WASHINGTON, Dec. 18 .- President Cleveand to-day sent to Congress a message on the Hawaiian questions. He says he is convinced that the difficulties lately created here and in Hawaii and now standing in the way of the solution of the question through executive action, render it proper that the matter should be submitted to the broader authority and discretion of Congress. When the present Administration entered upon its duties it found the Senate and under consideration a treaty for the annexation of Hawaii. From documents accompanying the treaty it appeared that the working of the Maraii had been tendered by the Provisional Government which had displaced the Queen. It did not appear that the Provisional Government had the sanction of either popular revolution or suffrage. The message of the President accompanying the treaty declared that the overthrow of the monarchy was not in any way prompted by this Government, and that at the time the Provisional Government took possession no United States troops were present, but a protest from the Queen accompanied the said treaty which said that he yielded to the superior forces of the United States, whose Minister had caused troops to be landed, and declared he would support the Provisional Government.

THE BRITISH OUTLOOK.

Gladstone refuses to permit the House c Commons to make a longer Christmas adournment than five days, because he regards it as decidedly in the public interest that the bill establishing parish councilsa most democratic measure—shall be passed during the present session of Parliament. This determination to keep the House working, and to atone in some measure for its unnecessary waste of time in attempting to burk the Irish Home Rule Bill, has noved the opponents of the present Ministry to assert that the Grand Old Man is hard pressed, and that he is merely fighting to avoid going to the country because he is afraid to face the people. But the facts do not support the allegation. The present British Ministers were returned to Parliament, not to pass a Home Rule measure alone, but to put on the statute book what is now known as the Newcastle programme. They passed the bill conferring a measure of Irish self-government on he Irish: it was no fault of theirs that the class opposition in the House of Lords defeated the voice of the populace, and it would have been absurd, within a year of the last general election, to have put the country to the expense of another conflict. Hence the determination to pro seed with other legislative measures without for a moment forgetting that in du course the Irish ameliorating legislation must be put on the statute book in spite of the habitual wreckers of democratic

egislation. The charge that the new House of Com nens has done nothing is not true, though it would have accomplished a great deal more if it had met with less senseless obstruction. It has found time to pass various measures serviceable to the Eng-lish people; for instance, the Railway Servants' Hours Act, which was acceptable to trades-unionist opinion; an amendment of the Eduration Act; the Agricultural Fertilizers and Feeding Studs Act and the Savings Bank Amendment Act. Moreover, a resolution was passed in favor of the paying of members of the House of Commons, an innovation essential to the adequate representation of labor in the Legislature. The improvements in the administration of affairs under the present Government has been great. It has organized a labor department of the Board of Trade, which has working men and women for its correondents; it has appointed additional facory inspectors, among whom women are, for the first time, included; it has pub-lished an official Labor Gazette of indisputable service to labor; it has rigorously enforced the factory acts and organized a lepartmental committee to supervise occu pations dangerous to health; it has ap pointed representative workmen as magis trates; it has introduced the eight hours rule in the cartridge department at Wool wich; it has fixed a minimum wage in the Government dockyards; and finally, it has interfered to protect trades unionists in non-unionist workshops.

It is admitted that the Ministry has not moved so fast as the Redmonds of Ireland,

the Laboucheres of England, or the Camerons of Scotland think that it ought; but the question to be considered is whether cr not the reforms already accomplished would have been undertaken by a Con-servative Ministry. No one believes that Lord Salisbury would have passed as many advanced measures in so short a time. No one believes that the Conservative leader would undertake any of the reforms that Mr. Gladstone is murmured against for leaving undone. Considering the perthe octogenarian Premier, the prog ress made has really been remarkable. And while the business of the House has been under way, the Ministers have taken time to do other good work. Mr. Gladstone proposed and Lord Rosebery has carried out accessfuliy the plan of arbitration between the miners and their employers. IT'S "CLASS LEGISLATION."

Hon. M. J. Fanning Analyzes the License System.

Some 35,000,000 Barrels of Beer Con sumed in the States Last Year.

Railroad men and workingmen in general to the number of several hundred were present in the East End Hall last night to hear Hon. Michael J. Fanning, the exegineer from Michigan, discuss the various phases of the question which is the almost universal topic of discussion at the present time in this country—the liquor traffic. Mr. Fanning was suffering from an attack of the prevalent grip and was not in very good voice, but in spite of this he held the attention of the audience throughout, receiving rounds of applause when various good points were brought out. Seated on the platform besides the speaker and chairman were Rev. Jos. Philp, T. L. Fowler and Roy. A trio, composed of Messrs. Frank Skinner, R. Heard and W. Lobb, sang a prohibition song in capital style.

Ex. Mayor Taylor occupied the chair. He said that a person could form an opinion of anything in accordance with what was seen. The man of the present day who was addicted to drink was out of order, while the man who attends to his everyday work and looks after the interests of his family was looked upon with respect by all persons of a good social standing.

Mr. Fanning dwoit at some length on the

Mr. Fanning dwolt at some length on the question of license legislation and the manner in which it favored the rich in the United States. As an instance he told a story of a veteran soldier who had enlisted in the American army for a short time, and on returning from the war minus a leg had enough money to purchase a stock of liquor, but not enough to pay for a license. Accordingly he was refused the privilege. But a well-known burghr ceme along with his \$5,000, which he had stolen and hidden while serving a sentence for the crime committed, and got a license without any questions as to respectability. In many more cases the circumstances were similar. Mr. Fanning said on the first of the month the question "Whe should our attitude to the liquor traffic he?" would have to be answered. This, he had no doubt, would be answered in the right and preper way by a large majority ight and proper way by a large majority by the carrying of the prohibition movement. Of the many views in regard to the matter he would tavor the prohibiting of the entire business by supplimenting our moral efforts with prohibitory legislation. Mr. Gladetone, who in Mr. Fanning's estimation was the greatest statesman the world ever knew, said that in England it was the greatest evil and that restriction in law had never proved itself to be restriction in fact, and that the history of the beer trade in the country had proved to be the case. The United States was a grand country for brewers, and it had become such through license legislation. Last year the people on the other side had drank only \$3,000,000 barrels of beer, and all this time it was and on the other side had drank only 35,000,000 barrels of beer, and all this time it was under the legislation system. History and common experience had proven this method a failure. Class legislation of the license law strikes at the personal liberty of the many and favors the few, while prohibition says to the poor man, "you cannot sell," and to the rich man, "neither can you." This was the condition of affairs most desirable and that which the people would have the chance to secure by casting a solid vote on Jan. 1.
