FOLLOW UP NEEDED, SAYS L. W. SIMMS

Ontario and Quebec Papers Are Strongly Commended by St. John Men For Generous Backing of Port Demands-About Twenty-Five of Local Deputation Home Today

Highly optimistic as to results that may be expected from their meeting Premier King, members of the Cabinet and of the House of Commons, a large number of St. John members of the all-Canada delegation which strongly advocated a national transportation policy and a limiting of the British preference to trade through feeling of the members interviewed that while tangible results were STATES SHOOTIN not apparent, the trip would serve the purpose of focusing the W attention of the entire country on the problems of the Maritime Provinces, and thus lead to prompt action by Parliament.

URGES STRONG FOLLOW-UP

L. W. Simms, president of the St. John Board of Trade, declared on his return that a strong follow-up was needed to emphasize the purpose and aims of the delegation. Mr. Simms expressed the opinion that much remained to be done, even though the Government's reception had been favorable.

About 25 delegates returned home today. The remainder are due to leave Montreal this evening, arriving here tomorrow noon. All praised the handling of the delegation by the C. P. R.

That the Maritime delegation to Ottawa was a long step forward in the movement to redress grievances down east, and that a strong follow-up was necessary to consolidate what had been gained and to press on with the good work in this direction, was the opinion expressed by L. W. Simms, president of the St. John Board of Trade, who returned this morning from Ottawa with several other members of the delegation. "We must not take it for granted that our work is finished now," Mr. Simms declared in an interview. "Much remains to be done, and if we are to reap the advantage accruing from the presentation of our case to the Parliament of Canada we must be prepared to maintain our efforts in this direction."

Chief Palmer has advised the local police that a constable will leave Halifax tomorrow morning and will have the man under arrest conveyed to the capital city for trial.



THE poultry industry in New Brunswick is a generalized rather than a specialized industry. It is, however, one which is growing in importance, and if a thorough study is made of livestock statistics it will be found that poultry is the only branch of livestock statistics it will be found that poultry is the only branch of livestock which shows a consistent increase in population over a period of years.

At the present time farm flocks average only 25 or 30 laying fowls. Flocks of 100 birds are becoming fairly common and a very few are found where the number of mature fowls reaches five,

Specialized poultry raising requires considerable skill. The difficulties met with are losses due to contagious distance advantages which farm flocks large market has many advantages over the distant one.

with are losses due to contagious discasses which sweep occasionally through flocks, 'causing great loss, and losses in brooding and rearing which are much greater in flocks of several hundreds than they are with smaller numbers. There have been failure among persons who have attempted to operate specialized business, there is a growing tendency towards specialization and where the manager is skilled in the business there is little chance of failure. The person considering a specialized poultry business, poor sanitation, or a failure to consider the law of diminishing returns when making plans and estimates for launching in the poultry business.



Gorman was feeling in the best of shape and decided that he would like another trial at the indoor record. Four official watches out of six had the time, which gave Gorman, the local speed king, a world's indoor record for the distance.
