

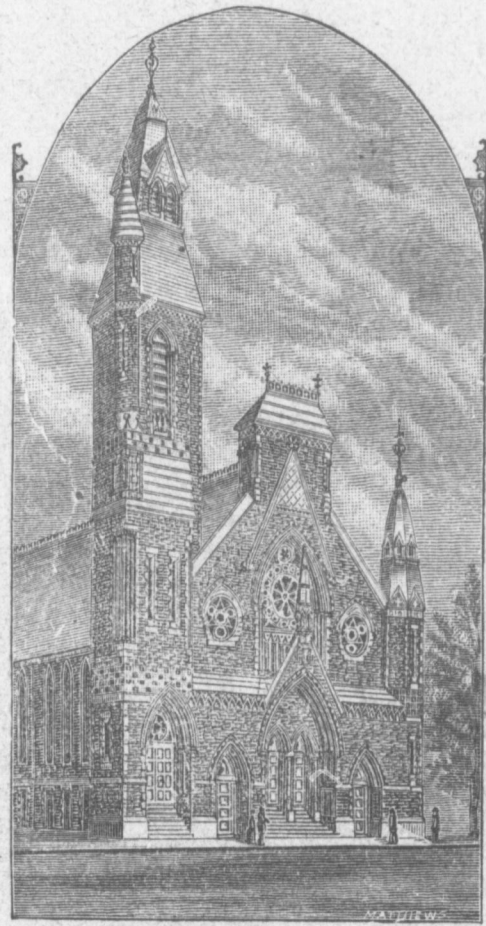

From St. Lawrence St., east to Amherst St., north as far as Sherbrooke St.

DISTRICT NO. IV—P. M. MAC TAVISH, *Elder.*

From Sherbrooke Street, included, northwards to the city limits, and from east side of St. Lawrence Street, included, eastward to city limits.

DISTRICT NO. V—JAMES ROBERTSON, *Elder.*

From St. Lawrence Street, to Mance Street, included, and from Dorchester Street, northwards to city limits.

DISTRICT NO. VI—THOMAS GRAHAM, *Elder.*

From St. Lawrence Street to Bleury Street, both included, and from Craig Street to Dorchester Street, included.

DISTRICT NO. VII—WILLIAM DARLING, *Elder.*

From Mance Street, excluded, to University Street, and from Craig and St. Antoine Sts. northwards to city limits.

DISTRICT NO. VIII—ROBERT STEWART, *Elder.*

From St. Antoine Street, north to city limits, and from University Street, excluded, westwards to city limits.

DISTRICT NO. IX—J. M. FARQUHAR, *Elder.*

From Dalhousie Square westwards to city limits, and from Craig and St. Antoine Streets southwards to the River.

TO THE MEMBERS AND ADHERENTS OF ST. GABRIEL
CHURCH.

DEAR BRETHREN,

The past year has been one of earnest work in our congregation. Everything has already settled down into its normal condition in our new sphere, and we have begun to grapple with the fresh responsibilities that belong to us, now that questions relating to the external affairs of the church are mostly disposed of. Three years of our second century have already gone, and we must not forget that we have a past to maintain. Let us see to it that the record shall be a constantly improving one.

The year has been marked by no very stirring event in our church life. The movement begun at the Annual Congregational Meeting last year, to provide for the extinction of the debt upon the Church, has been kept going on quietly, as the committee undertaking the work have had time to prosecute the canvass for subscriptions. It would probably have been better, if an effort had been made to wait upon all the people simultaneously to solicit contributions to the building Fund, and if the authorities of the Church had devoted a few days to this work, as soon as the scheme was launched. The whole of the people could have been seen in a week, if the work had been subdivided, and prosecuted with enthusiasm. As things are, a considerable number of the people have not yet been overtaken in the canvass, and half the amount of the debt has not been yet quite provided for. The matter should not, however, be left to drag too long. The end to be gained is too important not to be enthusiastically striven for. We must be able to call the church in every sense our own as soon as possible. We must have a larger revenue in order to fulfill our part in the community creditably. The salaries paid are too small for a church of the importance of St. Gabriel's. And, then, there is much outside work we could undertake if we were out of debt. The people ought to know this, and not be allowed to think that things are entirely satisfactory. But so long as there is a debt on the building, even one of manageable proportions like ours, it to some degree interferes with a congregation's duty in other directions.

The internal affairs of the Church are in a most healthy state. The congregation is thoroughly organized. We have tried to find a place for everyone ; and if all are not working for the Master, in connection

with St. Gabriel's, it cannot be pleaded that it is because of our lack of machinery. During the last year two important departures were made : a Sabbath School teachers' meeting was instituted, and lady visitors were appointed for the Elders' districts. To speak of the visitors first,—they fill a gap long felt in the congregation. Caring for the stranger, the sick, the sorrowing and the needy is peculiarly a Christian office ; and our visitors perform it in the name of the congregation. The Teachers' meeting has been held at 7.30 on Wednesday evenings, immediately before the weekly prayer conference. This proves advantageous to all interests. The Teachers get the benefit of the devotional exercises which follow the study of the lesson, without moving from their seats ; and parents and others, who are interested in the systematic study of the Scriptures, either for their personal profit, or for the better guiding of their children's Sabbath studies at home, by coming half an hour earlier than the prayer meeting, which they feel it a duty and privilege to attend, gain the two ends, of giving themselves to the Word and to Prayer. But we want to see the Lecture Hall full every Wednesday evening. In this active age, in which so much work is attempted, through so many channels, there is special need of devotion. The church's multiform machinery needs to be kept in good running order by the oil of grace ; and this can be had only in answer to prayer. Let us, then, as many as really would wish to spend an hour during the week in company with Jesus, come together every Wednesday evening, expecting Him ; and we shall not be disappointed. His word is pledged to us, and it never fails. *"If two of you shall agree on earth as touching any thing that they shall ask, it shall be done for them of my Father which is in Heaven. For where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them."*

TWENTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES
OF ST. GABRIEL CHURCH,
For the year ending 31st December, 1888.

Reviewing the financial position of the Church for the year just closed, if we have not yet conquered all difficulties or made quite as rapid progress as we desire, on the whole, considering the heavy responsibilities we have shouldered, the outlook seems very encouraging and is losing many of its terrors. If the Treasurer's Statement does not balance as we would wish, it is because a large portion of the expenditure charged is for debt previously incurred but settled within the year, and which it is hoped is the end of the expenses encountered at the beginning of the occupancy of the new Church. These cleared away, the management will be in a much better position to deal with the debt on the Church.

The Committee in charge of the Purchase and Interest Fund will present their statement of what has been accomplished in that direction, which so far may be looked upon as very encouraging.

The ordinary revenue though not yet up to the weekly average, estimated as required to meet all the demands upon it for the liberal support of ordinances, has advanced, and the arrears for the year are inconsiderable. Ordinary collections have much improved but the Weekly offerings which are the real support of the church and test of progress, do not seem to keep pace with the filling up of the pews, which is undoubtedly going on, slowly it may appear to our impatient hopes, but steadily, and the average attendance comparing favorably with that observed at other churches with much more powerful organizations.

The Trustees wish to press this matter of the discrepancy between the attendance or occupation of pews, and the offerings, on the notice of the congregation at this their annual business gathering, and trust they will give the subject the consideration which it deserves, and will not separate until they have fully investigated the cause and taken some steps to provide a speedy remedy. It is a matter of interest to every member and adherent that has identified him or herself with the welfare of the Church, to feel assured that all are helping conscientiously in the work of building up a strong congregation in this part of the City.

In this matter members who must surely desire to see the church to which they belong prosper, can lend valuable help to the management by pointing out to friends or acquaintances not attached to any other church, the advantage of our voluntary, but stated contributing, and furnish them with the circular about to be issued which explains the method, and thus possibly persuade many who are careless about such things to cast in their lot with a congregation which in proportion to its numbers probably has a larger number of workers than any other.

In connection with the expansion of the congregation, it is possible that many are still unaware how much the gallery has been improved during the past year. Those who examined the place when the church was first occupied would be much surprised and pleased at the effect produced by the new arrangement of the sitting accommodation, with its handsome furnishings provided by the Ladies Aid Society, while the access to the pews has been entirely changed, substituting a firm and comfortable footing in place of the objectionable slope which formerly existed.

Now that this expense has been incurred in order to make the gallery more in keeping with the rest of the church, it is hoped that even those who have no thought or desire to change their sitting, will at least visit the place, and see for themselves how admirably it is suited to the purposes for which it was designed. They will then be able more intelligently to recommend the gallery to any friends that might be desirous of joining the Church.

The Trustees had occasion in the last annual report to make honorable mention of the Ladies of St. Gabriel's, of the great value of this Aid Society to the Church, and the timely aid then afforded to the management.

It is therefore a great pleasure to report at this time that the Ladies Aid Society has supplemented their former magnificent donations by a further sum of \$100.00 which they have placed at the disposal of the Committee in charge of the Purchase and Interest Fund.

An incident of the past year to be always remembered with satisfaction will be, that the St. Gabriel Church Congregation were in a position to offer for some little time christian hospitality to the people of St. James Street Methodist Church, who are so soon to be our neighbors, by giving them the use of the School-rooms for their weekly prayer meeting, and we have reason to believe that this simple act of courtesy was warmly appreciated by the congregation to which it was tendered.

In the sober and peaceful relations between Pastor and people prevailing in the ordinary life of a Presbyterian Church, it is only at rare intervals that any opportunity is afforded the Congregation of giving expression to any feeling approaching to enthusiasm ; but recently when it was learned that the 25th anniversary of the married life of our respected Minister was at hand, and when it was called to mind that our Pastor and his beloved helpmate had spent almost the whole of that period in our midst, the occurrence was at once hailed with pleasure and made the occasion of a general demonstration on the part of the adherents of the Church.

An Annual Report has little space for all that might be said or felt at such a time. when a Congregation hastened with full hearts to tender their congratulations on the evening of the 29th December, 1888, but the management respectfully submits that the memory of such an

agreeable duty should be preserved. The people on that occasion paid their respects to their Pastor and counsellor who during all these years had devoted himself with unwearied energy under the Divine blessing to point the way to a higher life, and to the friend who through struggles and trials forgetful of self was ever ready with a cheering word for the despondent and the first to rejoice with them in their successes.

The cordiality with which the event was celebrated was most gratifying and could not fail to produce a lasting and beneficial effect on the best interests of the Church.

In closing their report at this time, the Trustees desire to put on record their thanks for the consideration constantly shown them by the congregation while endeavouring to carry on the temporal affairs of the Church, and for the hearty support afforded them at all times in their efforts for the general welfare.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CONGREGATION OF
ST. GABRIEL CHURCH.

The Twenty-Second Annual Meeting of St. Gabriel Church, in accordance with the Constitution and Bye-Laws, was held in the Lecture Room of the Church, on Wednesday Evening, January 9th, 1889.

On motion Mr. John Stewart, was called to take the chair, and Mr. J. M. Farquhar, requested to act as Secretary.

It was then moved by Mr. A McNaughton, and seconded by Mr. Loughead, that the Meeting be adjourned until Wednesday Evening, February 16th. *Carried.*

The Meeting then adjourned.

The adjourned Annual Meeting of the Congregation of St. Gabriel Church, was held in the Lecture Room, on the evening of Wednesday, February 16th, 1889.

On motion Rev. Dr. Campbell was called on to preside, and Robert Stewart, Jr. to act as Secretary.

The Meeting was opened by the Chairman with the usual devotional exercises.

The Secretary then read the minutes of the last Annual Meeting which were confirmed.

The Report of the Trustees for the past year, and the Treasurer's Statement of Accounts, Receipts and Disbursements, duly audited, were presented and read; also a report of the Special Building and Interest Fund.

Rev. Dr. Campbell then gave some interesting statistics regarding the Congregation, and was followed by Mr. Archibald McNaughton, who thanked the people in behalf of the Building Committee, for the liberal manner in which they had received the collectors, and also expressed a hope, that renewed efforts would be put forth during the coming year to wipe off the balance of the Church debt.

Moved by Mr. James Robertson, and seconded by Mr. James Harper,

"That the Reports and Financial Statements as now read, be received and adopted, and printed for the information of the Congregation." *Carried.*

Moved by Mr. Wm. Foulis, seconded by Mr. Robert McCulloch,

"That this Congregation desire to acknowledge, their profound sense of the Divine Blessing, which has been bestowed upon them as a Congregation during another year, and while giving all Glory to God, who directs and controls all things, this meeting recognizes that thanks are due to the several organizations, whose co-operation has contributed, to the furtherance of the Master's Kingdom." *Carried.*

It was moved by Mr. Richard Lynch, and seconded by Mr. Archibald McAllister,

“That as the Ladies’ Aid Society has been especially zealous in assisting in the establishment of the Congregation, in this Building, both by direct assistance to the Financial Trusts, and also by the embellishment of the Church, the thanks of this meeting are hereby tendered to them.” Carried unanimously.

Moved by Mr. Wm. Patton, seconded by Mr. C. Byrd,

“That the Congregation recognize the increased arduous duties of the Treasurer, and of the Secretary, and the hearty thanks of this meeting are hereby tendered to the Treasurer, Mr. Thomas Graham, and to the Secretary, Mr. Wm. Reed, for the time and work they have devoted to the duties of their respective offices.” Carried unanimously.

It was then moved by Mr. Wm. Reed, seconded by Mr. Archibald Watt,

“That in accordance with Article Three of the Bye-Laws, the following be elected members of the Board of Trustees, to fill the vacancies occurring at this time, Messrs. Wm. Patton, J. M. Farquhar, John MacTavish, and Wm. Foulis.” Carried.

Moved by Mr. Wm. Reed, seconded by Mr. A. Watt,

“That Mr. Robert McCulloch, and Mr. John Loughhead, be appointed Auditors for the ensuing year.” Carried.

It was then moved by Mr. Wm. Darling, seconded by Mr. Archibald McNaughton,

“That the Congregation desires at this time to record its warmest thanks to the members of the Choir, for the very efficient manner in which they have conducted the Psalmody of the Church services during the past year.” Carried unanimously.

Moved by Robert Stewart, Jr., seconded by Mr. J. A. Stuart, and carried,

“That as the Sabbath School is an important part of the Congregational Organization, the Trustees be instructed to make provision for its efficient maintainance during the ensuing year.”

The Rev. John Scrimger, M.A., by request of the Chairman, gave a spirited address, congratulating the Pastor and Congregation, on the success of their various undertakings during the year, and wishing them a continuance of the same.

A vote of thanks having been tendered to the Rev. Dr. Campbell for the efficient manner in which he had presided, refreshments were served by the Ladies, and the meeting resolved itself into one of a social character for the remainder of the evening.

ABSTRACT OF ANNUAL REPORT OF SABBATH SCHOOL.

The Festival, to which the children look forward, with glad thoughts, for weeks before it arrives, came off on the evening of Friday, January 18th, 1889.

The reports submitted were very gratifying. The total number on the roll in 1888 was 291, an increase of 28. There was an increase of 30 in the average attendance. The average attendance of the staff has never before been so high. Four new classes were formed during the year, and one was discontinued, its members going into the Bible Class. The Sabbath collections increased from \$83.99 in 1887 to \$173.26 in 1888. Mr. T. McIntosh's medal for bringing the largest number of new scholars was taken by Geo. A. Campbell; the Superintendent also gave a medal to Martha Stuart, for the large number she brought. Only 21 new books were added to the Library and Rev. Dr. Campbell, made an appeal to the friends present to help to fill up the shelves. Suitable books will be gladly received, or the means of procuring them, from any one interested in the prosperity of our School.

The Mission Funds were distributed, by a vote of the Children and Teachers, to the following objects:—
