

REPORT OF THE SESSION.

No very detailed or elaborate report is necessary in order to give the Congregation an intelligent idea of such matters as come more immediately under the supervision of the Session. We have much reason for gratitude to God for the measure of spiritual prosperity we have enjoyed as a Congregation. There have been features in the year's history wich were not calculated to promote the spiritual life: still the work has gone on, if not with that power and progress that all loyal hearts desire, yet with such benefit and blessing as is well fitted to enkindle gratitude for present blessings, and inspire us with the lope of greater things which are still in store. Many have been edified, conforted and strengthened. An unwonted number have cast in their lot with us by presenting certificates, and more than an average number have been brought to decide for Christ.

Seventy-one have been added to the communion-roll during the year, namely: 49 by certificate and 22 by profession of faith in Christ. This number by certificate is the largest annual addition from that source in the history of the Congregation so far as we know.

Still there is much in our circumstances to suggest self-abasement and invite solemn inquiry. There are many yet, both young and old, who attend with more or less regularity in the services of the church, who still remain unpledged to a Christian life: And our earnest desire is to see all such coming to a dicision on the momenteous question of their relation to Christ. The weekly Prayer Meeting, though holding its own, is yet not so fully attended as it should be, especially by the male members and adherents of the Congregation.

The Congregations at the morning service have been usually very large; but the fact that so many of our families have their homes in the country, has this effect, that the evening service is of necessity not so fully attended, and the morning service made to some extent dependent on the state of the weather and roads. Our request is that this disparity between the two services be reduced as far as possible by the very faithful attendance on the evening service of those whose homes are in the city, or not very far out in the country.

Still death has been among us. Two children and six adult adherents, most of whom were quite advanced in years, have fallen beneath his stroke. We may further add, that there are several who retain a nominal connection with the Congregation who should not be included in estimating the effective strength of the congregation. The session intend at an early day, to go carefully over the communion-roll, with a view to removing the names of those who are not bona fide members, and we believe that when this is done, the membership will be found to be about six-hundred and forty.

The session earnestly desire to see developed among the people a larger liberality toward the Mission Schemes of the church while we gladly acknowledge that there are a few who are conscientious and liberal, we are yet persuaded that no rich spiritual blessing will be enjoyed by us as a people, until we are more generally responsive to God's claims upon us in the matter of Missions. We hope and trust the year on which we have entered will be more fruitful than

any of its predecessors in this respect.

Probably never before has the outlook been more hopeful and cheering; and we would tenderly counsel all the christian people of this charge to strive earnestly for the spiritual benefit of the entire flock, and thus make our congregation a power for good in this city and community.

MANAGERS REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31st 1887.

The managers in submitting their report for the Year ending on the 31st of Dec. 1887 beg to congraturate the congregation upon the improved state of the finances.

On the first of January 1887 we had a floating debt of \$1,471-74, including an overdraft then due to the Bank of Commerce of \$1,021.74. To meet this liability, the Managers borrowed \$1,100.00, from the Bank of Montreal with which our indebtedness to the

Bank of Commerce was paid.

With the burden of a large Floating debt on our hands, caused chiefly by exceptional payments fully explained in the last year's report, it was deemed absolutely necessary to make a strong and united effort to wipe out if possible this great hindrance to the congregation's prosperity. With this object in view the Board with the co-operation of the session undertook to canvas the wlole congregation for subscriptions. The result of this appeal to the people was fairly satisfactory although not to the extent anticipated and under the circumstances so very desirable. The subscriptions amounted to \$944.50, \$816.90 of which has to the end of the year been paid to the treasurer. Since the Treasurer's books have been closed \$100.00 of the amount subscribed has been paid—leaving only a small balance outstanding which will be paid within a few days.

The repairs to the Spire cost \$229.66. To meet this unforseen liability the Managers had to borrow a further sum of \$230.00 from the bank to pay the contractors for the work when completed. To pay this obligation undertaken by the Board an appeal was made from the pulpit for two or three sabbaths in succession for a liberal collection. We cannot say that the appeal was responded to in that spirit of liberality that we expected. The whole collections amounted to \$125.35, being only about one-half the sum required.

The loan of \$1,100.00, from the bank you will observe from the financial statement has during the year been reduced to \$700.00 and the loan of \$230.00 has been paid in full. At the end of the year our liabilities were \$700.00 to the Bank of Montreal and \$450.00 interest on the Mortgage. To apply on this indebtedness we had \$487.83 cash in the Treasurer's hands. Floating debt on 31st December 1887 \$662.17. On the 2nd of January the Treasurer was paid \$100.00 on this fund which made the Floating debt practically only \$562.17. It will thus be seen that the year just closed has been financially fairly satisfactory and we are hopeful of still greater prosperity during the year upon which we have entered.

At a joint meeting of the session and the board the question of engaging a suitable person who would undertake to perform the duties of Sexton and Secretary-Treasurer came up for discussion and after full consideration it was resolved that Mr. Ralph Donaldson be engaged at a salary of \$450.00 per annuam. This Arrangement will we think meet with your approval and we feel confident that it will be found to work to the advantage and financial prosperity of the congregation.

The question of arrears yearly accumulating has been to the Managers a source of much trouble and anxiety. The arrears of 1887 amounts to the large sum of \$537.36 - an amount sufficient to wipe out the whole floating debt. The Managers are of the opinion that this accumulation of arrears from year to year is to a

large extent if not wholly due to the Envelope system

The session and Managers at a joint meeting gave the matter their earnest consideration and after much deliberation resolved to adopt the Pew-Rent system fully elieving that it will work more satisfactorily and produce better results than the present plan.

The pew-rent is placed at a uniform price of Four dollars per sitting throughout the whole of the Church—payable quarterly in advance. As the amount raised this way will not be sufficient to raise the revenue required, a supplementary subsepription will be expected from those whose circumstances will enable them to give which will also be payable quarterly in advance with the pew-rent.

An appeal will shortly be made to the congregation, and the Managers hope that the new system now about to be introduced

will receive a hearty generous and liberal support.

The open sabbath collections will be taken up morning and evening as usal and it is expected that all will realize the necessity of cheerfully and liberally contributing to this important weekly

The retiring members of the board by rotation are James Ben-

noch, Joseph Rankin, and J. P. Macdonald.
