

KILLED IN AUTO ACCIDENT.

While speeding around race track tire burst. — Driver crushed to death and spectator instantly killed.

JACKSON, Michigan, Sept. 6.—Harry Endicott, of Anderson, Indiana, brothers of "Farmer Bill" Endicott, the noted automobile racer, and Mary Sarata, of Jackson, a 10-year-old spectator, were killed and three persons injured here late this afternoon when Endicott's automobile, burtling around the track, crashed through a fence after one of the front tires blew up. The injured are George Benedict, of Los Angeles, who was acting as Endicott's mechanician; Mrs. Mabel Walters and Francis Hall, 13 years old, both of Jackson. Benedict's condition is in doubt. Neither Mrs. Walters nor the Hall girl was seriously hurt.

Endicott was driving a 100 horse power Outling car, preparatory to an exhibition race against Benedict here to-morrow, when the accident occurred. Benedict was at his side. The machine turned a sharp curve as it swung onto the homestratch, and with a report like a piscolahottish tire burst.

Before the crowd, which lined both sides of the track, ondir realize what had happened, the machine skided about 20 feet and plunged directly at a filmay fence to the side of the course.

Endicott was crushed to death against an iron railing, which the wrecked car anapped as though it were a pipestem.

Benedict was hurled from the car and one of the rear wheels passed over his body. He is believed to be injured internally.
