



current to the chief most one of the world's greatest statesmen." Out of this movement grew an agitation in favor of the union of the Maritime Provinces. The outcome was the appointment of delegates by the governments of the four provinces to meet in Charlottetown to consider the matter. The delegates from New Brunswick were S. L. Tilley, W. H. Steeves, J. M. Johnston, E. B. Chandiey, and J. H. Gray.

But little did these men dream when they met in that city on September 5th, 1844, that the business that had brought them together would be brushed aside, and another and a vasty greater union would be considered. The government of Canada arrived and proposed the government of Canada arrived by the government of Canada arrived and proposed the governm so evenly divided that neither could carry on the public business. The meeting in Charlottetown suggested a solution of the difficulty, and a delegation consisting of John A. Macdonald, George Brown, George E. Cartler, Alexander T. Galt, T. D'Avery McGee, Hector L. Langevin, Wm. Macdougal, and Alexander Campbell, presented the case. The question of Maritime Union was laid aside, arrangements were made to meet in Quebec on October 10th of the same year to deal with the whole question, and the same men with the addition of Charles Fisher and Peter Mitchell were sent as the representatives of this province.

It is not our purpose to trace the career of Mr. Tilley during the exciting times which followed, suffice it to say that largely through his efforts the country, which at first had decidedly rejected the scheme, reversed its verdict, and as decidedly accepted it. With others he was sent to London to watch proceedings while the matter was being dealt with by the Imperial nuthorities, and to safeguard our interests. No one had reater reason to be proud of the part he had played an connection therewith than had Mr. Tilley when he took his place in the Parliament of the new nation as one of Her Majesty's cabinet ministers. His intelligent grapp of the situation, and the loyal and patriotic motives by which he was actuated won for him golden opinions, and led his ever gracious and appreciative sovereign to confer upon him the homor of knighthood.

During his occupancy of the position of Lieutenant Governor, which he held for over twelve years—from 1873 to 1378, and from 1885 to 1893—the partizan was ever kept in the background. 


