The Two Factions.  
Many people fail to understand one of the Government papers, and come far short of appreciating its apparently independent utterances, because they are not acquainted with the fact that there are two hostile factions in the Government ranks. The New Brunswick Ministers—Isaac Burpee and Albert J. Smith—have never been in full accord with their colleagues. Having come over from the ranks of the Macdonald-Tilley party, and been given seats in the Cabinet that Mr. Mackenzie wanted to give to tried and true followers of his own, they have been looked upon with considerable dislike by the Mackenzie clique. The majority in favor of the new regime was so small at first that the leaders were forced to share the spoils of victory with those who deserted the enemy just before his surrender, leaving certain of their own hungry followers with no offices and little job-printing as rewards for their faithful services. But the election, which was determined on without the advice of the Cabinet, gave the Government so large a majority that they no longer depended on the support of quondam opponents. Since then Mr. Mackenzie has been managing things without the slightest consideration for the feelings or interests of his New Brunswick colleagues—quarreling over a petty red granite cottage, abolishing railway privileges that have been enjoyed by the people ever since the road was built, and carrying things with a high hand generally. Messrs. Burpee and Smith have warned him that his course will alienate New Brunswick, and may drive them from the Cabinet, but he has been heedless of the former threat, or desires the carrying out of the latter very much, as he persists in his course. For the double purpose of strengthening themselves in the Cabinet, and preparing a way for them to leave it if their endurance of hostilities should fail, Messrs. Burpee and Smith have instructed the journal that jumped the political hedge with them to speak out strongly on the reciprocity, Bay Verte and Railway grievances. This is the secret of the matter. The Telegraph expresses the feelings of the Customs and Marine, and the other two Government organs echo the opinions of the Premier. It will be remembered that, in the last Parliamentary contest, one of the organs referred to deprecated the bringing out of any candidate without the Premier's sanction, and that the other had not a word to say for the Minister of Customs. One of these has lately revealed the corrupt manner in which the editor of a religious weekly was rewarded by Mr. Burpee for his sudden conversion to "Reform," and the other is careful always to publish the other's "Amen" or "So mote it be" to everything Mackenzie says and does.

In case the "reciprocity" proposal is accepted by the United States Senate, and the prospect is good for the defeat of the Mackenzie Government, the question of ratifying them, Messrs. Burpee and Smith and the journals that follow their political fortunes will go in opposition and come up smiling for a share of the spoils that it will be Tupper's to distribute.

Chaotic France.  
France has, at this moment, no professedly permanent form of Government whatever. Perhaps this is just as well, as the people seem to have a deep-rooted antipathy to anything permanent. The so-called constitution of 1875, which has been able to constitute nothing fundamental in all the years of its existence. It agreed, strangely enough, in making Marshal MacMahon President for seven years, and has failed, naturally enough, to pass laws defining his powers and duties. It has been largely, to the astonishment of the Deputies, that he really intended and expected to remain in office seven years, and that the necessary legislation might as well be had at once, but the Assembly didn't act on the hint, evidently being unwilling to pass any act that could not be repealed during the Marshal's seven years' term. While there is no definitively constituted form of government each party and faction has an undoubted right to speak, write, vote and intrigue for the establishment of the form it desires, and it sounds strangely to hear Bonapartists, Legitimists, or members of other factions, accused of treason for intruding in the interests of Prince Louis, the Count de Chambord, or any other aspirant to the throne. As the form of government is yet to be decided on every man has the right to do what he can to insure a decision in accordance with his own ideas. If the Republic, the Empire or the Monarchy should be definitely established, there would be some sense in taking measures for the punishment of all who plotted against it, but the spasmodic content against Bonapartists and not a strangely vacillate with the chaotic uncertainty that exists at present.

Anarchy on a "Bloody Ground."  
A letter dated Hazel Green, Ky., July 23, to the Cincinnati Gazette, alleges the following facts: Having just returned from a visit from Breckinridge county, we found that county in a most terrible state of anarchy. Politics has nothing to do with it; it is a personal feud between the parties engaged, originating from some of the results of the war of the rebellion, so I am informed. The parties engaged are represented to me as having been enemies, and disagreed on the subject of the war about the division of their spoils. Since that time a bitter feeling has existed between the parties, and has gradually grown stronger, and as the present time both parties are in open war, one against the other. Many of each side have since the commencement been either killed or wounded. On Thursday the 13th inst., in the town of Jackson, county seat of Breckinridge county, Jerry Little and Curtis Jett, two of the opposing parties, commenced an affair in which Jett was killed, and Jerry Little seriously, but not mortally, wounded, although having received nine or ten shots in his body. The friends of each then commenced, and others commenced the brother of the dead man, received a wound in the side by the hand of Jett. This ended the affair for the time; but the friends of the parties at once commenced a fight, and there were at least fifty armed men in town, eager for the fray. Parties were seen skulking through the woods and

Fredericton Water Supply.  
This question is agitating the people of the beautiful City at present, and the City Council are discussing several plans for providing a good supply of water. On Friday last the entire Council, with a distinguished American engineer, went to Tower Hill Lake to consider the question of bringing water from there to the city. The lake is about four miles from town, and is elevated at a head of four hundred feet could be obtained. The water was tasted and found to be excellent, but there were serious objections to its use. The lake has no visible inlet or outlet, and for some distance round it there is soft mud, the water seeming to be only the drainage of the surrounding land. The experiences of the party were very amusing, and the work was somewhat fatiguing. Some of the Council members were completely up and, had to allow the others to finish the work of inspection. The party went round the lake, and the American engineer gave a decided opinion against leaving their water supply from Tower Hill. He recommended water from the river instead of bringing it so far. Dust-Watering Carts.

The driver would have got dust in his eyes and had, just under his paper collar, and dust on his clothes, while the horses would have been so dusty that it would have required a half-hour's work to clean them at night. We hope that everybody who felt annoyed by the absence of the watering carts will be satisfied with the explanation we have given and not be unreasonable enough to look for them again on disagreeably-dusty days.

Coroner's Inquest on the Remains of Dr. C. E. Fiske.  
Coroner Earle held an inquest yesterday afternoon on the remains of Dr. Fiske, at his late residence, Germain street. The only witness was Dr. Fiske, Jr. He was with his father but a few minutes before the tragedy occurred, and left for the purpose of getting a morning paper. On his return he found his father quite dead on his bedroom floor. A Ballard rifle, which had evidently just been discharged, was lying at his side. The bullet entered the right temple, came out on the opposite side of the head, and lodged in the ceiling. Death was, of course, instantaneous. The jury returned a verdict that deceased came to his death by his own hand while laboring under a fit of temporary insanity, produced by mental depression. Dr. Fiske has for a long time been a great sufferer from an incurable pulmonary disease. The funeral will take place to-morrow.

John Noyce was characterized by the Magistrate as "another of these nice young birds," and told to pay the same fine or follow the same road as Rogers.

Canadian, British and Foreign.

New York, Aug. 3-p. m. The case against Theodore Tilton for libel, presented in the District Court, has been postponed till Wednesday.

London, Aug. 3. To-day is a bank and general holiday in this city.

The American game of base ball is attracting considerable attention in London. As a game to-day, 5,000 spectators were present.

The report that England, Germany and Italy have agreed to watch the Spanish coast is denied.

Germany has not proposed intervention to Austria, but the latter is ready to join the other powers in an acknowledgment of the Spanish Republic.

Prince Bismarck, whose health has greatly improved, will leave Kissingen in a fortnight.

London, Aug. 4. MEN-OF-WAR ON THE SPANISH COAST. An Italian frigate is ordered to the northern coast of Spain.

The British Mediterranean squadron have sailed to-day for Barcelona.

It is asserted that the Carlists have shot the Canon of the Diocese of Victoria.

TROOPS FOR CUBA. The Spanish Government is about to despatch 15,000 troops to Cuba.

The PUBLIC WORKS REGULATION BILL passed its third reading in the British House of Commons last evening.

A GOVERNMENT SUCCESS. The Republican forces in Spain have entered Olat. They met with no opposition, the Carlists fled, leaving behind 100 prisoners.
