## BIG IMMIGRATION INFLUX PROMISED

Toronto, Dec. 28.—What promises to be one of the largest movements of immigrants into Canada for some years, will take place during the first two months of 1924, according to C. N. R. officials. Not until the end of March, it was said, will there be an end to the influx.

Six transatlantic lines have completed arrangements with the Canadian Government for the carrying of the immigrants from Europe. Despite the large number of sailings which has been announced by each line, arrangements have been made for the handling of the traffic in Canada.

Further announcement of the dates of arrival will be made by the C. N. R.

## JUDGMENT IN FOREST FIRE CASE

Defendant in Quebec Case Must Pay for Pulwood Destroyed

A judgment of considerable importance in view of the recent fires that have been devastating this country, was rendered by the Court of Appeal, Quebec, a short time ago.

The facts are as follows:—One Fournier had bought a lot of land from a settler who held a location ticket from the Crown, but who did not have the letters patent. A neighbouring settler, residing on the next lot, set fire to some brush on his lot and the fire spread to Fournier's lot and burnt a large quantity of standing lumber and also several hundred cords of peeled pulwood.

Fournier sued his neighbour for damages, claiming the value of the standing lumber and the value of the manufactured pulwood. Sénéchal, the defendant, pleaded that Fournier could not get judgment against him for two reasons: first, because the fire had spread through no fault of his, and second, he denied that Fournier had a proper title to the land on which he claimed. The wood was cut and destroyed.

Under the law of the Province of Quebec, there is an article that says that a settler, before obtaining his letters patent, cannot transfer his lot to any one else without the consent of the Minister of Colonization of the Province of Quebec, and if he does transfer the lot, the transfer is null and void. Therefore, Sénéchal pleaded that the plaintiff Fournier, did not obtain this authorization before he bought the lot, and he has no right to the land in question and therefore, no right to the pulwood that he made.

The plaintiff, Fournier, who was represented by the Honorable John Hall Kelly, K. C., answered by saying that it was true that he had not obtained the sanction or permission of the Minister of Colonization when he bought the lot, but that in dependent of this he was entitled to be paid for the wood that he had manufactured, seeing that the manufactured article represented not only the standing lumber, but also the value of his labor.

In the Supreme Court, the plaintiff lost his case and the Honorable Judge Letellier decided that the plaintiff had not obtained the necessary sanction from the Department, that he had no right to anything and therefore his case was dismissed with costs.

The case was then carried to appeal, and the Court of King's Bench (five Judges sitting), reversed the judgment of the Superior Court and decided that, although the plaintiff had not obtained the sanction of the Minister of Colonization, still, he was entitled to be paid for the value of the wood that he had manufactured, which had been destroyed by fire set by the defendant, Sénéchal.

In the Superior Court and in the Court of Appeal the plaintiff was represented by the Honorable John Hall Kelly, K. C., and the defendant Mr. Charles Angers.

The Court of Appeal in rendering judgment in favor of the plaintiff, also condemned the defendant to pay all costs of both Courts.

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## QUEBEC OFFICIAL IS INVESTIGATING

Meanwhile \$2,400 Worth of Skins Are Still Being Held by Authorities

Fredericton, Dec. 28.—The investigation in connection with the seizure of 159 beaver skins, valued at \$2,400, from Morris Rappaport, a local fur dealer, which bore province of Quebec royalty stamps, has been placed in the hands of a special investigator from the province of Quebec, who has arrived here to take up the matter with Chief Game Warden J. A. Gagnon. Following a brief conference here the investigator has proceeded to the North Shore to investigate the circumstances surrounding the consignment of the skins from the firm of Rosenheck & Gilman, of Campbellton.

The beaver skins were held when it appeared that they were of such an age as to have been secured out of season, there being no open season in New Brunswick and the season in Quebec opening only on December 15th.

It has been hinted that the officials may unearth a scheme of surprisingly large extent as a result of the investigation and that its ramifications may finally prove international in character.

The Quebec official mentioned above arrived here Saturday morning and took up the matter from this end. In conversation with the Graphic he said that he expected to go further into the matter at an early date, when he thought he would be able to prove something.

Paris, Dec. 31.—Louis Duvauval, a 78-year-old druggist, pardoned in 1902 after serving 24 years of a life sentence imprisonment imposed in 1878, after he was found guilty of poisoning his wife, and who was given amnesty in 1919 because his two sons were killed in war, had his name cleared completely yesterday by action of the court of cassation.

Duvauval showed through experts that the scientific evidence on which he was convicted was erroneous and that his wife died of a kidney disease of which nothing was known at the time. The court quashed the old conviction, granting him a pension of 12,000 francs and damages amounting to 20,000 francs.

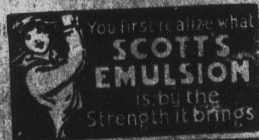
