

LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY,

As adopted at a General Meeting of the Society, held in the City of Toronto, on the third day of August, 1855; and amended at General Meetings held on the 13th day of April, 1880, and 18th day of November, 1887.

[UNDER THE ACT OF INCORPORATION.]

ARTICLE I. This Society shall be denominated the "UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY," having the same object in view as the British and Foreign Bible Society—that is, the circulation of the Bible, without note or comment.

II. This Society shall endeavour to unite all Bible Societies in the Province, and to concentrate their operations, in order to give more efficiency to the whole.

III. This Society shall maintain, in the City of Toronto, a general dépôt of Bibles and Testaments, from which all Societies in connection with it shall be supplied with the Scriptures at the lowest price at which they can be afforded.

IV. The business of the Society shall be carried on by a Board of Directors, to consist of a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer and Secretaries, and a representative from each Branch, as provided in Article V., together with twenty clerical and twenty lay members, so selected as to give the Board always, as before, a representative character as regards the principal religious bodies interested in the work of the Society, five of whom shall form a quorum. The five clerical and five lay members who shall have attended the least number of meetings of the Board shall not be eligible for re-election, except in cases where the non-attendance has arisen from illness or absence from the country, in which cases the Board may nominate such member or members for re-election.

V. Each Branch Society shall be entitled to a representative on the General Board. The President of the Branch shall be *ex-officio* such representative, or any other resident member whom the Committee may appoint as a substitute, who shall be a member of such Branch.

VI. At any meeting of the Directors, the President, or, in his absence, the Vice-President, first upon the list then present, and in absence of such Vice-President, the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be chosen for that purpose, shall preside.

VII. Each person paying annually one dollar shall be a member of this Society; and persons paying fifty dollars at any one time, either to this Society or to any of the Societies in connection therewith, or through them to the British and Foreign Bible Society, or who may have rendered important services, shall, at the discretion of the Directors, be declared Life Members.

VIII. Each Life Member of this Society shall be furnished with a certificate of membership, under the corporate seal of the Society, duly signed by the President and Secretaries.

IX. The Board of Directors for the time being shall have the appointment of the Permanent Secretary, Agents, Depository, Colporteurs, Book-keeper, and Assistants of the Society, and the fixing of all salaries and allowances; and shall have the superintendence and management of all the property, real and personal, of the Corporation, as well as the management and control of its general affairs

and the appropriation of its funds, with full power to enact such rules as may be requisite to effect the objects contemplated by the Act of Incorporation.

X. The Board of Directors shall meet for the transaction of business on the third Tuesday of each month, at the hour of 7.30 p.m. Special meetings may be called by the Secretaries at any time, at the request of the President, or of any three Directors.

XI. The Annual General Meeting of the Society shall be held on the second Wednesday in the month of May in each and every year, or at such other time as the Directors, for the time being, may deem best for the interests of the Society; when the Officers and Directors for the ensuing year shall be chosen; a report of the operations of the Society during the foregoing year shall be presented, together with the Treasurer's and Depository's accounts duly audited. Special general meetings may be called at any time by the Board.

XII. In case of the death or removal of any Director or Officer during the year, the Board shall at the next ensuing meeting thereof fill such vacancy.

XIII. No alteration of these By-laws shall be made except at a General Meeting of the Society, and after one month's notice of the proposed alteration has been given to the Board.

RESOLUTION PASSED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS RELATIVE
TO GRANTS TO SUNDAY-SCHOOLS, SEPTEMBER, 1878.

That in all applications for grants of Bibles to Sunday schools, the applicant be requested to furnish the Secretaries with an account of the state of the school; the number of scholars and teachers; the amount of funds at the disposal of the managers; who are its officers; and why it is necessary to make such application; all of which should in every case be certified by a minister of the Gospel, or some person of known respectability. And further, this Board recommends that the Secretaries make grants in future only to destitute settlements; reporting the same to the next General Meeting of the Board of Directors.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE RELATIVE TO "GRANTS TO
SUNDAY-SCHOOLS," ADOPTED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS,
18TH JUNE, 1888.

That the forms of application for grants, already in use, as authorized by the Board in October, 1867, and September, 1878, regarding Sunday-schools, be continued, although it is right to state that the superintendents of schools have not availed themselves of the privileges offered in the form of September, 1878, to any extent.

In the opinion of your Committee, mission churches and schools, under denominational auspices, are not in general to be considered fit objects for the gratuities of the Society; but missions among Indians, Jews, French-Canadians, Chinese, Italians, etc., though under denominational auspices, are not to be taken as coming under this general rule.

RULES

RECOMMENDED TO BRANCH SOCIETIES.

I. That a Society be formed in connection with the British and Foreign Bible Society, through the medium of the Upper Canada Bible Society, for the purpose of contributing to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment; the English copies being of the authorized version *only*.

II. That the Society be denominated "THE ————— BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY."

III. That all persons subscribing one dollar annually, or five dollars at one time, shall be members of this Society.

IV. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and a Committee consisting of not less than ————— other members; five to constitute a quorum.

V. That all Ministers of the Gospel who join the Society shall be reckoned members of the Committee.

VI. That the Committee shall meet quarterly or oftener; time and place of meeting to be fixed by themselves.

VII. That the Committee divide their sphere of operations into Districts, and appoint visitors for each district, to solicit subscriptions and donations from the inhabitants, and also to ascertain the wants of the people regarding the Word of God.

VIII. That the whole of the subscriptions and donations received by this Society, shall, after deducting incidental expenses, be remitted, yearly, to the Upper Canada Bible Society, for the purpose of translating the Word of God into the Indian languages, and for supplying other nations, through the Parent Institution, with the pure Word of God; or for the purchase of Bibles and Testaments to supply the neighbourhood *at cost price*, or gratuitously to those who cannot purchase.

IX. That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held on the ——— day of ———, in each year, at ———, when the accounts shall be presented; the proceedings of the past year stated; a new Committee appointed, and a Report agreed upon; the Report to be published under the direction of the Committee if required.

X. That on the formation of a new Committee, the President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and such three-fourths of the other members of the Committee as have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

FIFTIETH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY,

SUBMITTED AT THE ANNIVERSARY MEETING HELD AT
TORONTO, WEDNESDAY, 21ST MAY, 1890.

Through the goodness of God, the Upper Canada Bible Society is privileged this year to celebrate its Fiftieth Anniversary. It is really sixty-one years since the Society was organized as the York Auxiliary Bible Society; a name which was changed when York became the City of Toronto a few years later (1834). In the year 1840 however, the Toronto Bible Society, having meantime organized a number of Branches throughout Upper Canada, considered that it was amply justified in assuming a Provincial character, under the name which it has since borne. The meeting at which the new name was adopted, was the eleventh Anniversary of the Toronto Society, and was held in the Adelaide Street Wesleyan Methodist Church, on the 6th of May, 1840. A melancholy interest attaches to the fact, that of all the office-bearers then elected, and of the speakers who addressed the meeting, held just fifty years ago, there is not a single survivor.

With the passing years, the Society has gradually increased in usefulness and prosperity, until this jubilee year, when in many respects its operations have been more extended and successful than in any previous year.

In reviewing the past, we would recognize the over-ruling providence of God, who has watched over the organization from its earliest infancy, and guided its directors in the important duty of aiding the parent society in circulating the Holy Scriptures, both at home and abroad. In presenting our report this semi-centennial year, we are confident that the detailed statements of the different departments of our work which follow will furnish ample evidence that God continues to bless our efforts.

That the Bible is the only book adapted to all the spiritual needs of mankind, is attested by the marked and beneficial changes produced through its influence in Pagan and other lands, where false religions and corrupted forms of Christianity had previously prevailed—testifying to the power of the Written Word, in convincing of sin—directing to Jesus as the only Saviour of men, and instructing the ignorant and superstitious.

The preaching of the Word is important; "How shall they hear without a preacher?" The circulation of the Scriptures is equally important; "Search the Scriptures, for they are they which testify of Me," said the Lord Jesus.

In order that they may be enabled to obey this command of our Saviour—the Word of God must be placed in the hands of our fellow-men, who are less privileged than we are, and have not yet heard the "joyful sound." To this exalted service, namely—the giving to all peoples and nations, printed in their own language—the old, old Gospel story, which

proclaims redemption and eternal life through Jesus Christ; we as members of the Bible Society, and as professing Christians, are called. The promises to those who are thus engaged are very precious and inspiring; "Blessed are ye that sow beside all waters;" "He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again with rejoicing; bringing his sheaves with him." These assurances of blessing and reward have been incentives to earnest action in the past, and it is encouraging to note the fact, that the same spirit of devotion to the cause and practical activity characterizes the work of the Branches generally in connection with this Society.

The Society is to be congratulated on the fact, that notwithstanding the depression in business, the partial failure of crops in some districts, and the low prices realized for produce of the farm; also the epidemic which prevailed for a time throughout the whole country, we are able to report that the returns show a considerable advance. The total receipts for the year amount to \$33,444.41, being an increase of \$825.85 over the previous year, and is the largest annual revenue ever attained in the history of the Society.

It will be gratifying to learn that this increase is derived chiefly from contributions of the Branches, and sales of Scriptures at the Depositories, and by our Colporteurs. Special donations and bequests (which are always very acceptable) were much less this year than last.

During the past year we have been reminded "that this is not our rest," in the removal by death of two of our Vice-Presidents, viz., the Rev. John A. Williams, D.D., and the Hon. John Macdonald. With regret we have also to record the sudden death of William Gooderham, Esq., who had officiated as a Director. Messrs. Macdonald and Gooderham were liberal supporters, and subscribed largely to the erection of the new Bible House, and Mr. Gooderham has bequeathed \$10,000 to the funds of this Society.

We would likewise refer to the death of Mr. John E. Taylor, who had been long engaged in the work of Colportage, formerly in England; and for the last ten years as an earnest and successful Colporteur for this Society. He will doubtless be remembered kindly in many parts of Ontario.

AGENCY AND VISITATION OF BRANCHES.

The Permanent Agent, and the Provisional Agents have made the annual visitation of the Branches assigned to them respectively for the year—services which have entailed much labour and considerable expense. The Rev. J. G. Manly, Permanent Agent, reports that the year just closed was the most enjoyable and successful ever experienced in his many years of service in connection with the Bible Society. And the Provisional Agents generally report much interest and sympathy in the work of the Society.

Special visits were made by Directors and others, on the invitation of the officers of the Branches at Belleville, Hamilton, Georgetown, Brampton, St. Thomas and Orillia.

A number of the Branches held their anniversary meetings, being addressed by the local clergy and officers, thus saving the expense of an agent's visit. But we regret to say that a few of the Branches which undertook the conduct of their anniversaries failed to hold any meetings, or send out Collectors, consequently this neglect will cause the loss of their revenue for the year. Several of the Branches have not yet reported, so that we are not aware whether they have held their usual meetings, or

made the annual canvass for subscriptions in their respective districts. This is much to be regretted. As our fiscal year closes on 31st March, all reports should be sent in by that date.

Generally speaking, the officers of the Branches are very faithful, and are worthy of the highest praise for their devotion and promptitude in performing their voluntary duties.

The following new Branches have been organized or resuscitated during the year, in Ontario:—Lynden, Flinton, Port Arthur, Rat Portage, Sunbury, Dromore, Canfield, Coboconk, Horning's Mills, Holland Centre, Chatsworth, Corbetton, Whitfield, Cedarville, Walter's Falls, Kilsyth (16).

The Medonte Branch has been closed, having been associated with the Branch at Coldwater

MANITOBA AND THE NORTH-WEST TERRITORIES.

Aggressive work has been done in Manitoba and the North-west Territories. Eighteen new Branches have been established, and Bibles and Testaments, amounting to a large sum, have been sent to stock these new Depositories. The Rev. J. Dyke, of Fort William, Ont., visited 13 Branches in Manitoba and organized 8 other new Branches. He was engaged 31 days in the work and travelled 2,839 miles. The Rev. Alfred Andrews, of Viriden, visited 15 Branches and formed 7 more new Branches. His tour occupied 22 days, during which time he travelled 982 miles. The Rev. J. M. Harrison, of Regina, visited 10 Branches and opened 2 new Branches, covering a distance of 411 miles in 14 days. The Rev. A. J. McLeod, of Banff, visited 7 Branches. A severe snow storm blockaded the railway trains for several days, which prevented him from visiting two other places according to appointment. These, as well as other towns, desiring to have Branches of this Society will be visited (D.V.) by one of our agents during the ensuing year.

The needs of this vast Territory are great and pressing. Bible Depositories should be multiplied as early as possible.

The Branches organized in this Territory are showing signs of activity, and several have already sent us encouraging remittances which augur well for the future.

The new Branches formed during the past year in Manitoba and the North-West, are:—Morris, Gladstone, Rapid City, Birtle, Morden, Manitou, Boissevain, Deloraine, Wawa Nesa, Treherne, Carman, Holland, Douglas, Alexander, Souris, Elkhorn and Grenfell, (17).

From a letter dated 7th May, from Wm. Redford Mulock, Esq., the efficient Secretary of the Branch at Winnipeg, we quote: "Our Annual Meeting was held on Monday 5th inst. The Rev. Dr. King was chairman, and the speaker was the Rev. Dr. Grattan Guinness, of London, England. We had a better meeting than any that has been held since 1883. The speaker undoubtedly was the great attraction, and he gave a most excellent address, for which the Society is deeply indebted to him. He has thrown new life into us up here, and we hope the year's accounts will show it."

COLPORTAGE.

The work of Colportage has been faithfully prosecuted in Ontario by our Colporteurs, Messrs. Taylor, Cromar, Dean, Lockhart, Sinclair and Armstrong, and notwithstanding difficulties peculiar to the past year, the sales of Scriptures has been considerably increased.

As stated in our Report for the previous year (page 4) a renewed arrangement was made by the Board for the circulation of our Bibles and

Testaments in Manitoba and the North-west Territories, through the Colporteurs of the U. C. Religious Tract and Book Society. The sum of \$1,000 was appropriated for this purpose, but at the close of the season only \$430.84 was required as our proportion of the expense. This arrangement, which has been carried on for two years, was considered satisfactory and expedient. It was therefore decided to continue it for the ensuing year.

QUEBEC AUXILIARY.

We are pleased to be able to report that our Branches have again contributed liberally to assist the Quebec Auxiliary; \$1,357.56 have been appropriated by the Branches, which sum having been augmented by a special donation of \$500 by the Board, the whole unpaid amount was forwarded to the officers at Quebec on 3rd May. In a letter dated 5th May, from the Rev. Edward J. Stobo, Secretary of the Quebec Auxiliary, acknowledging receipt of our remittance, \$1,540.06, he writes as follows:—

“Pending a meeting I thank you in name of the Committee for the large remittance from the Upper Canada Bible Society and its Branches, to our Treasurer, Mr. D. Cream, for the work of French Colportage in this vast and most destitute district. Your liberal aid will enable us to retain for the present our staff of helpers, who amid many difficulties and privations are doing excellent work, which is sure in the course of time to make itself manifest, and to the glory of God. May I ask special prayers for our helpers, that they may be divinely guided, upheld, and used effectively in their great work of Evangelization.”

BRITISH COLUMBIA.

Handsome remittances have been received from Victoria, New Westminster and Nanaimo.

Arrangements have been made for colportage work along the line of the Canada Pacific Railway during the summer months.

FINANCES.

The total income of the Upper Canada Bible Society from all sources for the year ending March 31st, 1890, amounts to \$33,444.41.

THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY.

The American Bible Society held its Seventy-fourth Annual Meeting in New York on 8th May, 1890. From an abstract of the Report for the past year, we learn that the total cash receipts for general purposes were \$597,693.05. In addition to this, the sum of \$42,316.05 was received to be permanently invested. The disbursements for general purposes amounted to \$529,955.74.

Issues in 74th year; Bibles, Testaments, and Portions, 1,496,057, of which 562,717 were circulated in Foreign Lands.

THE BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY.

ABSTRACT OF REPORT FOR 1890.

The latest chapter in the history of the Bible Society is one of much interest. It is an account of work which in almost every part of the vast field is extending, and which is exerting year by year a deeper and happier influence. It is the sole object of the Society "to encourage the wider circulation of the Scriptures without note or comment," not only at home, but also in other countries, "whether Christian, Muhammadan, or Pagan." How noble this object is—how immense the labour necessary to realize it—few years have shown more impressively than that which has recently closed: it may be added that few have reaffirmed more distinctly the soundness of the methods by which this labour has been guided.

But, before one enters on the details of life in its conflict and effort, some reference must be made to those who have "entered into rest." In May, 1889, Bishop Rawle, of Trinidad, passed away, one of the Vice-Presidents of the Society. In August Mr. Joseph Moore, one of the most prudent and most devoted, as well as one of the oldest members of the General Committee, died; and a few months later the Society's former Agent in Rosario—the trusted Adolf Henriksen. In October the Society lost its faithful Agent for Denmark, Pastor Plenge, and in December another of its Vice-Presidents, the great Churchman and exegete, Dr. Lightfoot, Bishop of Durham. December proved also the month in which two Honorary Life Governors were removed, Mr. T. W. Pocock and Mr. J. Spence. In February Mr. F. Ehrenzeller, long a member of the Committee, died. The last name in this succinct obituary is also one of the most illustrious—it is that of the renowned Orientalist and translator, Dr. Franz Delitzsch, who died on March 5 of the present year.

Several distinguished names have during the year been placed on the lists of the Society's Honorary Office-bearers. To that of Vice-Presidents have been added those of the Bishop of St. Asaph's, S. W. Silver, Esq., and G. F. White, Esq. The Rev. Alan Edwards, Alexander McArthur, Esq., M.P.; F. Cleeve, Esq., C.B.; and Theodore Fry, Esq., M.P., have been associated with the Honorary Life Governors; and Bishop Szasz has been elected an Honorary Member.

The name of Mr. Fry recalls one of the most interesting events of the year—the acquisition by the Society of the unique collection of English Bibles formed by the late Mr. Francis Fry, of Bristol, to the purchase of which, by private subscriptions, Mr. Theodore Fry so liberally contributed. Full and interesting accounts of the transfer of the "Fry Library" have been given elsewhere by the Editorial Supt., the Rev. Dr. Wright, to whom the acquisition is so largely due.*

The FINANCIAL accounts show that the total of the Society's income and outlay is, in both items, close on that of last year. But there was then a deficit of some thirteen thousand pounds; and there is a similar deficit now. There has also been an increase on the expenditure, but, considering the whole sum, it is very slight. The Legacies are less than before by some five thousand pounds, but it is pleasant to know that the Free Contributions from Auxiliaries are gradually but steadily rising. The Home sales are less; but this is more than counterbalanced by a considerable increase in sales abroad.

Looking broadly at the financial position, no one can be content with it: the Society's work has constantly moved forwards, but the normal income has not equally advanced. Behind the Society's splendid opportunities and its achievements there must be a heart just as strong and generous as these are great, and a power which strides, pace by pace, alongside of the demands of the task. Until this easy and powerful equilibrium of forces is attained, the friends of the Bible must not, and they cannot, rest.†

The ISSUES of the year have again been large—they rise to a total of over THREE MILLION SEVEN HUNDRED AND NINETY THOUSAND COPIES. This is an advance on those of last year by a hundred and fifteen thousand, and on those of ten years ago of a million of copies. The figures of recent years have been swollen by the special and temporary returns of the "Penny Testament"; when these are withdrawn the normal issues show strong and rapid progress, and give striking evidence of the immense and ever-widening tide of this river of the water of life.*

But from these statistics—so practical, so definite, so suggestive of something great which has been accomplished, yet in another sense, so vague, so insufficient—let us turn to the actual details and the picture of the work to which they refer. A picture full of movement and colour, full also of human reality, and varied as the races and the countries which are seen by glimpses, as in a panorama, passing before the eye. Nothing can be more interesting than the simple narrative of the colporteurs—we travel again with them through the streets of European cities and crowded bazaars of the East—by steep paths which lead over the hills of Italy or France—across the wastes of Siberia—along the rivers of China. We listen to them as they converse—ever on the all-absorbing subject—now with the Hungarian peasants, then with Persians, with Jews, with Arabs of the Desert, with the Fellahin of the Nile, with Malays, with Koreans. We catch glimpses—in the endless world-wide journeyings—here of the glens of Norway, again of the white roofs of Nazareth and Jerusalem, then of the palm trees and the bungalows of some district of Hindustan. So graphic are they, so endlessly varied; and yet—like everything which deals with the human spirit, and with the unseen—they suggest immensely more than they describe.

The narrative begins with FRANCE, and in this, its earliest chapter, there is a brightness of tone which is happily preserved—with more or less of interval—onwards to the close. It is not that the circulation has risen to a total which nearly trebles that of the year before—this is accounted for by the Free Distribution at the Exhibition, and the colportage sales are even less †—but there are evidences of a deeper and more substantial kind. "It is my strong conviction," says M. Monod, "that the current of popular thought and life is very apparently less irreligious than it was a few years ago." The same hope touches the colporteurs' journals—often otherwise weary enough—with a pleasant light. "It is impossible," one writes, "to deny that the public religious mind is better in this part of Brittany than ever it was before." "Here in the Pays Basque, considering the actual state of the people, what is sold now is *certainly* good seed in good ground, living water fertilising the desert." "It seems to me that in these districts of the Loire and the Rhone superstition is not so general as it was, and that what people call "the Protestant faith" is honoured by many who ten years ago felt nothing but a bitter hatred against the Gospel and the Scriptures which we circulate. Blessed be the Lord for that! Those times are gone, and the light of the Gospel seems to spread." These words are adopted by M. Monod as his own: "I like," he says,

"to finish under the impression which they give." But, whatever opinion may be ventured as to the signs of general advance, there can be no doubt as to the instances of individual good which constantly appear. As the pages are turned over in the long record of the year, we see the men at work everywhere—they are found in the old towns of the north, in the seaports, among the shepherds of the Adour and of the Alps: we watch them conversing with the reapers in the harvest-fields of Central France: pressing along the crowded thoroughfares of Paris: itinerating among the villages of Auvergne. "These little Gospels," as one of them calls the Portions, "are a great blessing," and many impressive stories are told of the way in which they are constantly proving messengers of peace. Nothing can lessen the value of this quiet ministry—or of these instances of individual good. For, after all, each soul is itself a world, and each person the central figure in a history which shall have no end.

M. Monod's account of the Exhibition—in many ways the central event of the year—is equally pleasant. Over a quarter of a million of Portions of Scripture passed into the hands of visitors, and the nature and work of the Society were made known perhaps more widely than ever before. It should be added that there are occasional but distinct evidences that the influence of Lasserre's work is by no means exhausted. On the whole, the past year in France has been one of exceptional importance, and much will be expected from the future.

From SPAIN the report of the year is strikingly hopeful: the same slowly liberalising influences which are touching France seem to be also at work beyond the Pyrenees. The copious accounts of Mr. Jameson's colporteurs have left on his mind a strong and distinct threefold impression—"first that the power of the priesthood is rapidly lessening, next that rationalism in a crude form is extending, and lastly that the Scriptures are gradually but increasingly getting into the hands of the people, and influencing their lives." Beyond these conclusions he does not go. The history of Spanish evangelization has been full of surprises, and many of these have been painful. But it is impossible to ignore the consensus of facts which, in the unconscious narratives of the journals, become articulate and eloquent. In the meantime, with a care which is expectant as well as prudent, the colportage system has been reorganized "so that no district of Spain may be left unvisited: so that no hamlet, no farm-house may be passed without having the Word of Life offered at the door." The men have loyally accepted the new and often difficult conditions; they are found climbing almost inaccessible mountain passes, sleeping in the open air, braving all weathers, and, much harder to brave, all discouragements, so that their noble work may be done. If the actual sales are but slightly in advance of those of last year it is only from the initial difficulties of the new system; and the total circulation of the year has increased.* The tone which Mr. Jameson finds in his summary is one of "hope and expectation"; it has been a year of "foundation work, where much is unseen, but nothing lost," and, remembering to how large a degree in Spain this Society is the only agent and messenger of evangelical truth, he reaffirms his assurance that if ever the Peninsula becomes evangelical it is to the Bible Society the debt and the honour will to a large extent be due.

From Spain, thus but half awakened from its mediæval sleep, with its languid, suppressed life, its lingering traditions, its touches of Oriental manner, the transition is great to ITALY. For in Italy everything is instinct with the movement of modern life—everything is in transition—everything is aspiring and expectant. The accomplishment of political unity is not a final but a first step. "We have made Italy," says Massimo D'Azeglio, "we have now to make the Italians." Of all this eager motion and hope Signor Meille's annual letter is full: he also would see a new era, and he justly believes that the forces which are—often blindly—feeling their way to a great future can have no safer ally than the Society which would do for Italy what has been done for England, and make the Bible the companion of every fireside. It is in this connexion he quotes the

words of Professor Teza, of Padua from whom the Annual Report of last year received an appreciative review, in which he called attention to "the vastness of our field, the importance of our work, both in its missionary and its linguistic aspects, and the success which has been attained." In a more recent lecture Professor Teza claimed for the English and the German literatures "an undeniable superiority to all others, whether ancient or modern, in richness, in variety, in high moral tone, and attributed this to the fact that in both countries the Bible has been the book of the people." He adds sorrowfully that Diodati's version, "with its brief and pithy style, in which one feels the results of painting and of sculpture, which speaks and comments at the same time," was quite equal to have rendered in Italy the same noble service which Luther's and our English Bible have in their northern spheres, "if religious intolerance in former times and religious prejudice at the present day had not made it a forbidden book for the great majority of the Italian people." These times are surely passing. It is with special interest that Signor Meille notes "that the variance between the civil Government and the Vatican is wider than ever; that every year the colporteurs visit hundreds of places where the voice of the evangelical preacher is never heard, leaving behind them many copies of the Word of salvation"; that the circulation they have effected is the highest ever known; * that the Society's efforts "to make the Scriptures a household book from the Alps to Sicily are every year more and more successful," and that, in spite of an opposition, which is constantly growing more bitter, "could we only know in how many homes and how many hearts a Bible, a Testament, and even a single Gospel has shed light and consolation, we would have ample confirmation of the Divine promises on which we rely, and also ample encouragement to persevere to the end."

In leaving Italy we leave also the great Latin peoples of the West; the Romance tongues are heard no longer; we are on the confines of the Teutonic races—especially we are on the confines of Germany.

To GERMANY, indeed, one must turn early and with special attention. Perhaps no chapter of the year is more important than that which refers to the early home of the Reformation. So much of the brain-work of Europe—one may say so much of the brain-work of the world—is done there; so much power is folded and waiting for its hour of action; so wide are the influences either of the strength and soundness, or of the decay of the nation's spiritual temper, that one cannot easily overstate the interest of the subject.

For all these, as well as for other reasons, the favourable—almost the triumphant—tone of the annual letter will be doubly welcome. To use Mr. Watt's words, "the year stands forward as that in which, for an ordinary year, the spread of the Word of God, as a printed volume, reached the highest point ever yet attained in Germany. The circulation of all the Bible Societies, native and foreign, taken together, exceeded six hundred thousand copies. The figures of the German Societies have of late years gone up by leaps and bounds. What is more remarkable is that our own direct circulation has not, as might have been expected, gone back in consequence. On the contrary, with only twenty-seven colporteurs, compared with fifty-eight in 1881, the increase on that year is more than twenty-five thousand copies. It adds to the suggestiveness of these figures to quote the words in which Mr. Watt sketches the ideal of colportage work, which his own men, as well as others in every field, are nobly realising in actual life. "Every effort is made to get the right men and to secure the right kind of work. . . . We wish to think of each Bible, each New Testament and Portion, sold by the colporteur as an outward and visible sign of a victory gained over hostility or indifference to the Word of God. Viewed thus, the colporteur's work is grand; nor can its worth and the measure of blessing attending it be gauged by the number of copies disposed of. . . . It is in this spirit we have tried to work during the past year, and our circulation

of fifty-five thousand copies by colportage represents to a greater extent than perhaps on any previous occasion solid work of this kind done."*

The narratives of the German staff of colporteurs add the substance and actual touch of circumstance which often escapes from general statements like this. Everywhere—from Posen, on the eastern frontier, where one hears the Polish tongue and notices the Slav features, in Silesia, in Bavaria, in Eastern and Western Prussia—to Baden and the Rhine, the men urge their inspiring but often difficult work. There are respects in which it is more difficult in Germany than elsewhere. When one passes from the influence of Catholic intolerance it is often to meet a more fatal power—the "Free Thought," which chills spirituality at its heart and scorns every form of religion, and one not unfrequently catches a more weary cry of pain from conflict with this featureless power, than from strife with any other foe. But there is nothing more admirable in these simple men than their patience in such tests, their quiet persistence, their gentleness, their faith. Again and again their words awaken old sensibilities; a sense of better things returns, the forgotten Gospel is opened afresh, and they go on their way rejoicing. It should be added that one of the most characteristic sections of Bible-work in Germany is that devoted to the army; and Mr. Watt, in noting a circulation of some thirty-five thousand copies, mentions two interesting things: one, "the participation in the work of an ever-increasing number of Bible Societies," the other "the warm support of many of the officers in command, some of whom pay for copies to be given to their men."

What is true of Germany may be found in altered circumstances, but in similar forms, in Switzerland, Holland, Denmark, Belgium, and Norway. These lesser members of the Teutonic group reproduce within their own boundaries many of the aspects of the work seen in a wider or busier field. In SWITZERLAND there are ten centres of Bible distribution: one of them the recently formed "Bible Union," with which the Society is specially associated, and the records of the year are singularly vivid and encouraging. In HOLLAND, and in view of the proposed withdrawal of this Society, a new Auxiliary, full of purpose and energy, has been formed, and the Netherlands Society is pursuing its course with increased vigour. From the work in DENMARK, the sure and skilful hand of Pastor Plenge has been suddenly withdrawn; but the place of that devoted man has been filled by his friend, Colonel I. Ravn, and the work progresses with many signs of encouragement. BELGIUM lies partly within the Latin, partly within the Teutonic limits; it represents the difficulties of both, and is one of the least rewarding fields; but the circulation of the year has again advanced,† and Mr. Kirkpatrick's men have worked with commendable resolution and with success. In the report from NORWAY one seems to pass from scenes of conflict to those of repose; its quiet fjords and mountain parishes lie outside the maelström of less happy life; it is like a return to the old homes of piety; the colporteur passes amidst the welcomes of the people from stage to stage of his journey, treated everywhere and honoured as a friend.‡

At this point the course of the survey sweeps southward, and draws us again within the whirl of religious and political life. Scarcely any Agency of the Bible Society is more varied in race and language than AUSTRIA-HUNGARY, and few have had a more varied history. Within the wide Hungarian plain, and among the populations which spread themselves along and over the mountain ranges, or beside the levels of the Danube, one may see the East meeting the West, and the past of the Middle Ages and their nomad peoples shaping itself into the future. How sensitive Mr. Millard is to the spiritual interests of his Agency all readers of his reports know, and they will welcome the pleasant mes-

sage which this year he is able to send. In both the important avenues of issues there has been increase;* and, conscious as he is of the immeasurable difficulties of the field, he is surprised that there has been any advance at all. But, what is far better, there are evidences that a spirit of serious inquiry is in many places being awakened, and that many anxious minds have been led to find peace in the study of the Word of God. These instances come from every part of the Empire, and Mr. Millard "thankfully lays stress on the fact that this is the case in places in which, up till now, few such happy results had been observed." He adds that the colporteurs' licences, where these were necessary, have been readily renewed by the authorities, and that the Protestant Churches of the Empire, when meeting in congress in Vienna, passed a cordial vote in favour of colportage. The survey which his report furnishes of the various provinces of his Agency are everywhere full of that deep interest which belongs to the history of the soul; and occasionally it becomes warm with expressions of thankfulness for unusual or unexpected advance. "The accounts from Bohemia," he writes, "are most cheering; the circulation has again increased in spite of great opposition. In Hungary our issues are the largest on record; in Croatia they have again surpassed those of the previous year. Galicia and Bukowina are a difficult field in every respect, yet we find to our joy that our circulation is increased; in Servia, Poland, and Roumania we are permitted to see many evidences of the blessing of our work." From Bosnia, where the first Protestant Church was consecrated last summer, Mr. Millard was delighted to receive a donation from a poor widow in aid of the Bible Society, and from a number of soldiers in Poland a vote of thanks for "such precious books at so low a price." No summary of the year can perhaps be better than his own. "Clouds have been dispelled, numerous cares removed, much opposition had to be encountered, not all hopes were realised; but God's abundant blessing has followed our work. May He grant us to spend and be spent in His service, impelled by the power of a Redeemer's love!"

These words may linger in the mind as we pass into the territory of Islam, and feel the touch of its chill and heavy shadow. Across the south-eastern barriers of the Austro-Hungarian monarchy stretch less the territories than the influences of the Turkish spirit and its government; they sweep eastward and southward to Persia and the Indian Ocean. In this empire of Muhammad two famous cities are at the same time the two headquarters of the Society—the one the centre of the new spirit in the old world, the other of the old and barbaric spirit in the new—Alexandria and Constantinople. The TURKISH and EGYPTIAN Agencies which they represent may suitably be considered together, for both are included in the region which they unitedly occupy. In this survey Greece is included, though politically and religiously it stands apart. The reports of the past year are perhaps less cheerful than those which precede them; there are frequent references to the increasing poverty of the people, and the tightening hand of civil and religious intolerance, and the circulation has only maintained itself.† From Constantinople, indeed, the real circulation is less, though the total issues are slightly more; from Alexandria there is a genuine increase, but it is slight. Even this, however, is perhaps to be taken as advance rather than loss of ground. To Dr. Thomson's eye three causes amply explain any lessening of the work. One the prevalence of influenza and kindred disorders, another the hostile action of the Greek Church in Bulgaria, the third the rising in Crete. Mr. Weakley's staff have also been touched by the prevalent epidemic, and he has had to work for some time with but a fraction of his force. But in spite of all such qualifications the story of the year is irresistibly vivid and interesting. In the Northern Agency the centres of movement are, perhaps, ALBANIA and GREECE, and from these, as well as, indeed, from the other provinces, there are

too many evidences of successful work to allow any sense of disappointment. "In Greece," to quote from Dr. Kalopothakes, "the colporteurs have visited almost all the Cyclades and the Ionian groups, and most of the larger towns and villages on the mainland, and with one or two exceptions they have been gladly received; after a second visit they are welcomed as familiar friends." It is the modern Greek Bible, adds Dr. Thomson, which is proving the means of awakening the nation from the sleep of centuries; and he emphasises the interesting news that the Patriarchate, conscious no doubt of the new spirit of inquiry, has announced the approaching publication of a fresh version of the New Testament. The coast of Asia Minor and the famous Ægean islands have been carefully visited by the colporteurs, and with very general—sometimes with very special—success, and considerable advance has been made in opening-up new districts in Macedonia and Albania, as well as in Bulgaria. In Cyprus opposition to Bible work has almost disappeared, and the returns are in advance of the previous year; in Crete the work though largely limited to the cities, and naturally dangerous, has been carried on with admirable courage, and Dr. Thomson believes "the good leaven is evidently at work." Altogether the yearly accounts are "full of labour," and, it may be added, of conflict, though no striking or brilliant results appear.

The accounts from Alexandria are, perhaps, more varied, and they carry more appearance of present success. Alexandria itself has, indeed, had its colporteur force almost entirely withdrawn, but there has been an enlarged circulation at Cairo, and good work is being done there. At Port Said the issues have also increased, and a friendly feeling seems to be establishing itself between the colporteur and the sailors whom he visits on their rapid passage. At Aden the circulation has doubled itself, and some tentative journeys have been made to the interior; at Massowah, where the Swedish Mission is at work, the doors have been re-opened at last, and a mule's load of Scripture, sent to the Tigre country. On the road to Khartoum, is the vanguard of the new Christian advance. From Palestine the accounts are less favourable; but Mr. Letheby still occupies "Kir of Moab," and from this "centre of future work for the interior of Arabia," he already foresees the annexation of the peninsula for Christ.

From the steep of this wild fortress the eye, turning to the north-west, notes the solitary glen which leads, ten miles away, to the shores of the Dead Sea, and beyond to the Mediterranean and the populous spaces of Europe. But should the view be turned eastwards, and the thought pass across the masses of barrier mountains, and again onwards towards the north, it will visit first the valleys and the cities of PERSIA, where Mr. Douglas is now receiving from the hands of Dr. Bruce the charge of his successful work, and then enter, across the northern frontier, the vast spaces of European and Asiatic RUSSIA. And if, from this limit, the view still sweeps northwards and onwards, at once towards both east and west, it will pause only at the ice of the Arctic Ocean, and in the silence of its deserted shores. It must always be a deep joy to the Society that nowhere are its messengers more generally welcome than among the populations of the great empire to which belongs so much of both east and west—so much of the past and also of the future.

From the St. Petersburg centre, Mr. Nicolson is able to send accounts of colportage which has gone actively forward—of a circulation which has broadened its issues by twenty thousand copies, and reached a total of over three hundred and eleven thousand; * of a new sub-agency at Jekaterineburg which breaks the almost endless line of view across northern Siberia, and "places the coping-stone on the organization of the Agency," and from which, within six months, eighteen thousand copies have already been distributed, almost doubling the issues during the whole year before; † of the receipt of the seventh Hundred

Thousand, within six years, of the People's Russ Testament; of the progress of new versions or new editions for the Kalmuks, the Uzbek Turkis and Kazan Tatars; and in one brief, and in itself almost sufficient sentence, of "work which has steadily and continually advanced from year to year." From the South, Mr. Morrison's report is equally favourable. "The year," he writes, "has passed without any of those special troubles and anxieties which marked former years; the circumstances and surroundings of our work are becoming more hopeful, and its simple and holy character has become more generally appreciated in all parts of the country." The circulation has increased, in some districts, at a very rapid rate, and this in spite of a season during which alternate droughts and floods wasted the lingering harvests. In the case of neither the Southern nor the Northern Agency can details of their various work be given here; the survey is too rapid, the limits are too confined. One hears of the colporteur "plunging painfully from village to village through miles of deep snow, again along swampy roads, almost waist-deep in mud and water," but distributing, with unconquerable patience, some two thousand copies during the year. This was in the Kieff district. The same physical difficulties, borne with equal fortitude, reappear elsewhere. In the district east of the Black Sea, near Batoum and Kutais, we hear of the moist malarial atmosphere, the brooding fever, the indescribably bad accommodation, but the men, themselves Orientals, bear with these too common conditions, and seven of them, among the fanatical and half civilized people of these wild mountain districts, sell during the year fourteen thousand copies. This is in Transcaucasia, within the shadows of Ararat. In Turkestan, and in the localities associated with the name of Alexander, where three hundred years before Christ, he "flung the net of Greek civilization across the East," we read of similarly successful and, if possible, more interesting work. Tcharjui on the Oxus had last year eight hundred and thirty copies; Askhabad, five hundred and sixty; Merv, the "Queen of the Desert," four hundred and seventy; Kerki, on the Afghan frontier, three hundred and sixteen; Samarkand, two hundred and eighteen; Bokhara, a hundred and forty-five; and the work would have been better but for transport difficulties. It is delightful to meet in these journals the familiar statement that everywhere "the Russian soldier is the colporteur's best friend." The same thing is noticed by Mr. Millard when speaking of Russian Poland. "I cannot refrain from repeating," says one of the colporteurs there, "with what evident joy the Scriptures are purchased by the Russians as a people. Very often soldiers tell me with what fervent desire they have been wishing to obtain a copy of the Word of God. It is touching to see how they kiss the volume, and press it to their hearts." Instances of a similar kind are found in every part of the Empire.

From CHINA the reports of the year are less inspiring than these—"the dark lines," to use Mr. Kenmure's phrase, "seem more numerous and prominent," and the total of actual issues in each of the three Agencies is less than those of last year; but all together they exceed a quarter of a million copies, and this very favourably compares with the circulation of 1887. The tone of the account from the Northern Agency is saddened by allusions to famines and pestilences which have "reigned"—the expression is Mr. Bryant's—and "with dire sway" across the levels of Shan-tung and Manchuria. The European staff has also been reduced in the Southern as well as in the Northern Agency, or weakened by temporary illness or absence. Yet each report is pronounced in its favourable estimate of the past, and in its outlook,—as in many cases where less favourable outer results emphasize the importance of those which are spiritual. These, happily, are far from being rare. Even across the pages of the most disheartened journals lies a ray of light—a thread of gold: it is the light which ever accompanies the history of the individual soul as it moves through confusions of thought and sense to the light which is rising in China with the approach, in these latter days, of Christ. In out-of-the-way hamlets, in obscure mountain tracks, one hears of copies of the Gospel which have come—one cannot say how, or whence—but as messengers of life and of a new world. The same general

statement is true of China's island sister JAPAN: there also the issues are less;* the warm breath of evangelical revival which introduced a new word to the language and a new and happy conception to the mind has for the time subsided, and political movements seem to have absorbed the national thought. But there also the river has sunk only to reappear, for the legend of Arethusa is a reality in the spiritual history of nations and of the soul. Perhaps for both peoples no summary of the year can be more just than that of Mr. Kenmure: "The great matter is preparedness of heart—good soil for good seed, and this, we can see, in China, being realized. There is a movement of the dry bones. New influences are at work; new experiences are being passed through; new light is coming in. There is a demand for railways and telegraphs and electric lights. Material things!—but with them will come knowledge, and with it the knowledge of Christ."†

The comparative quiet, the pause in spiritual motion—if indeed there be a pause—which seems to touch the accounts from China is strongly contrasted by the vigour of those from INDIA. In these the ear seems addressed as well as the mind; we seem to catch the sounds of a conflict which has come from the very advance and victories of Christianity, and which proves how deep and how shattering of the old order these victories are. It is as if one heard, in their ancient and famous temples, the voice of the old gods as they alarm each other and go out to battle—as if, in India, the era had come again when the divinities of classic Greece and Rome were fighting with early Christianity for their lives. "Never," says one account, "have the powers of evil been so active in Southern India as now"; and the same report, with a voice more or less emphasised, arrives from other parts of the country. And—just as in the second and third centuries—it is along the great roads, in the cities, wherever active political or intellectual life centres itself, that the force, and almost the despair of the assault of idolatry is seen. In the country districts and up among the mountains one still finds in India—and will find for long the *Pagani*—the village people who peacefully worship the old deities; or, hearing of Christ, wonder whether this is not Krishna again in a new incarnation. We have come, it is increasingly evident, to "the last great battle"; to the mutiny, not of the people, but of the powers and tributaries of the vast pantheon of the East, which is to precede the wail—which some believe they have already heard in India, sobbing itself away, "Great Pan is dead!" So far the reports of the year seem to be articulate and significant; they are equally articulate as to the spirit in which the assault is being hailed, and the way in which it is already being met. Never were the sales of the Madras Auxiliary so high as during last year; those in the Bangalore territory have also advanced; in the Panjab they have risen by one half and added fifteen thousand to the issues of the previous year. Even more important than this may prove the quiet influence of the two hundred and sixty-six Bible-women who, in India and Ceylon have been subsidised by the Society, and by whose means, in the Zenanas and among their native sisters, the circulation of seven thousand Scriptures in 1888 has risen to ten thousand six hundred in 1889. For, again, as in the early centuries, and in the East as once before in the West, it cannot but be that Christian women, winning back their old place of sweet supremacy, shall develop their unique influence, and tend, as they alone can tend it, the infant Church of their people as it slowly strengthens towards its prime.

Beyond the shores of India and of Asia lie other immense fields occupied by the Society, the island worlds of MALAYSIA, of OCEANIA, of AUSTRALASIA, the ever-extending continent of AFRICA, the Dominion of CANADA, the Republics of SOUTH AMERICA. To these hardly a glance can be given here, but their importance is perhaps scarcely less than that of those great peoples whose reports have

been reviewed. From Singapore Mr. Haffenden announces a circulation which from the thirty-three thousand of last Report, now passes forty-six thousand; and within this total the purely Malay issues have increased a hundred per cent. He speaks of disarmed Muhammadan prejudices, of growing thoughtfulness among the native races; and adds, "hundreds upon hundreds of towns and villages have been visited; and so many registered conversations that for fear of exaggeration I must not mention their number." From NEW ZEALAND and AUSTRALIA the messages of the year are unusually bright; it is evident that the Greater Britain of the southern seas will emulate—it must be hoped it will yet surpass—the highest Christian enterprise of the old land. The reports, which barely touch the new world of AFRICA—MOROCCO and Algiers in the north, and to Egypt reference has already been made—and the group of Auxiliaries of the South, seem all to show the expansion and advance which has elsewhere in this rapid survey been so evident; but the Dark Continent is only as yet touched by the dawn of its approaching day.* In the Dominion of CANADA the conflict of race and faith seems to deepen; in the South American Republics the influence of secular life and a low morality is fatally present; but Brazil has received, without bloodshed or political shock, the conditions of religious equality and freedom which have so often proved favourable to the advance of the Kingdom of God.

It is at the close of a survey like this that one may be asked to recollect again some of the figures which were given when it began. It has been said that within the year almost four millions of copies of the Scriptures—whole or part—have been put into circulation. Is it possible still to think of these numbers as they may have been thought of when they were read—as blind figures, as a dumb register of the routine work of printers, of tradesmen, of colporteurs—an expression which only meant something vast, but which, when one tries to touch it, disappears into the unknown? Shall they not now be more justly understood as symbols of the forces and the acts of life—of life in conflict, in persuasion, in the awakening of thought, in conviction, in love, in anger, in prayer—but always of life in its activity, and never of death in its hopelessness and doom?

And if it be said that multitudes of these messengers are neglected and destroyed, that they lose themselves and leave no trace, and that, like the leaf in autumn, the wasted seed in spring, they also belong to the grave—let it be remembered that even in material nature there is a wider law than that of destruction, and a deeper one than that of decay. There is the conservation of all energy, the preservation of all matter: the leaf will pass into another form, the seed will go to its divinely appointed place—even in death these will praise Him, they will glorify Him whom all things serve. It is when duty guides us into the heart of difficulties, when opposition vexes us, when the narrowness of sense torments the spiritual mind, when failure seems to triumph over the noblest lives—it is then that we may most truly follow, most entirely obey. When the New Jerusalem comes down out of heaven from God we shall receive again our lost messengers—we shall hear of the forgotten ones. We shall reap the harvest of the dead. It will then be seen that the strength of that eternal city was being laid in the darkness in which we lose ourselves, and its beauty fashioned in the conflict in which we fall.

EXTRACTS FROM AGENTS' REPORTS.

REV. WALTER AMOS—*Weston*.—Dec. 3rd. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. After devotional exercises, led by the Rev. Walter Reid, pastor of the church, the President, Mr. P. Franks, took the chair. Rev. Mr. Reid gave a short address, and was followed by your agent, who urged at length the claims of the Society. This branch has for many years done good work.

North Etobicoke.—Dec. 4th. The President, Mr. W. A. Wallis, a very warm friend of the Society, was in the chair, and conducted the devotional exercises. He then gave an address, after which your agent addressed the meeting. Mr. John Dixon makes an efficient officer.

Woodbridge and Pine Grove.—Dec. 5th. The meeting was held in the Orange Hall, *Woodbridge*, and was fairly well attended. The Rev. W. F. Willmot, the very active president, was in the chair. The chairman and your agent addressed the meeting. Rev. C. H. Shortt, of the Church of England, desired to attend the meeting, but was unavoidably absent.

Bolton.—Dec. 6th. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. Rev. Mr. Walker, pastor of the church, and the Rev. Peter Nicol, of the Presbyterian Church, gave addresses on behalf of the Society's work, and were followed by your agent. The choir rendered good service. In the death of Mr. J. F. Warbrick the Society has lost a warm advocate and supporter.

South Etobicoke.—January 27th, 1890. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. Rev. Mr. Bowles, pastor of the church; Rev. Mr. Pearen, of Lambton Mills, and your agent, addressed a fair audience. Mr. McPherson, president, in the chair. Mr. Charles Shaver retires from the secretaryship after a service of 28 years in the interests of the Society. Mr. S. R. Bingham has also had a long connection with the branch here. The choir did good service.

Humber Summit.—January 28th. A fair attendance. Your agent had no assistance in addressing the meeting. It was a disappointment that neither the president nor Mr. Wallis, the Depository, was able to be present. This branch is young and active.

Caledon East and Mono Road.—January 29th. Meeting in the Methodist Church, *Caledon East*. The pastor of the church, Rev. W. McDonald, in the chair. Attendance small. Local events of an unpleasant character have stood in the way of the branch's work during the past year, but it is now hoped that matters will resume their normal condition.

Charleston.—Jan. 30th. Rev. Mr. Wilson, pastor of the Presbyterian Church in which the meeting was held, led in devotional exercises. Your agent spoke of the pressing claims of the work. This branch has got a fresh start in the good work.

Mono Mills.—January 31st. A meeting had been announced, but so few came, out that no meeting was held. La grippe detained the local clergymen at home. The roads were bad. Collectors were to be sent out as soon as possible.

REV. D. AYLESWORTH—*Langton*.—January 21st, 1890. The meeting was held in the township hall (not a very comfortable place), and the meeting was small owing to the weather and sickness. The friends manifested cheerful interest in the work of the Society. The Depository was examined and found satisfactory and in a conspicuous place.

Otterville.—January 22nd. A meeting was held at *Bookton*, a sub-branch of *Otterville*, four miles farther on. The meeting was not large, but deep interest is felt in the cause. The *Otterville* branch also selects collectors and supervises the work at *Sommerville* and *Hawtry*. The meeting on the 23rd at *Otterville* was also affected by sickness and the weather. Many were detained who desired to be present. The meeting was, however, quite successful and very interesting.

Norwich.—January 24th. The meeting was held in the Baptist Church, and was respectably attended.

Lynedoch.—January 25th. Found the depository, secretary and treasurer all in one person, who is very competent and very earnest in the work. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church on Monday night. It was an excellent meeting and the branch is in a flourishing condition. Your agent preached on Sabbath morning in the Methodist Church at *Lynedoch*, in the afternoon in the Presbyterian Church, and in the evening at *Delhi*.

Port Rowan.—February 10th. The meeting was held in the Baptist Church, and was fairly well attended. Efficient officers and collectors are determined to push the work of the Society this year. The American Bible Society is operating in this section, which somewhat lessens our receipts.

St. Williams.—February 11th. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. A very intelligent congregation manifested a genuine interest in the Bible cause. The officers are zealous men and will do their duty.

Vittoria.—February 12th. The meeting was fairly attended in the Presbyterian Church. The depository desired a change, but no better place could be found.

Port Dover.—February 13th. *Port Dover*, like *Port Rowan*, is beautiful for situation on the lake shore. A very enthusiastic meeting was held in the Episcopalian Church, presided over by the minister. The officers are all men of experience and thorough business men, and the work of the Society will be thoroughly done.

Waterford.—February 14th. The meeting was held in the Baptist Church. All the week the weather had been delightful until Friday night the storm came, yet a fair congregation assembled, and by a re-arrangement of the officers it is confidently hoped that this branch will make a very honourable record in the future.

REV. A. ANDREWS—*Portage la Prairie*.—The Congregational Church was placed at our service, and cheerful assistance given by the pastor and organist. The Methodist and Presbyterian ministers also rendered us cheerful service. There was a great storm, and the streets were filled with snow, which doubtless aided in causing us to have a small audience. But those present seemed much interested in our work. I visited the depository and found the stock in capital condition. From *Portage* I proceeded to *Winnipeg*, to go to the *Stonewall* meeting. I was storm-staid there, and by belated train also failed to reach *Carberry*. Sabbath was spent at *Brandon*, where I preached for Presbyterians in the morning and the Methodists at night, and addressed both Sabbath schools during the afternoon. The annual meeting was held in the Methodist Church. Sheriff Clements, the president, occupied the chair. Rev. A. Urquhart, president, rendered the agent valuable service. The meeting was well attended and collection good. I found the stock very low. Our depository has

not a suitable place to display the books, but arrangements were entered into to secure better accommodation during the year. With enlarged stock and better facilities the sales must be materially increased. Rev. M. C. Bunt (Methodist) kindly drove me to the meeting at *Wawanesa*, the new town on the N.P.R. that is to swallow up the hamlet formerly known as *Souris City*. The new roads down the river are such that few care to travel at night, and the meeting held in a private house was attended by only a small number of persons. Still a branch was formed that will, no doubt, be successful in doing a fair work in this fine section of country. *Stockton* branch is situated in a fine farming country, but with no village or town as a centre, and about ten miles from *Glenboro*. We had a capital audience, and by resolution it was unanimously decided to keep the depository open, at least until it is known where the extension of the Manitoba and Southwestern Railroad will pass, and its station be located. At *Glenboro* we had a good attendance; sales fair, stock well kept, and good interest manifested in the Society's work. A Sabbath was spent between *Glenboro* and *Stockton*, and I held services at both points, besides conducting Sabbath school at the latter place. *Treherne* is a new point; attendance very large and interest encouraging. Rev. Mr. Howarth (Methodist) assisted. A branch was formed and arrangements made for ordering stock. At *Carman*, also, we held the first meeting in the interest of Bible circulation. I found friends of Bible Society work from the Province of Quebec and elsewhere, who were glad we had come to open the work here. One of them, Mr. R. T. Meikle, was elected president of the Society. Rev. A. Gordon (Methodist) greatly aided us in the meeting. To save time, as we have only three trains a week on the South-western, we had to return about seventy miles back to *Holland*, where our meeting in the Presbyterian Church was presided over by Rev. H. Drenfield (Church of England). The Presbyterian and Methodist ministers also both aided us very considerably, and Mr. Holland, a stationer, formerly of London, England, gave interesting information of what he had seen for many years of the great work carried on at the Bible house on Queen Victoria street, London. On account of drifts we had to go by rail *via* Winnipeg to *Carberry*. We arrived late on account of delayed train, but a few friends of the cause remained and listened attentively to the agent's address. Rev. W. Colpitts had given an address on the value of the Bible before my arrival. The stock here should be increased to meet the demands of a large and prosperous community. *Douglas* was another new point. The agent was ably assisted by the young Methodist minister. Capital audience despite the storm. Collection good. Branch formed and depository located. At *Alexander*, aided by Rev. Mr. Brown (Presbyterian), the congregation was small. We formed a new branch and ordered a supply of new books. A long drive of about seventeen miles brought us to *Plum Creek*, a prettily situated town, on the banks of the *Souris*. The audience was large. Both the Methodist and Presbyterian ministers were present, and very heartily threw themselves into the meeting. A branch was formed and steps taken to get a supply of books. *Oak Lake* gave us a good meeting and fairly well attended. Financial proceeds scarcely equal to last year. Local causes decided our friends not to canvass this year for subscriptions. Indeed, in several towns west of Brandon, the effect of last year's short harvest, together with church building in several instances, will prevent us securing as good financial returns as is desirable. Still, the response made to the appeal for assistance in Bible work will, on the whole, I trust, be satisfactory. During the month I sold two Bibles and nineteen Testaments, and gave away six cheap Bibles and six Testaments. Had not my time been so fully occupied, more sales could have been effected. *Virden* anniversary is to be held next Thursday, and will be reported at once. I cannot set dates at present for *Stonewall* and *Alameda*, but, as soon as the way opens, the meetings will be held.

REV. DR. BEAUMONT—*Nanticoke*.—A well-attended meeting, and lively interest manifested. Rev. Mr. Leaman and Rev. Mr. Morrison were present. Mr. Hind, the secretary, is a zealous friend of the Society.

Chcapside.—The meeting was small. Dr. Sherk, the respected president, is well aided by Mr. Silverthorne in keeping this branch alive.

Selkirk.—We had a good meeting and a cheering report. This branch is fortunate in having Mr. R. D. Winyard for one of its chief officers, as well as the able services of Mr. M. F. Jardin.

Cayuga South.—The German Evangelical Church, in which the meeting was held, was nearly full from end to end. The whole assemblage was in fullest sympathy with me, as I unfolded the objects of the Society in giving the Word of God to all the nations of the earth; having already issued it in 296 different languages. The genuine interest is attested by the liberal sum of about \$75 which the excellent secretary treasurer remits to you. Mr. Honsinger and Rev. Mr. Lidt are his zealous co-adjutors.

Cayuga.—The meeting, which was fairly good, was presided over by the Hon. Dr. Baxter, Speaker of the Ontario House. The branch is to be congratulated on having for its president a man of such true worth and culture as Dr. Baxter. The secretary, Mr. Cotter, consecrates his well-known professional abilities to the service of the Society. I preached twice here on Sunday on the Holy Scriptures and the work of the Bible Society. Much advancement may be hoped for in *Cayuga*.

Canfield.—I spent Saturday in calling upon many of the residents, preparatory to the meeting on the following Monday. The attendance at the meeting, although not large, was encouraging. I succeeded in fully organizing a branch in the place, and have good hope of a successful career for it.

Dunnville.—Nothing could exceed the kind interest of the Rev. Mr. Wilkinson, and his efforts to secure a good attendance. In this he succeeded well. We had a thoroughly good meeting and heard a cheering report. The treasurer has a handsome amount to remit. Rev. Mr. Magee was also present, and Mr. Lasalle occupied the chair.

Port Colborne.—The work here is in a rather languid state. There is an evident lack of interest, notwithstanding the good services of the Rev. C. H. Phillimore and Rev. Mr. Taylor.

Ridgeway.—A good meeting assembled at the appointed time, Rev. Mr. Wilson in the chair. A large proportion were young people, to whom I endeavoured to adapt my address.

Fort Erie.—I had to re-organize the branch. Mr. A. A. Coulthurst will prove a good secretary. Mrs. John Graham has entered, with her usual earnestness in every good work, on the duty of co-operating with five young ladies in collecting for the Society, and will be glad to receive collecting books. The future of the *Fort Erie* branch is now hopeful.

REV. J. R. BLACK—*Minesing.*—Found a good audience in the Baptist Church. The officers of this branch, with whom it is a pleasure to be associated, were on hand. The Revs. Wright (Baptist) and Renny (Methodist) were present, and the former opened the meeting with prayer. *Minesing* will nobly do its part, as usual.

Elmvale.—This branch was formed only last year, and owing to several causes did not do much during the year. Its first president, Mr. John Patterson, died suddenly, and the secretary had removed to another place. The weather was bad and the meeting small, but we succeeded in placing in the offices of president and secretary gentlemen who may be depended on to attend to the interests of the Society. In the treasurer the Bible Society has an old friend, who deserves our gratitude for the kindness manifested to your agent.

Penetanguishene.—The president was absent, but the efficient secretary, Mr. Sneath, supplied by his energy the loss of the chief officer's absence. The audi-

ence was not large. The Rev. Mr. Currie occupied the chair, and the new president, Rev. Mr. Patterson, opened the exercises with prayer and a spirited address. A new depository was elected, and the depository will be placed in better shape.

Edgar.—The audience was twice as large as a year ago. In the absence of the president, the Rev. R. J. Stilwell (Congregational) was called to the chair, and subsequently elected president. The audience were evidently in sympathy with the object of the Society, and listened attentively to the words of your agent.

Rugby.—The meeting was convened by the president, George Tudhope, Esq. There was a good attendance. The crops have been exceptionally good in this section, and the Society may be expected to gain financially.

Midland.—Here the Bible Society has many friends, prominent among whom are Rev. D. James (Presbyterian) and Rev. Mr. Morgan (Methodist). The meeting was the best in every way your agent has had the pleasure of attending. The Rev. D. James was elected president, and at his hands we may look for an advance this year. Rev. Mr. Morgan invited the agent to his house and made him comfortable during his stay.

Coldwater.—The audience was largely increased over last year's. All the officers were present, and the president, Mr. Lovering, pledged his word that he would do what he could for the Society this year. The Rev. A. Bedford deserves our thanks for the kindness he has shown your agent, and the pains he has taken in the establishment of the branch.

Bracebridge.—The meeting was held in the beautiful new Methodist Church. The Rev. Mr. Brown, the pastor, and Rev. Dr. Clark (Presbyterian), both true friends of the Society, were present. The audience was smaller than expected. Regret was expressed by several for this feature at the close of our meeting, and assurances were made that a special effort would be put forth next year.

REV. ROBERT BURNS, PH. B.—*Copetown*, October 31st, 1889.—The meeting was held in Zion Hill Methodist Church. Wm. T. Howell was appointed secretary *pro tem*, and read the report, which showed the very encouraging state of the branch. There is an increase in the contribution over the preceding year. The Rev. George Cookman was elected president in the place of Mr. Kitchen, who so ably filled the position for a number of years, but now wished to retire. The audience was good, notwithstanding it was a wet night. The depository is carefully kept.

Jerseyville.—The weather was very stormy and was against the meeting, which was held in the Baptist Church one and a half miles south of the village. About twenty gentlemen were present. Rev. R. Bridgman, the pastor, was elected president. In the absence of the secretary no report was given. The collectors were appointed, after which the agent addressed the few who braved the storm. I believe the officers, committee and collectors will give a fair report for the current year.

Lynden.—On Saturday evening I addressed a meeting in the Methodist Church. The meeting was a good one although it was a wet night. A branch was duly organized. The officers, committee and collectors were appointed. Mr. Jamieson consented to take the depository. The choir rendered excellent service. The Rev. H. C. Cook assisted by his counsel and support. I preached twice on Sunday, and set forth the claims of the Bible on the world. I believe *Lynden* will give a good report.

Alberston.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The Rev. Mr. McClung occupied the chair, and the choir led in the singing. The officers were re-elected. The agent reviewed the Society's work during the past year. The meeting was well attended. An old gentleman (Mr. Irwin), eighty-nine years of

age, walked over a mile and a-quarter to the church, thus showing his zeal and love for our Society. The people here are very loyal to the principles of the Bible Society.

Kilbride.—A large and excellent service was held in the Presbyterian Church. The musical part was furnished by the choir of the church, and added greatly to the interest of the meeting. The officers and collectors were appointed. The financial returns will be liberal.

Burlington.—The meeting was held in the village hall. Mr. Gray, the president, occupied the chair. The Rev. John Wakefield read the Scripture and led in prayer. Revs. Mr. Abraham and Canon Belt also took part in the meeting. The agent addressed the meeting on the work of the Society and claims of the Bible. The officers and collectors were appointed, and the subscription books will be placed in the hands of the collectors at an early date. We trust that *Burlington* will give a good account of its work done for the Bible Society.

Strabane.—The meeting was held for the first time in the village of *Freelton*. The Baptist Church was pretty well filled by an appreciative audience. Rev. James L. Robertson, of *Strabane*, presided over the meeting in the absence of Rev. Mr. Bracken, the president. The village choir gave some very fine selections of music. The officers and collectors were elected, and the district marked out for the collectors. This is a fine, healthy branch.

Waterdown.—The meeting was postponed on account of rain, and the second evening it rained again, but we met and appointed the officers and collectors. It was decided that the agent hold a public meeting on the first Sunday afternoon of February 1890, in the Presbyterian Church, when he will give an address on the subject of the Bible.

Glenmorris.—This branch is just a year old. It is in a good, strong, healthy condition. Considering the poor state of the roads and unfavourable weather, we had a fair attendance and an excellent meeting. The venerable president, G. Fleming, ex-M.P., presided. The secretary, Wm. McDonald, read the report, which was a model in every particular, and displayed business tact and principles. Rev. Robert Pettigrew assisted by his sympathy and support. The officers were elected and collectors appointed. *Glenmorris* will give a good report for the current year.

REV. A. CAMPBELL—*Moir.*—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, with a good congregation, considering the storm. The agent addressed the meeting, and officers and collectors were appointed. The people seemed to be encouraged, and the prospects are good for work.

Roslin and Thomasburg.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The pastor was present and did good service. The president, Dr. Hudson, in the chair, encouraged the people to support this good cause. The collectors have done well, and they and the officers were re-appointed for another year. This branch is growing in interest and good work.

Tweed.—This branch is also growing in interest. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The pastor, Rev. Wm. Limbert, was present and made a good speech. President R. Gordon presided ably. The agent addressed an enthusiastic meeting. This branch is in advance of last year, and expects to do better this year. Officers and collectors were appointed.

Flinton.—Here we organized a new depository with good prospects of usefulness, and also of doing good work. Secretary, James M. Dafoe; Depository, Mrs. William Campbell; Treasurer, Bro. Briden.

Madoc.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The pastor, Rev. D. Wishart, was present and did good service. Secretary-Treasurer E. D. O'Flynn was present with matured minutes and reports. Rev. O. R. Lambly,

Methodist minister, was also present and addressed the meeting. Officers and collectors were appointed. This branch is characteristic of the town: it is doing well and purposes to do better.

Trenton.—The depository was examined by the agent, and the depository found to have sold more Bibles than any other branch on the route. The collectors have not performed their duty as yet, but are expected to report soon. This ought to be a vigorous branch, and no doubt will develop in the future.

Frankford.—This branch is moving in the right direction. The free-will offerings will double last year's. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, the pastor being present. He and the Church of England clergyman made good speeches. The officers were present and enthusiastic. Officers and collectors were appointed for the coming year. Purchases in advance of last year.

Stirling.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, the pastor and Methodist minister being present to help on the good cause. Dr. Boulter, one of the best financiers, made his report. This branch has done good work every year. Officers and collectors were appointed.

Campbellford.—The meeting held in the Methodist Church was a good turn out, and was presided over by the president. The officers were present with a firm conviction of their duty and a good purpose to discharge it. The report will show advanced work this year, most of the money being remitted before the meeting. Officers and collectors were appointed.

REV. A. B. CHAMBERS—*Tamworth.*—This is a rising village on the Napanee and Tamworth Railroad. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, and was almost exclusively a Methodist gathering. Although the attendance was not large we had a good meeting, and a collection somewhat in advance of last year's. The subscription taken at the meeting was larger than the total collected for the preceding year. When the collectors complete their work I anticipate a respectable increase. The Presbyterians have just dedicated a commodious new church in this village, and at my suggestion the pastor, Rev. Mr. Smith, has very cordially placed it at the disposal of the Society for next year's meeting.

Newburgh.—The meeting of this branch was held in the Presbyterian Church. The weather was rather unfavourable, but a goodly number manifested by their presence their interest in the work of the Society. The pastor, Rev. Mr. Allan, conducted the opening exercises and made a short and appropriate address. Rev. D. D. Crossley (Methodist) also rendered valuable assistance. The spirit of the meeting was good, and it is confidently expected that the financial returns will be at least equal to last year's.

Deseronto.—The meeting was held in the elegant Presbyterian Church. Devotional exercises were conducted by the pastor, Rev. Mr. Craig; suitable music was rendered by the choir, and Rev. A. Campbell (Methodist) assisted. A good audience gave your agent an attentive hearing, and at the close of the address gave a good collection to the Society.

Melrose.—We had an interesting meeting in this rural village. Rev. James Rattray (Presbyterian) did good service. A select choir rendered valuable assistance. Four additional collectors were appointed, so as to take in two other villages, where there are no branches. I was very much pleased with the spirit of the Melrose people.

Picton.—This was the most disappointing meeting of the series. In our larger towns there are so many public meetings and so many local interests that it seems impossible to get a large and enthusiastic meeting under the auspices of the Bible Society. I have, however, reason to hope that the officers and people were so dissatisfied with the apathy into which they had all fallen, that greater efforts will be made in the future. I shall be very much disappointed if the next

annual meeting be not larger, more enthusiastic, and much more in harmony with the great work in which the Bible Society is engaged.

Milford.—Rev. Mr. Achison (Episcopalian) presided over a good audience in the Methodist Church. The pastor, Rev. James Faull, opened the meeting, and his choir added greatly to the interest of the occasion. Your agent regarded this as a pleasant and profitable meeting.

Cherry Valley.—This is a small but pretty village. One of its chief ornaments is the fine Methodist Church in which the meeting was held. Rev. M. R. Adams (Methodist) conducted the devotional-exercises, and, in the absence of the president, occupied the chair. Considering the size of the village the attendance was good, and encouraged your agent by the interest manifested. The officers are full of hope for a good year.

Wellington.—Notwithstanding unfavourable weather, we had a large audience. My friend, Rev. W. R. Young, the popular pastor of the Methodist Church, had done all in his power to make the meeting a success. It gave me much pleasure to meet an old and highly-esteemed friend, Mr. J. M. Squier, who occupied the chair as president of this branch. The energy of the officers, the appearance of the hearers and the excellence of the choir, made this a pleasant meeting and promised well for the future.

Bloomfield.—We had good weather and a good meeting in the Methodist Church. Rev. J. A. Jewell, M.A., gave proof of sincere interest in the work. Music rendered by a fine choir greatly enhanced the pleasure of the meeting. Mr. Williams, the venerable president, read a valuable address, and the congregation was perhaps the largest I have had the pleasure of meeting. Some changes were made in the officiating which were deemed in the interest of the Society. This meeting formed a very agreeable conclusion to the work of your agent.

REV. R. M. CROLL—*Hanover*, Monday, Nov. 25th. In its population this village has a large German element. Here is a depository admirably furnished and well kept. The meeting held in the German Baptist Church was well attended. Rev. T. H. Highly, as president, read the Scriptures and called on Rev. N. Paterson to engage in prayer. Good singing very much enlivened the exercises. Rev. A. Clark (Methodist), Rev. W. Baccus pastor of the church, and Rev. Mr. Schwartz (Evangelical Association) delivered short addresses. The two latter gentlemen spoke in German, and, I was informed, were understood by the majority of those present. Your agent then addressed the meeting. Here the officers are energetic, and the people manifest great interest in the work.

Tara and Invermay, Tuesday, Nov. 26th. Called on the secretary and depository. I was greeted with a large meeting held in the Presbyterian Church. The venerable president, A. Brunton, Esq., presided. Rev. J. I. Smith (Methodist) conducted the opening exercises. Reports read and adopted. Your agent then addressed an audience fully in sympathy with the work. This is a real live branch, with a good executive. Mr. F. R. Noble, the secretary, is indefatigable. They hope at least to equal their splendid efforts of last year.

Arkwright, Wednesday, Nov. 27th. The day was rough and stormy, and rain prevailed towards evening. I found in the Methodist parsonage an old and valued friend, Rev. B. Shillock, whose hospitality I shared. The meeting held in the Methodist Church was small, but those present listened to your agent with unflagging interest. In order to work the other end of this field, it was agreed to hold the public meeting next year at *Mount Hope*.

Allenford, Thursday, Nov. 28th. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. A union choir was present, and preparations had been made for a large attendance; but on account of the depth of the snow and the unbroken state of the roads, the audience—though not so large a one as anticipated—was a good

average one. Rev. Mr. Moore, a kind and loving man who entertained me courteously, occupied the chair. Rev. W. Burwash took part in the devotional exercises. The earnest attention of the audience made it an easy task to address the meeting. This is a new branch, with a large field, but it is doing good work; it is well officered, and is full of zeal and hope.

Wiar-ton, Friday, Nov. 29th. Visited the depository and found it well stocked and reporting large sales. The meeting held in the Baptist Church was much smaller than it should have been. Rev. Mr. Vansickle, pastor of the congregation, presided. Your agent addressed the meeting, and the Rev. C. E. Bolton and Rev. Mr. Youmans, who were present, promised to bring the claims of the Society prominently before their congregations at an early date. On Sabbath morning your agent preached in the Baptist Church, and in the evening in the Presbyterian; in the afternoon visited one of the Sabbath schools of the town, and on each of these occasions he sought to enlist the sympathies of the people with the work of your Society.

Riversdale, Monday, Dec. 2nd. The day was rough, and on account of the stormy evening the meeting, though fair, was smaller than was expected. Here my old friend, Rev. R. Gray, pastor of the congregation, opened the meeting and presided over it. Reports were read and officers re-elected. Those present showed much interest in the work of the Bible Society, and expressed themselves anxious to have as large a free contribution as possible. The collectors are to be at this work in January.

Pinkerton, Tuesday, Dec. 3rd. The depository here is supplied with a good stock, which is all paid for. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, Mr. Garland—"mine host"—an old and valued president, was in the chair. Rev. D. Campbell, pastor of the church, engaged in devotional exercises. Reports were read and adopted. It was stated by the secretary that on account of the deep snow last year some of the collectors did not overtake their work. To prevent the recurrence of the same it was arranged that they would begin their work earlier in the season. The meeting was one of interest. The officers, all earnest men, are determined to work their field well. I have good hopes of *Pinkerton*.

Paisley, Wednesday, Dec. 4. Waited on the officers individually, and during my stay enjoyed the comforts of the president's hospitable manse. The meeting was held in the Congregational Church, over which Rev. J. Gillies presided. Rev. P. H. McEwen, pastor of the church, conducted devotional exercises, and with Rev. Mr. Johnston (Presbyterian) helped much in the work. The meeting was good and lively, though the ministers present thought that Paisley could and should have better. Found the depository in need of replenishing—a good sign. I have great hope of Paisley; it will doubtless do well.

Burgoyne, Thursday, Dec. 5th. I arrived by rail and livery. This branch has a purely rural field of operation. The meeting, which proved a small one, was held in the Methodist Church. In the absence of the president, who was unfortunately detained through sickness, the Rev. J. R. Jackson (Baptist) presided. After the adoption of the reports, your agent brought the work of the Bible Society before the attention of the people and urged reasons why they should give that work their sympathy and support. I have hopes that *Burgoyne* will do the large and liberal things which this branch is able to accomplish.

Southampton, Friday, Dec. 6. I called on the secretary and depository (the president was from home), and found that on account of another meeting placed for that evening, the officers had deemed it advisable to cancel the Bible Society meeting. Your agent met with the officers at the depository on Saturday afternoon and arranged with them for the work of the current year. The collectors will do their work, as usual, and the free contributions will be forwarded in due time. From the spirit manifested and the sentiments expressed, I have confidence the work will be energetically carried out.

Whitechurch, Monday, Dec. 9 I found the branch here enthusiastic and vigorous. A very large audience met in the Presbyterian Church. The Rev. W. H. Geddes—"mine host"—was elected president in place of the Rev. R. Carson, who, during the present year, will leave that vicinity. The officers and directorate are full of enthusiasm. Mr. D. H. Henderson makes a model secretary. By his address your agent sought to increase their knowledge of the aims and results of the parent Society, as well as to fan the enthusiasm and direct the zeal of the *Whitechurch* branch. You may expect gratifying and prompt results.

Walton, Wednesday, Dec. 11th. This is a newly-formed branch, which has done and still promises to do well. Here I found a painstaking depository, whose sales were gratifying. There was a large and pleasant meeting, at which your agent realized the assistance of the Presbyterian minister, in whose church the meeting was held. Mr. J. S. Smillie was elected president and occupied the chair. He is a man of executive ability, and the interests of this branch are safe in his hands. I have great hopes for the efficiency of this branch, as well as for the known liberality of the *Walton* people.

REV. C. DUFF—*Downsview*.—The meeting was held in the school room of the Methodist Church, and though the number present was not large, they were appreciative and intelligent. They handed me over in all the sum of \$27.67; appointed a new secretary, and seemed determined to push forward the work more vigorously in the future. It should be remarked that the amount contributed to the Society is larger than that of the previous year. They complain of the landowners leaving the country for the city, and those who come in their places do not take the same interest in the Society's operations as the old friends who have left.

Thornhill, March 5th. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, and a fair gathering was in attendance. A new president and secretary were elected on the recommendation of the retiring president, and it was arranged that collecting should be entered upon forthwith, and the results forwarded before the close of the fiscal year on the last day of the present month. The Rev. John Locke rendered valuable service in securing a meeting and in pushing forward the work of collecting funds for the Society.

Eglinton, March 13th. We had a very respectable turn out, and valuable work was done for the branch and the Society by re-organization and the appointment of officers and collectors, which were to immediately enter upon their work. Mr. George Clarke, the new secretary, ably occupied the chair. Mr. J. J. Gartshore, the new president, and Revs. McTavish (Methodist) and Hamilton (Presbyterian) did good service by their presence and speeches. The collection amounted to \$5.00, and they hope to forward to the Society a subscription list of \$50.00.

The REV. J. DYKE—*Port Arthur*, Dec. 5th, 1889. A well-attended and enthusiastic meeting was held in St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, with the Rev. James Pringle, the pastor, in the chair. The collection was \$10.06. At the close of the public meeting the branch, which had been dormant for some time, was revived, and an energetic set of officers appointed. We anticipate a good work will be done at this point.

West Selkirk, Jan. 22nd, 1890. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. Rev. Mr. Harvey (Episcopalian) and the agent, gave suitable addresses. The attendance was fair and financial receipts moderately good.

Morris.—The branch at this point has not been in a very thriving condition for several years, so we deemed it wise to hold our meeting on a Sabbath evening. The Presbyterian and the Episcopalian congregations flocked to the Methodist Church, in which the meeting was held. The three congregations quite filled the house. After service officers were elected, and the prospects are excel-

lent for the Society. The stock in the depository has been all sold out, and new stock ordered. The collection was \$5.00. Lady collectors from each of the churches were appointed, and promised to enter upon their work at once.

Emerson.—This meeting was well attended. The president, Rev. James Lawrence, was very ill with la grippe, and the Methodist minister was out of town, but a good choir aided the meeting very much, and the Rev. Mr. Hall followed the agent with an address. New officers were elected and collectors appointed. The collection was \$3.75.

Gladstone.—Your agent opened a new branch in this town, and was ably assisted by the Rev. Mr. Garton (Episcopalian) and the Rev. Mr. Stalker (Presbyterian); the Rev. G. Hanna (Methodist) was out of town. The audience entered upon the work with spirit, and with such good officers an excellent report may be expected from this place. Collection \$5.50.

Neepeewa.—Several circumstances militated against our evening meeting, which was poorly attended. The president explained that nothing had been done since the branch was organized last April, but expressed his sympathy with the objects of the Society's work, and his determination to press the work with vigour during the ensuing year. The Revs. Stewart and Edwards took part in the meeting. New officers were elected and it is hoped that a prosperous year has been entered upon.

Minnedosa, Jan. 30th. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. Addresses were given by the Rev. J. W. Bell, G. Gill, H. Lemon and the agent. The officers of the Society were elected and collectors appointed. The branch at this point is doing a good work. It has a vigorous secretary in Mr. George Beynon, who has filled the position for several years.

Rapid City, Jan. 31st. The agent had a very cold drive for eighteen miles to this place; and as the roads were drifted and the country new, he found it necessary to hire a driver as well as a rig to take him to *Rapid City*. The attendance was not large. The Rev. Messrs. Colter and Peters took part in the meeting. A branch was organized and collectors appointed. The return drive to *Minnedosa* next day was much pleasanter, as the road was not so badly drifted and the weather was milder.

Birtle, Feb. 2nd and 3rd. The agent preached to fair audiences in the Methodist and Presbyterian Churches. A public meeting was held in St. George's Church (Episcopalian) on Monday evening. The Rev. T. Mitton, M.A., pastor of the church, presided and gave the opening address. The Rev. James Hodnet and F. A. August took part, with the agent, in the meeting. The collection was \$5.90. A complete list of officers were appointed, and also lady collectors from each church. The agent received many expressions of interest and delight that the Bible Society had now a branch in the town.

Morden.—The Presbyterian Church was occupied by a deeply interested audience on March 25th. The day had been very stormy, and militated somewhat against our having a large audience, but those present were fully alive to the importance of having a branch of the Bible Society formed. The Rev. M. McKenzie, pastor of the church, Rev. Mr. Bracken (Baptist), and Rev. W. Bridgeman (Methodist) took part in the meeting. At the close of the address a collection of \$8.00 was taken up, and the meeting proceeded to elect officers and organize a new branch.

Manitou.—The meeting here was held in the Methodist Church. A large audience was present. Devotional exercises were conducted by the Rev. Thomas Argue and the Rev. Mr. Cavan; the other Protestant clergy were absent from town. The agent was greeted heartily, and his address evoked considerable enthusiasm. A collection was taken up of \$11.80, and a resolution unanimously passed to organize a branch. The necessary officers were elected, and the work entered upon with a determination to make it a success.

Boissevain.—The meeting was held on Sabbath morning, March 30th, in the Presbyterian Church. The various congregations united by previous arrangement. The Revs. Welsh, Darwin and Reekie took part in the meeting. After the address of the agent a collection of \$8.90 was taken up, and a unanimous desire expressed that a branch be organized. A list of officers was submitted and approved by the assembly, and a date fixed for a meeting at which the organization would be completed.

Deloraine.—The meeting at this point had been announced for 8.15 p.m., at which hour the people flocked from their churches to the town hall, which was soon filled to the doors, and the agent had the pleasure of addressing a deeply interested audience. The Revs. Munroe, Ferrier and Armstrong expressed their desire that a branch be formed. A collection of \$7.10 was taken up and a list of officers submitted to the meeting for approval. The service closed about 10 p.m. amid many expressions of delight with the success of the meeting.

Whitemouth.—This is a small village sixty-one miles east of *Winnipeg*, with a population of about two hundred persons. The meeting was held in the school house, which was about half filled with very attentive hearers. After devotional exercises Mr. William Saxsmith was appointed chairman. There are no resident clergy; religious services being supplied by students from *Winnipeg*. The agent gave an address on the work of the Bible Society, and the audience responded with a collection of \$5.10. After discussion it was thought advisable not to form a branch this year, but the agent was requested to visit them again next year.

Rat Portage.—The meeting at this point was held in the Presbyterian Church. The audience was not large, but those present manifested deep interest in the work of the Bible Society. The Rev. R. Nairn, M.A., pastor of the church, presided, and the Rev. Mr. Thorn, of *Kewatin*, led in prayer. At the close of the agent's address a collection of \$4.65 was taken up and a branch of the Society organized. There is a fine opportunity in this growing town for Bible work, surrounded as it is by lumber camps, saw mills and mining industries.

REV. J. B. FRASER, M.D.—*North Bruce.*—A fair meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. In the absence of the president, Mr. Airth, who was laid up by an accident, Rev. Mr. Eadie presided ably, and added much to the interest of the meeting. The new secretary, Mr. J. B. Muir, is a worthy successor to his father, who served efficiently as secretary for many years. The branch hopes to improve upon last year.

Underwood.—A large and enthusiastic meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The officers of this branch are specially efficient. Exceptionally good singing characterized the meeting. Rev. Mr. Little conducted the devotional exercises, and Mr. Hunter, the president, filled the chair very satisfactorily. The branch will endeavour to sustain its good reputation.

Tiverton.—A good meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. Capital singing was rendered by the choir, led by the president of the branch, Mr. D. McLaurin. Pointed addresses were delivered by Revs. Anderson and McFadyen. A good collection was taken up—a promising beginning for a prosperous year.

Pine River and Amberley.—This meeting was held in Pine River Presbyterian Church, the pastor, Rev. J. McFarlane, president, in the chair. The attendance was above the average of former years. Collection small, through an oversight in the intimation of the meeting. The depository is well kept, and promises to do better than last year.

Ashfield.—I preached to a full house in the large Presbyterian Church of which Rev. K. McDonald is pastor, on the Sabbath, and had a better opportunity of pressing the claims of the Society than would have been afforded by any

meeting on a week evening. The local officers will arrange for holding the annual business meeting, and the collectors will not overlook their important work. No public meeting was called to hear the agent of the Society.

Port Albert.—Meeting held in Presbyterian Church. On account of rain and various local circumstances the attendance was small. No local ministers reside near the place, and none were at the meeting. Mr. James Heyden, president, efficiently discharged the duties of the chair. The secretary and the depository both do their work well. Collecting done in this branch by the men, who will need to look to their laurels.

Kincardine.—A large meeting in the Methodist Church. The venerable president, Mr. McPherson, who has been forty years in Bible Society work, in the chair. The business of the meeting was soon through with owing to efficiency of the other officers. Local clergymen occupied only enough time to indicate their hearty sympathy. Collectors will do their work early and an advance on last year's contribution may be looked for.

Ripley.—On Sabbath evening preached to a fine congregation in Huron Church, of which the president of the branch, Rev. A. F. McQueen, is pastor. The other churches of the village had no evening service that all might hear the agent of the Bible Society. The large congregation was devoutly attentive and deeply interested. On Tuesday evening addressed what was said to be the best Bible Society meeting ever held in the place. The collection, \$13.33, testified to the interest felt. Some lover of the Word and of souls placed a \$5 bill on the plate. May God bless the giver and the gift, and may he be stimulated to a larger liberality.

Bervie.—A fair meeting in the Methodist Church. The president, Rev. F. G. Newton, in the chair. The admirable secretary, Mr. Henderson, had all the business in such good shape that it was soon transacted. The president and the Rev. Mr. Amie gave brief but pointed addresses. The choir of the church did their part well. The Bible Society has some faithful friends in Bervie. The secretary made a new departure, worthy of general imitation, by inviting the ministers of the place with their wives to meet the agent and take tea together.

Arnou.—A purely rural branch. The Presbyterian Church in the place vacant. The Methodist minister otherwise engaged. Had to take the whole meeting myself. Attendance rather small. Work of committee left to be done in public meeting. Urged a change in this respect and showed the necessity for it. Very kindly entertained by the president and the secretary of the branch.

Glamis.—A good meeting in the Methodist Church. Neither the Baptist nor the Methodist minister were able to be present; on account of special services they felt obliged to attend in other parts of their fields. Rev. Mr. McMillan (Presbyterian) rendered valuable and much appreciated assistance. The worthy secretary, Mr. Harrison, had all the business in excellent shape. The depository is well managed. Altogether the branch at Glamis is flourishing, and promises to be more fruitful.

REV. J. FRASER—*Oakwood*, December 16th. There was a hope of good sleighing, good roads and a good time in visiting this section, but the hope was not realized. It was a rainy, muddy time and so our meeting was not large. It was a hearty one, however, and the branch promises to do fairly well this year. Rev. Mr. Curts conducted the devotional exercises. A good subscription list was started. The sales were in advance of previous years.

Little Britain, December 17th. The rainy weather travelled with your agent and caused the meeting to be very much smaller than last year, but the friends here are in hearty sympathy with the work and will not let it suffer loss. Rev. Mr. Bamforth opened the meeting with reading of the scriptures and prayer.

The reports were in good order and the sales in advance of previous years. The young ladies appointed last year faithfully performed their work and are again ready to "do what they can."

Sonya, December 18th. This was the worst night of the week, yet some of the faithful came to the meeting. This section had already remembered the Society by taking up a collection on Thanksgiving Day, so do not fall very much short of last year.

Manilla, December 19th. A hearty meeting. Rev. Mr. Purkis (Congregationalist) conducted the devotional services, assisted by Rev. Mr. Lloyd (Methodist). Mr. Purkis gave some account of experiences in Bible Society work in Quebec, and the meeting seemed to be impressed with the idea that we have a great responsibility resting upon us to give our fellow citizens in that province the Word, life and liberty. The officers and committee here believe in being actively engaged in the work, so divide the district into sections and do the collecting themselves. The whole community is in hearty sympathy with the work.

Glenarm, February 4th. A very stormy night and few out. Meeting held in the Methodist Church. The president, Rev. D. McDonald, was ill in bed and not able to be present. There should be a depository at Glenarm.

Cambrai, February 5th. The meeting was an encouraging one. The friends had been at work last year for the Society, and your agent found a considerable sum in hand for the work and a hearty disposition to do more. Rev. Mr. Horten, Methodist minister, conducted the opening services in his church where the meeting was held. Your agent was kindly entertained by Mr. and Mrs. Lyttle. One of the Society's Colporteurs visited this section last year and made considerable sales.

Fenelon Falls, February 11th. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian church, the president, Mr. Thomas Roberts, in the chair. There was a good attendance. Evidently interest in the work of the society is deep and general. The branch seems in good working order. After the agent's address, spirited speeches were delivered by Rev. Messrs. Parker (Methodist), Frazer (Baptist), and Lochead (Presbyterian). A good collection was taken up.

Bobcaygeon, February 12th. Meeting held in the Presbyterian church. The attendance was small. In the absence of the president the chair was occupied by the Rev. J. R. Craigie, M.D., pastor of the church. After devotional exercises, conducted by the chairman and Rev. Mr. Oswald, Presbyterian, the secretary, Mr. Junkin, made a statement of the position of the branch. Last year nothing was done; no annual meeting was held and the officers of the previous year continued to hold office. New officers were elected, collectors appointed for the district and the prospects are brighter.

Dunsford, February 13th. Meeting held in the Presbyterian church. The meeting was considered large for the place. In the absence of the president Mr. W. Thurston was called to the chair. After devotional exercises, officers were elected and collectors appointed. The agent and Rev. Mr. Thomas (Methodist), addressed the meeting. The prospects are more favourable than last year.

REV. THOS. GOLDSMITH.—*Princeton*. My first meeting was at Princeton, where an epidemic of typhoid and malarial fever was raging, in which some of our Bible Society workers were suffering, but notwithstanding our meeting was larger than the previous year, and arrangements were made for a thorough canvass for subscriptions.

Drumbo.—Here we are in competition with a township fair and oyster supper, and though some of our friends were in favour of adjourning, yet the officers of the branch pluckily resolved to go forward, and their courage was rewarded with a full house and most successful and enthusiastic meeting.

St. George.—I spent a very pleasant and, I hope, profitable Sabbath in this place, preaching in the morning in the Presbyterian church, and in the evening in the Baptist, as engaged by the committee, and had a good opportunity of bringing the claims of the Bible before the public, and in the evening the three congregations met in one, with their ministers, showing how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity. On Monday evening the ministers of the place were all with us, rendering efficient service and making the meeting one of real practical interest.

Washington.—This branch, though not large nor "boasting of things beyond its measure," holds steadily on its own way, and is doing a good work.

Plattsville.—Here we had a good meeting, fair attendance, and then the Methodist minister (the only minister at present resident in the village) was present and did good service.

Mount Pleasant (Brant).—Here, by arrangement of the committee, I preached Sabbath, October 20th, in the Presbyterian Church in the morning at *Bishop's Gate, Burford Road* in the afternoon, and in the Methodist Church, *Mount Pleasant* in the evening, and on Monday evening held our meeting in the West Presbyterian Church. The meeting was much larger than the previous year. The invaluable president, Rev. T. Alexander, was in the chair, while the Presbyterian and Methodist ministers were present, and gave good aid and interest to the meeting. This branch will give a good account of itself this year.

Scotland.—We had a meeting of real interest here in the Congregational Church, though not largely attended. The meeting was favoured with an excellent address from the worthy pastor of the church, the Rev. Wm. Hay. This is an old branch and is doing good work.

New Durham.—My next meeting was at *New Durham*, where I found the worthy secretary, M. Corliss, waiting at the station to convey me to his residence and warm hospitalities. The meeting was a good one, fairly attended and of deep interest. The branch was duly organized and all their forces ready for vigorous work.

Burford.—Here I found warm welcome and generous hospitality from my old friend Henry Cox, under whose presidency the interest of the Society is kept alive and progressing. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, the ministers of the place present. The church was well filled, the meeting animated and hopeful of surpassing last year's work. It warms and cheers the heart of an agent to come into the atmosphere of real live Bible workers.

Welland.—Our meeting this year was held in the Presbyterian Church, and a few earnest Bible-loving people came together to consider the claims of God's word, and the Society that circulates it, upon their sympathies and efforts, and I am hopeful that after so long a period of *coma* this year may give evidence of throbbing life.

Font Hill.—Our meeting was held in the Baptist Church, and the pastor who was present rendered his aid to endeavour to rouse this old branch into new life. Some of the old friends and workers of our Society of twenty years ago, when I first used to visit the place, have gone to their rest, and some have moved from the place, and the present difficulty is to get the right persons to lead in the good work. We made the best selection we could and look to Him who alone "can give the increase."

North Pelham.—The night was stormy, and as it is in the country and the people scattered, it is not strange that only a few turned out. The officers promised diligence to do something in the matter that is practical.

Niagara Falls and Queenst.n.—We had in this place a most delightful and refreshing meeting. The Rev. Canon Houston, the worthy president, was in

the chair, and the Rev. Wm. Emory (Methodist) and Rev. Mr. Mordy (Presbyterian) were on the platform. The singing and speaking were of a high order, and the outlook for this year cheering.

Niagara.—In the morning in the Presbyterian Church, and in the evening the two congregations, the Methodist and the Presbyterian, met in the Methodist Church, crowding it to the doors. On Monday evening we had our meeting, and though deprived of the presence and counsel of the worthy president through illness, yet the meeting was large and the cash results satisfactory, larger probably than they ever reached before.

REV. JAMES GRANT—*Rockwood.*—This branch was visited by me on March 20th. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, Rev. Dr. Strachan, Presbyterian minister, presiding, with several of the local ministers present. The attendance was large, and the interest in the work of the Society rose to a gratifying pitch. I fully expect that next year will bring a substantial increase to the receipts of this branch.

Acton.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. All the local ministers were present. The attendance was, I am told, unusually encouraging, and the receipts of the branch more than during the past year. I think they will do still better this year.

REV. E. B. HARPER, D.D.—*Cooksville.*—This branch was visited on the 17th December, 1889. The Rev. W. T. Hicks, president, met me at the station, took me to his hospitable home, and presided at the meeting, which was held in the Methodist Church. The attendance was small, partly owing to the condition of the road. The secretary-treasurer reported the amount on hand, which, with the collection (\$1.20) made \$16.85. This sum was voted to the U.C.B.S. The agent earnestly urged upon the collectors now appointed a prompt and thorough canvass throughout the boundaries of the branch.

Streetsville was visited on the 18th December. I was kindly cared for and entertained by the Rev. W. R. Barker, who went with me to the depository, where the stock was examined and found to be carefully kept and in good condition. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, and was presided over by the Rev. Mr. Barker. No other minister of the place was present. The audience, which was fair in point of numbers, gave good attention to the agent's address for almost forty minutes. The hope was indulged that this branch will yet bear fruit proportionate to the ability of its highly favoured people. Officers for the current year were appointed and the meeting closed.

Derry West.—On the 3rd February, 1890, I was met at *Cooksville* station by Mr. John McCauley, the president of this branch, and taken to his house, about $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles from the station, and thence to Trinity Methodist Church $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles further, the appointed place of meeting. The church was comfortably warmed and well lighted, the night clear and the roads tolerably good, yet the attendance was small. Those who were present evinced much interest in the Bible cause. No depository is kept.

Milton.—The meeting was held in the town hall. The attendance was not large, but was select—embracing the more prominent members of the several churches. The president took the chair at the hour for opening. The Rev. Mr. McKenzie (Church of England) and the Rev. Mr. Parke (Methodist), took part, and showed deep interest in the cause of the Bible. The agent spoke forty minutes and received good attention and a vote of thanks for his address. The condition of the depository, the sales made, the contributions of the subscribers, and their application, were all highly satisfactory.

Norval.—The meeting was held in the new and beautiful Methodist Church. A good choir added much to the occasion. President Watson took the chair, gave us an interesting speech, and conducted the business of the meeting with

geniality and efficiency. The Rev. Mr. Argo, secretary of the branch, is the right man in the right place. The collections were all made, and the sales and condition of the depository duly reported. This is a fruitful branch, showing no signs of decay.

Erin, 5th March. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, which was well lighted and warmed. The night was bright, the "going" good, and the attendance the largest I have seen this season. The venerable president, Rev. H. Reid, and the octogenarian secretary, Mr. W. Tyler (42 years in office), were in their places, and warmly pleaded the Bible Society's claims on the Christians of our day. The Rev. R. Fowlie (Presbyterian), the Rev. G. Monro (Disciple), and the Revs. J. Ball and A. E. Thorley (Methodist), were present and took part. The reports from the treasurer and depository showed life, activity and fruitfulness in this branch. The sales last year were over \$16, and the free contributions slightly beyond those of the preceding year.

Hillsburg, 6th March. The meeting took place in the Presbyterian Church, at present without a pastor. The night was very cold, which, no doubt, lessened the attendance. The Rev. W. J. Waddell (Baptist) was the only minister present. He opened the meeting with devotional exercises and gave a short speech. The president, D. McMurchy, Esq., presided with ability and gave a useful and earnest address. Mr. John Byrne, the secretary, made a report which showed a gratifying liberality on the part of the Society's friends. The officers for the coming year were then appointed and the meeting closed.

Cheltenham, March 11th. The Rev. J. L. Campbell, the president of this branch, took the chair and conducted the business of the evening. This branch, through some tardiness in the past, got behind in collecting funds and making timely returns. An attempt will be made to remedy this. The stock is small, but is well kept. The sales have not been numerous, and the free contributions are below the ability of the constituency.

REV. J. M. HARRISON.—Arrived at *Moosejaw* and was kindly met by Rev Dr. McLean and entertained by James Bradshaw, Esq. All reports show a good healthy branch doing excellent work, excepting the depository, which we found in the rear part of a building formerly used as a printing office, but now not in use at all. The secretary is not afraid to work, and proposes to do it well. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, and excellent help was rendered by the Rev. Messrs. Taylor and McLean. The night was very cold and la grippe had a very strong hold of the people. Notwithstanding these difficulties we had a fair audience and a very good meeting. The return from subscriptions are far in advance of last year. We succeeded in getting the depository in the best situation in the town.

Wolseley, Jan. 21st. On Monday I took train for *Wolseley*, and arrived at 2.30 o'clock. Held the meeting in Presbyterian Church. A genuine North-West blizzard was blowing and it was impossible to keep the room warm. The meeting was well attended and very excellent addresses were delivered by Rev. Messrs. Clague and Campbell. Your agent addressed the audience for an hour, taking for his subject "The Bible as a factor of civilization." The financial returns were good, but a large portion of them were used in local expenses. The depository is well kept. The books are exposed for sale in a very prominent place, and are kept in an excellent bookcase. This branch is directed by live men.

Whitewood, Jan. 22nd. Arrived at *Whitewood* at 4.43 a.m., and was kindly entertained by T. J. Barson, Esq. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. Excellent assistance was rendered by Revs. Mr. Hamilton, Presbyterian minister. The audience was fair and the meeting enthusiastic. Good

work has been done during the year. A great deal of the credit for the success of the branch is due to the untiring interest of Rev. Alex. Hamilton. The depositary is well kept.

Moosomin, Jan. 23rd. We next visited *Moosomin*, where we arrived at 6 o'clock, very unwell indeed. In the afternoon we called on the officers and found that the work had hardly been pushed as earnestly as its importance demanded. We found the stock upstairs in an out-of-the-way place, but the depositary promised to have the case repaired and placed in good position. The meeting was held in the new Methodist Church, which is very comfortable, and very beautiful addresses were given by the Rev. P. W. Davies, and by Mr. McInnis, teacher of the public school. Rev. Mr. Douglas, from whom we expected help, was not at home.

Elkhorn, Jan. 24th. At *Elkhorn* we were greeted by another blizzard. Rev. Mr. Hopper met and took charge of us during our stay. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, and the Rev. L. Littlehales, pastor of the church, presided. Rev. Mr. Andrews, agent for Western Manitoba, was present and delighted the audience with a most excellent address. Your agent gave a short account of our work, and then at each of the meetings gave an address on "The Story of the Book." The meeting was most enthusiastic. Collection, \$5 00, which was reserved for local purposes. We organized a branch of the Society here, and I feel confident that good work will be done.

Broadview.—I spent Saturday in *Broadview*, preached twice on the Sabbath and held our annual meeting on Monday in the Methodist Church. The officers here determined to make the subscriptions a success, and so at their own expense gave Bibles as prizes to the most diligent collectors. Mr. Fred Gush, the president, occupied the chair, and Rev. Messrs. Bennie and Nichols gave addresses. The gathering was not large, but the interest was sustained throughout. Returns from this branch are very good indeed. Hard times prevail throughout but perhaps a little harder here.

Grenfell.—We had an excellent meeting in the Presbyterian Church. R. S. Garrat occupied the chair. A united choir added greatly to the interest of the gathering. Addresses were given by the Rev. R. Halsall and B. P. Richardson, M.L.A., when your agent, being called on, held the fort for an hour and a-quarter, after which we organized a branch of the Society. A collection of \$3.50 was taken, and left in the hands of the treasurer for local purposes.

Indian Head.—The president, R. Crawford, was away from home, as was the Presbyterian minister, and the chair was occupied by Mr. McLeod, who performed his duties very efficiently. Your agent had the whole evening to himself so he spoke for an hour and a-half. The interest seemed very great. Very little work was done here last year. We have better organization and are hoping for better results. The sales were good for so small a place, and the depositary is an energetic and careful officer. I feel very hopeful for the future of this branch. The Secretary of the branch deserves special mention for his promptitude, and under his direction I am hoping for better results.

Qu'Appelle.—I was very unwell, but the good hand of my God was upon me and enabled me to speak for over an hour. The choirs had united, and their singing added greatly to the interest of our meeting. The Rev. Mr. Tozeland gave us an admirable address that was directly to the point. The sales were fair, though not nearly so good as during the first year. The town is small, the country thinly settled, and the year has been an exceptionally hard one. The depositary is in a fairly good place—indeed, the best in the town.

REV. W. HARYETT—*Coboconk*, October 26th. Called on the ministers and doctor of the village, and found the Rev. N. B. Drene and Doctor Broad in full

sympathy with Bible work. Rev. Mr. Drene kindly gave up the morning to introduce your agent to friends, and J. R. Phillips, Esq., gave up the afternoon to the same; the result being that we were enabled to arrange for preaching twice the next day.

Sunday, October 27th. Preached in Presbyterian Church at 11 a.m. to a fair audience, taking for text II. Thess., iii. 1. Gave an address to Sunday school children at 2.30 p.m.; preached in the Methodist Church at 7 p.m. to a crowded building on the value of the Word of God. After the service a number of those specially interested met together, and a branch was formed.

Woodville.—Held public meeting in Presbyterian Church at 7.30 p.m., a fair audience being present. The president, Rev. M. McKinnon, took the chair and gave a short address, the nature of which indicated he was in full accord with us in the work. Your agent then showed what a noble work the Bible Society had done and was doing, and pressed its claims upon the hearers. No collection had been announced, as the pastor thought it not wise just now.

Sunderland. Tuesday, October 29th. Met in the Episcopalian Church at 7.30 p.m. and had a fair attendance, representing the four churches of the village. Rev. W. G. Mills, B.A., of the Presbyterian Church, acted as chairman; Rev. F. J. Lynch, Episcopalian, led in prayer; Rev. Mr. Desbrisay, agent of Evangelical Churchman, read the Scriptures; Mr. Evans, Baptist supply, prayed, and your agent gave an address of forty minutes on the work and claims of the Bible Society.

Sutton.—Held the meeting in the Christian Church. Quite a few friends came out, notwithstanding the storm, and we had an interesting meeting. The friends promised to try to make up in collecting what we lost through bad roads and weather. President of branch took the chair. Rev. Mr. Gardiner (Methodist) first gave an address, and your agent followed.

Unionville, November 14th. The meeting held in the Methodist Church was not largely attended, but those present appeared quite interested and made fair promises. Rev. Mr. Mackintosh acted as chairman and gave a short address. Revs. J. A. Rankin and G. G. Valentine (Methodists) made a few remarks, and your agent was called upon to speak of the Bible Society's noble work.

Beaverton, November 25th. This meeting was held in old St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church. Dr. Watson, president, could not attend through ill health. Rev. D. C. Johnston (Presbyterian) occupied the chair, and Rev. D. Williams (Methodist) spoke favourably for the work, and your agent told the story of the wonderful work the Society had done with the wonderful Book. A collection was taken up and a new depository was appointed.

Mara, November 26th. Held the meeting in the Methodist Church. It was a dark, cloudy night, but we had a fair attendance. President of branch took the chair. Rev. G. H. Raley (Methodist) gave an address, and your agent gave as much information of the Bible Society and its work as he could in a talk of about forty-five minutes. Officers here appear in full sympathy with the work.

REV. T. ALBERT MOORE.—*Ancaster.*—The meeting here was not so largely attended as before, partly owing to the rainy weather and partly because "Hallowe'en" was observed by the boys in playing tricks, and many heads of families were watching. However the audience was very attentive, and the officers look forward to a good report this year. Rev. Mr. McLung rendered every assistance.

Binbrook.—Your agent visited this branch on Thanksgiving evening, and found a large congregation in the Presbyterian Church. Rev. Messrs. Walkei

(Presbyterian) and Bell (Methodist), rendered assistance. We described many scenes of Bible Society labour, and every hearer manifested deep interest. There is no branch better worked than this one.

Jarvis.—This branch has been almost extinct; it was only through the persistent efforts of Rev. C. R. Morrow (Methodist), that a meeting could be arranged. The annual meeting was small but attentive, and the agent was urged to return and hold a mass meeting on the Sabbath. This will be done, and it is confidently expected that Jarvis will now do better than for the past few years.

Hagersville.—The annual meeting was held in the Baptist church on a rainy evening. There was a small attendance, but an improvement on previous years. The agent was requested also to hold a mass meeting here on the same Sabbath as at Jarvis, with the hope of enlisting a larger interest in the Society. Rev. Mr. Cripps (Baptist) was present.

Oneida.—This branch is well officered, and enlists the sympathies of the people of the neighbourhood. Though an unfavourable evening there was a good attendance, and close attention given to the agent's description of the good work being done by the parent society, as well as the Upper Canada Bible Society. Rev. Mr. Caswell rendered valuable assistance.

York.—A good meeting here. Rev. C. L. Bowlby (Methodist), was engaged in special services, and kindly gave up his church and the evening for the Society. The agent delivered an address upon the value of God's Word, and the blessings received from the same by its circulation. Mr. Bowlby also addressed the meeting. The friends decided to canvas considerable new territory as well as that formerly visited. Good returns may be expected.

Glanford.—As last year the agent arranged to spend a Sabbath with this branch. Owing to the very bad roads and the rain the congregations were small, Rev. D. Chalmers gave excellent addresses at each place, greatly interesting the people. The reports will be equal to other years.

REV. J. H. MOOREHOUSE.—*Alton.*—The meeting was held in the Congregational church. Meeting opened by singing hymn "Wonderful words of life," after which Rev. F. Davey, who had been appointed chairman, read a portion of Scripture and offered prayer. The accounts were carefully presented and found satisfactory. The work of appointing officers and collectors was then attended to thoroughly. In a few well-chosen remarks the chairman heartily commended the work of the Bible Society. Your agent was then called upon to speak, and was, apparently, listened to with deep interest throughout. There was only one drawback to this meeting, the attendance was small. I called on the depository next morning and found it in good condition.

Hornings Mills.—We met in the Presbyterian church; over fifty were present. Rev. J. Goodman occupied the chair. He not only rendered good service at the meeting, but had also previously kindly co-operated in the preparatory arrangements. After devotional exercises your agent addressed the meeting, presenting the history and principles of the Bible Society. Rev. Mr. Shaw, Church of England minister from Shelburne, heartily commended the work of the Bible Society. A vote being taken, it was unanimously and heartily decided to organize a branch. Officers and committee were carefully elected, and collectors were appointed for the village and for the surrounding country.

Dundalk.—The attendance was comparatively small. However, those who were present manifested a true interest in the Society's work. A lively spirit prevailed in the meeting, and the work of appointing officers and collectors was

thoroughly done. We regretted the absence of the president, Rev. W. H. Moss, who had been called away by the death of a relative. Unless indications deceive, the Dundalk branch will not be idle this year.

Holland Centre.—A meeting was held here Thursday evening, October 10th. There was a fair attendance. After I had given an address on the history, principles and work of the Society, the meeting resolved to organize a branch. This important work was carried through thoroughly and right. Collectors were carefully appointed to reach the whole district. Rev. Mr. Hartley (Methodist) resident minister, was present, and gave valuable assistance in organizing.

Chatsworth.—A fair number were present at the meeting, and after the address by your agent it was resolved to organize a branch. *Chatsworth* is a village of some five or six hundred inhabitants, with three Protestant ministers, and no branch being nearer in any direction than seven miles, there is ample room for the work. Officers, committee and collectors were carefully appointed.

Shelburne.—I was glad to find that although this branch appears blank in the report, yet it had not been idle—\$44.60 having been collected for the last year. Four of the resident ministers were present at the meeting. The usual business was carefully carried through. A lively interest was manifested in the work by those present. This branch gives evidence of life. Mr. Noble makes an excellent secretary, and the other officers are also efficient.

Corbetton.—This was an excellent meeting, and the interest lively and good. After the address, it being the wish of the meeting to organize, the work was thoroughly done, and collectors appointed. *Corbetton* itself is only a small village, but there are two churches, and it will serve as a point from which to reach the country around; while it will be an advantage to the neighbourhood to have the Society's depository there.

Whitfield.—There was a good attendance. After the address on the nature and work of the Bible Society, the meeting decided to organize a branch. This was accordingly done, and collectors were appointed. The opening at *Whitfield* is favourable. It has a field of its own, without interfering with *Shelburne* and *Hornings Mills*, which are the nearest branches; the former being eight miles distant.

Mono Centre.—The matter of establishing and furnishing the depository was discussed at the meeting, and it is likely some action will be taken soon. The officers here are excellent, but the branch as a whole is not as lively as it might be. Despite the small attendance the interest manifested by those present was encouraging, as they listened with the closest attention to an address of an hour in length on the work of the Society during the last year.

Cedarville.—There are two churches here, Presbyterian and Methodist. The meeting was held in the former, the pastor, Rev. John Morrison, presiding. Rev. Mr. Smith (Methodist) was also present. State of roads considered, the attendance was good. After an address on the history, principles and work of the Bible Society, the meeting resolved to organize a branch at *Cedarville*. Both ministers advocated the work. Mr. R. A. Vance consented to act as secretary and depository.

Orangeville.—This meeting was both discouraging and encouraging. Discouraging because the meeting was too small for a town like *Orangeville*, but encouraging because the interest manifested in the address was marked and lively. I had personal conversation, before leaving, with the newly-appointed president and secretary, and they seemed resolved that work shall be done this year.

Camilla.—The storm and snowy roads seriously interfered with the attendance, but the business was carried through as thoroughly as possible. Those present—manifested an interest in hearing of the Society's work. Rev. George Ballantyne, who is a warm friend of the Bible Society, occupied the chair.

Desboro.—Notwithstanding a severe storm nearly forty people assembled. Rev. Mr. Rogers (Presbyterian) and Rev. Mr. Armstrong (Episcopalian) being of the number. This branch was organized last year and made a beginning by contributing \$23.52. As I found on inquiry that a portion of the field had not been canvassed, there may be some advance this year. Rev. Mr. Rogers, who resides at *Desboro*, was appointed president.

Walter's Falls.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, Rev. Mr. Sanderson, pastor, presiding. It being the desire of the meeting to have a branch at *Walter's Falls*, we proceeded with the work of organization. There was an attendance of 36. It seems much to be regretted that the unfavourable weather prevented a large attendance, but the work was carried through as thoroughly as circumstances would permit.

Markdale.—I preached in the Episcopal Church morning and evening, and at *Berkeley*, five miles out, in the afternoon, presenting the claims of the Bible Society at each service. The annual meeting was held on Monday evening, December 2nd, in the Presbyterian Church. This branch was resuscitated last year. I was glad to find it had made a beginning by contributing \$32. The old officers were re-elected and collectors were duly appointed. An excellent spirit prevailed in the meeting, and the branch appears determined not to let the good work fall back this year.

North Sydenham.—The meeting was held this year in the Baptist Church. The president of the branch, Rev. Dr. Fraser, being unavoidably absent at the opening of the meeting, the pastor of the Baptist Church, Rev. Mr. Cunnings, presided in a genial, happy manner. Rev. Mr. McGee (Presbyterian), lately arrived from Ireland, was also present, and Dr. Fraser, president, arrived during the course of the meeting. As all three spoke in favour of the work, the Society did not lack advocates on this occasion. The meeting here was good, attendance fair, collection \$6.54. From having been long accustomed to the work, the interest in the Bible Society's operations is lively.

Owen Sound.—Three ministers of the town were present. The officers were carefully elected, and appear to me to be efficient men. Owing to the late hour at which the meeting began, the appointment of the collectors was left to the committee. Though nothing was actually forwarded last year, we were informed that something over \$40 had been collected, and was in hand.

REV. A. J. MCLEOD.—*Banff.*—The annual meeting was held in the Presbyterian church on Wednesday, February 12th, 1890, Mr. J. J. Fergusson in the chair. Rev. W. Dean, Methodist minister, conducted the opening devotional exercises, and gave a helpful address. The attendance was large. Plate collection \$7.20. Some special singing added to the pleasure of the meeting.

Calgary was visited on Tuesday, February 18th. The meeting was held in the Methodist church, Mr. Wesley Orr, president, in the chair. Revs. J. C. Herdman and J. J. Leach, at the conclusion of the agent's address, gave short but stirring addresses. The officers are talking of the possibility of employing a colporteur for Calgary and neighbourhood. Seventy-six Bibles or Testaments were sold during the year.

Maple Creek was reached by noon on the following day. A hearty meeting was held in the Methodist church; the pastor, Rev. J. W. Johnston, presided. The collectors had nearly completed their canvass before the annual meeting. Forty-five Bibles or Testaments have been sold.

Medicine Hat.—A good meeting was held on Thursday evening, Mr. W. T. Finlay presided. Rev. C. Teeter has taken much interest in the work. The officers for ensuing year were elected from those present, the various denominations being represented. A liberal collection was taken up. Collectors are at work.

Dunmore.—No branch exists at this place. It would be premature to organize now. An address was given on Bible work on Friday and public worship conducted on Sabbath.

Lethbridge and Fort McLeod were to have been visited on Monday and Tuesday, respectively, but a snow-blockade on the branch line delayed the trains for some days. Having waited from Friday till Monday, with only a very slight hope of reaching these two appointments, the nearest 100 miles away, when all hope of reaching the place in time for the meetings had to be abandoned, I telegraphed the cause of my absence, and urged them to hold their annual meetings on the days appointed. The affairs of these branches can best be regulated this year by correspondence.

Anthracite.—The coal mines, on which the population are completely dependent, are at a stand-still. In the hope that a change might take place for the better, the annual meeting was delayed as long as possible. All the officers have removed, and in the very depressed financial condition that prevails, it was deemed useless to appoint collectors; but the people are very hopeful about the future. The annual meeting was exceedingly small.

Donald.—We did not hold a meeting in this mountain town, although I have visited the place. Sometime ago by private enterprise, a number of the Society's Bibles and Testaments were placed in one of the stores, and are being sold at the price fixed by the Society. I believe the agent for this district should visit the branches if possible in October or November. Money is more plentiful, and the storms do not usually commence so early. I hope the general work of the year has been abundantly successful.

REV. JOHN MACMILLAN.—*Garafraxa*.—The meeting was held in the Congregational church. The office-bearers were in their places, except Mr. E. H. Smith, the treasurer, whose absence through sickness was deeply felt; he is an efficient worker. The president, Mr. W. Wray, ably presided. Mr. R. Y. Blyth had his minutes in splendid order, and read an excellent report. This branch worked well during the past year. The agent was heard with attention and evident interest, giving account of the Bible Society in its history and work. The Rev. Mr. Millican, who always takes deep interest in these meetings, was present, and made a good speech. The depository is carefully kept. This branch is in a healthy, hearty, active condition.

Mimosa.—The meeting was held in the Methodist church, at Dublin. Mr. W. Wray, "Mine host" at Garafraxa, kindly accompanied me, and gave me valuable assistance. The audience was chiefly composed of promising young people. The office-bearers were present. Mr. John Leslie, the president, took the chair, and opened the meeting, as is usual, with the reading of the Word of God, praise and prayer. The secretary-treasurer, Mr. R. A. Reed, read the report. It showed that good work had been done. All the collectors attended to their work, and reported to the treasurer in good time.

Moorefield.—We had our meeting in the Presbyterian church. The evening was wet and the roads were bad. The audience was small. All the ministers

of the place were unavoidably absent. The president, Mr. R. C. Brumpton, was with us, and took the chair. After the meeting was opened the secretary, Mr. George Mahon, read the minutes and the report. This branch did not do itself justice last year. The work of collecting was but partially done, but double diligence is to be applied this year, and steps were taken to secure it. The depository is carefully kept.

Rothsay.—Our meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The president was with us and so was the depository. The secretary, Mr. R. Harrington, gave us a model report. This branch has kept up its record, and steps were taken to make it, if possible, more efficient. The address of the agent was listened to with attention, and was well sustained by an able speech from the Rev. Mr. Edmison.

Drayton.—The meeting was held in the Church of the Christians. The audience was ordinary. The president, Mr. Whealy, took the chair. Mr. Isaac read the minutes, and the branch was reorganized by electing Mr. H. Diebel as president, D. G. Robertson as treasurer, and W. H. Gordon as secretary. Committee men and collectors were also appointed, and districts mapped out. From the remarks made by the pastor of the church and others, we hope good fruit will appear this year.

Glenallan.—Your agent had two services here on Sabbath, one in the Presbyterian and the other in the Methodist Church. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church; the audience was not large but hearty. The president, Mr. M. Henderson, took the chair. This branch had not its work for last year completed, some collectors reported and some did not. The branch has been out of harness, but it will develop, with care, into a good and strong one. Rev. Messrs. Morris and Hamilton spoke after the agent, expressing their purpose to attend to the working of this branch more than ever. So did Mr. Henderson, the president. The depository is well kept by Miss M. Porter.

Hollin.—Your agent preached here also on the Sabbath, in the Presbyterian Church, where the anniversary meeting was held. He found Dr. H. H. Fell and Mr. H. Maxwell as earnest as ever in the work of the Society; both are efficient officers. The president, Mr. Paterson was absent, but the chair was well filled with a substitute. This branch has lost by removals many of its best supporters, but it has warm friends yet. All the old officers were re-elected and the usual steps taken to secure success.

REV. C. O'MEARA—*Lakeside.*—The meeting this year was held in the Methodist Church, which is situated some four miles from Lakeside. The weather was very unpropitious, the rain coming down in torrents. Notwithstanding this serious drawback there was a fair attendance. The zealous president and energetic secretary were at hand to give an account of their stewardship for the past year. There being none of the local ministers present, your agent conducted the religious services himself. The collection was, under the circumstances, good, and the interest manifested most encouraging.

Kintore.—The night was again very wet and dark. The meeting was, notwithstanding the limited notice and the bad weather, fairly attended. The Rev. Messrs. Morrow and Husband assisted your agent by a few words addressed to the meeting. As the Rev. Mr. Husband was about to remove to another field of labour, he declined re-election as president, and the unanimous choice of the people fell upon James Sutherland, Esq., who will, your agent feels sure, do his best to fill worthily the position.

Harrington.—We were favoured here with a glorious night for our meeting, which was held in the Presbyterian Church. The pastor of the church Rev. Mr. Gordon, president of the branch, was unfortunately away from home.

The Rev. Mr. Grant, of Knox Church, St. Mary's, very kindly accompanied your agent and conducted the opening services. Mr. Grant also gave a very short but earnest address which was also practical. The secretary's report told of a good work done during the past, which will be doubtless the base for a still further advance in the next year's operations.

Innerkip.—Here the meeting was small. It was held in the Methodist Church. The pastor of the church was present and largely contributed towards making the meeting, notwithstanding its smallness, a bright, and, it is hoped, a beneficial and successful one. This branch is in good and safe hands when it has for its president and secretary such earnest and self-denying men as Messrs. Richardson and McBeath.

Corinth.—Here last year your agent had met with a disappointment, and had not been able to have any meeting. The officers had promised to make up for this much-to-be-regretted state of things this year. That promise was fully kept. The audience was not a large one, but there was a good meeting ably presided over by the Rev. Mr. Jackson, of the Methodist Church. Your agent cannot speak too highly of the officers, D. Connors, Esq., and J. Amoss, Esq. Mr. Connors gives to the cause the benefit of a long experience, while Mr. Amoss is the head and front of the real active work.

Tilsonburg.—The meeting this year was held in the Presbyterian church, of which the Society's president, the Rev. Mr. McGregor, is pastor. The president and Rev. Wm. Garnet, retired Methodist Minister, were the only clerical brethren present. The night was again very fine, but the attendance was not as large as it should have been. The Rev. Messrs. McGregor and Garnett conducted the devotional exercises. During the past year one of the Society's warmest friends and energetic workers connected with this branch, Mr. John Hill, has been called to go up higher. For many years Mr. Hill has acted as collector for the whole town, and so deep was his love for the work of the Society and so great his tact, so universal the respect in which he was held, that he has always been unexceptionally successful. This year Mr. John Wardell was appointed to take up the work. It was also thought well to appoint a committee consisting of two ladies from each congregation to assist Mr. Wardell.

Dereham.—A beautiful moonlight and a good meeting at Brownsville. Again, however, no minister present. The meeting was held in the Baptist church. At Burgessville your agent was alone. The officers and committee were all on hand and seemed to be full of zeal, and will, without doubt be able to give a good account of their stewardship if spared to see another anniversary meeting.

Beachville.—This was in every way the best meeting of the series; increase both in audience and collection over last year. The meeting was held in the Church of England. The Rev. Wm. Woods, its pastor, showed his interest in the work by driving from Woodstock, where he resides, to be present. He and Rev. Wm. Coutts both gave earnest and practical addresses. The president of the Society, A. Shaw, Esq., gave a short but pointed address. There is every reason to hope that with God's blessing this branch will go forward and prosper.

REV. W. W. SMITH.—*Angus.*—This place has not progressed of late, and matters connected with the branch have been discouraging. A new departure in putting two energetic ladies into office as secretary and treasurer. Collectors were appointed at the meeting for both Angus and Eutopia. Small meeting. Had the assistance of Rev. John Leishman (Presbyterian). Rev. Mr. Clark (Methodist), sick and unable to be present.

Avening and Creemore.—Two villages on N. W. Railway. Meeting at Creemore. Live branch; good meeting. Rev. Messrs. Vickery (Methodist), and Henry (Presbyterian), warmly advocated the cause. Two lady collectors for each place appointed. Made good collections last year; and they think they can do as much or more this year. Agent spoke for an hour, giving them facts and incidents, which they much relished. A union choir for the occasion; good singing. Two depositories.

Maple Valley and Badjeros.—Badjeros is the larger place; the meeting held there. No resident pastor, and no help, as far as speaking was concerned. Some warm friends of the Society among the farmers. A good choir and good singing. Met in Methodist church. Friends in good heart. Over \$60 was sent down from these little villages last year. Comparatively large sales in the depository.

Singhampton.—Meeting in Presbyterian church. No pastor, and Methodist minister away. J. R. Sing, a good friend of the Society, in the chair. Unfavourable night, and small meeting. Collectors did well last year; and they hope to do as well this year. The agent was well received.

Meaford.—Rev. Dr. Pirritte presided, and was appointed president. No other clerical assistance. The chairman recommended the Society and the agent. An encouraging meeting; did well last year. Expected to advance on it this year. A great shifting of ministers during the year; some staunch friends gone to other places. A fine town.

Stayner.—Over \$28 sold in the depository, part of it Tract Society's stock of Bibles, with Psalms, and paid for in cash, therefore not appearing in our returns. Rev. R. Moodie (Presbyterian), and Rev. Mr. Stevenson (Methodist), made excellent speeches. Both these excellent friends favoured the idea of an agent at a Sabbath evening union meeting in the town.

Painswick.—A rural branch a few miles south of Barrie. President C. T. Hunter is energetic and whole-hearted in the cause, as is also the secretary, Mr. J. C. Morrison. A fair meeting—60 present. A short and excellent address from the chair. Collectors re-appointed who had just finished this year's collecting. Agent gave the facts of the wide field at length to an interested audience.

Craigvale and Stroud.—A good meeting in the Methodist Church, Stroud. Mr. John Chantler, president, a venerable and leading member of the Society of Friends, gave an enthusiastic speech from the chair, urging greater work for God, and to be thoroughly acquainted with the Bible. Rev. Mr. Wellwood (Methodist) and Rev. Mr. McConnell (Presbyterian) warmly urged the Society's claims. In the matter of collections the vicinity was more carefully divided and more collectors appointed than before. There was an excellent choir present.

Lefroy and Bell Ewart.—Here I found thoroughly good officers and and everything well attended to. Meeting in Presbyterian Church. Rev. Mr. McConnell was again with us. This meeting was in his church. We had a most excellent union choir, which helped the meeting very much. Mr. McConnell spoke warmly. A young man sang a Gospel solo. Four collectors were appointed. The district is small, but will be well canvassed.

Churchill is situated two miles west of Lefroy. Meeting in Presbyterian Church. The pastor, Rev. W. A. Duncan, president of the branch, rendered efficient aid. There was a somewhat large meeting. The committee appointed had representatives from each church in the neighbourhood. The collectors appointed were all men. They are to finish up their collecting at once. The

branch is in good working order, under energetic officers. It did very well last year, and they hope to improve on it this year.

Thornbury and Clarksburg.—A good evening and a fair attendance at the meeting in the large Methodist Church. The choir of the church, composed of a dozen of very young girls, sang very sweetly a number of pieces, as they also did on Sunday evening. Rev. Mr. Fleming (Presbyterian) and the Rev. Mr. Washington (Methodist), both addressed the meeting. The president, Mr. R. Stevenson, gave the agent all the time he chose to take. All seemed interested. Collectors from both towns—they are only one mile apart—were appointed. A depository at Thornbury, in addition to the one in Clarksburg, was suggested. The officers will decide on the matter. On Sunday I preached in the Presbyterian Church in the morning to a congregation of about 200. In the evening, at the Methodist Church, I had 250 of a congregation. There is a thoroughly good president and secretary-treasurer here, a great thing for any branch.

West Darlington.—Meeting in Ebenezer Methodist Church. The minister in charge, Rev. Mr. Liddy, gave us good assistance. For some years this branch has been doing two things:—(1) Having its collections taken up by young men—this year six—and (2) Giving help to the Bible in Japan. They have also been extending their field by taking in a new district during the year. Everything encouraging—a purely rural branch. Collectors to go immediately to work.

Hope.—Next night at Welcome. All the week (first week March) very cold, with good moonlight. Rev. R. Hurley, the retiring president had spent a good deal of time collecting for the branch. Sent some \$40 last year, and hopes to do more this spring. Good choir. Live branch. Rev. E. A. Tonkin (Methodist) spoke powerfully in behalf of the work. His colleague, Rev. M. Kilgour, was in the chair.

Garden Hill.—Here in the absence of the president, Mr. McKeown presided, Ministers both absent, but had an interested audience. A good rural branch. When Mr. Dyer gets the woollen mills rebuilt (burnt out when I was here before) they will establish a depository. Collections to be taken up at once.

Newtonville and Kendal.—I visited Kendal first, as I wanted to see depository. Books well kept. Advised about replenishing stock. Hired a buggy to Newtonville. Meeting in Presbyterian Church. Dr. Leitch occupied the chair. Rev. Mr. Bartlett (Methodist) assisted. Fair stock in depository; sales small. Had I thought of it sooner, I should have also had a meeting at Kendal—the villages are seven miles apart.

Orono.—An important village, four miles north of Newcastle. Reached here Saturday, and preached Sunday morning in Presbyterian Church; evening in Christian Church. Monday meeting in Christian Church. The pastor, Rev. T. Garbutt, and the Presbyterian minister, Rev. Mr. McKeen, both helped well. The field is divided into six districts, and two gentlemen appointed to canvass each; they will go right to work, as it is late in the season. After old stock is sold off at a reduction, depository to be established at the post-office.

Hampton.—Next appointment, meeting in Methodist Church. Rev. Mr. McCullough (Methodist), spoke briefly and warmly for the cause. Your agent well received here and at the other appointments, with much kindness shown him personally. The best audience so far. None of the meetings crowded. The Methodist friends were very kind in giving their church for this meeting, right in the course of a series of Revival meetings they were carrying on. The two efforts did not conflict. Collectors (ladies) to go right to work.

Enniskillen.—Here is an energetic branch, well looked after by diligent officers and collectors. Rev. Mr. McLaren (Presbyterian), president, in the chair. Meeting in Methodist church. The former depository having removed, the books have been sold off. During the year, the president and some of the committee had held meetings at Mount Vernon and Enfield, two neighbouring villages, and got collectors appointed at each place, who went right to work. This new departure is to be highly commended. Other branches might often do the same. A good choir helped the meeting. The collections were all on hand, and a little more than last year.

Cartwright.—This branch is named from the township. The village is Blackstock; meeting in the Church of England. The clergyman in charge, Rev. M. Creighton, gave us every assistance, and spoke warmly for the cause; so did Rev. Mr. Kenner (Methodist). Sixty-two dollars were remitted last year, and they think they will do as well this year. This is another example of a live branch with the work well looked after by the officers.

REV. M. L. WING.—*Tavistock.*—The meeting was held in the Evangelical church, and pretty well attended. The Rev. Messrs. S. Krupp and Stern were present, and took part in the meeting. The collection was much better than last year. Business was promptly done, and everything brought into readiness for another year's work.

Sebringville.—Found the depository well kept by Dr. Eby. The sales of books were largely in advance of former years. Rev. M. Maurer, who kindly entertained the agent while here, and Rev. M. Clemens, both took part in the meeting. Attendance was quite good. Interest in the cause is growing here. Have a good staff of officers at this branch.

Zurich.—The meeting began at eight p.m., and was held in the Lutheran church. Attendance was good and interesting. There were present also also the Rev. Messrs. H. Hauch, W. J. Gaeger and Stremper, pastor of the church. They all gave brief addresses. Mr. F. Hess, the newly-elected president last year, did well, and takes an interest in the cause. The collection at the public meeting was better than for years. The books are well kept.

Crediton.—The Revs. C. Staebler and R. Redmond, were present at the meeting, and gave addresses. The meeting was held in the Evangelical church, and, I think, the best attendance we have had for the past three years. The old officers were re-elected. Everything else in good order.

Milverton, November 4th.—The meeting was held this year in the Presbyterian church, the Rev. J. Kay, president of the branch, presiding. Mr. Kay also gave an excellent address; also the Rev. Mr. Braun. Had an interesting meeting. Usual business attended to and matters arranged for another year's work.

Mildmay.—Meeting was held in the Evangelical church, and was very well attended. The Rev. Messrs. G. Braun and Berry gave also short addresses. The bulk of the speaking was left to the agent. Rev. Mr. Fairbairn could not attend on account of sickness. The collection amounted to over \$11, which was considered good. This branch has a good president in Mr. J. H. Moore.

Elmwood, November 6th.—Meeting was held in the Methodist church. The Rev. Mr. Burton, pastor of the church, was present, and gave a good address. The Rev. S. Eby also briefly addressed the meeting. The meeting was fairly attended. All necessary business was transacted, and matters arranged for another year. This branch sold more Bibles the past year than any year previous. The agent's address was given last, and closed the meeting.

Ayton.—The meeting was held in the Evangelical church. The evening was grand; attendance large. All the officers were present. After the transaction of the business the president, Mr. Wm. Langdale, gave a good address, followed by the agent, first in the German then in the English language. Interest is increasing in this branch. However, some of the other churches, the German especially, should take more interest in the cause. The German Evangelical church is taking quite an active part in the work. The officers are hopeful.

REV. A. YOUNG, of Napanee.—*Grafton.*—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian church. The attendance was equal to any former occasion. The depository was in good order. The officers were all present. The Rev. Messrs. Lord (Presbyterian), and Balfour (Methodist) were present and rendered assistance.

Vernonville.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian church. The attendance was much as usual. Rev. Messrs. Lord (Presbyterian) and Dowling (Baptist) assisted at the meeting.

Coldsprings.—Inspected the depository and found it well kept in a store and post office, and placed in a position to be easily seen. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian church, and was largely attended. The Rev. Mr. Gilchrist (Presbyterian) occupied the chair, and the Rev. Mr. McCamus (Methodist) assisted with an address. The public interest in this excellent branch continues unabated.

Fenella.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian church, Roseneath. The Rev. James Ross, the president of the Society, was unavoidably absent, but the meeting was presided over by the Rev. John Lawrence (Methodist). The Rev. Mr. Brown (Methodist) being present, rendered valuable aid. The attendance at the meeting was not equal to last year. The change from Harwood to Roseneath, however, might account for this.

Colborne.—Here it was arranged that I would spend the Sabbath. The Methodist church being undergoing repairs, I preached to that congregation in the Temperance hall. In the afternoon I accompanied the Rev. Mr. Duncan (Presbyterian) to Lake Port, and preached there in the Presbyterian church, and again in the evening at the Presbyterian church at Colborne. The attendance at all these services was large, and the work of the Bible Society was not overlooked. The annual meeting of the Colborne branch was held on Monday evening in the Presbyterian church. The attendance was large, and I was ably assisted by the following resident ministers, namely: Messrs. Duncan (Presbyterian), Davidson (Episcopalian), Tomblin, Carr and Dr. Bredin (Methodist). The officers of this branch were all present. The interest in this branch is growing.

Castleton, November 12th. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The attendance was small and not representative. None of the resident ministers were present. This branch continues in a languid state, and although promises of improvement are given from year to year, they do not appear to be acted upon. A new depository was appointed.

Percy.—The meeting of the branch was held in the Methodist Church at Warkworth. The attendance was good and all the officers were present. The Rev. Messrs. Thompson (Methodist) and Sutherland (Presbyterian) assisted at the meeting. This branch keeps its record of good management owing to the efficiency and zeal of its secretary and treasurer.

South Monaghan and Cavan.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church at Centreville. The night was dark, but the meeting was largely

attended, notwithstanding; the body of the large church being completely filled, and a number occupying the galleries. All the officers were present. I was ably assisted by the Rev. Messrs. Cameron (Presbyterian) and McCamus (Methodist). There has not been a depository opened here yet for the reason that a suitable place has not been obtained.

Millbrook.—The meeting of the Milbrook branch was held in the town hall of that village. It was fairly well attended. The Rev. Messrs. Burns (Methodist) and Cameron (Presbyterian) were present and took part in the meeting.

Brighton.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church in this village. The night was dark and rainy, and in consequence of that the attendance at the meeting was small. The Rev. Messrs. Buchanan (Methodist) and McLeod (Presbyterian) were present, and gave excellent addresses.

PROCEEDINGS
OF THE
FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY
OF THE
UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY.

HELD IN

KNOX CHURCH, TORONTO, WEDNESDAY, MAY 21st, 1890.

The chair was taken by the Hon. G. W. Allan, President of the Society, at a quarter to eight, and surrounding him were the Reverends Dr. Parsons, Dr. Thomas, Dr. McLaren, Dr. Potts, Dr. Reid, Dr. Dewart, Dr. Gregg, H. Grasett Baldwin, B.A.; W. S. Blackstock, T. R. O'Meara, B.A.; J. Burton, B.D.; J. J. Hill, M.A.; Manly Benson, J. G. Manly, Charles Duff, etc.; and Messrs. Warring Kennedy, John K. Macdonald, Alderman Gillespie, James Brown, George Dawson (Brampton), Walter B. Geikie, M.D.; David Higgins, A. T. Crombie, John Duncan, George Ferguson, S. C. Duncan Clark, A. E. O'Meara, Herbert Mortimer, Jas. Thomson, Robert Gilmour, C. J. Page, John Young, John Harvie, etc., etc.

The meeting was opened by singing

"All hail the power of Jesus' name."

After reading of Scripture (Psalm lxxvii.; I. Cor., ii. 1-14; I. Peter, i. 22-25; II Peter, i. 19-21), and prayer by the Rev. Dr. Parsons, the President delivered his opening address, as follows:—

In the Providence of God we are again permitted to hold an annual meeting of our Society. Since our last anniversary another year of Bible work has been accomplished. Throughout the whole globe bands of faithful men—the colporteurs of our own great parent, the British and Foreign Bible Society—have been carrying the Word of God to those who have hitherto been destitute of that Word.

Through the instrumentality of the same noble Society, that Word is continuing to be translated into new languages and dialects, in order to meet the ever-increasing wants of famishing souls; so that in many dark corners of the earth, during the past year, the Word of God has been carried to those who have been sitting in darkness and the shadow of death. To many such in this way has the glorious light of the Gospel arisen.

I read in the report of the parent society that they have distributed during the past year over 3,700,000 copies of the Scripture. This may serve to convey to our minds some idea of the nature and vast extent of the work, but we can scarcely realize the amount of patient labour, and laborious

brain work on the part of those engaged in the work of translating or the revision of translations of the Scriptures into every language of the earth ; or the self-denial imposed upon them, and the hardships and even perils encountered by these faithful men who have been thus carrying the Word into every part of the world.

I would in the first place say that if we would form anything like an adequate idea of all this, we must read the report of the parent society, and believe me these reports are by no means collections of dry details or statistics. They are full of interest and of living pictures of Bible work in every part of the world. You will see there how carefully and systematically the world is mapped out for a thorough distribution of Bible work, and you will understand from them how this work is carried on under varying conditions in every part of the world. If you turn over the pages of these reports you may trace the footsteps of the Bible Society colporteur as he carries his pack of Bibles and offers them for sale in the crowded cities, or takes his solitary way through the country to scattered villages and little hamlets, either in France, or Italy, or Spain, or throughout the States that now form the great German Empire ; or you may follow him, if you please, into the territories of the Russian Empire—that great Empire whose northern frontier alone stretches from the Baltic to the shores which look across the Arctic ocean to America, and comprehends within those boundaries 100,000,000 souls, and yet you will find from the Bible Society's report that there are very few parts of that Empire now that are entirely without the call of the Bible Society colporteur.

Then, again, turning to the far East, you will find the Bible Society's colporteur with his Bibles on his back amid the crowded cities of India, offering them for sale in the bazaars, at the religious feasts and fasts, to every purchaser who can read Hindoo or Mahomedan in his own tongue. Further East, to China, and you will find the work of colportage being carried on, amid the great discouragements and difficulties that there beset it, by faithful men ; very often amid pestilence and famine, but still being faithfully carried on.

Or, if we turn to what has been called the "Dark Continent" of this world—there has been very little regular colportage in Central Africa—but in Northern Africa, Tunis and Algiers, the Society have five at work ; and in Southern Africa, the famous diamond fields, where gather people from all parts of the known world and where almost every language in that part of the world is represented, you will find the Bible colporteur offering Bibles in Zulu, Bechuana, Kaffir, and in all the various dialects and languages of that country. I might say much more, but I think I have said enough to show you the wonderful extent of the work in which the parent society is engaged.

Now, I observe in the report that we have this year contributed \$5,000 free contributions to the British and Foreign Bible Society, and I rejoice to see it, but I am thoroughly persuaded in my own mind that if we more thoroughly realized the incalculable blessings which the translation of the Word of God into all these different languages has, through the instrumentality of the great Parent Society, brought to those who but for that might never have heard, let alone read, the Word of God ; and if we more thoroughly appreciated the self-denial and labour of the colporteurs in distributing that Word, we should make that amount far larger than it is.

While I say all this, and would urge a more liberal and greater interest in Bible work in distant lands, I do not forget that we have very great and

very important work to do nearer home. Thank God, the Holy Book is no stranger in the households throughout the greater part of Canada; but this Dominion includes within its limits many nationalities, races and creeds, and we know to some of them the Word of God has hitherto been, in a great measure, a sealed book. Now I think that upon us lies a very urgent obligation, which we cannot ignore, to do our very utmost to put that Book within the reach of those who, as I have said, have hitherto been without its guidance and light.

What, however, is being done with this home field? I am glad to say that very good and very important work is being done, and the zeal of our agents and the self-denial of our colporteurs will be very fully and satisfactorily laid before you to-night by one, than whom I do not think there is anyone more qualified to speak on that subject—I refer to our permanent agent, the Rev. Mr. Manly—and I shall therefore say nothing further in this particular regard.

Now, I do not wish to trespass further upon your time, because we have here gentlemen of very great eloquence and power, some of whom have come from a long distance to address you, and whom I have no doubt you are anxious to hear; therefore, I will end the few words I have to say by expressing the earnest hope that the words they shall address to us this evening may, by God's blessing, stir us all up to greater activity, renewed zeal and more thorough earnestness in the Bible cause.

Moved by Rev. J. G. Manly, Permanent Secretary of the Society:—

“That the Report submitted be adopted, and that the following gentlemen be Officers and Directors for the ensuing year:—”

The Rev. Mr. Manly spoke as follows:—

It ought to be well known and remembered by all our friends both here and elsewhere, for their encouragement and zeal, that the most magnificent Society on the face of the earth is THE BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY, and also that, by this Society's own repeated avowal, its greatest auxiliary is our own organization, THE UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY, now nominally in its jubilee year, but virtually in its sixty-second year. The Parent Society in London is the greatest, not only as wholly Biblical but as the mother and model Society for the world, as itself world-wide, as an unequalled Bible power and blessing, and as a glorious bond and building of Christian union; and ours is the chief auxiliary whose equal, for range, resources and Scripture-circulation, is not to be found in the United Kingdom, in magnificent India, or in continental Australia.

In this Dominion, EASTWARD OF KINGSTON TO THE ATLANTIC COAST, there are several Auxiliaries of the British and Foreign—as the Perth, the Ottawa, the Montreal, the Quebec, and others in the Maritime Provinces.

WESTWARD OF KINGSTON, as far as the Pacific Coast or Vancouver, is the whole course of this Upper Canada Bible Society, except in the Ontario portions of the London Auxiliary.

THE WHOLE FIELD OF THIS AUXILIARY contains 466 Branch Bible Societies, each usually including a Depository of Bibles and Testaments, and twenty-seven Depositories where now or as yet no Societies are formed.

THE ONTARIO REGION of this Auxiliary, from Seeley's Bay, twenty-two miles east of Kingston, is divided into thirty-eight sections, averaging eleven

Branch Societies in each section, or altogether four hundred and eighteen branches.

Three hundred and sixty-three of these Ontario Branches are *annually visited* by an official agent, for inspection and co-operation at the annual meeting. The remaining fifty-five *unvisited* Branches fall in, either responsively or spontaneously, with the design and endeavour of the directors to make as many branches as possible self-supplying, in order to lessen the expense of working, and in order to develop local ability and energy, both lay and clerical. It is well known, however, to all who have long watched the work, that many of the Branches would, without visitation, become unprosperous and unproductive, or would even decline and die.

What, then, is *The Use of this Society, its Purpose and Work?* First of all, to *provide* the Word of God for this vast country in every language that is either spoken or studied in it, as may be seen by a visit to its central Depository, 102 Yonge Street, in the hands of its tried and trusted curator. Secondly, to bring the Scriptures, the best and mightiest thing in the world, *within the reach* of every one that resides or roams in the land. Thirdly, to *sell* the Scriptures everywhere at one price, the lowest possible, often below cost, and in every variety of size, type and binding, without note or comment or apocryphal admixture; and in English, in the Authorized Version only. Fourthly, to supply the Scriptures *gratuitously* to the poor that want but cannot buy, to the needy red men, to Sunday schools that are unable to purchase, and that without us would be unsupplied. Fifthly, to *permeate* the whole country with the influence and edification of Branch Societies, that are centres of supply and sources of benevolent help, and also with the agency of colporteurs where needed; to make the Scriptures known and obtainable in the very newest, poorest and remotest settlements. Sixthly, to exert a Christian *missionary* influence throughout the land by the annual lectures or addresses of a carefully and impartially selected clerical agency of visitation, and by the readings and conversations of six or seven qualified Christian colporteurs, from house to house. And, seventhly, to take part in the same work *beyond us*, by helping other and weaker Auxiliaries, and by sending the Parent Society about one-third of our free income, or from six to seven thousand dollars yearly, so as to make this Auxiliary a catholic evangelist.

The need of Bibles, even in some old settlements and among some well-to-do people, as ascertained by ministers and colporteurs, is almost incredible. One minister, in three months' incipient visitation, found fourteen families, not far from one of our principal cities, without a Bible; another minister found an owner of four hundred good acres, an official member of a church, without a Bible. When his whole house was searched, all that could be found of the Word of God, for the minister's use, was a piece of a New Testament that had been thrown about the house as the childrer's play-toy. I could scarcely have believed this possible, if I had not heard it, and in public too, from an unquestionable witness. But what is Ontario's need in comparison with that of the regions beyond, both east and west, and, above all, in comparison with the world's thousand millions that, without the Bible, are benighted and imperilled in idolatry and falsehood!

Pity and doubt the nominal Christian who cannot or will not co-operate with this Society in giving our country and the world the Word of Divine light and love and life, according to the texts and translations of Christendom's best scholarship.

The *Colportage* service varies in amount and extent, according to eligible agency, Auxiliary funds, and the demands and necessities of the field.

The *Visiting* agency consists of one Permanent Agent, wholly devoted, and from twenty to thirty Provisional Agents of various denominations, to each of whom one section is usually allotted for annual visitation, throughout three years, avoiding interference with pastoral engagements, so as to make the ministers of the churches practically acquainted with the work of the Society. There need be no hesitation in saying that the success or failure of our work depends mainly on the resident ministers.

Of the *Permanent Agent's* share in it, for not a few years, much might be said, and of the Provisional Agents' much more, if time permitted, in relation to extent, method and circumstances, and to the people's general appreciation and aid. Obstruction or neutrality, sectarian selfishness, microscopic and misapprehensive gainsaying are happily exceptional and small. I can testify with gratitude and pleasure that the heart of this noble Province is true and responsive to the Bible Society, in harmony with Chillingworth's imperishable maxim that "THE BIBLE IS THE RELIGION OF PROTESTANTS." The people's hearts and homes are open to the Agents; and when they are called upon by our good collectors, chiefly ladies, they give for the supply and spread of the Bible, either out of their abundance or out of their diminution. This last year has not been to our farmers the most prosperous; the epidemic has affected many and bereaved not a few; the roads have been difficult and disagreeable for want of sleighing; and yet, since 1870, I have never had a pleasanter year, for attendance, attention, kindness and readiness of response—as may, indeed, be seen and known by the financial success, for the encouragement of the whole management and agency. *La grippe*, I am thankful to say, has not touched me or mine, and for the last two years especially I have not had any accident or adversity to cause a single disappointment in fulfilling my engagements from the east of Kingston to our western extremity. Sometimes, indeed, the work specially absorbs and drives to meet local conditions and preferences, and involves very much that is not pleasant to the flesh, but the love of the Book and its work and Author, together with the profit and delight of its minute and thorough study, and the conviction of Providential designation, infinitely outweighs all drawbacks and disadvantages. "This one thing I do."

I find that Sunday services, three in the day, in different congregations or neighbourhoods, sometimes including a mass meeting lecture in the afternoon, with the relegation of business to another time, are specially valuable, as affording the best access for information and appeal. Nothing better becomes the Lord's Day than the Lord's Word and work for the world; and for some places, indeed, it is the only day. "It is lawful to do good on the Sabbath day."

Lecturing on such themes as Bashan and Israel, Egypt and Israel, Babylon and Israel, Nineveh and Israel, the Bible and the World, the twofold truth of the Bible, in order to promote the better study, use and circulation of the Bible, with all its wonders and riches, I find in this land such faith in the Divine Book, such love for it, such practical union with fellow-believers, such thankfulness for this favoured age and place, and such regard for the evangelization of all mankind as serve to lighten labour, to make rough places plain and steep acclivities easy. AFRICA, as portrayed in prophecy, has been filling my mind and thought and looming before me for special early advocacy, that for her two hundred millions such men as Moffatt and Livingstone and Mackay, Bishop Steere, the translator, Bishop Hannington, the martyr, Bishop Crowther, the saintly, sable African, and Bishop Taylor, the self-reliant and enterprising leader, may not be few or short-

lived, to supply the record and preach the Gospel of the grace of God to the dark continent, "the mother of mourners," whose day of evangelizing grace is clearly come, and for whom the Master Himself is now sounding and summoning.

At this annual and jubilee juncture, when the old Board has rendered up its account and powers to the Annual Assembly of the constituency, and the Board for the current year is just elected, I may be permitted, after long experience, to say without partiality what ought to be said and known, what otherwise outsiders cannot well know, and what I have often said elsewhere, that no Society in this country is more vigilantly and faithfully managed than this.

The Board of Direction and Control is entitled to the confidence and coöperation of all the Christians of the land, including as it does the mercantile ability, the professional learning and clerical consecration of the various Christian denominations of this flourishing city and country. Such a Board and its several sub-committees, frequently meeting, carefully planning and allotting the whole work, periodically reviewing and adjusting it, making proper provision for it, and duly dealing with applications concerning it, is surely entitled to the hearty thanks and ready help of the whole community, and now particularly with jubilee joy. For the future, our Master's mandate is "Forward"; our maxim, "Faithful to death"; and our march song—"Glory to God in the highest; and on earth Peace to men of good choice."

The Rev. Mr. Manly resumed his seat amid great applause, and the motion, after being duly seconded by Mr. James Brown, was put and carried.

The second hymn on the programme,

"Hark the sound of jubilee,"

was sung, and the Chairman then introduced the Rev. Prof. Little, D.D., of Syracuse, N. Y., saying:—

I think it is one of the characteristics of Bible work that it unites together as one all men who really and truly love the Bible without distinction of creed or nationality. We have often on previous occasions been very much indebted to our friends and brethren from the other side of the line, who have come here to give us the assistance of their valuable services, and to whom we have always listened with pleasure and profit, and I think to-night I can offer you as great a treat as ever before, and have great pleasure in introducing to you a gentleman who has come from some distance to speak to you, the Rev. Prof. Little, of Syracuse, who will move the second resolution.

The chairman then introduced the Rev. Professor Little, D.D., of Syracuse, N. Y., with a few well-chosen words, calling upon him to move the second resolution:—

"That the Bible is the Charter of Religious Liberty, and the guarantee of Human Progress; that, courageously applied, its principles are a sufficient remedy for the evils, and, faithfully interpreted, are the keys to all the problems of our time."

Prof. Little said:—

MR. CHAIRMAN AND CHRISTIAN FRIENDS,—I count it an honour, always, to speak of the Bible. I should count it a very great honour to speak to an audience like this upon so important a theme, even though it were not con-

nected with what has been appropriately termed the greatest society on the face of the earth. But I certainly count it a very great privilege to be permitted to speak here to this auxiliary of the great Bible Society, that great Society which has been an inspiration to all the workers of the Christian Church everywhere on this globe. A great countryman of mine once said about Great Britain that her morning drum-beat followed the rising sun and encircled the globe with one unbroken round of the martial airs of England. Well, I think England has done something nobler than encircling the globe with an unbroken round of her martial airs. England has sent her missionaries and her Bibles all over this earth, and there is no continent that has not been hallowed by the bones of her martyrs, there is no continent and no island from which have not ascended the prayers of her saints and the songs of her redeemed sons and daughters, and that to me seems a nobler thing than anything else that England, in all her achievements, has accomplished.

Now, the resolution which I have the honour to move here to-night is one which I have chosen because it touches upon some of those familiar aspects of the Bible and its relation to mankind, which, from their very familiarity, are forgotten. We treat these things as we treat the sunshine, we know them so well that we never think it worth our while to praise them, and yet perhaps in these days it may be well for us to recall them and to ponder their significance. You will see that the resolution which I have framed has four branches to it, all growing out of the same trunk, and yet intertwined with each other. The first of them affirms that the Bible is the charter of religious liberty.

Now, I have chosen the word "charter" purposely. A charter is something *written*, and it is not the least of the claims of the Bible to the consideration of mankind that it is a written charter. Society advances and marks by certain acts its advance; and the stage when society passes upward to written law—when it has incorporated into a definite code the principles of constitutional liberty—is a marked stage in the history of any people. It was a marked stage in the history of Athens when Draco compelled the rulers of Athens to put their code in writing. It was a marked stage in the history of Rome when the Roman Tables were given to the people. It was a marked stage in the history of England when Magna Charta was signed, in order that the definite rights and definite privileges of free men might be known and distinctly understood. But God has done this wonderful thing for us of giving us a Book. He might have established a priesthood and committed to the priesthood His law, His plans and His desires, but He did not establish any priesthood to be the exclusive guardian of His will and of His purposes; but to the end that religious freedom might exist among men, always and everywhere, He wrote down His law—He inspired by His own breath a company of men of different epochs and different intellectual characteristics, all to co-operate together in the expression of that law, and moved as they were by the Holy Ghost, they have given us this charter from God, so that it should never be possible for any order of men to arise in this earth and say we have God's law, and we only have God's law to express among men. And so it has happened that whenever there has been any attempt among men to usurp in the name of God such exclusive authority over men's minds and over men's consciences, this charter has stood there as a defence of religious liberty. It is well enough for us to talk about Wyckliffe and Luther, and the men who re-discovered the Bible and re-published it to their generation, but we must go back in our thoughts to God, who first gave us

the Bible, in order that, though it might be covered over with the rubbish of men, it should always be there, that it might be re-discovered and might be re-proclaimed, and in the crises of mankind might once more come forth to save humanity. Now, I urge you to remember that there is no Church in Christendom, claiming to be a Christian Church, which dares to disavow this charter. I long ago read a somewhat striking book of Father Hecker, called "The Church and the Age." I found myself confronted with this passage: "It was," he says, speaking of the Reformation, "a most natural thing that both sides should appeal to the Bible, because the Bible was recognized by both sides"—recognized in a certain way, and so long as it is recognized in that way, just so long it will exist, not only inside of Christendom, but it will exist inside of every portion of Christendom for the eyes that can read it, the minds that can understand it and the hearts that can love it; that it may be just what this resolution sets forth it is, the Charter of Religious Liberty. Let one look at that striking incident in the history of France, when in their power and in their pride the Jesuits lifted up their hands to strike down what was truest and bravest and noblest in the Catholic Church of France; and then there arose that extraordinary man, Blaise Pascal, marvellous for his knowledge of science, marvellous for the diamond flashing of his brain, marvellous for the courage of his conscience, marvellous for the lucidity of his speech—there arose that man marvellous also for his knowledge of the Sacred Word, and with phrases that smote as the lightning smites, he struck down those foes of France and left them writhing, and they writhe still when Pascal's name is mentioned. And so long as the Bible is read, so long as its spirit is breathed, just so long will it be a power in the bounds of the Christian Church, even though that Church shall reach depths of degeneration and degradation that you and I can hardly think of.

And now this follows, so it seems to me, partly because of the manner in which God has chosen to reveal His Word, and partly because of the substance of that Word. The Bible is a very strange book—marvellously composed in many ways—and nothing to me is stranger about it than that it should have been written by men who were for the most part in opposition to their times. Moses was in opposition to Pharaoh; the prophets were often in opposition to the kings; the apostles were in opposition to the authorities of the Church, and, to a certain extent, in opposition to the authorities of the Empire. It was no fault of theirs, but the fact is just as I state it, and because of the fact it was possible, in revealing His Word through them, that God should give to mankind concrete examples of courage in the defence of faith which shall stand so long as this world stands, to be an inspiration to our humanity everywhere. It is something to breathe the spirit of Moses if one should have to contend with overwhelming authority in one's defence of one's faith; it is something to breathe the spirit of Isaiah and to breathe the spirit of Elijah if one should be confronted with the strong arm some day in defence of one's faith; it is something to breathe the spirit of Paul if one should have some day to stout it out against a high hand and against a haughty mind and a rude spirit in authority. And because of these illustrations of His truth, and the very manner in which God has chosen thus to illustrate His truth, the Bible seems to me to be what I have named it—the Charter of our Religious Liberty; and in the very substance of the Bible there is the very same thing set forth to us. What are, after all, the two great facts of the two Testaments of God? The one is a redemption from human bondage, the other is a redemption from a bondage worse than any

human bondage can be. Freedom is the watchword of the Bible. Freedom! That is the sound that we hear uttered when Moses stands before Pharaoh. Freedom! That is the word which is the watchword of the Israelites who are following him into the land which God promised unto Abraham; and when we come to the New Testament we clearly find that the service of God is declared to be perfect freedom, and there ring into our minds, into our consciences and into our souls the blessed words of our glorious Master, "Ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free." So that if there is anything that is set forth distinctly in the Bible, it is God's condemnation of bondage and God's love of free service; and almost the last word—the very "amen" of Scripture—is "Whosoever will, let him come"; as though God would make man understand that it is not slaves he desires for service, but free men—men who have intellects of their own and consciences of their own, and who serve him, not because of compulsion, but of their own free minds and hearts.

Now, having touched upon this first branch of the resolution, let me pass to the second one. I say the Bible is a guarantee—is *the* guarantee—not simply a guarantee, but *the* guarantee of human progress.

Why do I say *the* guarantee of human progress? Well, first of all, because there is no other. Scientific men say that when there is only one hypothesis in the field, they must accept that, for the simple reason that the facts are there, and the facts must be explained in some way. There is only one guarantee in the field; who else is guaranteeing human progress to-day? Have you noticed that philosophy has broken down in the nineteenth century; broken down completely—broken down completely and confessedly? We have had philosophies hitherto that have been more or less bombastic, but philosophy in the nineteenth century is utterly pessimistic. It has no other word to say than that there seems to be no hope for mankind. It has no other word to say than that the best the future can possibly bring to us is the extermination of humanity. It looks about upon the woes of society and says those woes are incurable, and it has but little to suggest to man except that each should bear his burden as best he can and avoid as skilfully as he can the calamities of life, and that is the philosophy of to-day. So it is with the literature of the nineteenth century. The literature of the nineteenth century is not only realistic, but strangely pessimistic too. The greatest of living French critics, Bouget, in a series of most remarkable essays on the great writers of France, names one after another, deploring all the time that with the single exception of Victor Hugo there is not one who is not given over to despair; and that even the greatest of them, and that the one he names as an exception, was touched with the very same disease. Literature has no guarantees. Poetry, even, has very little solace in the pictures which it gives to the imagination. Realism has supplanted all the idealism that used to make poetry so inspiring. And now what have we? Now that philosophy has failed and literature is failing, what have we if they take our Bible from us, and take away the guarantee of human dignity, and the guarantee of a terrestrial and the guarantee of a celestial blessedness which God Himself has put into our hands? Will you allow me to suggest to you another thing? Look abroad at the world to-day; where has there been progress? Not simply where there has been progress; where has there been progress? Pope Leo XIII. long ago chose to speak of the Protestants of America, and of his love for the Protestants throughout the world. Well, he has much reason to love them, for where is the Roman Catholic Church as sheltered to-day—where is it as safe to-day? Is it safe in France? Why,

the Roman Catholic nobleman of France must send his boy to England if he is to be educated in a Roman Catholic school. Is the Roman Catholic Church safe in Italy? They say not—they say not! In Italy it has not been very long ago since the Grand Duke of Tuscany sent an Italian family to prison for five years for reading the Bible; but in England, where the Bible has been free, in America, where the Bible has been free—in England, where it has been read, and in America, where it has been read, tolerance is known, liberty of thought is known, and as liberty of thought and tolerance are known in these countries, so progress and individual liberty and freedom among men is known in these countries; and the Bible, where it exists, has not only guaranteed men in their liberties and in their progress, but has gloriously made good that guarantee.

And then let me point out to you some other things in the structure of the Bible itself. Where is there to be progress? If there is progress among men, why do we want to make society better? Well, we want a better home, we want a better workshop, we want a better Church, we want a better State. We want to get these four things, and then we shall get further on toward the millennium. Well, what has the Bible to say about the home? Look at the two great central revelations of the Bible—the Revelation in the law and the Revelation in the Gospel. I sometimes wonder how Moses felt when he began to write the Fifth Commandment—"Honour thy father." That he could very well write without a tremor, because the spirit of the ancient time was that of reverence towards the father of the family. "Honour thy father and thy mother." There God sheltered the family for all time by lifting the mother to an equal place in the great commandment side by side with the father. "Honour thy father and thy mother, that thy days may be long in the land which the Lord thy God giveth thee." And now, when you turn over to the New Testament, you find in the facts that gather round the life of Jesus Christ the same wonderful shelter of womanhood, the same dignity for motherhood, for He Himself condescended to be born of a woman. You find the same wonderful, the same extraordinary guardianship thrown about the womanly character, and the same honour and the same dignity conferred upon the woman that flashes upon us in the commandment which Moses wrote—for it was to a woman that Jesus Christ revealed himself first after He came from the grave, with His triumph over death yet fresh upon Him, thus for all time presenting to mankind God's estimate of motherhood and God's estimate of womanhood. And you know perfectly well that just in proportion as this estimate of womanhood has been accepted among men, just in proportion as the mother has been revered, just in proportion as woman has been honoured by man, just in proportion as the home has become more sacred, just in proportion as the home has been looked upon as reflecting in itself the very relations which exist in the great and glorious Trinity, just in that proportion has society gone on from progress to progress and glory to glory. I want to point out to you another thing. I mentioned the workshop. As the workshop improves, society improves. The early work of man was warfare. They smote each other, and accounted that their chiefest and very noblest work. Jesus Christ, when He came among men, dignified work by that remarkable declaration in which He said, "My Father worketh hitherto, and I work." The first picture we have of God, is God serenely and quietly at work. It is no Asiatic splendour that is unfolded when the curtain rolls to give us glimpses of His glory, but it is a picture which seems to belong to our modern times, when the Great Architect cries, "Let there be light!" And as His word rolled forth in space, there came

back in worlds and in throngs of beings answers to this Creative Voice. God at work is the first picture that the Bible gives us, and so our Lord, standing among men, said "My Father worketh, and I work." God consecrated labour in the very first declaration that He had to make to man, and then that man might be taught a lesson not to be forgotten, so that he might be made to understand that even work has its limits, so that he might be made to understand that there should not be the exhaustion of the last drop of blood—that there should not be the exhaustion of the last nervous fibre, He said, "Six days shalt thou labour and do all that thou hast to do," and then He established that there should be no work done on the seventh day. You people of Toronto, I fear, do not know how glorious your Sabbath is, and you had better lay down your lives than surrender it. For when God established the Sabbath, God established the first great defence around the working men. (Hear, hear). When God established the Sabbath, He established it not for His own sake—He did not need it; but, as the Lord Jesus said, the Sabbath was made for man, not man for the Sabbath, and in the establishment of that sheltering institution God—I repeat—God made a wonderful landmark for human development, and all that is involved in any of these questions about the limitations of labour really lies in that commandment; for there God recognizes the weakness of man, there He recognizes the febleness of his frame, there He laid it down as a fundamental principle that, beyond the natural limit of his strength, no man was ever to be driven.

Now, if you go a step further, you will find that all that belongs to the progress of the State is really contained in the substance of the revelation that has been made to us by our great and blessed Parent; but let me, without developing these points at all, just call your attention to one other feature. The Bible is the only guarantee that we have of the value of man as man. There is no scientific guarantee of the value of man as man. There is no guarantee that you will ever get from political philosophy of the value of man as man. Your politician will see in man only the instrument of his purpose; your great diplomat and your great warrior will see in man nothing more than the checkers upon the checker-board, to be used according to his sweet will. Your scientific writer, who has no Bible in his brain and no Bible in his heart, will see in man only the survivor who is left after the struggles and the attritions and the competitions of life; but Almighty God sweeps that nonsense away with His own strong hand, and gives Jesus Christ to die for mankind, and upon the cross guarantees the value of every man born of woman. (Cheers). That is the reason I say that the Bible guarantees human progress, for human progress lies there, if anywhere; it lies in the recognition of the dignity of manhood, it lies in the recognition of the fact that, underneath the surface of even the worst humanity, there is another humanity which God can make over into His own image. Your hearts and mine were thrilled some time ago with the story of what happened at Samoa. There were vessels of war gathered there from three separate nations. What they were doing there only God in His wisdom knows; but they were gathered there ready for quarrel, ready for strife, ready for war unto the death if the signal should be given them by their respective governments. But God Himself chose to take a hand in that foolish quarrel among the nations, and so a great storm arose; the great deep was tossed up by the fingers of the Almighty and the great waves came rolling in, and the ships that were anchored in the harbour seemed as shells as the great storm burst upon them. One after another, lifted from its moorings, seemed to be cer-

tain of a speedy doom. One of these ships—the American flagship—seemed to be utterly and hopelessly lost ; but as the four hundred men upon that ship looked upon the waste of waters that seemed like living furies, and as they listened to the howlings of the storm that seemed to have no pity in their breath, they beheld the British ship *Calliope* making for the high seas, trying one last venture for escape. Breathlessly they looked upon the awful struggle as the *Calliope*, straining every nerve, her mighty engines throbbing with all their strength, and with all their steam, slowly, inch by inch, made her way towards the distant and safer sea, and as in that awful moment the boys in the American ship saw that their British brothers were gaining the mastery over death, there arose from out their throats a mighty cry, “Three cheers for the *Calliope* !” and these doomed and dying men (as they thought they were) cheered their brothers because they saw that their brothers would seemingly be saved. (Applause). That is what God saw under the surface of humanity ; that power, that beauty, that grandeur of sympathy which might make all men brothers ; which, if made permanent, which, if it came to be the one continued guiding force of life, would lift men up to the image of God. That it was that God saw, and He sent Jesus Christ down to this earth to make it permanent. He sent Jesus Christ down here so to redeem men that that which sometimes shows itself for a moment might show itself for eternity, and that those mightier possibilities of humanity which reveal themselves now and then in such flashes as I have spoken of, might go on until, with angels and archangels, man should kneel and say, “Thy kingdom come ; Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven.” (Cheers). And so I say that in the cross of Jesus Christ, in the fact that God took this interest in humanity that God gave his only begotten Son for man, we have the greatest guarantee that we possibly could have of the progress of mankind, not only for this life, but for the life that is to come.

And now let me just for a moment or two give a thought with reference to the two remaining branches of the resolution which I have had the honour to offer.

The third maintains that, courageously applied, the Bible is a sufficient remedy for all the evils of our time. Courageously applied. Now I do not mean that if you put a Bible on the shelf that the Bible will cure any disease. I do not mean that by shaking the Bible at society you can heal society of its ills. I do not mean that by any incantations or juggleries with the Bible you can help men out of their difficulties, what I have written is *courageously applied*. I mean, for instance, applied with the courage that Elizabeth Fry used when she went into the prisons of England, carrying into those prisons not only her own sweet presence, but her remarkable intelligence, her skill in the administration of affairs, her quick mother wit and her quick suggestiveness. In talking not long ago with one of the ablest prison administrators in my own country, he told me with the utmost frankness that Elizabeth Fry seemed to have grasped the entire situation from the very first, and that there has been very little suggested since her time that was not communicated in her first suggestions made to the British public as a consequence of her own personal experience in the prisons. When men and women, for instance, go into the prison-life with the spirit of our Master, as she did, then we shall see the evils disappearing there. Courageously applied—yes, as Clarkson Duff insisted upon the application of the principles of the Bible to Indian administration. Let anybody compare the administration of India as it was before William Carey went out to India, before the missionary movement had called the attention of all Christian people to the splendour

of India and to the character which the Indian administration ought to assume in that country. Let anybody compare the Indian administration of one hundred years ago with the Indian administration of to-day, and then let him say how much one single man had to do with the change—let him say how much the persistent labour, the earnest remonstrances, the great intelligence and great and zealous study of Clarkson Duff had to do with that change, and then I think you will appreciate what I mean when I say that the courageous application of the principles of the Bible is a sufficient remedy for the evils of our time.

Let me state another case. Over here, as I was coming along, your Secretary pointed me to Shaftesbury Hall. The Duke of Argyle spoke of that remarkable man, after whom that Hall is named, saying: "My Lords, not to any party in England, but to the persistent energy and courage of one man is due the moral progress of these latter times, and that one man is the Earl of Shaftesbury." Ah! But he had to apply his principles courageously. He was opposed. Sir James Graham opposed him. Sir Robert Peel opposed him. John Bright opposed him. Even large-brained large-hearted Richard Cobden opposed him, but he had the courage to apply his principles—the boy, the noble boy who had learned at the knees of his nurse the story of Jesus Christ, had in his soul some of the courage of Jesus Christ, and so though Lord Ashley was denounced, though he was misunderstood, though he was misrepresented, though he was opposed, though he was scoffed at, though he was hooted at, he lived to triumph. Thank God, he lived to incorporate into English Law what one celebrated writer says is the finest factory legislation of mankind. He lived to have even the men who opposed him stand up in the House of Commons and say they were wrong, and that same Sir James Graham, who shouted it out so long in opposition to him, with that manliness which is the characteristic, and the noblest characteristic of a great English Statesman, arose in the House of Commons and said in plain blunt words, "Lord Ashley was right and I was wrong in this matter." And now, I say, that is what it means courageously to apply the principles of the Bible—the principles of the New Testament, to the problems and to the evils that we see around us. No, we shall not by shaking the Bible, simply, over our desks, change these things, but when we go into society with the Bible in our hearts and the Bible in our brain, applying a sanctified intelligence to the remedy of the evils that we see around us, then we shall see them vanish as the fogs vanish often before the strong north-west wind.

And now, finally, in the Bible I insist you find the keys to the problems that vex us, the problems that confront us and demand a solution at our hands. These problems spring up in our track, and the question of our time is this question that we have individually to face. Can we have free thought and a stable Church? Can we have free and individual life and a stable government? Is there such a thing as unity amid diversity? Is there such a thing as coöperation, with individuality? All the problems of our time culminate it seems to me in that one question. Well, what has the Bible to offer us upon that subject? Here we talk about our Church differences, and the Bible stands among us as an everlasting witness that men may speak for God, and they may speak differently, they may speak in diverse manners and yet they may speak without rancour, they may speak without contradiction of each other. There is God's lesson to the Church. There, in this marvellous coöperation of men who "spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost" to speak, and here is God's prophecy of that time when there shall be One Fold

and One Shepherd, when men shall no longer confound free thought and free wrangling; when men shall no longer confound individual enquiry with individual consciousness and individual fidelity to the truth; when men shall learn in all candour to state their thoughts; when they shall learn in all candour to press their enquiries, and when by the free, frank statement of their thoughts and by the persistent and courageous pressing of their enquiries, they shall come at last to see eye to eye and look each other in the face and say "Our Father who art in Heaven." Why, brother, we are all brethren and we did not know it!

In the very revelation of God himself as a glorious Trinity it is made plain to us that there may be this variety of person, and this unity of being, and so from the very foundation we may take heart and take hope, and press forward toward the day of perfect union in Him, as Jesus was one with His Father.

And so, when men look upon each other as brothers, as Jesus Christ looked upon them as brothers, and go forth enquiring in the spirit of Truth and not in the spirit of controversy, when they shall come to attack all social problems, not in the spirit of those who turn and overturn, but in the spirit of Jesus Christ, who would heal and make alive, when His Spirit has been thus diffused among the thinkers of mankind, among those upon whom God shall devolve the burden of studying out the plans for the construction of society, when statesmen shall learn at the feet of Jesus, when philosophers shall come and kneel before Him and ask for that wisdom which is given liberally and without upbraiding, when this study of the problems of philosophy in the face of Jesus Christ, illuminated by the Spirit which inspired the men who wrote the Bible, is taken up, then you shall find that humanity has in its hands the key of every problem that is now vexing and tormenting it.

Professor Little resumed his seat amid continued applause, and the resolution was seconded by the Rev. John Burton, who said that the opportunity of doing so afforded him great pleasure, and he would content himself by simply expressing the hope that the responsibility which he believed all present felt rested upon them might lead to something greater being done for the Book which has not only such a wonderful history but possessed such mighty power.

The resolution being duly carried, and the collection taken up, the Chairman called upon the Rev. Dr. Thomas to move the third resolution, which he did as follows:

MR. CHAIRMAN, DEAR FRIENDS,—I am sure that you will take my resolution—indeed, I chose it on the understanding that the audience would receive it—on its merits, without any argument, for truly arguments in support of it are unnecessary. I really believe that the Board of your Society has a grudge against me. It has brought on these two last occasions the two most brilliant speakers that the United States can produce, so as to shelve me. I really thought last year in listening to Dr. Pierson, that I had never listened to a production that was more full of inspiration, in my life. I begin to doubt it to-night. I am sure that during the period of my residence in Toronto we have not listened to an address so full of inspiration or more calculated to bring us into sympathy with God's Word than that we have listened to to-night.

I most heartily sympathize with the idea that what the world needs to-day to rectify its tangled condition, to lift it up to a better and purer manhood, is the Bible, and I am sure that that thought has been deeply impressed

upon our hearts as we listened to the burning words of the speaker of the evening. Before I sit down I wish to say a word as to a statement made at the opening of this meeting, a very important statement, and one that should be made at all our meetings : I allude to the outline given of the work that has been done by our Society in Ontario. I am sure that all must have felt amazed on learning that there were in Ontario even members of Churches who had not a Bible in their house. May God give us grace to go on and see that His Word is put into the hands of every individual, especially in our own land, and may He hasten the day when it shall be in the possession of men everywhere.

The resolution that was to have been supported by myself is as follows :

“ The Bible carrying in its own interior structure, as well as in the affluence of its inspirational resources, indubitable witness to its divine origin and authority, is worthy of a supereminent place in our appreciation and affection, and no effort should be spared in placing it in the hands of every human being that lives.”

Mr. Warring Kennedy seconded the resolution, saying :

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,—I may say that I got positive instructions simply to *second* the resolution that would be *eloquently* moved by my friend Dr. Thomas, and I now fulfil my duty in obediently carrying out the spirit of my instructions and seconding the resolution that has been proposed.

The resolution was put and carried.

The Chairman then called upon Dr. Dewart to move the fourth resolution :

“ That the hearty thanks of this meeting be presented to the Speakers.”

Dr. Dewart said :

MR. CHAIRMAN AND FRIENDS,—I am sure that those who heard Dr. Little's sermon last night, and have listened to his thrilling and comprehensive speech on the Bible and its influence this evening will be ready to admit that their minds have been informed and their hearts stirred up by his glowing words, and I trust that we shall all go home to-night resolved more firmly and earnestly to do our full share in making known its saving truth to all nations.

Dr. Geikie, in seconding the resolution, said that the speeches had been most interesting, and that he had been particularly pleased to hear the statement as to the progress of the Society made by the permanent Agent, the Rev. Mr. Manly, affording as it did an opportunity for every one present to get a clear insight into the noble work that was being done.

The resolution was put and carried amid applause. The Chairman then called upon the Rev. Mr. Hill, who moved the fifth^d resolution as follows :

“ That the hearty thanks of this meeting be presented to the Pastor and Trustees of this Church for its use on the present occasion ; likewise to the Pastor and Trustees of Broadway Tabernacle for the use of their Church last evening, when the Annual Sermon was delivered ; also to the Organists and the Choirs for their valuable services on both occasions.”

Mr. Hill said :

MR. PRESIDENT,—From what we have heard to-night I am sure the resolution placed in my hands takes the whole subject out of the commonplace

formality of tendering a vote of thanks to the Pastor and Trustees of the Church where we have had the privilege of meeting to-night to hear this grand exposition of the grandest of all Books, God's revelation to man, and also our thanks to the Broadway Tabernacle and the Members of the Choirs included in the resolution. Those of you who heard the sermon last night and the speeches this evening will all agree in tendering their thanks to the Pastors and Trustees of the Churches where we have had the pleasure of hearing those words.

The resolution was seconded by Mr. Herbert Mortimer, and duly carried, the meeting being closed by the long metre doxology—the Rev. Dr. Caven pronounced the Benediction.
