Montreal, Jan. 11.—Reduction in the electric lighting rate in this city will be announced here today by the Montreal Light, Heat and Power Company, the reduction to take effect immediate by upon the signing of new contracts now being sent out to customers. The reduction is of 11 2-5 per cent from the current rate and according to the circular being distributed "will mean an annual saving of upwards of \$300, 000 to our consumers as compared with present rates."

The rate is reduced from 4.8 cents to 4.25 cents a kilowatt hour. In 1908 the rate was 12.75 cents.



AND THE SUPPLY
OF ALCOHOL

E. Clinton Brown, in conversation with a reporter today, said that a delegation of retail druggists which appeared before the Provincial Government yesterday did not ask for more freedom under the Prohibition Act, but rather that New Brunswick provide some means for the druggists of the province to take advantage of an act passed by the Federal Parliament last year permitting pharmacists to purchase alcohol from the distillers.

He pointed out that at the present time they must pay \$9 a gallon tax on the alcohol as well as profit on both the cost and the tax, whereas in purchasing from the distillers the tax paid would be \$2.40. Under the present local law the local druggists were unable to manufacture tinctures, as the cost was prohibitive and they were therefore compelled to import them from upper Canada where they were manufactured in bond and paid the lower tax on the alcohol used in their making. If the province would provide the means for their obtaining the alcohol so that the manufacture of tinctures could be resumed, a great deal of the money sent out of the province for this purpose would be retained here.

New York, Jan. 11—The death of Mrs. Adele Robertson at Bellevue Hospital recently has been followed by the disclosure that she had undergone an unusual and exceptional delicate kidney operation in a desperate attempt to save her life from the effects of bichloride of mercury poisoning. The operation consisted of transplanting a sheep's kidney into the woman's body. It was performed by Dr. Selian Neune, assisted by Dr. Sinclair Wilhelm of the Bellevue Hospital staff and Dr. Ransom S. Hooker. Medical observers of the case report that the operation itself, technically considered, was a success, but that the progress of the mercury poisoning had been so great that nothing could counteract it.
