The Prince of Monaco. (Toronto Mail and Empire.) Prince Albert of Monaco who died a few days ago has been described as the greatest living patron of science, and he was more than a patron. He was a distinguished scientist himself, perhaps the leading authority on oceanography, which is itself a science not a hundred years old. With a specially constructed ship the prince sailed about the world taking soundings and making photographs and collecting specimens of the swarming life of the seas. The result of many years' study was a series of maps, the most important ever made in this particular field. Prince Albert was also one of the richest men in Europe, his enormous revenue being drawn from Monte Carlo, the famous gambling resort, which supported not only himself in princely style and made possible scientific investigation at huge cost, but also paid the taxes and permitted his subjects to live a life of comparative idleness. The little principality of Monaco is an independency, with its foreign policy under the auspices of France. Its domestic affairs, however, were controlled by this benevolent prince, and seeing the prosperity that the citizens of Monaco derive from the Casino and the worthy use to which the prince has devoted most of his income, it is not probable that for a long time to come there will be any internal movement to abolish the gambling which has made Monte Carlo celebrated and which draws annually hundreds of thousands of people to the smallest principality in the world. The Casino is run by the Blanc familiar the least of the smallest principality in the world.

The Casino is run by the Blanc family, which leases the privileges from the state. For many years the annual profit has run into the millions, and a goodly share has been handed over to Prince Albert, who spent most of his money on scientific pursuits. In the war he cast in his lot with the Allies, despite the fact that he and the ex-Kaiser were formerly friends. He handsomely supported war charities and turned over his magnificent estate to convalescing soldiers. No man of our time has used money obtained from so questionable a source to such good purpose as the late ruler of Monaco.

Montreal, July 12—Montreal is threatened with a general strike of all municipal employes, including policemen, firemen, aqueduct workers, incinerator employes and all the clerks at the city hall. A resolution, amounting in effect to an ultimatum, was unanimously carried this afternoon and evening at mass meetings of the federation of municipal employes. It calls upon the executive committee of the city council to give their immediate attention to "the grievances" of the civic employes and this resolution will be presented at the meeting of the city council tomorrow afternoon.

If a favorable answer is not received secret strike ballot will be taken, at hich if a two-thirds vote carries the roposal, a strike will be called within

wenty-four hours.

The "grievances" are connected with wages and working conditions. Mayor Martin, interviewed on the matter tonight, said that if the police and firemen struck, "there is only one thing to be done—call out the militia."

NEW BRUNSWICK AGRICULTURE MAKES STEADY PROGRESS

Ottawa, July 12—Interesting facts regarding the development of the industry of agriculture in New Brunswick are contained in the Agricultural Gazette of Canada for July and August

It points out that to meet the expenses of supplying information and education to the farming community of that province there has been and average appropriation during the last nine years of \$82,712.46 and a total of \$744,-412.19 has been granted by the provincial government.


The federal agricultural instruction grant has been used to supplement this work as well as to develop some new lines of endeavor. The total expended from this subsidy to March 31, 1922, was \$524,420.59.

Dealing with the dairy industry, O.C. Hicks, B. S. A., says in the Gazette:
"A reconstruction period in the dairy industry in the province has been in progress. The small creamery is passing and the new era has brought the centralized creamery in its place.

"There are now three large co-operatively owned creameries operating. One is situated at St. Hilaire, one at Moncton, and one at Fredericton. The amounts paid to patrons of those creameries for the last year were \$23,-939.93; \$192,995.92, and \$60,918.10 respectively.

The cheese industry has so strengthened under a system of factory inspection, grading, and marking of the product, that New Brunswick cheese is now sold on its merits in competition with the best of Canadian cheese."

TEN MILLION BUTTONS MADE. That Number Manufactured in the United States Last Year.

United States Last Year.

(New York Times.)

That the people of the United States pay an average of \$100,000,000 a year for buttons and have sent \$16,000,000 worth abroad since the beginning of the war is shown in a recent statement by the National City Bank of New York.

"The history of the button industry in the United States, since the war cut off our principal source of foreign buttons, drawn chiefly from Germany and Austria-Hungary, is," continues the statement, "one of great activity both in home production and exportation. In the year before the war the value of the buttons turned out by our factories was \$20,000,000, while a census statement recently announced shows the value of the out turn of our button factories in 1919, the latest census year, \$43,000,000, and exports in that industry estimate that the sum paid for them by the 'final consumer' in the United States was about \$100,000,000. The total number of buttons turned out by the factories of the United States in 1919 is stated by the census at 69,323,000 gross, or equivalent to virtually 10,000,000,000 buttons.

party of the Ottawa Poultry Association held at the Experimental Farm, Ottawa More than 300 poultrymen were present and during the day moving pictures of the event and a group photograph were taken by the Publicity Branch of the Department of Trade and Commerce. Mr. J. M. Caldwell, president of the association, was in charge of the programme. Within the past few years the hen had risen both in the estimation of the people and the government stated Dr. Grisdale. The latter now operated two poultry divisions, both of which were doing good and useful work in the fields of production and marketing. The net result of the work of both divisions was getting somewhere.

Egg inspections and grading were ferred to the possibility of registration of poultry in the future. There was now in Canada as 325-egg hen and Dr. Grisdale saw no reason why there should not be a 836-egg hen. On the question of the control of imported eggs, the speaker said that legislation would shortly be enacted which would in some measure control the quality of the article imported. The consumers were beginning to be more discriminating, and price was not so much the object as good eggs, he thought.

Prof. E. S. Archibald and his staff welcomed the opportunity to show those interested in poultry the work that was being done at the Farm. Prof. Archibald stated that in his opinion there were too few hens on the farms in Canada and household ecomony to keep them. Hens manufactured useful food from table and farm scraps, and it was necessary in a factory at Zwesten, near Schwaneide, Prussia, where surplus war material was being broken up. Many were injured.


