Details of Desperate Battle With Servians Which Ended in Fall of Kumanova

Ottoman Troops Made First Attack, But Were Repulsed -Then Servians Charged Under Fearful Hail of Shot -Great Losses on Both Sides in Balkan War--Bulgarians Now at Adrianopole

London, Oct. 26—The Turkish troops were the first to take the offensive in the desperate battle which ended in the fall of Kumanova into the hands of the Servian troops and opened up the way for their further advance on the stronghold of Uskup.

## SHE LOSES JEWELS WORTH \$100,000 IN

THREE NOVA SCOTIA WOMEN DIE ON SAME DAY IN BOSTO

Three natives of Nova Scotia died in Greater Boston within a few hours of each other one day this week. They were all women, all in middle life and all had lived in or near Boston for some years, but all originally came from Nova Scotia.

Catherine McGillvary who was born in Pictou, died at the home of her daughter. Mrs. Mary Robinson, in Washington street She was the wife of Daniel McGillvary.
Sabina Merchant, the widow of Edward Merchant went to Boston some years ago from Halifax. She died at the home of Mrs. McGillvary.

In Somerville, and also within three miles of the other two, the third was Mrs. Margaret Nearing, who also died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Joseph Lyons, Bartlett street. She was a native of Nova Scotia, lived in Halifax, and had lived in and around Boston for some years, Mrs. Nearing was the widow of George Nearing, who had a business in Somerville.

Besides the strange fact that all three were from nearby places in Nova Scotia, all lived near each other in Boston, all died the same day, and all died at the homes of their daughters. 

League Formed

The Nova Scotia League for the Protection of the Feeble-Minded was formed with headquarters in Halifax. With this as the parent organization, branches of the league were being formed in every city and town in the province. John Weir was appointed as organizer and started his work at the beginning of this month, visiting each town in turn. His work had been most successful. Each branch would do its part in the campaign of education and would also help to organize the public feeling thus aroused to bring pressure to bear on the members of the legislature to pass the required act, and it was hoped that within a short time the demand for the founding of the proposed institution would be so irresistible that it would be no longer delayed.

While this was the chief work in which the Halifax Women's Council were engaged at present, it was by no means the limit of their efforts. The public playgrounds of Halifax were carried on most successfully under their direction and this year four well equipped grounds were conducted with a staff including a supervisor, two teachers for each and instructors in athletics for both boys and girls. The work had reached a stage where the organizers felt that it should be recognized as a public institution, and so supported, but this they had not secured. In this respect they were holding up St. John as an example to be followed.

Another problem with which they were endeavoring to cope was the care of Protestant girls, who came in contact with the police authorities. The Catholic church cared for girls and women of their faith who were arrested and sentenced, but there was no provision for the others except the jails. The result of condemning a girl, arrested perhaps for a minor offence, to association with other women who were to be found in jails, was a very serious matter, and it was to rescue them from this that the council was working. They proposed the establishment of an industrial home for the three maritime




Wanderers Get Ross. ^


