Enthusiastic Reception to the Member for Longford.

Ireland's Urgent Need of Home Rule-Evils of the System of Perpetual Landlordism.

TORONTO, Sept. 19.—The reception given this evening to Hon. E. Blake, Home Rule member for Longford in the British House of Commons, was a grand success both as regards numbers and enthusiasm. Although admission was by ticket the Horticultural Pivilion was crowded with an audience of more than 4,000, and many hundreds of disappointed ticket-holders were turned away.

Hon. Frank Smith presside and the address of the reception committee was read by Rev. Dr. Burns, president of the Wesleyan Ladies' College, Hamilton.

Mr. Blake was received with wild enthusiasm, and throughout his interesting address was frequently interrupted with prolonged cheering. He outlined the continuous influence that had been brought to bear on the cause of Irish home rule by the people and Parliament of Canada, and told how the moral support of the people's representatives had never failed when the cause seemed most hopeless.

The whole speech was characterized by Mr. Blake's recognized fairness in debate, and when dealing with the opponents of the cause he advocated, and the possible motives of which they were actuated, he was always fair and considerate. In dealing with the economic evils he clearly showed how the condition of the people was due to the existence of a perpetual class of landlords and a perpetual class of tenants—a condition under which the producing class was despoiled of everything but the barest subsistence. Sometimes, he said, they were not even allowed to retain a bare living, and the contributions of relatives who had emigrated were absorbed by the landlords. He was convinced of the absolute necessity of a system of resident freeholds.

Addresses were also delivered by Archbishop Walsh and several members of the Dominion and Provincial Parliaments.

FATAL FALL.

Harry Dixen Thrown from a Wagon and Run Over by a Street Car-Death Sone Ends His Sufferings.

STABBED WITH A LEAD PENCIL.

Two Friends Get Into a Row Over

Two Friends Get Into a Row Over a Religious Argument.

New York, Sept. 20.—Thomas Alexandrovitch, a Pole, 31 years old, who was employed in Havemeyer's sugar refinery in Commercial street, Greenpoint, died in the Eastern District Hospital in Williamsburg on Sunday of the effects of a stab wound in the left eye made by the sharp point of a lead pencil in a saloon in Greenpoint, on Sunday last, by Thomas Juzzkowski, of Broome street, New York. The men had been friends for many years. After playing cards in Alexandrovitch's house, in Oakland street and Greenpoint avenue, they went to the saloon, where they had several drinks. They discussed religion, and became involved in a wordy war over the difference between the Catholic and the Episcopal greeds.

Juszkowski took a lead pencil from his pocket to write the address of a friend on a piece of paper. While he was writing Alexandrovitch pushed him and said he was not a good Catholic. Juszkowski swung around the hand in which he had the pencil and drove the sharp point deep into Alexandrovitch's eye. Alexandrovitch fell senseless to the floor and Juszkowski ran away. An ambulance surgeon discovered that the pencil had penetrated the injured man's brain. Alexandrovitch was taken to the hospital in terrible agony.
Juszkowski, who was arrested soon after the affray and committed to Raymond street jail pending the result of Alexandrovitch's injuries, was arraigned in the Lee Avenue Police Court, and held to await the action of the coroner. Asiatic Cholera in the Camp at Sandy Hook.

A Stampede of the People Is Feared.

Another Case Reported in New York City-Numerous Cases in Holland-Troops Spread the Disease

in Bessarabia.

THE CAMP AT SANDY HOOK.

CAMP LOW, N. J., Sept. 19.—Three hundred and sixty-we detained passengers were brought here this morning from Hoffman Island, making the total population of quarantine here 1,056 persons.

A FRESH OUTBREAK.

CAMP LOW, Sept. 20.—12:10 a.m.—It is efficially announced at this late hour that Asiatic cholera has broken out here. Francesco Moreno, who was landed here Sunday morning, died of the disease at 1 p.m. The body will be cremated at Swinburne Island. A widow, name unknown at present, who was accompanied by her four small children was taken ill with every symptom of the disease shortly after 11 p.m., and Dr. Rauch, the cholera expert, immediately had the family removed to an isolated tent. The man's death is said to have been largely due to the excesses in which he indulged on Monday night.

Great excitement prevaits among the officials of the camp, and fears are entertained of a stampede of the people here from fear when the fact is made public. The dead man and the infected family were passengers by the Normannia and had been in quarantine for eighteen days.

Louis Weinhagen, a coachman, 35 years of age, was removed to-night by the New York health authorities from his boarding-house Nos. 4 and 6 Extra Place, to the floating hospital at the foot of East Sixteenth street. He is believed to be suffering from an attack of Asiatic cholera.

The Board of Health report that in the case of the man Smith reputed siek with chelera at 460 West Thirty-first street, investigation shows it was not cholera.

PARIS, Sept. 19.—In this city and its suburbs to-day 29 new cholera cases and 15 deaths are reported, including 16 new cases and 4 deaths in St. Ouen.

In Andericcht, Austria, one new case of cholera and three deaths to-day.

In Rotterdam three new cases and two deaths. Numerous cases of cholerine and some deaths from the maiady are reported irom other towns in Holland.

HOW IT SPREADS.

LONDON, Sept. 20.—Prof. Drasche, the Vienna specialist for cholera, has a long article on the epidemic in the Neue Freie Presse. It is one of Prof. Drasche's chief arguments that the cholera bacillus cannot enter except by the mouth, that it must pass the stomach, where the natural acid of a healthy man will kill it, if only the person's digestive faculties are in perfect order.

The steamer Uranus, from Hamburg, arrived at Hull on Monday, with one of her crew suffering with cholera. The man was removed to a hospital and the vessel quarantined.
