6,500 ARE HOMELESS; San Francisco Is Rocked By Three Violent Earthquakes Today PROPERTY DAMAGE IS Sultan and 3 SALE OF NEARLY \$100,000,000 Sons To Marry

Ten Municipalities Completely Wiped Out and Toll of Injured Is Great; 200 Dead in Havana Province Alone

HAVANA, Oct. 22.—Reports of more than 650 persons killed in Wednesday's hurricane, an unknown number of injured, and 6,500 homeless, were mingled with frantic appeals for aid early this morning.

Ten or more towns and villages are said to have been completely destroyed. The damage is estimated to reach nearly \$100,000,000 at various places in the provinces of Havana, Matanzas, Santa Clara and Pinar Del Rio. In Havana alone it is estimated that 200 persons were killed and 1,600 injured, and that 3,200 families had their houses destroyed.

# QUEEN SQUARE

History Recalled in Connection With Its 135th Anniversary

One next Sunday Queen Square United church will celebrate its 135th anniversary. It is the mother church of the former Methodist churches in Saint John, and the following interesting facts concerning it have been gathered by A. B. Gilmour.

The organization dates from October, 1791. The first meeting was held in a house occupied by John Kelly, on the southeast corner of Princess and Charlotte streets. On Christmas Day, 1791, the little group took possession of and held an opening service within the first Methodist church in this city. It was a building in Germain street which had

was destroyed in the Great Fire of 1877. For a while they worshiped with Exmouth street church, then in Ring's hall, the upper flat of a building on the corner of Germain and Church streets. It was decided to move from Germain street to the present site, and the corner-stone of Queen Square church was laid on August 3, 1879. The schoolroom was dedicated on July 3, 1879. The congregation and Sunday school occupied the school until the opening of the church on October 5, 1879. On Christmas Day, 1891, the centennial of the church was celebrated, and in 1909 that of the Sunday school, with appropriate ceremony.

ANNIVERSARY FEATURES. On next Sunday the preacher for the day will be Rev. Dr. Clarence Mac-Kinnon, principal of the United Church

College, Halifax. Dr. MacKinnon is a former moderator of the resbyterian branch of the United church, and was the first president of the Maritime con-ference of the United Church. The choir will render music appropriate to the day. Rev. H. C. Rice, the present pastor, will conduct the service. On Monday evening there will be a congregational reunion, with a musical program and addresses. On Tuesday evening the Y. P. A. will have a program, and the observances will conclude on Wednesday evening with a prayer and praise service.

### Dorothy Dix

"The Dependent Mother Who is Forced to Live With Her Married Children Has Our Sympathy; She is a Martyr; But the Rich Woman Who Intrudes is a Parasite and a Fool," Says Dorothy Dix.

THERE are a million phases to the in-law problem, and one of the most difficult of them to deal with is that of the mother who insists upon living with her children after they are married because she cannot bear to be separated from them by even a few blocks.



This woman is not financially dependent on her children. She has plenty of money to maintain her own establishment. She is not old or ill or helpless. She is middle-aged and strong and well. But she has absorbed herself so much in her children that she has no life with out them. She has no interest except in them, and what they do and have and

So when Tom or Sally gets married, there is no possibility of leaving mother behind. She is fastened like the Old Woman of the Sea upon their shoulders, and they have to take her along into their new homes where she is almost invariably the evil genie.

THE other day a woman came to me with a case of this kind: people in the world, but hard to live with. There is no finer man than my husband, but he also has his peculiarities. Mother insists on living with us, and I have to stand

perpetually between these two antagonistic personalities, and it is me to a frazzle and driving me crazy.

"My mother has plenty of money," the woman went on. "She could live luxuriously anywhere but she is of the clinging-vine type and wants to be festooned about me all the time. She is not willing to be left alone for a minute. Wherever my husband and I go, she has to go, too, and he loathes it. I love my mother and want to do everything possible for her happiness, but, after all, she is nothing to my husband except a tiresome old woman. She isn't his mother and I can't blame him for resenting not having the home he supports to himself. We never have any home life alone together. And I don't know what is the right thing to do about it." me to a frazzle and driving me crazy.

"When a woman gets married," I replied, "she swears at the altar to leave father and mother, and cleave unto the man she takes for better or worse. Therefore, her duty to her husband is paramount to her duty to her mother, and in a case where her mother is ruining her husband's happiness and disrupting the home, the

"THIS is a hard saying. It is hard for the mother who has given her life to her child to know that there is no place for her in her daughter's house and that the child she has loved with an idolatrous love is happier without her. It is bitter hard for a mother to be forced to realize that while her children are necessary to her, she is not necessary any longer to them.

"But it is doubly hard on the daughter. I can think of nothing more cruel that can betall a girl than to have to evict the mother she loves and who clings to her and depends on her. It will tear the daughter's heart out of her to remember how her mother has cared for her in her helpless childhood; how mother has watched by her sickbed; how mother has sacrificed herself for her; how mother has put her before all the world.

"BUT, on the other hand, when a woman gets married she takes her husband's happiness in her hands, and if he is good and kind and tender and considerate, she has no right to let his peace be destroyed and permit him to be made miscrable by friction in his home. And living with an uncongenial person is a daily and hourly martyrdom.

"Furthermore, the wife is in honor bound to protect her home for her own sake and the sake of her children. She hasn't a right to let even her mother wreck it. And it is a practical certainty that an objectionable mother-in-law in it will drive the husband out of it into the wilds where the lady wolves in sheep's clothing wait to prey on the lambs that have escaped from the domestic fold.

"IN CASES where a mother has no money, and where she has to depend on her children for a living, and where they are not able to support outside of their homes, there is nothing for her to do but to live with hem and run the dangers that this involves. But there is no excuse for the comen of independent means imperiling their children's homes by forcing themselves into them.

"They know well enough that they are not wanted, because every young couple naturally desires to be alone. They know that they will be a constant source of discord, and that they run a good chance of breaking up their children's homes and being the cause of discord harves have them.

"They know that when they themselves married they didn't want any in-laws sitting around, or to have to drag an older person around with them wherever they went. They know how they resented the unsolicited advice that their in-laws handed out to

"YET they saddle themselves upon their children because they are afraid of being lonely. They can't bear not to be with Tom or Sally every minute of the time, and they can't endure not to dominate their children's

"These women think that they would be unhappy separated from their children, but they wouldn't. They would be a million times happier because they would have the joy of independence.
They would even be closer to them because they would be united in spirit.
No two people are as far apart as the mother and child who live together but between whom is an eternal conflict.

"It is for mothers to settle this phase of the in-law question. They have no right to force it upon their children. It is too cruel to make a tender and devoted child shut his or her door on the mother he or she loves. It is for the mother to have dignity enough, considera-tion enough, unselfishness enough, to refuse to put herself in a posi-tion in which she becomes an embarrassment and a source of sor-row to her children. She should never go to live with them.

HE poor, dependent mother, who is bound to live with her children, is entitled to our profound sympathy. She is a martyr. But the rich woman who insists on living with her children cannot be too much censured. She is a parasite and a fool." DOROTHY DIX.

That the credit of Canada in the United States was never higher than it is today was the opinion expressed last night by Frederic Hudd, Canadian Government Trade Commissioner at New York, in the course of an interview with The Times-Star Development of Canadian export trade, said Mr. Hudd, was one of the factors essential to prosperity. "Although more than one-third of Canada's exports go to the United States, under present tariff conditions, except in emergency circumstances," said Mr. Hudd, "it is difficult for the Canadian manufacturer to sell his goods there. The bulk of Canada's

present exports to the United States is composed of natural or partly manufactured products and this trade, especially in a few lines, such as pulp and paper and asbestos, is so highly organized that it more or less promotes

"A very considerable export business with foreign markets outside the United States is capable of development through New York indent houses. New York is the foreign buying centre of the North American continent and there are to be found many hundreds of export houses engaged entirely in selling products in the various markets of the world.

"It is important that the Canadian manufacturer should establish contact with these houses, preferably in person. In some cases the New York indent house has exclusive representation in this or that overseas market and through these channels it is possible for Canadian manufacturers to develop a very considerable export business. There is a special reason why the Canadian exporter should cultivate the New York indent house. Many are loing business in British markets, where Canadian lines are favored, not merely on sentimental grounds, but because of the preferential arrangements existing between Canada and other portions of the British Commonwealth.



The case against the income tax was presented to the taxation committee by Captain W. C. C. Innes, Dominion executive director of legislation for the Retail Trade Bureau of Canada, as follows:

"The system of raising revenue through the Dominion income tax is, in my opinion, absolutely wrong in principle in a young and undeveloped country requiring capital for the development of its national resources and country requiring capital for the development of its national resources and population. It is all very well to argue that other countries are subject to income tax, but it should be remembered that these old countries are fully developed and have generations of accumulated wealth behind them, while we in Canada have unlimited undeveloped national resources but no great accumulated wealth, and a burden which could lightly be borne by an old country with its great capital resources is one which might strangle the future development of a young nation.


### INCOME TAX HIT.

is the most outstanding check upon the industrial life of this country. Eighteen months ago my association, the Retail Trade Bureau of Canada (an association of outstanding retailers)
made a careful examination of the
workings of our income tax with a view of ascertaining, as far as possi-ble, the effect it was having on our industrial life. Our investigation more than confirmed our contentions and for the last twelve months we have conducted a vigorous educational campaign, holding public meetings in the principal cities and towns, and putting before the tax payers of this country our views on this matter.

### AS WAR MEASURE.

"The Dominion income tax was introduced as a war measure, and for that reason it was justified, but there is always a danger of such measures becoming perennials, and this is exactly what has happened with the income tax. It has had the effect of

### Bathurst Official Comes Out With Views On Proposed Change

Sports Editor, The Telegraph-Journal, Saint John, N. B., Dear Sir,—I have read with a great deal of interest your different articles regarding reinstatement of suspended athletes and in your issue of today I heartily agree with the system which is proposed, as a basis only, and think that some special consideration should be given to the misguided youth who participated in professional sport while under the age of 21 years. I consider that no matter how many years he played professional sport while under the age of 21 years that his sentence of suspension should not be more

than one year.

Take for example if a boy plays professional sport for two seasons during the ages of 19 and 20 years, your schedule of suspension would not allow him to participate in amateur sport again until he is 26 years of age. What chance would he have of coming back and catching a place on any team at this age after being out of all sport for six years?

I believe that one year out of the game for an athlete, who has participated in pro sport while under the age of 21 years, is a heavy enough senting with milk a ball players.

I would be glad to have your views on this point.



### RADIO SENDS 200 WORDS PER MINUTE

Editors in Montreal and London Exchange First Messages

Canadian Press Despatch. MONTREAL, Oct. 21-"It is a new girdle put around the world for closer understanding between all men of good will." In these words Lord Burnham, chairman of the Imperial Press Union, greeted the inauguration today of the fastest wireless service in the world, the Beam system, between Montreal and London. Messages were exchanged at a rate of 200 words a minute and reception here was perfect. The inaugurating messages were exchanged be-tween representative journalists of the

two countries.






