Finance Committee Given
Authority to Extend
Time

COUNCIL IN SESSION

Coun Jardine Complains of
Being Ignored By Other
Members of Com.

The Town Council met on Tuesday evening. His Worship Mayor Murray presiding and Couns. McLennan, Jardine, McLean, Andrew, Miller, Taylor and Doherty being present.

The deeds from Patrick Smith and Neil Smith in the Smith Lake purchase were submitted and ordered to be placed on record in the registry office.

The release from J.B. Christie, other in settlement of past house matter was ordered to be filed.

The plan of the eastern boundary of the town prepared by W. E. Fish was submitted and referred to committee.

Coun McLennan, from Police & License Com. submitted report recommending that Tom Le Blanc be granted license for barber shop on payment of \$10.00 and that S. W. Dimock's request for exemption of license fee for moving picture show be granted.

Report adopted.

The motion passed at last meeting ordering payment of Jos Salter's Sons accounts for coal at a reduction of 65 cents per ton, was reconsidered and payment ordered at 25 cents reduction, according to the offer made by Messrs Salter.

The Finance Com. were given authority to extend the time for receiving tenders for debentures if it was thought advisable.

In reply to an enquiry Coun. Miller stated that no offer had yet been received for debentures, although several parties had asked for information, which had been given.

Coun McLennan asked if work had been commenced on the new dam.

Coun Andrew replied that a number of men had gone back to the lake that day to prepare for work.

The Clerk and Treasurer were requested to furnish statements of licenses issued since April 1st.

The Treasurer was instructed to furnish a list of defaulters for 1906.

Coun McLennan asked why a good plank sidewalk had been torn up at the lower end of the town and a concrete walk put down. He thought that some sections in the upper part of the town, where the sidewalk was in poor condition should have been attended to first.

Coun Taylor said that the sidewalk referred to was not in good condition and needed attention.

Coun Jardine said that he as a member of the committee had not been consulted regarding this matter as well as the payment to Geo St Onge of \$140.00 for moving building. He felt that the committee were not doing the right thing by him.

W. A. Trueman, town solicitor, read a clause in the deed of new street by Joseph Duncan to the town, where it was stipulated that the proposed street should be called Middleton street. The Solicitor explained that this was objected to by the other grantors of street and there was a deadlock in the matter.

It was thought that a way out of the difficulty could be reached by securing from Robert Duncan a new cross street to the proposed street and the Council could have the right to name it as desired.

The plans and specifications for new town building were submitted to the Council and on motion it was decided to call for tenders for the erection of the building, said to have been received up to noon of October 8th.

Telegraphic Ticks

Mr. Rudyard Kipling has given a definite promise that he will address the Canadian Club of Toronto, but the date has not yet been decided on.

James J. Jeffries the greatest fighter in the world, passed through Quebec, Friday morning on a trip around the Saguenay. He arrived by the R. & O. steamer from Montreal, at an early hour, and parted reluctantly with the many passengers on board, as they had all grown very friendly towards the big fellow, who interested them quite a bit on the trip down to Quebec, by telling them many little incidents of his career.

The Springhill strike has now been on for ten weeks, and is the longest in the history of the mining town. There is said to be a possibility that the mechanics will be called out. If they quit work a new phase of the strike will be entered on and one that may bring about some settlement of the difficulty. A report says there has been no suffering in town, and but very little relief work has to be done. Conditions have been materially helped by the large number of men who have left the town.

An automobile containing Mrs. Wm. Graham, of Santa Barbara, Cal., her daughter and a governess, knocked down and killed a peasant, Friday near Auxerre, about a hundred miles from Paris. The chauffeur, in trying to avoid the accident, ditched the machine and its occupants were thrown out. Mrs. Graham was cut about the head, and the governess had an arm broken, but Miss Graham and the chauffeur were not hurt. The party were taken to Paris in an auto-ambulance.

Sir Geo. Arbuthnot, head of the firm of Arbuthnot & Co., of Madras who was arrested on May 2 in connection with the failure of its London house, P. Macfadyen & Co., in October last, which caused the head of the latter firm to commit suicide, was Friday convicted of breach of trust and sentenced to eighteen months' rigorous imprisonment. Sir George Arbuthnot has been chairman of the Chamber of Commerce of Madras seven times and six times a member of the Legislative Council. He is a fellow of Madras University and was chairman of the Indian famine fund of 1900.

Some time ago it was announced that Messrs MacKenzie & Mann intended putting a steamer on the Bay of Fundy. They own a railroad in Nova Scotia, running from Victoria Beach, opposite Digby, and connecting with their Halifax and Southwestern system, between Halifax and Yarmouth. It is now said that next season will see a considerable extension of their services in this section. One report is that they will put on two fine boats between Boston and Yarmouth to compete with the D. A. R., and that they will also put on the Bay steamer and will devote considerable energy towards directing travel in this direction.

Otto Olsen and Charles Dalkrist were killed at a crossing at Norman, Ont., while driving home from a dance early Friday morning.

Mrs. Mary Brander while on her way to the Royal Alexandra Theatre, Toronto, Friday night had an attack of heart failure and dropped dead.

The dinner given by the Sultan at Constantinople to Admiral Sir Charles Drury and his officers was a gorgeous affair. All the dinner table service, including the forks and spoons, was made of solid gold.

One political club in New York city has 387 members in the fire department, 184 in the dock department, 287 in the street cleaning department, and 39 affiliated young women who are public school teachers.

Chicago's "lightning divorce judge," with a speed record of 20 divorces in twenty minutes, appeared as a lecturer at the Rockford chautauqua recently and was "escorted around the grounds by a score of admiring women."

The Cunard line steamer Lusitania, from New York Sept 25, arrived here at 3.56 a. m. Friday, the passage thus occupying 5 days, 4 hours and 19 minutes, or 4 hours 25 minutes more than her outward run. The only record broken was that of the Lucania of the same line.

The Hamburg-American Steamship Co. has placed an order for a trans-Atlantic steamship larger than the Cunard liner Lusitania. The new vessel will have a combination of turbine and reciprocating engines. The hull will be built at Belfast and the engines will be supplied by a Clydebank firm.

Rear Admiral Chadwick, in an address at Newport, Va., on municipal government, said he had studied the European systems and he considered that those in Germany are the best. The mayorality there is a profession, where a highly trained and experienced city administrator may be called from city to city.

A despatch from Mobile says that the white men of Whistler, Ala., are armed for an organized attack of negroes who are said to be en route to Whistler to avenge the lynching of the negro, Dossett, last Sunday night. Fire alarm signals have been arranged to warn the whites.

W. M. King, Deputy Minister of Labor, after studying the Oriental labor question says Orientals are not employed because they are cheap, but that they have superseded whites in sawmills and like work because of their sobriety and efficiency. He found some Chinese employed in sawmills at wages of four dollars a day.

Additional reports by mail and by coast steamers from remote points show that sixteen, and possibly twenty-four lives were lost about the Newfoundland coast during the equinoctial gales of Thursday last. Seventy-five fishing vessels were wrecked and much damage done to the wharves and fishing gear. The financial loss is estimated at a quarter of a million dollars.

"Everybody Works but Father," is no longer to be true in Detroit, if the provisions of a new law, effective Friday, are strictly enforced. By the terms of the act regarding husbands and fathers will be obliged to support their wives and families by toiling in the workshop, if they decline to furnish the necessities of life under a condition of liberty. The wives of the lazy ones will be allowed \$1.50 per week from the labor of the latter in the prison. It is believed by the officials that the new law will have a wholesome effect on

the men, who have a tendency to abandon their families to the mercies of the wolf of poverty.

It is reported that the Federal Grand Jury has found six indictments in San Francisco against officials of the South Pacific Railroad and Pacific Mail Steamship Companies for violations of the rate laws. These indictments are said to contain 140 counts, and it is understood that E. H. Hariman, J. C. Stubbs and R. H. Schwerin of the Pacific Mail, are included among the officials named.

The Ursuline nuns were expelled from their residence Friday by a detachment of troops, assisted by gendarmes. The Sisters, who kept a large girls' school, are very popular in the neighborhood, and a large crowd gathered and expressed their displeasure at the proceeding. They cheered the nuns repeatedly, and the gendarmes were powerless to disperse them.

At a meeting of the Council of the Municipality of New Richmond, held on the seventeenth day of August, in the year 1907, there being present John Fallow, Esq., Mayor, Messrs. Alphonse Bassinault, Edmund Miller, Angus Campbell, and Thomas Fair-service, Councillors, under the presidency of the Mayor it was resolved as follows:

WHEREAS it is in the interest of this Municipality that a certain encouragement should be offered to the Caspacia Manufacturing and Trading Company, a body corporate and politic, having its principal office and place of business at New Richmond, in the County of Bonaventure, in the District of Gaspe, in order to have the said Caspacia Manufacturing and Trading Company build, erect, maintain and operate its mills within the limits of this Municipality; and whereas the said Caspacia Manufacturing and Trading Company, aforesaid, has offered to the said Municipality, the sum of \$2000.00 in order to purchase and buy in the Taylor and LeBlanc properties, the said properties to be used by the said Company for a mill site.

That this by-law will have force and effect only on its having been approved by the electors being proprietors of practical real estate within the limits of this Municipality as the whole is by law provided;

That in order to provide for the said sum of \$2000.00 that this Municipality be authorized to issue, sell and negotiate in the name of this Municipality debentures for a sum not exceeding \$2000.00; That the said debentures will bear interest at the rate of five per cent. per annum;

That the said debentures thus issued will be signed by the Mayor of this Municipality and countersigned by the Secretary Treasurer of the said Municipality and sealed with the seal of this Municipality; and the said debentures will be payable to the bearers thereof in ten, fifteen, twenty and twenty-five years from date of their issue at the office of the Bank of Nova Scotia at New Richmond;

That each debenture will be for the sum of one hundred dollars;

That there will be attached to each debenture coupon for the amount of the yearly interest, which said coupons will be signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the Secretary Treasurer of this Municipality; and the said coupons will be payable to the bearer thereof when the interest will become due each year, and on payment of the said interest the said coupons will be handed over to the said Secretary Treasurer;

That each year a sum of \$450.00 will be raised by direct taxation on the holders of real estate in this Municipality, which said sum will be to pay the interest on the said debentures each year as they become due and the revenues of this Municipality are by these presents effected and made liable to the said sum;

That there will also be established by this by-law for the buying back of the said debentures, a sinking fund, said sinking fund to be for the sum of three hundred dollars, and shall be collected yearly from the holders of real estate in this Municipality by direct taxation, which said sum will be yearly paid to the Secretary Treasurer of this Municipality;

That the issue of the said debentures, principal and interest fixed upon or by these presents, be also guaranteed and secured on the general funds of this Municipality;

That the aforesaid sum will be handed over to the said Caspacia Manufacturing and Trading Company for the reasons aforesaid, and subject also to the following conditions:

That the said Company will build, establish, erect, maintain and operate yearly in this Municipality, their plant consisting of a pulp mill, single mill and long lumber mill with an annual capacity of twenty-five million feet, the whole to cost about one million dollars; said 25 million feet to be cut yearly;

That the said Company will build within a year, and operate every year;

That this by-law will only have force and effect after having been sanctioned as provided by Article 48, and others of the Municipal Code of the Province of Quebec;

Given under the seal of this Municipality on the 17th day of the month of August, in the year of our day and first above written.

for the massive trimmings. Instead of the heavy back effects we are all familiar with, which gave the appearance of dragging the poor wearer's head off her shoulders, we now have large front trimmings. For an effect of this kind the crowns are rather low, with the trimming arranged well forward over it. Brims are wide at the sides and in the back, and where they are naturally narrow in front they are wired and rolled off the face to give this effect. Nothing, though is better form for an all round hat than a broad brimmed sailor trimmed with huge wings. Light wings are used on dark felts, and the rule is reversed on light ones. Two and even four pairs of wings are often used, and the most artistic results are gained when there is no other trimming. When the stiff brim of the sailor hat is not becoming, the trouble may be overcome by turning it up slightly, at the left side in cavalier fashion or curving the brim downward back and front or making it drop all round like the cloche shape. These upturned brims are faced with velvet in a darker tone than the hat. Taffeta silk is also used for facings, and the all taffeta chapeau that has been worn by chic women here in Paris all summer is now sent over to you as a fall model. Bandeaux are seen on almost every model, but they serve as a resting place for malices such

as jugs or flowers rather than as a means of tilting the shape itself. Parisiennes have even been guilty of employing the bandeau as a foundation on which to pin false hair. Of course such a cache-peigne is not attached to the hat, but is taken off with it.

CRUSHED IN BOWS MODISH

Crushed in bows are a fad of millinery, and they are very uncommon looking when well made. They seem very careless, these crushed in bows of velvet, satin or lace, but if not scientifically wired and shaped they look amateurish. As a rule, they are large and wide, with plenty of material allowed for the crushing process. Clipped beavers and fine French felts rival each other in all the new shapes, and the beavers are shown in dressy as well as in the tailored hats. The favorite trimmings are feathers and flowers and not infrequently a combination of both. The idea of an ostrich or marabout boa wreathed about the crown of a large clipped beaver shape is one of the accepted fancies of the season. Another attractive hat is of green clipped beaver of the high crowned, broad brimmed cult that drops slightly all round. A bandeau an inch and a half high tips the hat a little at one side and is trimmed with brown malines. No matter what the color scheme of a hat may be this season, the malines bandeau exactly matches the hair. The crown of the green hat is encircled with a ruching of brown satin ribbon, and posed at the side are two green ostrich tips of medium size beneath a bunch of coppery roses. The brim is faced with brown satin.

WONDERFUL COLORINGS USED

Never before in the history of

millinery have the color combinations been so artistic and in some cases so bizarre. Take, for instance, as an example of queerness a combination of blue, green and purple. Yet this seeming incongruity of nuances is blended into a perfectly fascinating ensemble on a Carlier hat. It is fetching, too, to put many shades of the same color together, and in this line reds work up remarkably well. But, after all, the black hat has a smartness all its own when of handsome materials that nothing can take away, and it will be worn by the most exclusively modish women with their pastel frocks. Mr. Bernard Shaw says American women dress better than French women, because the latter never look like human beings. Just

wait until this witty Celtic gentleman sees Mlle. Chic in her winter hat and he will call her an angel.

PAPERS IN POLITICS

Are the best interests of this country, or any other country, for that matter, served by hide-bound partisan newspapers? No! Emphatically, no! One trouble, today, with this Eastern Canada of ours is its newspapers. There is scarcely one daily, semi-weekly or weekly, between Sydney and Campbellton, which isn't bound hand and foot to one or the other of the two great political parties of this country. It would be difficult indeed to find one which was at all independent in politics. This is an unfortunate state of affairs, and it is made worse by the fact that there is scarcely one among all these newspapers, that possesses the honesty, the manhood to censure its own party when it is in the wrong, and praise the opposing party when it is in the right. These papers misrepresent, quibble, lie in the most barefaced fashion imaginable. Is it possible the opinions of their readers are subjected to any perceptible change as the result of perusing their dishonest columns? We are not so silly as to believe that those of intelligent persons are, but those of the low-browed, dyed-in-the-wool partisans may be. Not long ago two newspapers, which, by the way, were about the only really independent newspapers that exercised any influence in the lower provinces were purchased by a man who might be said to belong to the inner circle of the conservative party in New Brunswick. The bluff was put up at the time that these papers would continue as independent in politics. That the new owner did not at once announce that they would support the Conservative party, was, we believe, due to the fact that he wished to retain the services of the editors who had piloted the papers to success as independent journals. In fact, we have every reason to believe that one stipulation made by the man who parted with the papers was, that the services of the two editorial chiefs were to be retained. After exercising a potent influence as independent newspapers and giving the provincial and federal governments full credit for all that they had accomplished for the benefit of the country, it would be the height of folly to have these same editors come out all at once and denounce all the good works of the two governments. So it was decided that the papers were to be called independents. Then gradually the process of degenerating from independence to partisanship took place, until today both these papers are about the rank and file conservative organs to be found in the provinces. The men, who, three months ago, were praising the good deeds of the liberal party are now engaged in denouncing these self same deeds, the men, who three months ago looked upon Dr. Pugsley as the man best fitted to serve the interests of New Brunswick, in the cabinet of Sir Wilfrid Laurier are now engaged in belittling him in every manner possible and at every opportunity, the men who three months ago were rendering a service to this country are now jeopardizing its interests. Of course they will not succeed in working the country serious injury, because, the majority of people understand why these papers were purchased, and for what their editors are now paid. If "Events" supports a political party, it is because it believes the policies of that party are the safest and soundest, and that the men who dictate them are the best fitted to administer the affairs of the country.

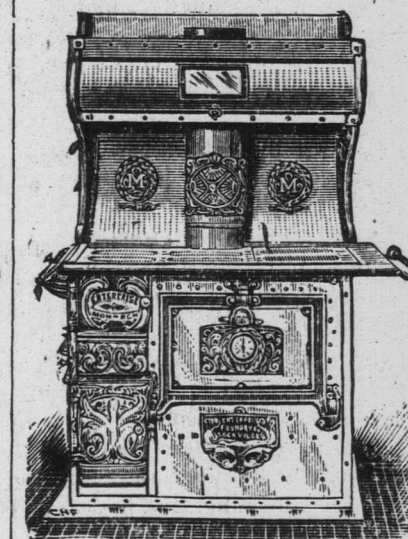

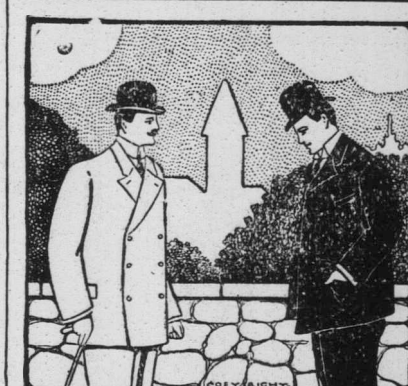

TOWN TOPICS

Rev. W. A. Thomson will preach at Moore's Settlement on Thursday, Oct. 10th at 6 o'clock p. m.

Fred McLean was committed for trial by Magistrate Matheson last week on a charge of stealing a watch and chain from Hugh Marquis.

There were thirty-nine drunks before Magistrate Matheson during the month of August and two criminal cases. The fines collected amounted to \$86.

Angus Dugay, arrested on suspicion of being one of two boys who burglarized the store of Moore Bros. was sent up for trial last week by Magistrate Matheson.

A McG. McDonald and C. F. Clare walked out to Smith's Lake early yesterday morning and had a look at the town's recent purchase and the beaver dam which is there.

Three new steel spans arrived here Saturday for the I. N. R. One was taken out of the line, Monday, at just as it is placed in position the others will be taken out.

The beavers have built a dam at Smith's Lake about three or four feet from where the town intends to build one. The beaver dam has already raised the water in the lake at least four feet.

Alfred G. Vanderbilt and August Belmont, who were in search of big game at Amqui have returned to New York. Mr. Belmont left by special train on Sunday, and Mr. Vanderbilt left on Tuesday. They were very successful, obtaining a caribou and moose each.

The Maritime Express coming east from Montreal, was derailed some time during Sunday afternoon at Aston Junction, seventy-two miles west of Lewis. The train was number 41 and was due in Lewis at 5:05 p. m. The passengers were transferred to a mixed freight train and arrived in Lewis at midnight, seven hours late. Intercolonial officials state that none of the passengers were injured, the damage being confined to the rolling stock, but the engine was said to be badly derailed. The train was not seen until seven hours late reaching Campbellton.

Col Ogilvie, district staff adjutant of military district No. 8 was in Campbellton, Tuesday evening, and inspected the equipment of F. Company, 73rd regiment. He also transferred the clothing and other equipment over to Lieut. McKenzie. While here Col Ogilvie also inspected the rifles of the Restigouche Rifle Association and found them in a very satisfactory condition. He intimated that five Ross rifles would be sent here in time for next year's shooting. He inspected the Armouries of B Company at Chatham, yesterday, and today he is at Blackville inspecting G Company. Col Ogilvie will also inspect the clothing of the Twelfth Field Battery at Newcastle before he returns to St John.

A very enjoyable affair took place, Monday evening, in Sharpe's restaurant, when the members of St. Andrew's Presbyterian church choir assembled for the purpose of presenting Barclay Gerrard with a handsome sterling silver cake dish. Mr. Gerrard is a valued member of the choir and is to be married shortly. About twenty-six sat down to a well loaded table at which oysters and cocoa were served. Fruit and other delicacies of the season. After ample justice had been done the good things, Judge Matheson in a neat and appropriate speech, on behalf of the choir presented the gift. Mr. Gerrard in a few well chosen words tendered his thanks for the handsome gift presented him, and spoke of the friendly feeling existing between himself and the other members of the choir.

All who ever came in contact with him esteemed him highly. Deceased leaves two daughters, Maud at home, and Mrs. E. F. Payne whose husband is connected with the D. A. R. in Nova Scotia. He also leaves five sons, James M. in South Africa, George, mechanical superintendent with a navigation company in Ontario; Ernest and Harry employed in banks in Ontario and Charles employed on the International Railway here. Mr. Johnston was a Mason and a member of the Royal Arcanum. The funeral of deceased takes place on Friday afternoon. His will be buried with masonic honors. He was 62 years of age.

Dr. Pidgeon occupied the pulpit in St. Andrew's Presbyterian church and preached a most interesting sermon before a large congregation.

While the three-masted schooner Great, of Dalhousie, Capt. Mosher, was loading at Stonehaven, Gloucester County, Thursday afternoon, one of the crew, Peter Jamieson, aged 21 years, of Norway, was instantly killed. The accident occurred by a large stone weighing over two tons slipping and falling on him while being lowered into the vessel.

La Justice announces that Alphonse E. Turgeon, son of O. Turgeon, M. P. for Gloucester, has been sworn in as attorney general of Saskatchewan, to succeed his law partner, Hon. J. H. Lamont, who was recently appointed to fill the vacancy on the supreme court bench. Mr. Turgeon will likely contest the by-election which takes place on October 12th.

On Friday night at Harcourt the first class coach of the Maritime Express, caught fire from the Finisch Oil plant; and for a few minutes a dangerous conflagration was threatened. The passengers had to leave the cars, in a hurry. However, the connections were broken, and the danger averted. Lanterns afforded light for the rest of the trip to Montreal.

They succeeded in getting a fine head. Mr. Cowles tells a very interesting story of his sojourn in the woods. He saw 37 animals, 21 bulls and 16 cows. He says it is a common thing to see a moose go out into ten or fifteen feet of water and disappear entirely, while feeding on the bottom of the lake. They would remain under water without breathing for periods ranging from 35 seconds to 1 1/4 minutes.
