Toronto, April 30.—Huron County goes dry tonight. The announcement was handed out from the office of Provincial Secretary W. J. Hanna this morning. No extension of existing licenses will be granted, and every hotel bar and shop within the county lines must close up immediately.

Pressure from the temperance workers from Huron influenced the minister's decision. The local license commissioners granted renewals of all licenses for the year, but in the face of such strong opposition from the forces that succeeded in winning a majority for the Scott act, the Provincial Secretary had no alternative but to refuse to sanction the act of his appointees.

Territory Is 800 Miles Long, Including Four Important Towns-Envoys Trying to Clear Up Internal and International Trouble.

Mme. Fremstad was originally scheduled to take part in the concert, but was indisposed and unable to appear: but with Mme. Butt the chief drawing card, even this announcement the day before had no appreciable effect on the attendance.

The English contralto figured twice on the program, each of her groups containing two numbers-Handel's "Rend 'il Sereno" and "Lusinghe piu care," Schubert's "Der Wanderer" and Beethoven's "Creation Hymn," the last-mentioned with organ accompaniment-but her ap pearances on the stage were far more numerous than these would suggest. Time after time the singer was recalled. and innumerable encores were demanded



And these commissioners, inefficient and incompetent as the Tory politicians and press say they were, yet stood by their experts, and refused to give him any more than the engineers allowed. Then Mr. Borden came into power. The old commission was dismissed, and Major Leonard appointed with full charge. Mr. Mc-Arthur's protest was considered by his new employers, and his bill paid, less the amount he offered to throw off. In other words, the new rulers of affairs paid the contractor \$733,000 more than these old incompetent Liberals were wiffing to pay him

FOULEST PRISON IN AMERICA TO BE CLEARED OF INMATES

San Juan de Ulao, Used for Centuries, Yields Up Pitiable Victims From Flooded Dungeons When Americans Unbar Doors.

VERA CRUZ, April 29.—The prison and fortress of San Juan de Ulao, notorious for centuries as perhaps the foulest prison on the American continent, has been ordered by Rear-Admiral Fletcher to be completely vacated immediately. When the American sailors and marines occupied Vera Cruz, there were in this prison, which is constructed in the form of a little island in the harbor, some 400 prisoners, most of whom were confined for political offenses. Three hundred of these men already have been released or transferred to other prisons, but there remain 96 and now these men are to be sent elsewhere.

The inspection by the American authorities verified the tales that had been written and told for generations of the terrible conditions prevailing there. Many dungeons were below the water line when the tide was running in, at which time the inmates, many of whom were half blind on account of their long incarceration in semi-darkness, were drenched. 




