Generals Kuroki and Kuropatkin have been marching northward along parallel lines, both armies being greatly hampered by heavy roads, the Japanese in a rough region and the Russians along a flat country.

St. Petersburg Believes That Kurcpatkin Will Get Away Without More Lossee.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 7-2:10 a.m.-There has been no news from General Kuropatkin since Monday afteroon. This is attributed to the interuption of direct communication with he commander-in-chief, owing to the ransfer of the telegraph office to Muktransfer of the telegraph office to Mukden, whither messages have to be sent by courier. The utmost confidence prevails at the war office that the Russian army is slowly but surely effecting the retreat without serious risk of being cut off. Nevertheless, intense anxiety is felt throughout the whole nation, and this feeling is shared by the Emperor. His majesty is unwilling, at such a juncture, to absent himself from Peterhof, and has countermanded all proposed journeys. He ermanded all proposed journeys. He will not go to Warsaw or Libau, and remains closeted for hours with his military advisers. It is believed that the outcome of these deliberations will e an order to mobilize several more rmy corps.

Late Tuesday evening the Associated Press obtained the following statement from the war office: "No telegrams whatever were received from General Kuropatkin today (Tuesday). It is inferred that only Russian troops remaining at Yentai, Sept. 6, are on the rear guard, whose mission is solely to retard the enemy's movements.
