GOOD PRICE FOR SCHOOL BONDS

Issue of \$50,500 Goes to Atlantic Bond Co. at 95.51 — There Were Five Bids

In spite of the scarcity of money and prevailing low price of bonds the Board of School Trustees have been successful in floating an issue of four and a half per cent bonds at 95.51. This is regarded as a remarkably fine showing and compares most favorably with the flotation of any issue reported within the last few months. It is a substantial tribute to the credit of this city and the reputation it bears in the financial world.

BELIEVE ATLANTIC RATE WAR IS SURE

Daily Hints For the Cook

DELICIOUS SUMMER DESSERT. Soak 1/2 pound marshmallows cut in halves over night, with 1 can of pineapple chunks. About an hour before serving mix 1 jar of cream whipped stiff. Serve very cold.

TUTTI-FRUTTI PRESERVE. Put into large stone jar 1 pint pure alcohol, 2 drams of salicylic acid dissolved in it. We put in cherries and strawberries first and add other fruit and berries as they come.

CREAMED PEACH TAPIOCA. Cook 1 heaping tablespoon of tapioca (the kind that requires no soaking) in 1 pint of milk in double boiler about 15 minutes. Take 4 or 5 peaches, peel and cut into pieces.

DALTON SANATORIUM READY IN SEPTEMBER. Will Be Erected on High Ground 20 Miles From Charlottetown - To Be Free to the Poor

INDIANAPOLIS UNIONS WITHDRAW FUNDS FROM BANKS IN INDIANAPOLIS. The Deposits Amount to Between \$4,000,000 and \$5,000,000 - Movement Anticipated by Banks

Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 18 - As an aftermath of the recent labor trouble and strikes here, it was announced today that officials of international unions having headquarters in this city, at a meeting last night, decided to withdraw from Indianapolis banks on January 1 all funds of the international organizations that it is possible to withdraw at that time.

The money is divided among a number of institutions and it is said the withdrawal will not seriously affect any one bank. In a statement issued today by the officials who attended the meeting, it is set forth that the reason for the withdrawal is that "we have reason to believe that said moneys are being used by the merchants, manufacturers, and team owners of Indianapolis to destroy and crush out the working people."

It was stated at the banks late today that the movement for the withdrawal of the labor funds had been anticipated and that preparations had been made to meet the demands.

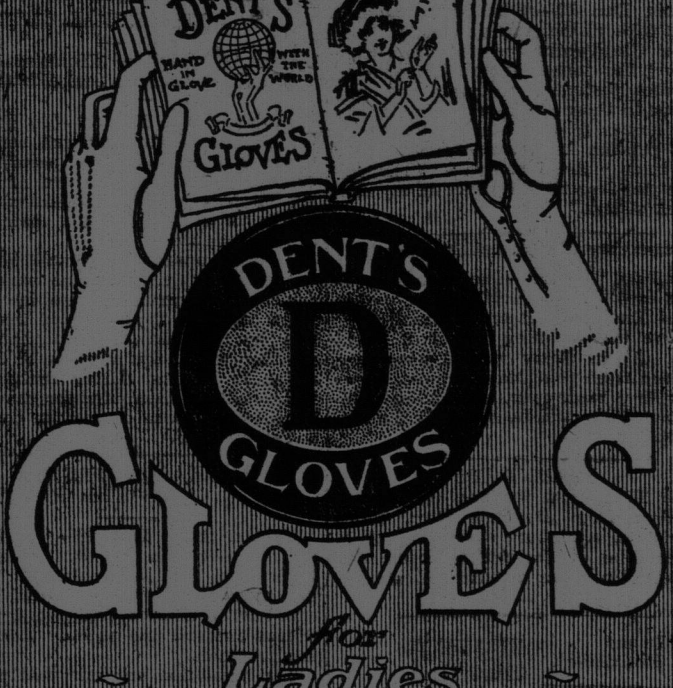

TAX REFORM

From the city of Halifax, N. S., and also from Manchester, Eng., comes an argument in favor of a more equitable system of taxation than now prevails.

"Patriotism has become a business, and while the big armament firms are so well paid they will see to it that the cry for more warships is not allowed to cease."

The Borden government has named three departmental officials as a commission to inquire into the causes of the increasing cost of living.

Home Secretary McKenna, in a recent address before the London Magistrate's Club, said he recognized the value of probation, and the necessity of extending it.

The city council has unanimously adopted a resolution declaring that unsatisfactory conditions exist in the police department, and asking the government to remove the chief from office.

The proposal of the mayor to ask for the construction of two 800 foot berths to the north of the sugar refinery wharf should be carefully considered.

One of the speakers at a recent Liberal meeting in Manchester told his hearers that it was nonsense to look for danger from Germany.

DETERMINED ON EITHER EMBARGO OR CLOSE INSPECTION

Washington, Dec. 18 - Whether common Irish potatoes from Canada, Newfoundland, Great Britain, Ireland and Continental Europe shall be barred from the United States because of the danger of importation of dangerous plant diseases, or shall be admitted under the same restrictions as apply to nursery stock, was the subject of a hearing before the federal horticultural board under the direction of Secretary Houston.

At the outset Secretary Houston said that the question under consideration was not the lifting of an embargo against diseased potatoes but whether a quarantine should be absolute or administered in such a way as to admit the entry of potatoes properly passed upon by government experts.

Dr. Gussow declared that United States experts had made a sufficient investigation of the potato crop in Canada upon which to base a recommendation to exist in certain portions of the United States because of disease.

The state pathological experts urged a strict embargo for a period of years on the ground that potato diseases are dangerous to exist in certain portions of every foreign country, included in the department of agriculture's notice on the subject.

Lord Eustace Percy, third secretary of the British embassy, expressed regret that the United States should have suggested the embargo on English potatoes without co-operating with the agricultural experts of that country in their investigation of conditions.

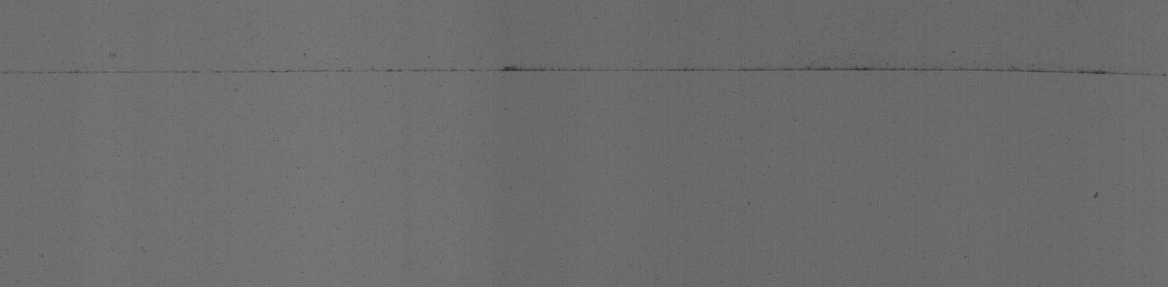

Infant Mortality

What Has Been Done in New Zealand

Some Useful Hints

In Lecture Doctor Who is Authority Tells How the Death Rate Among Little Ones May Be Reduced

(Manchester Guardian.)

Dr. P. Tenby King, who gave a very interesting lecture in the Hulme Town Hall last night on "Health and Fitness," is recognized in New Zealand as the chief authority on the prevention of infant mortality. Not quite eight years ago he began on his own account health mission among the households of Dunedin. It was so successful that within two years an organization—the Society for the Health of Women and Children—was formed to extend the work. This movement has produced some remarkable results. Branches have been formed all over New Zealand, and the effect of spreading information about the maintenance of the health of women and the care of infants has been a great reduction in the infant death rate of the colony. For the seven years ended 1907 the infant death rate for Dunedin was eight per cent. It now only 2.87 per cent. And the mortality for the whole of the colony is only five per cent. The infant death rate in St. Petersburg was 25 per cent, and that in Manchester for 1910-12 the rate was 18.5 per cent.

The governor of New Zealand, Lord Plunket, and his wife took a great interest in the movement, and in 1912 the minister of public health, recognizing that the society was performing a beneficial public function, decided that the work should be still further extended. It was arranged that Doctor King should be released from his other official duties in order to undertake an extensive lecturing tour throughout the whole Dominion. This year Doctor King was sent to represent the colony at the English-speaking conference on infant mortality and child welfare in London. Since that conference Doctor King has been on the continent to acquire information about the conditions there, and he is now performing a similar work in Great Britain, where he is also taking advantage of any opportunity to tell the public what is going on in New Zealand in order that advantage may be taken of the knowledge so obtained.

The lecture last night was arranged by the sanitary committee of the Manchester Corporation, and Councillor Jackson, the chairman of the committee, in opening the proceedings, said England had a great deal to learn from some of the colonies about the care of child-life. The question was one of the most important of public health work, and was all the more serious because of the ever-increasing birth-rate. Legislation had done a good deal to society in this matter, and administration by public authorities could do very much more.

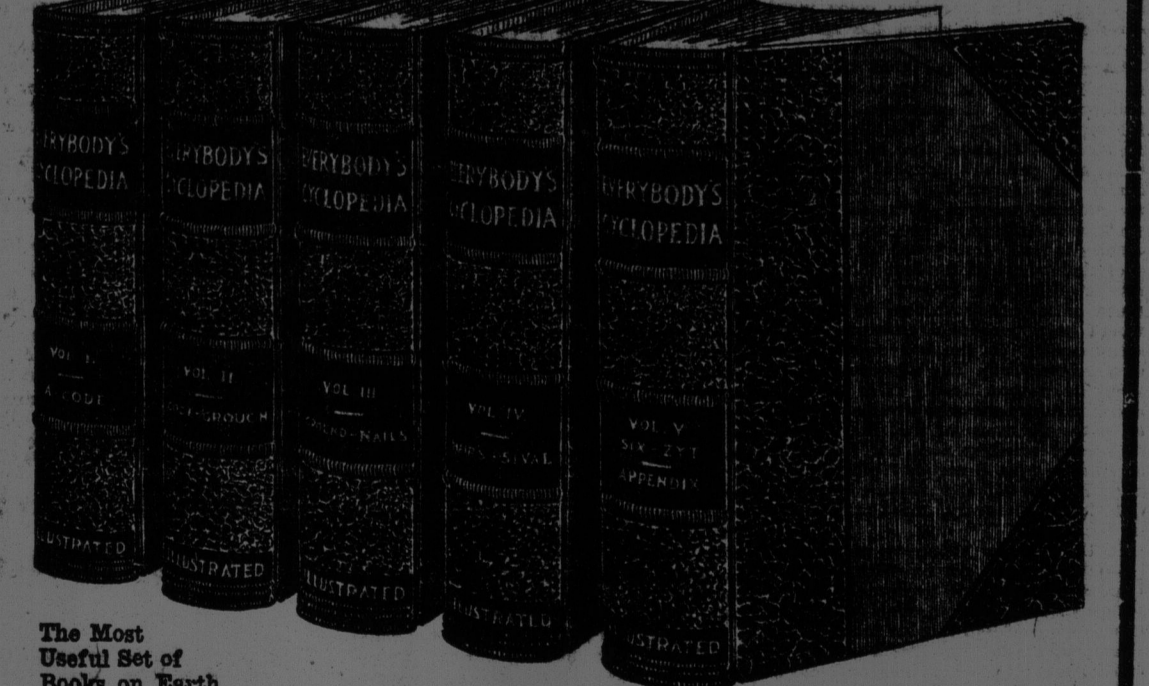

WANT REFERENDUM ON NAVAL QUESTION

Toronto, Dec. 18.—Some sweeping changes were recommended in the resolutions passed by the Dominion Grange this afternoon. The subjects dealt with, and the policies recommended were as follows:

Immediate readjustment of the tariff to remove the burden under which agriculture labors.

Gradual increase of the British preference to lead ultimately to free trade with the mother country.

Appointment of a committee with power to deal with the proposal of co-operation of farmers' organizations in all parts of Canada for interexchange of products and elimination of middlemen's profits.

Good roads programme, based on municipal control, supported by increased railroad taxation and increased assessment on automobiles, any federal aid to public highways to be allotted to the municipalities on the basis of assessed value.

Tax reform by exempting improvements from taxation.


Development of parcel post system along lines that will facilitate the easy interchange of products between country and town.

Settlement of the naval question by direct referendum—submitting the propositions of money contributions, Canadian navy, or remaining as at present—the will of the people as recorded to be followed by the government.

Substitution of initiative and referendum in the matter of important legislation for the present system of party government.

Britain Will Not Take Part.

London, Dec. 18.—The cabinet tonight decided against official representation of Great Britain at the Panama-Pacific exhibition.

A Bush Town

(Manchester Guardian)

It is a town with its atmosphere. Even the railway, which runs along the north side of the street—there is only one street—is dominated by the atmosphere. One steps from the suffocation of the Pullman; there is a crisp crunch as one's foot strikes the snow; the starting symbol of today glides out of the world with two steam engines; and one stands in a luminous infinity of anethist and primrose and silver. Light is too hard a word for the intangible color which creases you; it is rather the spirit of light.

"Ain't that your trunk at the depot?" The trunk is taken to the hotel and one follows disconsolate. A plentiful supper is served in the dining room which is—Canadian; that is to say, a loud and garish apartment where the chairs are surprisingly uncomfortable; the crockery surprisingly thick, and the waiters surprisingly the equal of the diners; indeed, were it not for the name over the door, and the fact that a number of plates are thrown before one much as a bone is thrown to a dog, it would be a pardonable mistake to imagine oneself in the conversation-room of a waiter's club. The allotment of the street draws you hastily from the table, and a pleasant surprise awaits a stranger in the discovery of that the etiquette of perfect equality does not forbid the acceptance of a timorously offered gratuity. For myself the pleasure was incidental to the discovery, and has not proved recurrent.

In the corridor you cover as much as possible of your person with furs. On the left hand as one approaches the entrance there is an open door, from which comes the confused hum of many voices, glancing through one sees a row of fur caps, refer coats with huge sheepskin collars, and an understructure of clumpy trousers. Most of the trousers end in moccasins, but here and there a coat rests on a mighty pair of Wellingtons. The line of clothes apparently stretches into infinity, but probably ends somewhere in the cloud of pungent smoke which fills the air, and mingles with the fumes of eye whiskey to form the lumberjack's heaven; for the trousers, the referers, and the fur caps are occupied by leather-faced bushmen, who lean across the long counter, fat wad of hills in one hand and whisky glass in the other, drinking with steady purpose until the first dissolves into the second. As the evening wears away the hum of 'zigzag' and Finnish, Russian and Swedish, Italian and Irish will rise to a wild shouting as it did the other night when Giovanni Petrilli plunged his knife into Black Dietrich in order to convince him that he, Giovanni, could make more spruce-ies in a day than could Dietrich in two. It was at any rate, a final argument for Black Dietrich, who gasped his last blasphemy on the floor of the bar, and Giovanni will never again hear the ring of an axe in the frozen silence of the bush. A slim, grey-bearded man salutes us in French, and

lumber-rod. A hill rises on the left and thrusts a bare crest out of the plain. There we could breathe, a short scramble through the bush will do it. We plunge into the deeper gloom. We turn quickly, and see one clear thing in the world; it is the bright yellow eye of—McGregor and Co.

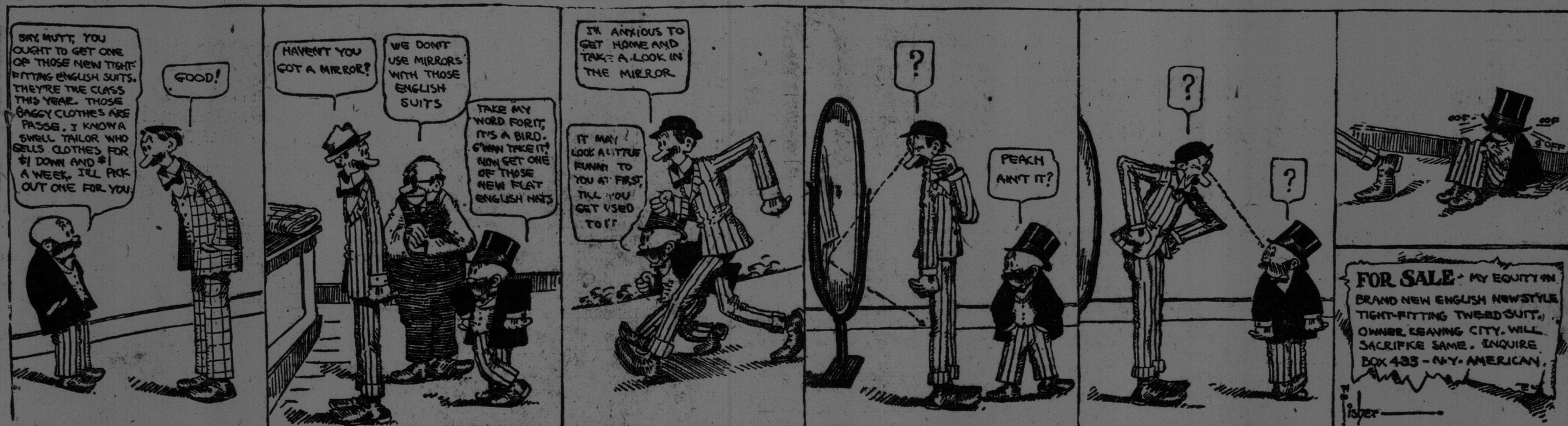

FARMING FOR INSANE BOTH PAYS AND CURES

Victory of Colony Farm in British Columbia in Live Stock Competition New Chapter in Experiment

Chicago, Dec. 10—Agriculture, as a self-sustaining means for curing dementia, won conspicuous victory when the awards were made at the international live stock show, to animals exhibited by Dr. Charles E. Doherty for the Colony Farm of the Mental Hospital at Coquitlam, B. C. The result achieved in British Columbia may mean a world-wide change in the administration of state institutions for the care of those thousands who are within the twilight zone of mental incapacity.

The success at Coquitlam, signalled by various blue ribbons at Chicago and other shows for live stock bred and cared for there, is credited largely to Doctor Doherty, a brief, business-like, dynamic person, and to Doctor Henry Eason Young, minister of education and provincial secretary of British Columbia, and to the financial support given to them by the province. The one building completed has cost \$800,000. The asylum complete will have cost \$3,000,000.

Patients at Coquitlam are made to feel that they are guests—not inmates. They do not feel incarcerated. They sleep in large dormitories open to the air and with the breeze in huge fireplaces at one end to add good cheer.

The main building of the Coquitlam hospital overlooks the well kept fields and the buildings of the colony farm, which the view show place of the institution. Out-door work for insane patients was still experimental in the Argentine, sixty miles from the sea, in an arable country, a task for insane was growing its own crops, feeding itself, and for itself, with a minimum of sane attendants. Other experiments were being tried in Belgium and the United States.
