

#### NEW PRINCIPLES OF FINANCE IN THE BRITISH BUDGET.

The original feature of Mr. Lloyd-George's budget is the imposition of a tax upon land values and undeveloped land. The complete reports of his speech which appear in the English papers received this week give a clearer idea of his proposals than could be gleaned from the telegraphic summary. For the purposes of taxation Mr. Lloyd-George made a distinction between agricultural land and land which had a special value artached to it owing to the fact of its covering marketable mineral deposits, or because of its proximity to any concentration of population. Agricultural land, he said, had not appreciated during the past 20 or 30 years, but there had been a marked growth in the value of urban sites. This increase had been due to no expenditure of capital or thought on the part of the ground owners, but was entirely



#### A COSTLY BLOW

#### Fatal Toronto Row Sends One Man Down for Two Years.



London, May 13.-Ten thousand voluntary workers of both sexes are beng enlisted to undertake the duties of stewarding and similar tasks at the great exhibition, entitled "Africa and the East," which is being organized by he Church Missionary Society to take place in the Royal Agricultural Hall from June 8 to July 3.



Bread and Water. To the Editor of The Advertiser: The above questions are of first importance to everyone. In London there has been a good deal said about both. Although the price of flour has been advanced 15 cents per hundred, the bakers are generous enough to say that there is "no immediate likelihood of a change in the price of bread." I think the council made a great mistake when they allowed the bakers to make less than the legal loaf of two pounds.

As a result, the bakers have finally cut the loaf down to one and a quarter pounds for five cents; or eight cents for a two-pound loaf. This means an ad-vance of 60 per cent in price. The water question is just at present.



### CITY AND COUNTY ARE

County Representative Maintains Is Paid for Hospital

Patients.

At the regular meeting of the hospital trust there was a dispute between the city members of the board and the representative of the county Wagstaffe's Old English City and District as to the division of the trust funds donated to the hospital. After considas to the division of the trust funds erable argument it was decided to hold a conference between the city and ounty auditors and the trust, to see if the matter could be adjusted. Mr. Turnbull's contention was that the county was paying the city about \$40 a year too much. When the interest of the trust fund was divided each year, the paying patients and their cost of maintenance was taken out of the general expenses, and the money divided according to the number of poor patients from the city and

ounty, each getting its share. Mr. Turnbull took it from the agreement, that the division should be made the actual number of patients in the hospital, both paying and free patients. By so doing, the county's share would be increased \$40. He refused to sign the voucher for the payment of the money until this sum

#### The Agreement.

Mr. J. C. Judd, K. C., read the original trust agreement, in which it was pointed out that the division should be made proportionately on the number of city and county patients. At that time there were no paying pa-tients. He interpreted the clause to mean that the money should be divided proportionately according to the number of patients sent by the city again proved that they have the best and the number sent by the county, There was no other interpretation than their previous laurels by capturing all that "city and county" patients in the ribbons in class 67 for the best the agreement meant patients sent in by the city and county, poor patients in other words.
