Only Three Aldermen of the Old Board Returned—Mayor McNally's Close Call.

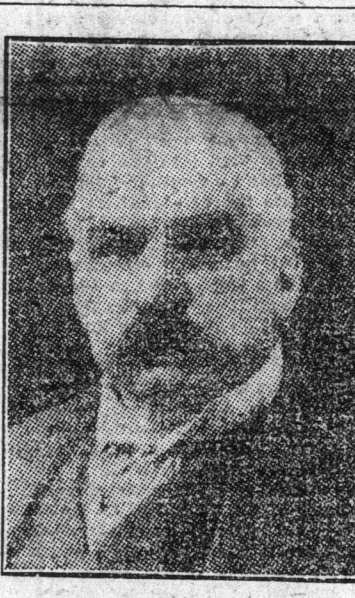

She tried hard in those days to curl her hair a little and to powder her face, but before going home she was always careful to smooth down her hair again and to wash her face well.

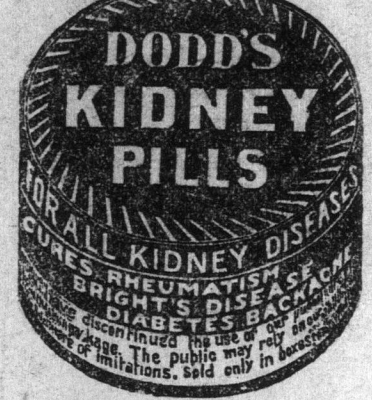
Then, all at once, began a period of trouble and illness. Her father died. She herself was anemic, always fatigued, never having enough rest.

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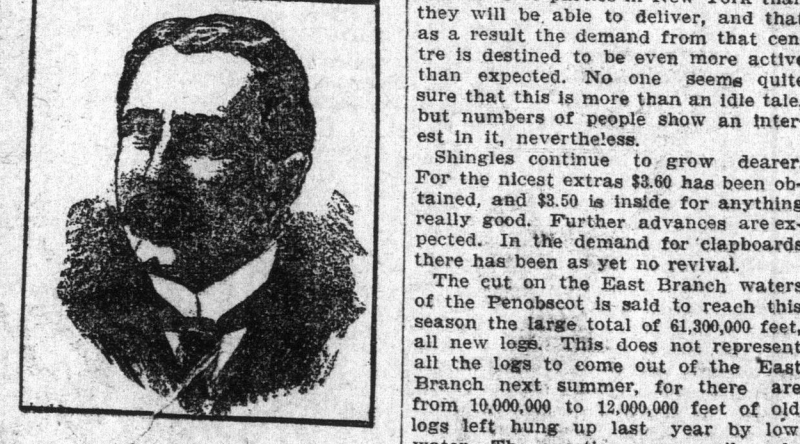

WERE ORDAINED SUNDAY

Interesting Ceremonies at Trinity Church

Five Young Men Received Into the Priesthood and One Ordained Deacon

Six young men Sunday morning in Trinity were ordained according to the rites of the Church of England.

With the exception of one ordination a short time ago there has been no ordination to the Anglican ministry since 1879, when the late Bishop Medley ordained three young men in the Trinity church.

Those who were ordained yesterday were the following: Rev. H. F. Rigby, at present engaged in church work at Campbellton; Rev. C. W. Forster, at present at St. Mary's, and now stationed at McAdam, and Rev. C. W. Nichols, also a native of this city, and now assistant to Rev. R. P. McKim at St. Luke's.

The ordination sermon was preached by Bishop Kingdon, who was followed with the closest attention. His Lordship took for his text Isaiah, chapter 8, "Also I heard the voice of the Lord, saying, whom shall I send, and who will go for us. Then said I, Here am I, send me." And he said, "Go and tell this people."

SYDNEY, March 11.—The steamer Baines Hawkins, owned by the Cape Breton Steamship Company of this city, and chartered to the Dominion, was forced to stop on Saturday morning as a result of having her bow stove in by drift ice. One life is believed to have been lost, that of Thos. Bowdridge, of the city, boatswain of the steamer, who has not been heard from since he left the steamer alone in a small gig shortly before the vessel sank.

NEW YORK, March 11.—The New York Herald has the following in a special cable from London today: The announcement that a lecture on Christian Science was delivered in Holy Trinity church hall, Sloane square, on Tuesday last has created some criticism of the rector of the church, the Rev. H. R. Gamble, whose view of Christian Science is that, while there is a great deal in it that a churchman can accept, it is impossible for a man to be a Christian Scientist and a member of the Anglican church.

POPE SENDS MESSAGE OF REGRET

HALIFAX, N. S., March 11.—Thousands of persons of all denominations today viewed the body of Archbishop O'Brien, which now lies in state at the archiepiscopal residence. The funeral will take place on Wednesday morning from St. Mary's Cathedral. Distinguished prelates will attend, including Mgr. Sbarretti, the apostolic delegate of Ottawa, and the Archbishop of Quebec.

GEORGIAN BAY CANAL

OTTAWA, March 11.—What it will cost to construct the Georgian Bay canal will not be known until next year. The survey will not have been completed until the summer. The engineers are hopeful, however, that the work will be within the hundred million mark, which has been the popular estimate of the cost of the waterway.

ICE IN ST. LAWRENCE IS BREAKING UP

MONTREAL, March 11.—The ice in the river is showing signs of breaking up. As the ice formation at Cape Rouge is reported to be very thin, the likelihood is that the present season will see a new record made in the opening of navigation, some experts placing the first arrival from sea for as early as April fifteenth.

KILLED HIS CHILD AND HIMSELF

German Walter Angry With His Wife Adopted a Tragical Method of Punishing Her.

WASHINGTON, March 12.—Emil Fuhl, a German waiter, took his own life last night and also that of his five year old daughter because of grief over separation from his wife. Mrs. Fuhl left her husband six weeks ago and he retained custody of the little girl who was their only child. Last night, according to the neighbors, the man took the child out to a thicket, and upon their return about midnight he locked her in the same room with himself, and broke off a gas fixture. The smell of gas about daylight attracted the neighbors who breaking down the door found Fuhl dead and the child barely alive. She was taken to a hospital where she died in a short time. Fuhl left a letter stating that he killed the child as a punishment to his wife.

The following item, taken from the Town Crier, Newton Centre, Mass., refers to a former St. John girl: "Miss Gertrude Melick, of Forest street, left yesterday for New Bedford, where she is going to take up her duties as assistant superintendent of St. Luke's Hospital. Miss Melick is the president of the Nurses' Alumnae Association of the Newton Hospital, and has made her home in Forest street for some time past."

CANADA DOES NOT WANT ANNEXATION

Native Declares Candidate Favoring It Could Not Poll Two Per Cent of the Votes.

(N. Y. Herald.) To the Editor of the Herald: Many Canadians, like myself, have read with much interest the letters from the Canadian Northwest in recent issues of the Sunday Herald. At the same time I wish to protest against some misstatements in the letter from Winnipeg last week. "What may happen in the dim future as to the political relations of Canada to this country no one can foresee, but we are all entitled to an opinion. As a Canadian, and one who knows Canada well, I am confident that no annexation sentiment, to any appreciable extent, prevails in any part of the country. I will go further and challenge any one to point out any one constituency where a candidate for either parliament or a provincial legislature could, on an annexation issue, poll two per cent of the votes recorded. In fact he could not be nominated. No doubt there is at present a large emigration from this country to Canada, and I hope it may continue, but if your correspondent will make a care-ful canvass of some of those American settlers who have long enough in the country to be able to give an intelligent opinion, he will find they have no fault to find with the flag they are living under or the way law and order are maintained. The writer states that there is a large French element in Toronto and in every town east of the Great Lakes. This I reply that he may walk the streets of Toronto for months and, also almost any town east of the lakes, including Hamilton, Brantford, Peterborough, Belleville, Kingston and throughout the country in Ontario and, until he approaches the border of the province of Quebec, he will probably never hear the French language or meet a French Canadian. I strongly protest, also, against his statement that the Western Canadian found he could add a dollar to his pile he would join the United States. Emphatically this is not so. If a Canadian is anything, he is a loyal British subject and quite as patriotic and no more likely to change his nationality than any good citizen of this country, and can I put it stronger? Canada owes her prosperity to her own people up to this time, and while no doubt the influx of farmers and others from this country is of much benefit to Canada, still, should they cease to go it would not retard her progress. She has steadily and surely by her own resources. Americans are going there simply because they wish to share in the prosperity, and I believe the large majority of them have no desire to interfere in the internal affairs of a contented and prosperous people, quite content with their present form of government. He is more than seventy-five years of age.
