held 145 Sunday Services, 100 week day services with 50 celebrations of the Holy Communion. There has been quite an addition to the Communicants list, our parish coming now, I think, third on the list of Country Parishes. I have visited a great deal during the past year, and have driven over 4000 miles.

God has given me good health and strength, so that I have been able to take the long drives and do an amount of work in this large and scattered Parish that a physically weak man could not do.

Steps are now being taken to secure a man to work in outlying places in this Parish and the neighboring Parish of Stewiacke.

Your Board has very generously given us a grant of \$300, which supplemented by \$300 from local sources will give us \$600 to begin with.

MANCHESTER.

Rev. and Dear Sir,—In sending you a brief report of my Parish work in the Parish of Manchester, I regret to say that there is not much that will be interesting. This Parish is a very small one: it is a small part of the Parish of Guysboro', and was set off as a separate Parish some years ago in order that the Minister might become a Rector. The Strait of Canso was an outlying district from it, and was attended by the Minister from Manchester, but it was considered expedient that the Strait should have a Minister of its own. By this arrangement Manchester was left as a small Parish. During the last year I have had regular services in the Parish Church every Sunday morning and also on the Holy Days. I was over to Bayfield on Sunday, and had services in the church while Mr. Brown was down to Linwood attending the Church at that place.

MAHONE BAY.

Parish work has gone on regularly during the past year. Services being kept up at the many stations throughout the Parish. There has been an improvement in the offerings of the people. The weekly envelope system having been introduced into the Parish church, the subscriptions have increased, and regularity has been achieved in the payment of salary.

The Mission of New Germany containing many stations, still is a part of the Parish, but is worked altogether by the Curate in charge, living at New Germany. With the exception of the Missionary district, which only awaits time to become a separate Parish, this Parish is now self sustaining, except also that it receives some aid from Church Endowment Funds. The debt upon the new church is quite small, and we hope soon to see it wiped out.

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The working of this Parish entails a large amount of driving, and we hope soon to see the Rector have more assistance, possibly a Curate to work at Martins River, and also in part of the Parish of Chester, districts to become a good parish in the near future we trust.

NEW ROSS.

In presenting the report for 1891, I have to inform the Committee that it represents my work for nine months only. From Aug. in last year, until Nov., I was unable to attend to my Parochial duties. During that period I had to leave the Parish for medical treatment and rest.

It really seems as if this Parish must continue for some time yet under the fostering care of the B. H. M. We cannot expect any change until some system of communication is established with the outside world. At present my people *barely exist*. It would be a breach of confidence to make public the actual state of affairs in some houses. It would hardly be beaten in the slums of London, and I speak from experience.

NEWPORT.

In some respects the past year has been the most successful for some time in the history of this Parish. In Brooklyn a Mission Room has been opened to seat about 70 persons. Here, owing to the distance of the Parish Church from the people, evening and other services are held. In Brooklyn there is now *one* service every Sunday. Until within the last two years there has been one Sunday in the month in which there was no service. This evil has now been remedied, and the people have now three morning services and one evening service in the month. An effort has been made to have a weekly celebration. During the winter there are three celebrations a month at Parish Church and one at Walton. In the summer there is an early service at Woodville, four miles from Parish Church, at 8.30 a. m.

In the past year the Church at Walton was renovated inside, and is now changed from one of the most uncomfortable, and unsightly places imaginable, into a very neat and tastefully arranged Church. A Silver Communion Service was presented this year by friends in memory of A. McNeil Parker.

Last Easter we tried to adopt the voluntary system, which as far as the Ministerial expenses are concerned will turn out, I think, successfully. There may be some deficiency in current expenses. This Parish receives no grant from B. H. M. About \$350.00 have been raised for various objects connected with the Parish. The out-look for the future is at present not very bright. Some people have moved away and their homes have been taken up by outsiders. Death too has taken a number of our standbys. But we must only put our shoulders to the wheel, and take courage.

NEW DUBLIN.

During the year ending Dec. 31st, 1891, the usual services were held at each of the churches (four in number). Holy Communion was adminis-

tered once a month at each church. Three Sunday Schools were well attended during the summer, and the libraries at each largely used. One library cost \$50.00, another \$40.00 and the third one \$6.00, which however was augmented by a spontaneous gift of books from Messrs. McKinlay, Halifax. The Parish church was renovated at a cost of \$290.00. About \$600.00 are still needed to finish the inside. Mr. Mellor has had charge of the Parish four and a half years. During the last 12 months he has had no agreement with the people with regard to stipend. The stipend however has been paid. Feeling that his work was done, he resigned his charge in November last, and was sometime after unanimously elected Rector of Petiti Riviere. In the year 1868, Petiti Riviere was set off from New Dublin Parish.

PICTOU, N. S.

On Easter Monday last (1891) a motion unanimously carried, made the sittings of St. James church free and unappropriated. I am glad to say that an increase during the year is quite apparent, but I regret to notice a gravitation towards the rear sea s of the church; a peculiarity (it may be of free seats) which I have noticed elsewhere.

During the year we have expended about \$200.00 in painting the exterior of the church. About \$190.00 (raised by subscription) on a bell of 800 pounds to replace one of only 100 pounds; \$30.00 or \$40.00 more on other necessary improvements, which, with a regular correct expense account of \$1300.00 and an extra parochial \$137.00 has been quite a strain on the energy of the Parish, and only accomplished by the efficient aid of the Ladies' Working Societies.

Our Lenten and Advent daily services begun in my study in 1888-89, with an average attendance of six (6) are now held in the church with an average of 8 during Advent (91) and 18 during Lent of the same year.

If no other good were done by these services (of which who can judge it) I am sure that the necessity for each one to respond clearly, where only "two or three are gathered together," has reacted upon the responses of the larger congregations and improved them.

I am happy to feel that interest in missionary work is increasing, and I pray that it may still increase, and that with it may grow a greater interest in all things spiritual.

PORT MEDWAY.

This is a Parish not subject to any very great and existing changes either of prosperity or adversity, yet a slight change either way makes itself very seriously felt. Unfortunately we are feeling the effects of a change in the undoubted direction of adversity. Whether there is a general depression in business and a no less scarcity of money, I do not know—for in a true sense, I am out of the world—yet such has been the case here for some time. A very exodus has taken place. As one proof, my choir at the church in Port Medway, which a year ago was full and strong, consisting of sixteen voices, is now reduced to five, and entirely owing to removals from this place; and this same cause is operating in a similar way in every part of the Parish. Several whole families have removed to the States since I came here, and some part, and in some instances the larger part of many families have also gone away. From

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this cause, no doubt, much of our principal unsatisfactory state is due, and this is largely felt by the Parson. His experience of late in this particular has been quite a new sensation. There appears to be but one cure. However, some little work has been done upon and about the churches in the Parish. Last summer we had the church in Port Medway painted outside, which has greatly improved the appearance and of course, will far more assist in its preservation. The church at Mill Village had the floor raised and supported, and the interior walls of the entire building have been calsoimined, while the centre light of the chancel window which had been broken, has been sent to Montreal and repaired, and is now in its place.

At the Parish church at Eagle Head, while there has not been anything done to the interior or exterior of the building, some labour has been spent on the graveyard. But the Rectory is in most urgent need of repairs. The building and the barn alike are hardly fit for their respective occupants. During the cold high winds of the past few days, the Parson and his family have really suffered with the cold through the many hidden ventilators of an old wooden house nearly three score and ten years old! The horse and cow have been covered with frost in their stalls.

I regret to acknowledge that there was not any general collection made in this mission last year for the B. H. Mission. I plead innocence in the matter, for while I had arranged with a collector and thought that the work was going on, she was advised by the Church Wardens not to do it, as they were trying to solicit all they could for the Rector's salary. This year a collection has been made, but very small indeed—it is the day of small things—and these must not be despised.

I expect to have a small class for confirmation at each of the churches at the Bishop's approaching visitation.

ST. JOHN, CORNWALLIS.

The work of the Church in the Parish of St. John, Cornwallis, for the year 1891 was carried on as usual without any interruption other than what is unavoidable in the Country owing to heavy storms.

The general health of the Rector and people was good. Divine Services were held with H. C. in the Parish Church according to the rule adopted, every Sunday morning and on special Holy Days, as Xmas., Ascension and Good-Friday, also on Thanksgiving Day.

The Friday weekly service is not properly attended. The Evensong and Litany Alternating has been regularly held in the outstation Canning, and again resumed in Kingsport, after a break, in the private house of Mr. E. Hiltz. The work is hindered from lack of more convenient accommodation in both these places.

The Sunday School has been efficiently and successfully conducted by our Superintendent, Mr. L. J. Davidson. Although it and the Parish Choir have suffered loss in the removal from the Parish of many of the older scholars, some having gone to the United States.

The Choir suffered further loss through the resignation of our Organist, the sister of our Sunday School Superintendent, Miss L. E. Davidson, who we are glad still to hold as a Parishioner as Mrs. R. J. Starr.

Her place is being very cordially filled by a younger member, Miss Annie Chipman, and we confess the younger members of the Choir promise in time to well fill the vacancies therein.

The few members at Canning by a Tea, raised sufficient funds for current expenses in their Hall, and the parishioners nearer the Parish Church by means of a Strawberry Festival realized a small sum to swell the sum towards liquidating the debt on the Rectory.

I may state further that, recognizing the provision of the Church in her Liturgy the Lord's Death was properly celebrated ON GOOD FRIDAY by the *Celebration of the Holy Communion*. The Rector was surprised at the number of Communicants who embraced the opportunity; and for himself he may say, it was a season of great spiritual reformation. He looks forward to the time when the Spiritual Lethargy of the Church will be aroused in this respect.

It seems an anomaly that the *Day* of all days when *that Death* should be *shewn forth* in Christ's own appointed way, *it* should be celebrated in every way *but* that. The mind of the Church is evident, however, by the provisions made.

SACKVILLE.

I have been unable, owing to increasing infirmity, to get about among the people as I could wish, and cannot therefore give as good account of myself and my work as I would like to do; nevertheless the past year has not been without some fruit. The Guild continues its good work and has contributed upwards of one hundred dollars to church purposes, including ten dollars to the W. & O. Fund.

On the 16th June last, the Hammond's Plains Church completed by the kindness of extra parochial friends, was consecrated by the Bishop of Maine, and will, I trust, be for a name and a praise to future generations. The Parish church is now undergoing restoration, a new chancel is being added, and alterations are being made which will greatly add to its convenience and churchly appearance.

STELLARTON, N. S.

The Parish of Christ Church, Albion Mines, includes at present two stations Stellarton and Westville. During the past year regular services have been held at these places in their respective churches, Christ church, Stellarton, and S. Bees' Westville. There has also been a celebration of Holy Communion every four weeks in each church, and also there are Sunday Schools in connection with both congregations. The attendance at all the services is very small, and the number of regular communicants is also very small; notwithstanding these facts the services have been heartily carried on. Those who do come, come very regularly and do their best to make the services bright as well as devotional in character; but those who stay away also stay away very regularly, and only come to have their children baptized or their friends buried, with an occasional "look in" at Easter or Christmas, to show that they have not forgotten the way to the church. As to financial matters, the people of this Parish have fulfilled their promise with regard to the Rector's stipend. They promised to pay \$750, and to their great credit be it said they have done it. Stellarton giving \$500 and Westville \$250. Both congregations have been as good as their word in this respect. All Diocesan and other collections have been

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taken up from time to time, when the appeals from the Clerical Secretary, have been duly read out. The claims of the Board of Home Missions have been brought before the people, and good collections taken up at the Missionary meetings held in both churches.

STEWIACKE.

As far as I can learn this is the largest and one of the poorest Missions in the Diocese, and I am the only clergyman in the whole region of country extending from Bedford to Truro, and from sea to sea, covering an area of about 50 miles square. I do not attempt to work the whole ground, but am trying to minister to our people who live between Enfield and Brookfield, and from the southern boundary of Maitland Parish to Musquodoboit. This necessitates my having to travel about 7000 miles a year. Outside of this altogether, we must have at least 200 souls, to whom I am unable to minister and who are consequently practically neglected by the church. Calls are frequently coming to me from different parts of the Mission for services which I am obliged to decline. One woman sends word from Oakfield:—"We have 11 church families here, if you cannot give us a service come and start our Sunday School and I will try to carry it on." Here is work, and is it possible that the missionary spirit of the Church in this Diocese is so low that no man can be found who will throw himself into this breach, or have the great needs of this field never been made known to our people? Certainly they have never been fully realized. If those who read this report will look at the Provincial map and see the great space this mission occupies I am sure their interests will be awakened and the present condition of things not allowed to continue. We want a man, and we want him at once. My heart leaps within me at the very thought of the glorious work that a zealous man might do here.

I have reason to believe that the B. H. Missions will give a grant, which with what the people can make up, will keep a single man comfortably, and I pray that ere long one willing to "endure hardness" may be found who will come here.

I have to thank the B. H. Mission for a grant of \$150.00, without which I could not possibly remain here. My best thanks are also due to the C. W. M. A. of Halifax, for a Missionary box at Christmas.

Within the last year we have built a new church at Shubenacadie. It is a "gem" in every respect *and there have been no mistakes made about it.* There is a thorough brick foundation, and the Contractor Thomas Higgs, has done his work in a thorough workmanlike and satisfactory manner. We are indebted to the S.P.C.K. for a grant of £40 sterling for this object.

The Church Mission's Aid Association here and at Shubenacadie have done the chief part of the work in raising funds for this church, and they are still zealously employed in trying to pay off the debt of \$400.00 still due the contractor.

Since I came here a little more than two years ago there have been 98 baptisms and 84 confirmed. There have been 10 marriages and 21 burials. I hold three services every Sunday, and my drive is 32 miles. In addition to this I have week night services in different parts of the Mission, and during the summer I hold weekly open air services at one of the large mills near here where there are about 50 men employed.

Every Monday evening I devote entirely to the instruction of those who are preparing for Baptism, Confirmation or Holy Communion.

We have a Guild in good working order which has been productive of

much good. One of the members (Mr. Lynds) is now studying, with a view to taking Holy Orders at some future day.

I cannot close this report without thanking my dear parishioners one and all for the many substantial tokens of their love for me and mine. Last year they gave me a fur coat, this year a new sleigh, besides remembering us in the bestowal of smaller gifts at different times, and there is not a ripple of unkindness in any direction to disturb our relations as Minister and people. This is a feature of my report which I rejoice to make. Although my work has been hard, I have been encouraged and supported by as loving kind-hearted people as ever it was a man's lot to be cast among. God grant that we may continue "to keep the unity of the spirit in the bond of peace," and when He shall come to gather up His jewels "may we with His whole Church triumphant be gathered into one fold under one shepherd Jesus Christ our Lord, to whom with the Father and the ever blessed Spirit be all the glory now and forevermore."

TANGIER.

The chief point of interest in the history of this Parish for the year 1891 is the fair success with which God has blessed our effort at a scheme of systematic and proportionate offerings for all church purposes. The result is seen in the financial statistics as sent in to the B. H. M. Much larger contributions to the needy funds of our beloved Church have thus been raised. All the contributions now partake more strongly of the nature of free-will offerings. No one goes round to collect anything; all is brought at the services, and all is reverently offered, even in the school-rooms. And the Clergyman's dues are paid very regularly, one-twelfth the year's amount each month.

The Parish Church at Tangier has had extensive repairs and alterations made in it so that its interior instead of being one of the very crudest may be reckoned amongst the pretty country churches in the Diocese.

At Spry Bay the funds are being husbanded for some intended repairs.

At Spry Harbour the congregation contributed, beside their offerings, \$50.00 for the purchase of a site for a very much needed church.

The services have been held as regularly as usual, including for the first time 24 instead of 12 at the new church in Mooseland; where also a very neat fence has been put around the church-yard.

TRURO.

Work in this Parish has gone on very much as usual during the past year.

Our financial condition has been very good. Besides meeting all current expenses, and giving more than in any previous year to Missions, we have, through the offertory alone as a source of revenue, paid off about five hundred dollars of indebtedness. We were also able to engage the services of a Curate for three months. Two Clergymen are needed for doing the work of this Parish as it ought to be done. What we were able to do last year has shown that with the continuance of God's blessing it will not be long before we shall be able to maintain two.

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any previous year we may hope that the spiritual life of the Parish has grown and deepened. It was through the kindness of Bishop Kingdon that we were able to have the rite of Confirmation administered.

The system of giving, advocated by Rev. W. J. Ancient, as the representative of the B. H. M., has been in part adopted, and promises well for next year.

The Sunday School is in a very flourishing condition. The attendance of teachers and scholars has never been larger. All, together with the untiring superintendent and librarian, have worked hard for a new, large and valuable library. This we now have, and all are enjoying the benefit of it.

For the valuable services of the Rev. Dr. Bullock and Rev. J. O. Ruggles, who supplied the place of the Vicar during his enforced absence, the Parish is deeply indebted.

Death removed from us several very highly esteemed members, among whom were Miss Jane Hamilton, a devout Churchwoman and a representative of one of the oldest Church families of this place; and O. C. Cummings, kind and large hearted, whose liberality in assisting in every good work we shall greatly miss.

WEYMOUTH.

I am asked to give a short report of work done in this Parish during the past year. I presume that, as usual, the Parochial statistics will appear in the next Report of the B. H. M., and that the financial statement will also be given. I shall, then, now merely say, that of the four deaths (one was that of a child) that occurred in the parish two were those of elderly persons, whose resignation and trust in the only Saviour of sinners, gave surviving friends a comfortable hope in their death. The other was that of a young man, aged 23, who, after lingering from an insidious disease, finally succumbed. I visited him every week, except on two occasions, during several months. He resided 10 miles from Weymouth; and it was comforting to observe how willing he became to surrender his bright young life into the hands of his Heavenly Father. A large concourse of friends and neighbours attended his funeral; and the church at Barton, although a capacious one, barely sufficed to contain the large congregation. I preached from 1 Peter 1, 24. I have four aged parishioners, 9, 13 and 14 miles from me. I never leave these humble people without deriving comfort and instruction from their simple faith and pious trust in God, and having renewed evidence that it is the religion of our Blessed Redeemer alone which can, amid the pains and decay of nature, illumine with its unspeakable consolation, the dark passage which leads to the tomb.

In November the Rev. Dr. Partridge came to Weymouth, as a deputation from the B. H. M.; and in a very full and effective address, depicted the sad financial condition of the Society. The Rev. J. M. Withycombe who accompanied Dr. Partridge, made an effective speech, and the Rev. Dr. Ambrose also came over to help us.

Towards the close of his admirable address, Dr. Partridge referred to a Society recently established, called "The Society of the Treasury of God." This scheme recommends to the members of the church making contributions to this fund even in small amounts and upwards as parties are able. And if but one half of our Parishes would adopt it, it is surprising what large amounts would flow into the Treasury of the Board of Home Missions,

and thus the Committee, whose labours we cannot sufficiently appreciate, would be in a position to augment the insufficient stipends of a large proportion of our clergy, many of whom will, otherwise, be compelled from dire necessity, to seek more remunerative fields of labour, seeing that the Church in this Diocese is unable to make adequate provision for its self-denying and laborious clergy.

I feel constrained here, to bear my own as well as my people's grateful testimony to the effective aid rendered me in the discharge of ministerial duties, by the Rev. D. Prescott Allison, who, to the regret of all, left us after a residence of two and a quarter years in Weymouth, to become Curate of the Rev. W. B. King, Rector of St. Luke's, Halifax.

YARMOUTH.

This Parish was without a Rector for several months during the year 1891. The regular work of the parish was therefore interrupted, and until near the close of the year when the present Rectorship begun, no systematic efforts were made towards raising funds for either Parochial, or Diocesan, or Guild objects; as a consequence the Parish suffered loss. No minutely accurate report can now be given of the numerical, financial, or spiritual condition of the Parish for the year, as required by the Canon, and the figures herewith presented must be regarded as only approximately correct.

The position and prospects of the Parish are considered. There is a spirit of unity and zeal among the people. Divine service in the Parish church is regular and frequent, and is generally well attended. A weekly celebration of the Holy Communion has been established. The offertory is being made the one legitimate method of supporting the church, and is steadily increasing. Three Sunday Schools are conducted, and in addition to the services in the Parish Church, Mission services are held at All Saints Chapel, Milton, and St. John's Chapel, South End. An Adult Bible Class is conducted by the Rector, and two Confirmation Classes now regularly meet, each of which has a large number of members. Among Parish organizations in active operation are "The Ladies' Parish Guild"; "The Young Ladies' Auxiliary Guild—Daughters of the Church"; "The Girls' League—Golden Circle"; "The Young Mens' Club"; "The Boys' Club," &c. Each of these organizations has appropriate committees for Parish and general work. The finances of the Parish are generally satisfactory. A small debt remains on the Parish property, but so small that it can be paid off whenever there is a desire to do this. It is proposed to buy or build a Rectory. Liberal contributions have been made for Diocesan and other objects; and ere long the Parish will take its place among the foremost Parishes of the Diocese for liberality, zeal and effort. Its record in the past encourages hope for the future, and despite the disadvantage of its isolated position there is reason to anticipate a high state of efficiency, both spiritual and material. In its resources, its labors, its successes the Parish should be the equal of any Parish in the Diocese.

But the surrounding districts require more attention. It is a shame that towns and villages where the church should be strong and flourishing are wholly neglected. The claims of the Tusket Mission ought not longer be disregarded. With his present arrangement and duties the Rector of Yarmouth cannot render more active service to those places. But a system of lay-agency might be established under his supervision, with the sanction of the Bishop, and supported by Board of Home Missions, which, if

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effectively worked, would soon prepare the way for planting the Church throughout this county and in many contiguous towns. What an awful thing it is that there is not a single Parish or Mission between Yarmouth and Weymouth, on the one side, and not a single service between Yarmouth and Barrington on the other! Yet church-people are scattered all over these districts, and they ask for the services of the church. The church has failed to provide for the wants of its own children, and they are in consequence falling into the hands of strangers. Can nothing be done to remedy this defect—to supply this need? It is one of the pressing demands of the Province; it should be one of the burning questions of the Diocese. The Parish of Yarmouth will do its duty in the matter, if the Board of Home Missions, and other parts of the Diocese will do theirs. At least the Mission of Tusket, which has been closed for more than a year, should be provided. With proper sanction and support the Rector of Yarmouth will undertake to provide for Divine Service and for Pastoral oversight.

HALIFAX.

St. Paul's is the oldest Parish and largest church in the Diocese of Nova Scotia. It was opened for Divine service Sept. 2, 1750, and accommodates nearly 2000 people. The present Rector is the seventh. It is centrally situated, and included all classes and conditions of people, about 425 families being on the parochial list. Contrary to the general idea a majority of the attendants are of the young and middle aged, and during the past two years, the congregations, especially in the evening, have been large. The work carried on is that of a large Church of England city Parish. The services are bright and apparently attractive; the Wednesday evening service is well attended; and the daily services during Lent also.

A regular Church evangelistic work is carried on the whole year round by the Church Evangelist, Mr. Winfield, (formerly under the Bishop of Bedford in the East London Mission), and hundreds hear the simple gospel every week within the lines of the Church, without any need of the Salvation Army or other services.

A special parochial Church Mission is held during Holy Week in Lent, and the week preceding, conducted by the Rector and his Curate, and preceded by a service of song, the people singing hymns for 15 minutes while the congregation assembles.

Every house in the Parish is visited by the Scripture Reader, and the names of all Church people enrolled.

Amongst the Parochial works are the following:—

The Sunday School—Thirty-five teachers, nine officers; 386 scholars; total 430; average attendance last month, 315.

The Young Peoples' Society—an organization of the young men and young women of the church. Objects: social, devotional, and active church work. Amongst its best work, is the uniting the younger church members, hospital visiting and sending flowers to all sick.

The St. Andrew's Brotherhood—an organization of young men to bring young men to Christ and the church, and pray for young men. They visit all hotels and boarding-houses in the Parish weekly to invite men to church.

The Ladies' Working Society—to encourage poor people to work, and provide them with material. The Rector's wife and 16 other ladies form the committee.

The Children's Sewing Class—an excellent organization for teaching the children to sew. 9 ladies also are on this committee.

The Band of Hope—meets every Friday at 7. About 100 members, and a good managing committee

The District visitors—20 ladies. A good work.

The Mite Society—to raise money to support the Missionary at Country Harbour. Fourteen ladies do this, and raise about \$500.00.

The Bible Classes:—At the Rector's on Friday afternoon for all. On Monday evening for teachers: Mr. Skey's for men; Miss Hodggers', Miss Tremaine's and Miss Uniacke's for young women; Mrs. Winfield's for married women.

The Sister's Church Committee—for superintending the chancel and vestry arrangements, the linen, the communion cloths, etc.

The Alms House, and the C. and C. C. S. work might be mentioned also.

The Church raised last year \$5668.81 for current expenses; \$3514.00 for Home and Parish objects, including \$650.00 as a gift to the Bishop, \$609.00 for the poor, \$1155.00 towards repairs; and \$3801.19 to various Missions, including \$350.00 to Foreign, \$178.69 to the W. & O., and \$120.00 to B. H. M., \$700.00 to C. & C. C. S., and 10 other objects.

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Reports of Deputation Meeting held during 1891.

AMHERST.

On Monday the 23rd of Nov. I left by the 2nd I. C. R. for Springhill, and owing to a strange error in a post card written the previous week the meeting which was to have been held that evening in Parrsboro was put off till Tuesday and consequently was not held.

On Tuesday evening the 24th of Nov. a large and interesting meeting was held in Springhill. The attendance, notwithstanding many hindrances, was very large, and the attention most earnest. After a short service and a few introductory remarks by the Rector, the lay-reader, Mr. Stansfield, gave an interesting address upon Mission work in Cape Breton. I followed with an address upon the state and needs of the B. H. M.—the duty and plan of systematic giving—an explanation of the card and envelope system, concluding with an appeal to the heart for the consecration of their lives to the Master.

The offertory was \$9.71.

On Wednesday morning Mr. Wilson and myself took train for Stellarton, arriving in time for the afternoon session. I was present at the session, and some profitable and interesting discussions were had upon the B. H. M. work, and the best means of forwarding its interests. In the evening a B. H. M. meeting had been arranged at Westville, and a good congregation assembled at 7.30, but unfortunately owing to the failure of some person to convey the Rector's message, the Stellarton party, consisting of the Convener and all the clergy and a number of friends, on their arrival by the 8.15 found the congregation dispersed. The church was lighted however and a nice service was held, the Convener by request preaching an *ad clerum* sermon, which was in reality an explanation of the Board's aims and hopes.

On Thursday the 26th Mr. Almon and myself proceeded to Pugwash where, on Thursday evening, a very fair meeting was held.

With regard to Pugwash, the Deputation feel bound to remark that the needs of the Mission are very great, and the case of the clergyman very trying. It was supposed that the bringing of the Railway would bring business and families to the place. On the contrary its effect has been (as the Conductor of the train informed me on the way here) to take families away.

Mr. Bent has lost by death and removal family after family, his best supporters now being gone and none coming in to take their place, nor is there at present any prospect of an influx of new people. It seems hard—nay, it is hard and it is unfair—that instead of receiving an increase of \$50.00, this Missionary should have \$50.00 taken away. Had I had the slightest knowledge of the true facts of the case I would have urged the injustice of taking it from a place like this while retaining it in

parishes that are financially prosperous. If the funds of the Board make it impossible to give an increase, and necessary to make a reduction, then the reduction should be made in some other parish. My colleague thoroughly corroborates this opinion.

The service in the church was a very good one, and the collection \$4.13.

On Friday the Deputation proceeded to Wallace. The night was dark, the roads muddy, the church at some distance from the village, but we had a good meeting and profound attention. The collection was \$4.08.

Mr. Bent has great hopes with regard to the church prospects of this place.

Leaving Wallace on Saturday we came to Oxford Junction and there separated for Springhill and Halifax.

In conclusion I would suggest most earnestly the following ideas:—

1. That by a Canon of Synod or otherwise a definite Sunday be appointed for the collection for B. H. M.—Trinity Sunday or Whit Sunday being preferred, and that the collection be made in each parish or mission within two weeks of that appointed Sunday and sent to the Diocesan Secretary within one month of the day of collection. (At present this collection is taken anyhow and at any time—often on a Good Friday or Thanksgiving Day—not even on Sunday much less a great Festival Sunday). After one year of possible grumbling all will concur in this.

2. That by a Canon of Synod or otherwise arrangements be made for the holding of a Missionary meeting in each Parish and Mission throughout the Diocese (during the Autumn or Winter) for the threefold purpose of imparting information with regard to the Board and systematic giving, stirring up the spiritual life of the people and receiving offerings. An addition of \$500 a year to the income of the Board might be expected. (In the Diocese of Ontario in 1890 the Missionary meeting collections alone brought in \$2,059.49). These to be arranged three months before and definitely adhered to.

If this is done I think we need have no fear for the future of the B. H. M. Funds.

ANNAPOLIS.

The Deputation district entrusted to my care was that of the Annapolis Deanery and Yarmouth. Early in November a meeting was held at Annapolis, at which I advocated the claims of the various funds of the Diocese, but especially of the Board of Home Missions. There was a good attendance, and much interest was manifested. My efforts were strenuously seconded by the Rector, Rev. H. How, who is emphati-

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cally the right man in the right place. No meeting was held at Granville, as the collection for the Board had already been made. The next day a service and meeting was held at Digby, on the way I was joined by Rev. J. M. Withycombe of Clementsport, who ably and kindly assisted in the rest of the work. A good service was given us at Digby with the hearty support of the Rev. Dr. Ambrose, who, we are all sorry to hear, has since resigned the parish. He has worked zealously for the best interests of the Parish for many years, and Trinity Church will stand as a continual reminder to the people of his earnest and successful labours.

From Digby your deputation proceeded to Weymouth where the venerable Rural Dean, Dr. Filleul, received us with his wonted hospitality, and in the charm of his delightful family a pleasant day was spent. The service was held in the Parish Church, and was attended by many of the business men, who evinced great attention to the explanation of the principles of the Society of the Treasury of God, which were carefully explained at all the meetings. From Weymouth we went to Yarmouth, where we found the new Rector Rev. Dr. Cartwright, with a financial scheme already in operation, very similar to that advocated by us. The schoolhouse in Yarmouth was well filled, and much energetic work is being done. Their Parish must eventually take the leading position of the Diocese outside of Halifax itself. There are men of means and business experience, who are not backward in placing both at the disposal of the Church. In each instance the principles of systematic and proportionate giving were strongly inculcated. It cannot be but that much good was done, the fruit of which will be seen later on. It is to be hoped that the Deputation System will be worked to its utmost extent during the coming season, when a large increase to the funds of the Board must accrue.
