Translation of the Babylonian Cuneiform Texts.

The Civilization of Chaldea Six Thou sand Year Ago-An Old City Dug Up.

The British Museum has recently published in volume form the Cuneiform texts from the Babylonian tablets, now in its keeping, and at Leipzig Dr. Meissner has also published the result of his investigations in the same field. 



Cleveland's Veto.

Killed the Measure That Was Specially Offensive to

Washington, March 3 .- The President's message, vetoing the Immigration Bill, gives at length his objections to the first section of the bill, estab-lishing an educational test, by which the right of a foreigner to make his home with us shall be determined. The message then proceeds: "The fourth section of this bill provides 'that it shall be unlawful for any male alien, who has not in good faith

made his declaration before the proper court of his intention to become a citizen of the United States, to be employed on any public works of the United States, or come regularly or habitually into the United States by land or water, for the purpose of engaging in any mechanical trade or manual labor for wages or salary, returning from time to time to a foreign country.' The fifth section provides that it shall be unlawful for any person, partnership, company or cor-poration, knowingly, to employ any alien coming into the United States, in violation of the next preceding section of this act. The prohibition against the employment of aliens upon any public works of the United States is in line with other legislation of a is in line with other legislation of a like character. It is quite a different however, to declare it a crime for an alien to come regularly and habitually into the United States for the purpose of obtaining work from private parties, if such an alien returns from time to time to a foreign country, and to constitute any employment of any such alien a crin such alien a criminal we consider these offense. When we consider these provisions of the bill in connection with our long northern frontier and boundaries of several of our states and territories to be but an imaginary line, separating them from the British Dominion, and recall the friendly intercourse between the peo-ple, who are neighbors on either side,

provisions of this bill affecting them must be regarded as illiberal, narrow and un-American. The residents of these states and territories have separate and special tests, which in many cases make an exchange of labor between their people and their alien neighbors most important, frequently with the advantage largely in favor of our citizens. This suggests the inexpediency of federal interference with these conditions when not necessary to the correction of a substantial evil affecting the general welfare. Such unfriendly legislation as is proposed could hardly fail to provoke retaliatory measures, to the injury of many of our citizens, who now find employment on adjointh of the uncertainty of ing foreign soil. The uncertainty of construction to which the language of these provisions is subject is a serious objection in a statute which describes a crime. An important element in the offense sought to be created by these

sections is the coming regularly or habitually into the United States. These words are impossible of definite Q and certain construction. A careful examination of this bill has convinced me that for the reasons given and others not specifically stated, its visions are unnecessarily harsh and oppressive, and that its defects in construction would cause vexation and



OCEAN CABLE MAKING.

He Who Does the Jointing Must Keep His Hands Almost Dainty. Jointing is one of the most difficult and delicate operations in Atlantic cable making. To see a joint made I climbed, on one of my visits to Woolwich, up into a swallow nest of a cabin, fastened in some mysterious way to the side of a wall of the 'core' tankroom. In the center of the little room sat an imposing individual, whose charcteristics seemed to be rotundity, profuse sweating and absolute cleanspace with him. A few simple iron tools and several big gas jets served as his equipment. First the assistant out off a few inches from the two ends, pared down the gutta percha in such a way as to leave two or three inches of copper conductor uncovered, beveled each end with a file, laid them together, soldered them, and then wrapped the joint tightly for the distance of half an inch with fine copper wire. This wrapping insures a connection in case the soldering should some time break. The other man so far had done nothing.

It was explained that in the work of jointing the copper he was not allowed to share est it should "spoil his hands." His duty was to joint the gutta percha, an operation in which much depends on delicacy of touch. When the copper joint was done, the core was passed on to him, and he proceeded to pare down the gutta percha until he had perhaps a foot in all to work on. He then heated the gum on each side with a spirit lamp, and with his fingers worked it down until the copper was all evenly covered. His next step was to build up the insulator. One after another strips of gutta percha, which had been heated at the end, were applied, wound around the

core and carefully worked and molded the length of the wound. Should a bit of dust, an air bubble, a speck of moisture, be left in the insulator, it would give trouble later. Hence this heating and kneading and caution against dirt. Experience has shown, too, that no machine will pack the gutta percha at this critical point so perfectly as the human fingers. They alone can feel when the work is progressing properly and is finished satisfactorily. Hence the care to keep them always sensitive, to prevent their becoming callous by rougher work.



Latest Gossip From the British Co.

lumbia Region. Seattle, March 3 .- The Seattle group on Kettle River, Boundary Creek, is making a fine showing of ore in the tunnels that are now being driven or its 300-foot ledge. This ledge is trac-ed through four claims, which give it a length of 6,000 feet, and it is credited with average assays across the full width of \$8 gold, 15 per cent copper, and 5 ounces silver. The Smuggler Company, of Fair-view, has ordered a ten-stamp mill. During the first two weeks of last month \$340,000 worth of ore and copmatte was entered for export to United States at Nelson, on the Columbia River. Most of it was from the mines and smelters of Southern Kootenay. During the same period several large shipments were made by way of Revelstoke. At the Le Roi mine there has been no cessation of work, and the output still averages 150 tons a day. Since
